You have asked that we comment on the effect and equity of the formula provided in SB 216, an Act authorizing state aid to municipalities for the construction and development of cultural facilities. We submit the following information and comment.

Summary

Property value is generally a reasonable indicator to use to determine relative abilities of municipalities to pay for services. If only one indicator were to be used, especially considering the relative ease of gathering property value information and of verifying the validity of the data, it is probably the best. "Assessed" valuation is generally not as good an indicator as "full and true" value, in that full and true values consider optional exemptions and variances from market value. The formula is silent on state assessed oil and gas properties (AS 43.56). We assume that oil and gas properties are to be used in calculating the state average assessed valuation. If so, the use of assessed as compared to full and true values for non oil and gas properties will tend to increase the relative importance of state assessed property. Lastly, the use of the variable base percentage (10 percent for the smallest communities and 30 percent for the largest) will tend to increase the differential between small community and large community contributions, since more infrastructure and thus more tax base is generally attributed to larger communities.

Property Value as Ability to Pay Indicator

The formula contribution varies according to the relation of the local property value to the state-wide average. Property value is thus being used as an indicator of the "wealth" of each community. Wealth varies from income in that income is realized in the present, while wealth is previous income which has been invested in any number of ways, including property, stocks and bonds, jewelry, precious metals, etc.

Taxes are generally paid from income and not from wealth. However, it can be argued that local governments may not tax income, and therefore property value is a better single indicator of ability to pay.

Assuming that the municipal share of the cost of the cultural facilities will generally be financed with municipal bonds, debt capacity should be discussed. Debt capacity is a function generally of municipal population and property value. Rules of thumb used to estimate debt capacity by the municipal bond bank are \$2,000 per capita or 15 percent of assessed valuation. Some cities (especially Petersburg and Klawock) are at or near the maximum, while others are not near their debt limits. While debt load and debt capacity are necessarily major considerations of the local governments, it would seem that the formula adequately considers debt capacity, both via the use of property value and the differential "contribution percentage" which increases with population.

Assessed Versus Full and True Property Valuation

The bill provides for the use of assessed valuations in the formula. Assessed values do not include optional municipal exemptions, including personal property, the first \$10,000 of residential property, fishing vessels, etc. It also may vary to different degrees from the market value of the assessed property.

The state assessor is presently directed to evaluate local assessments and to adjust them to full and true property values (AS 29.53.060). Full and true values are a much improved indicator when comparing municipal wealth, especially when property value is the only indicator.

State Assessed (Oil and Gas) Property

AS 43.56 provides for state assessment of oil and gas properties. Oil and gas properties constitute nearly 52 percent of the total property value in the state (Alaska Taxable 1978), and thus their inclusion or exclusion is significant. Since oil and gas property that is located within a municipal boundary is taxable by that municipality (and municipal property taxes are deducted from state property tax liability), it would seem reasonable to include these properties. On the other hand, much of the Alaska pipeline and some other oil properties are located within the unorganized borough and are thus not taxed by local governments. We mention this for your consideration, but offer no opinion as to the merits of the partial exclusion of oil and gas property when determining the state property value base utilized in the formula.

Contribution Percentage Base Differential

The formula, by using a quotient which relates local property value to a state average property value base, generally shifts more of the construction cost to the state for relatively poor municipalities and the reverse for relatively wealthy municipalities (although we note that cities that

have property values in excess of the state average are protected from paying greater than the base percentage contribution rate). The use of a variable percentage contribution base is a significant divergence from the basic philosophy of "from those according to their ability." If it follows that larger communities have better tax bases, then the differential base would tend to exaggerate the effect of formula.

Further Comments

We presently have in our computer library a data file which contains a complete set of per capita property values for all municipalities. The values are full and true values, however, and thus not applicable to the present formula. Should you desire, we can provide some computer calculations of contribution rates or other information using the data base we now have. We could likewise generate information using assessed valuations; however, it would require the construction of a new data file and could not be delivered as expeditiously. Please let us know if we can be of further assistance.

BACKGROUND

CHAPTER 139, SLA 1977, established the Historic District and Tourist Revolving Loan Fund.

General law and home rule municipalities may, in consultation with the State Historic Sites Advisory Committee, establish historical districts within their jurisdictions. An historic district for this purpose is "a reasonably compact area of historical significance in which two or more structures important in state or national history, and related by physical proximity or historical association, are located."

Owners of properties in such districts may apply to the Division of Business Loans, Department of Commerce and Economic Development, for long term loans (currently 7.5% interest rate) for rehabilitation and improvement if the following conditions are met.

1. Property must contribute to historical character of district.
2. Project must be recommended by municipal governing body or designated agent (planning and zoning commission or historic district commission).
3. Project must be recommended by State Historic Sites Advisory Committee.
4. Division of Business Loans must approve application.

There are now historic districts in: Juneau, Skagway, Haines, Eagle, and Nome. Districts are under consideration in Anchorage, Fairbanks, and Ketchikan. Potential exists for districts in a number of other places.

District sizes vary greatly with character of historic resources present and municipal considerations. All of Eagle, Nome, and Skagway are included in the districts. At Haines, only Port Chatham is included. Juneau has the potential for several in addition to the present Swanton District.

At present there is no direct funding for historic district loans. When such loans have been made in the past, DBL has obtained the money by "selling" them to Department of Revenue.

S B 296 exempts \$25,000 in value from residential property. Revenue lost to the municipality by implementation of this bill shall be reimbursed by the State. This will necessitate an audit procedure of applications for each municipality. The number of applications to be audited is estimated to be approximately 125,000 in 1981 and an expected growth rate of new applications at 5% each year following.

It is anticipated that computerization of this program will help deter some personal services expenditures, however, it will be necessary to employ 5 clerical positions for the auditing procedures.

The estimated total revenue lost by the municipalities is \$37,355,700 for 1981. This was computed as follows:

This letter is in response to your inquiry about the fiscal impact upon our department if SB 309 and SB 292am were combined and passed into law. The fiscal note contained in this letter is based on a number of assumptions.

1. SB 292am and SB 309 would be combined and passed into law.
2. The provisions for preparation of fiscal notes on regulations, now contained in SB 292am, would be amended. The amendment would place primary responsibility on our department for preparation of fiscal notes for any regulation change by a state department when such change effects municipal finances.
3. The personal services cost is based on the addition of three staff members (a Local Government Specialist IV - Range 19, a Local Government Specialist III - Range 17 and a Clerk Typist III - Range 8) to handle the additional work.
4. Benefits are included in the personal services cost. These are figured at 28% of salary per year.
5. Travel costs are figured at \$2,000 a year. Preparation of the required fiscal notes would require dealing with agencies throughout the state and phone calls would not always be adequate to resolve the issues.
