HB 865

" An Act making a special appropriation to Hope Cottage; and providing for an effective date."

Effect of Bill: The Bill would provide \$400,000 in State funds to Hope Cottage, Inc. of Anchorage to renovate a facility located Chugiak, Alaska. The Facility would be used to provide residential care and habilitation services for the mentally retarded.

Discussion: Because of the lack of available long-term care facilities for the mentally retarded, the Department contracted with Hope Cottage, Inc. to explore the feasibility of renovating a school building in Chugiak, Alaska. Also, because of controversy regarding the type and location of the facility, the Department agreed to share this information and ask for advice from the Developmental Disabilities Council, once the study was completed. This process is not yet complete.


In addition, it was felt by the Department that any necessary renovation would be financed by means of private loan funds which would be recovered by means of Title 19 funding.

Recommendation: The Department endorses the concept of use of public funds to aid private non-profit organizations in the development of community supported facilities for the Developmentally Disabled.


However, because of the points made in the Discussion Section and because HB-865 will increase the State spending level beyond the Governor's request, we do not recommend passage of the Bill at the present time and in its present form.

HOPE COTTAGE

FEASIBILITY STUDY FOR THE CHUGIAK FACILITY

STATEMENT OF THE PROBLEM:

The Ridgeview Nursing Home, housing 75 residents, found it necessary to shut its doors. Fifty of these residents have found alternative housing in other nursing homes, family homes or out of the State. This left a total of 25 residents for whom alternative housing was not available. These people are temporarily housed in the Alaska Psychiatric Institute, (API). It is a general consensus that this is an inappropriate setting and there is much urgency on the part of the State to find an alternative. As a minimum of 11 of these residents are primarily mentally retarded, there is need for mental retardation expertise in finding appropriate placement for these adults. In keeping with Hope Cottage's philosophy and normalization concepts (see attached) we think that the organization and professional staff could provide the service and appropriate programing for these persons, if a facility were to be established.

The Chugiak Benefit Association initiated communication with the State Department of Health and Social Services indicating an interest in providing a facility for this type of usage. This Association exists to provide community services, i.e., helping the Little League and the Senior Citizens. They are recognized as a non-profit association of Chugiak land owners and our interviews with them have shown that they appear to have no surreptitious gains in providing the facility for Hope Cottage. In actuality, it would provide the opportunity for community involvement in human services in which they are interested. It would also provide jobs, financial opportunities, and volunteer opportunities for the community of Chugiak. (For the By-laws and Articles of Incorporation of the Chugiak Benefit Association, see attached.)

METHODOLOGY

Given the above information, Hope Cottage proposed to the State that a small grant to complete a Feasibility Study would be advisable. It would determine if the facility in Chugiak (which had been used as a school for 350 children) could be suitably remodeled into a quality treatment program for developmentally disabled residents requiring the Intermediate Care Facility for the Mentally Retarded (ICF/MR) standards of care.

The grant proposed to provide an architectural plan and cost analysis for the necessary renovations to meet regulations, a plan for a service and staffing pattern, and a plan for meeting the Life Safety Code.

Once this contract with the State was accepted, the following steps were taken in order to meet the requirements. The State Life Safety Code Surveyor, Bill Mears, made two visits

to the facility. One of these visits was with two members of the Architectural firm of John Graham and Company, (Bob Bezek and John Courage) hired to do the necessary architectural work study. Previous to this visit, Bill Mears had done a Life Safety Code Study. At this visit the architects reviewed this study and the building for conformance to the code. Using drawings provided by the Chugiak Benefit Association, the team reviewed the facility in terms of conforming with the program which Hope Cottage had presented to them and bringing it to code. John Graham and Company spent approximately 20 hours evaluating the information. Also the following people visited the facility: Jim Hotchkiss, State ARCA President; Dr. Robison and Roxy Pomeroy, the API Superintendent and Administrative Assistant; Dr. Bob Gregovich, Developmental Disabilities Coordinator; Roslyn Reeder, a Medicaid Representative; and the Executive Director, Deputy Director and the Director of Professional and Living Unit Services of Hope Cottage, as well as various Chugiak Benefit Association members. The above people were involved in the discussions and program possibilities for using the facility for this purpose. The Director of Nursing and the Director of Administration and Support Services for Hope Cottage visited API to look at the equipment, etc. necessary to relocate these residents in an alternative program and then participated in the meeting between John Graham and Company and Hope Cottage, Inc. in terms of the architectural needs for the facilities. Involved parents and the Hope Cottage Board members were also included, especially the Long Range Planning Committee from the Hope Cottage Board. A plan was devised throughout this period and many additional persons were contacted to involve all the above persons in the Feasibility Study. The need was brought to the attention of the Board through the Long Range Planning Committee several times, chaired by Dave Wolf, and the Hope Cottage Board Steering Committee, chaired by George Hall.

RESULTS

An Architectural rendering was completed by John Graham and Company (see attached) for the possible utilization of the facility to ICF/MR Standards. An estimate on the cost for the necessary renovations was arrived at by Bill Mears (the State Life Safety Surveyor), the architect, and others (see attached).

The building is a 10,000 square foot concrete block building. The original building was constructed in 1954 and an addition was built in 1958. The Chugiak Benefit Association originally offered to complete the renovations by securing their own financing, however, as the school location was secured through a still incomplete (two more years) Bureau of Land Management

Grant, they were unable to obtain financing. An alternate source must be considered. It seems feasible to approach the legislature for a long term loan for renovations. There may be other alternatives, however, it appears through our cursory study that no other resource could be located in a timely fashion. It is our understanding that time is of the essence. For additional information on the facility see the rendering attached.

A plan for service and staffing patterns was devised to meet the ICF/MR regulation (see addendum attached).

There was considerable discussion between Board members, API, Parents, and the Developmental Disabilities Council concerning the desirability of the location of the facility (18 miles from Anchorage), the appearance of the building, staffing patterns, the number of persons to be housed, the actual question of a need for this type of program, as well as the cost and other concerns. On the basis of the above discussion, the Hope Cottage Administration's position is that renovation of the building is feasible, that the facility could provide a quality ICF/MR treatment program for 20 to 25 developmentally disabled persons, a facility such as this was needed, and Hope Cottage can cost effectively provide a program.

DISCUSSION

It must be noted that there is considerable amount of conflict of opinion between the various organizations and persons included in the above paragraph. Hope Cottage Staff feels that the program is reasonable and the building could be renovated. API also feels this is a reasonable alternative to the problem. The State ARCA Association has strongly opposed the project. The DD Council and the Hope Cottage Board have deferred judgement until the Feasibility Study is completed and can be reviewed in its entirety. However, the Hope Cottage Board has determined that an ICF/MR facility is needed and that Hope Cottage should provide the service.

Dear Representative Sullivan:

During a recent meeting by your Committee concerning House Bill 866, certain committee members requested additional information about the \$ 317,800 in supplemental funding requested for the Office of Alcoholism.

Of that amount, \$ 295,700 is required because of a substitution of funding sources resulting from the 1975 departmental reorganization which transferred all income maintenance activities to the Division of Public Assistance. Under Program Revision No. 76-254 the Governor's Budget Review Committee authorized the transfer of \$ 476,500 in Title XX funding into the Administrative Section within the Division of Social Services. Of that amount, \$ 295,700 had originally been appropriated as income maintenance funding for which a 50% federal match was available, upon substitution of various appropriations for Title XX funding, for which the federal matching ratio is 75%. The result was that those general funds which were released within the division for transfer to cover the Title XX shortfall within the Office of Alcoholism were \$ 295,700 short of the total required to meet that deficit.

The remaining \$ 22,100 required for the Office of Alcoholism reflects funds which, before the advent of Title XX, would have been available as program receipts from various project contractors for project monitoring, evaluation and audit, as required under Title IV and VI regulations. The \$ 22,100 represents the uncollected portion of the total appropriation of these receipts at the end of the first quarter in FY 75-76 when Title XX went into effect and the initial project contracts were terminated and replaced with State General fund Grants-in-Aid. When the contracts were terminated there was no further basis for collection of the program receipts; thus the \$ 22,100 shortfall became apparent.

SUBJECT: Proposed legislation relating to

Attached is a proposed bill relating to state funding of Health Systems Agencies established in Alaska under PL 93-641.

Under terms of PL 93-641, Health Systems Agencies (HSA's) will be responsible for health planning and development activities on a regional basis throughout the United States. Three such agencies are to be conditionally designated in Alaska: in the Southeastern, Southcentral and Northern areas. It is anticipated that some \$115,000 per HSA will be available from the federal government. The legislation attached proposes to grant "seed" money from the state to each agency, beginning with \$100,000 the first year, and declining each year thereafter by \$25,000, so that in the fifth year of operation no additional funds will be granted by the state.

In addition, the state will offer an incentive to the regional areas concerned to contribute to the costs of health planning and development activities. Local contributions will be matched on a progressive scale, beginning with \$25,000 and increasing each year thereafter by \$25,000 to a maximum of \$100,000 in the fifth and succeeding years of operation. The objective is to involve the larger municipal areas (such as the Municipality of Anchorage), the native Regional Corporations, the AFN, and other groups with an interest in comprehensive health planning, in the planning efforts of the HSA. This is an important provision in that it encourages all entities engaged in health planning within a region to cooperate in the planning activities of its respective Health Systems Agency.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF ALASKA:

*Section 1. AS 18.07 is amended by adding a new section to read:

ARTICLE 2. HEALTH SYSTEMS

AGENCIES.

Sec. 18.07.110. PLANNING GRANTS TO HEALTH SYSTEMS AGENCIES_ (a) The department shall award grants to health systems agencies established in Alaska pursuant to PL 93-641 in amounts determined in accordance with the following schedule:

(1) \$100,000 during the initial year as a designated health systems agency and in declining amounts of \$25,000 for each succeeding year as a designated agency such that in the fifth year of operation no additional funds will be forthcoming except that

(2) from the initial year of designation, matching dollars shall be provided equal to the contributions provided to the designated health systems agency by local sources as allowable under PL 93-641, but not exceeding:

\$25,000 the first year of operation;

\$50,000 the second year of operation;

\$75,000 the third year of operation; and

\$100,000 each succeeding year of operation.

(b) The department shall promulgate regulations governing the administration of these grants consistent with state accounting procedures.

The fiscal detail above assumes maximum local participation in funding of health systems agencies, of which Alaska will have three. The formula mechanism is designed to allow survival of health systems agencies until local funding sources are developed with the portion encouraging this development.

Health systems agencies are a requirement of PL 93-641, the Health Planning and Resources Development Act of 1974. The function of the agencies is to provide greater local participation in the health planning process and greater participation

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Testimony received by the House HESS Committee by Hugh Fleischer, regarding HB 881 - Laetrile

First recommendation is that the language of the bill begins on line 13 "No person, group, organization or facility", rather than have it begin with "It is the intention"

He also feels it would be appropriate to limit the consideration of the bill to the administration of laetrile, as prescribed to a patient; if found to be harmful by the state medical board, (he concedes that over doses of oral doses, can be harmful, just as other quantities of aspirin, etc. can be harmful)

The appropriate wording for the consideration of the Medical Board should be worded as follows: Administrated by a physician and requested by a patient unless a substance as so prescribed or administered by the physician is found to be harmful by the state medical board.

This would define the responsibilities of the Medical Board and their latitude of questions regarding laetrile as administered by a physician.

He also suggests that this finding be subject to the Administrative Procedure Act, regarding rights to hearings, etc.

Regarding the statement by Chris Beardley, Providence Hospital, that "laetrile is harmful", Mr. Fleischer stated that legal counsel would or could advise the committee that the only law that applies to laetrile in Ak. is the Food, Drug & Cosmetic Act of 1938, which limits terms of its application and introduction & delivery for interstate commerce of any article under this drug act. Assuming that the F.D.A. has authority over laetrile under the provisions of this act, then this law is the only one that applies.

Advises the committee about numerous responsible studies that have been done by such institutes as the Sloan Kettering Cancer Institute, N.Y., National Cancer Institute, Food & Drug Administration under Dept. of H.E.W. All of these studies refute the blanket statement made by Dr. Wilson, that there is harmfulness in laetrile.

There are no toxic substances reported in and injection of laetrile. The history of laetrile is over a century old.

Recommends that the word "drug" be changed to "substance". He does not consider laetrile as a drug, although the Food & Drug administration has a very broad definition of the word drug.

Regarding - Laetrile - HB 881

One of the cruelest examples of man's inhumanity to man is in cancer quackery. The hope or sometimes promise to cure is held out to victims of cancer. Temporary improvement is seen in brightening of attitude, gain in weight, improvement in strength, even perhaps transient slowing in growth or regression of tumor. All of these effects are psychologically mediated. Such transient benefit is difficult to prove when controlled studies are done. Persons receiving the drug agent fare no better than those receiving a mock drug.

It might not matter if the only loss to patients were financial, though many cancer victims and their families can ill afford the dollar loss of a cancer hoax. What is most cruel of all is that some victims will lose their opportunity for cure or actual palliation by choosing the cancer hoax modality rather than legitimate expert care.

I have no personal experience with Laetrile. The best description of the substance and its history is contained in the Jan-Feb 1976 issue of Ca - A Cancer Journal for Clinicians, published by The American Cancer Society. I would like to read an interview between the editor of the Journal and Dr. Robt. Eyerly, M.D., chairman, of the Committee on the Proven Methods of Cancer Management, the American Cancer Society: p. 50-54.

If you are still unconvinced of the worthlessness of Laetrile, I suggest that you invite Dr. Elmer Gaede of Soldotna. I understand that he is allegedly administering Laetrile to cancer patients. If this is true, he should be glad to come before your committee to explain what he is doing. Ask him to bring X-rays and other materials with him to show you, if he can, how cancer lumps on chest and bone x-rays have disappeared or diminished in size after administering Laetrile.

You may ask why our medical societies are not looking into the matter. Well, we intend to, but I must warn you that if you pass such a bill as HB 881, it will make this kind of investigation much more difficult. Who wants to risk being fined \$5,000 - \$25,000. It is a risk because it is particularly difficult to conclusively, the word appears 3 times in the bill - prove anything beneficial or harmful in biological circumstances. Believe it or not, it has never been conclusively proven that penicillin is effective in late forms of syphilis, even though it has been the standard form of treatment for over 20 years. I could give many other examples. With a drug as inert as Laetrile - given by injection - it can be toxic when given by mouth because it turns into hydrogen cyanide, as you have heard - it is especially hard to conclusively prove harm, except to the pocketbook - from Laetrile.

Finally I would add that much of the malpractice legislation that you all have been struggling with so long and so hard is directed specifically toward strengthening, no weakening, discipline within the profession, increasing the desire and ease and effectiveness with which health professionals can review each others practices and behavior, Federal review programs such as PSRO are about this too. Don't undo this by passing such a foolish measure as HB 881.

Subject: HB 881

Providence Hospital strongly opposes HB 881 "An Act relating to interference with physician-patient relationships."

As the proponents of the bill are testifying specifically in favor of the bill as it relates to Laetrile (or its chemical equivalent) Amygdalin), as an alleged cure for cancer, I would first suggest that Sections 3 and 4 be omitted from the proposed bill.

Furthermore: Relating specifically to Laetrille,

1. Federal law prohibits the use or administration of a drug by anyone which is not approved by the FDA. Hospitals, of course, fall under this law. Therefore, a hospital must prohibit the administration of a drug or substance (regulated by the FDA) that is not approved by the FDA.
2. In a brief survey of hospitals relating to this bill, all surveyed specifically stated their opposition to HB 881.
3. In addition, some medical liability insurance carriers (malpractice insurance writers) have stated that if hospitals did approve administration of non-approved FDA substances or drugs, that their medical liability insurance would be stopped and/or non renewed.
4. In an attempt to circumvent the federal ban on Laetrile, the proponents have renamed it Bee-Seventeen, the "anti-neoplastic vitamin," and Aprikenn. These oral preparations have been distributed to many health food stores across the country. However, the FDA has issued a public warning that they are misbranded and potentially dangerous; the ingestion of five capsules of Aprikenn or two packets of Bee-Seventeen can be fatal in a child.

This is in reply to your March 23, 1976 request for information on Laetrile.

We enclose three pamphlets which present our current position on so called Vitamin B-17 also known as Laetrile and Amygdalin. These substances are drugs under section 505 of the Federal Food, Drug, and Cosmetic Act as amended. We do not have adequate information to permit its use or distribution, either as a drug or a vitamin.

In April 1970, a Notice of Claimed Investigational Exemption for a New Drug (IND) was submitted for Laetrile. The IND was terminated promptly thereafter with the concurrence of a panel of nationally recognized experts.

The FDA will entertain new INDs for clinical studies of Laetrile. All requirements as outlined in Form FD 1571 must be met in order for an exemption to be granted. In short, the preclinical and clinical evidence that justifies the clinical trial, and a well designed protocol in terms of section 314.111 of the CFR (a copy of which is enclosed) must be presented. The investigator must be qualified by training and experience to conduct the trial, and must have adequate clinical research facilities available to him and his subjects.

Laetrile, then, at the present time, is not an approved drug for the treatment of any malignancy. It is only through the efforts of interested parties which stimulate the conduct of the clinical studies necessary to provide the substantial evidence of safety and efficacy required by law that any drug will ever be approved for a particular use. Interested organizations may direct their efforts to finding, funding, and stimulating clinical investigators to conduct clinical investigations in this area.

As typical of our responses to consumers, we enclose a copy of a letter to a librarian in Illinois and also one to an attorney in Anchorage.
