

on-site monitoring trips during the period of time stated in the preliminary audit report; each technical assistance visitation was also an unofficial monitoring trip. We have now formalized the procedure beginning with FY'80 grant applications, a three year rotational schedule has been established. During FY'80, eleven (11) sites will be monitored. With the additional two (2) sites that the audit committee reviewed, thirteen (13) sites have been monitored. The remaining sites will be monitored during the next two years.

Finally we would clarify that the questionnaire, sent to community school coordinators and superintendents in the Supplemental Information Section, was not taken from the records of the Department of Education, Community School program, but was a survey which was conducted by legislative audit personnel.

I would like to thank you for the fine professional manner in which the members of your staff conducted themselves during the course of this audit.

4 AAC 32.010. SCOPE OF STATE-ASSISTED PROJECTS. (a) Community school grants are made to school districts for planning, establishing, expanding, improving or maintaining community education programs. Two types of grants will be made

(1) planning grants will be made to help districts and communities to develop comprehensive community education programs;

(2) operational grants will be made to help districts operate community education programs.

(b) Grants are for a period of up to one year. Subsequent applications must be submitted and will be evaluated in the same manner as initial grant applications. (Eff. 3/12/76, Reg. 57; am. 2/4/76, Reg. 60)

4 AAC 32.020. COMMUNITY EDUCATION GRANT APPLICATION. (a) The commissioner will, in the exercise of his discretion, award a planning grant to a district upon an application submitted to him which contains, in narrative form, the following:

- (1) objectives for the planning process;
- (2) procedures, strategies, and activities for accomplishing the objectives;
- (3) a time-line for accomplishing the objectives;
- (4) an evaluation design providing for the collection, verification and analysis of data to measure the extent to which the objectives are accomplished by the program;
- (5) a proposed budget, indicating the amount of grant funds requested; and

(j) a commitment to report to the commissioner the results of the planning effort.

(b) The commissioner will, in the exercise of his discretion, award a grant for operating a community education program to a district upon an application submitted to him which contains at least the following:

(1) an overall long-range plan which contains provisions to fulfill the following elements of a community education program:

(A) service to an identified community or local attendance area;

(B) potential for accommodation of all age groups as well as specific groups with special needs;

(C) concentration of activities in one or more public facilities;

(D) identification and utilization of cultural, recreational and other existing and planned resources located outside those public facilities in which the activities are to be concentrated;

(E) systematic procedures for identifying and documenting, on a continuing basis, the needs, interests and concerns of the community served and for responding to those needs, interests and concerns;

(F) programs and activities which reflect the array of needs, interests and concerns of the community; and

(G) creation of an active community education council whose members are representative of the community to be served;

(2) projections for expected long-range growth and development in regard to the following aspects of the community education program:

(A) the K-12 regular school program;

(B) facility and resource use;

(C) extended activities for children and youth;

(D) opportunities for the involvement of adults in the community education program;

(E) delivery of various human services at the most local community level; and

(F) community development in general;

(3) a short-range, detailed program plan which includes the following:

(A) program objectives which state specific and measurable outcomes of the selected program components;

(B) procedures, strategies, and activities for accomplishing the program objectives;

(C) a time-line for accomplishing the program objectives; and

(D) an evaluation design providing for the collection, verification and analysis of data to measure the extent to which the program objectives are accomplished by the program;

(4) documentation of the involvement of persons broadly representative of the community to be served by the program in the preparation of the application, and provision for indicating the continued involvement of such persons with the program;

(5) information regarding the administration of the program, including but not limited to

(A) proposed organizational arrangements for program administration and qualifications and roles of staff who will administer the program;

(B) provisions for securing appropriate training, where required, of a short-term, in-service or preservice nature for administrators, staff, community members, and others who will plan and carry out programs;

(C) an organizational chart indicating the relationship between individuals, groups and agencies affected by the plan; and

(D) a statement as to the proportion of the total school district which operates as

distinct administrative units for community education purposes;

(6) a commitment by the applicant to collect and make available information which may be required by the commissioner in accordance with those reasonable time constraints which he may establish, for purposes of carrying out program evaluations;

(7) letters from agencies and organizations affected by the program indicating affiliation or cooperation with the applicant as indicated in the program design; and

(8) a budget statement indicating money to be provided during the period of the requested grant by various agencies, organizations and individuals to support community education in the community to be served by the program.

(c) As necessary, incomplete or inadequate applications will be returned to the applicant for modification. Unfunded applications will be reviewed with comments provided by the department for future use by the applicant. (Eff. 3/12/76, Reg. 57; am. 12/4/76, Reg. 60)

4 AAC 32.030. DEFINITIONS. In this chapter, unless the context requires otherwise

(1) "community education" means a "community school program" as defined in AS 14.36.070;

(2) "district" means a city or borough school district, or a regional educational attendance area;

(3) "program" means a community education program which meets the requirements set forth in sec. 20 of this chapter;

(4) "public facility" means a facility owned or operated by the state, or a political subdivision of the state. (Eff. 3/12/76, Reg. 57)

Members of the

We have reviewed the Department of Education's response to our Preliminary Report. Our comments follow:

Recommendation No. 3

The Department disagreed with our recommendation, and stated that the Community Schools' planning grants may be made to school districts for expanding and improving their programs whether they are in their first year or their fourth year of operation. However, the following is a quote from a letter dated January 2, 1980, from our legal counsel, Legislative Affairs Agency, Division of Legal Services:

While conceding the community schools "planners" their due, I would caution that planning money is limited to one grant per "local attendance area." Neither the statute nor the department's regulations are clear on the point. However, the "Statement of intent" codified at AS 14.36.010(b) indicates legislative resolve that the "community school program will become fully operational at the beginning of the second fiscal year following its authorization." (Emphasis added.) A "local attendance area" may submit an application for a community schools grant, to include a request for support of a comprehensive plan for the community school program. . . ." If each local attendance area within a district may seek financial support for the development of the comprehensive plan for a community school program, where the legislation so clearly recognizes planning as a requisite to successful implementation and administration of a program and the legislature has taken the position that a supported program move into operation at the beginning of the second fiscal year, the net effect must be to limit the number of planning grants per "local attendance area" to one.

The House HESS Committee eliminated the requirement of initiation of an operational program at the start of the second fiscal year in its committee substitute. The House Finance Committee restored the provision, evidence that, while program planning was essential, it was the support of the development and implementation of an operating program which the legislature was seeking to support.



SUBJECT: House Bill 629

In the event that the legislature does not fully fund House Bill 629, the Department of Education recommends the following methods for dispersal of funds to those districts with approved plans of service:

1. If less than 1% of the total foundation support is given to the bill for sections a and b, then .5% will be used in section a and the remaining amount will be prorated to the districts in section b.
2. If 1% of the total foundation support is given to the bill for sections a and b, then .5% will be used in section a and .5% in section b.
3. If 1.5% of the total foundation support is given to the bill for sections a and b, then section a will be fully funded at the 1% level and section b will be prorated at the .5% level.
4. If 2% of the total foundation support is given to the bill for sections a and b, then section a will be fully funded at the 1% level and section b will also be fully funded at the 1% level.

"An Act relating to community schools; and providing for an effective date."

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF ALASKA:

CHAPTER 36. COMMUNITY SCHOOLS

Sec. 14.36.010. PURPOSE, INTENT. (a) The community school is an expression of the philosophy that the school, as the prime educational institution of the community, is most effective when it involves the people of that community in a program designed to fulfill their educational needs. The community school promotes a more efficient use of school facilities through an extension of buildings and equipment beyond the normal school day. The purpose of this chapter is to provide state leadership and financial support to encourage and assist local school districts in the establishment of community schools.

(b) It is the intent of the legislature that

(1) a program of community school grants be established to provide assistance to local communities in the initial development, implementation, and operation of community school programs;

(2) technical assistance, monitoring, training and coordination of statewide efforts to develop and operate community school programs be provided by the department; and

(3) the community school program will become fully operational once a plan of service has been approved by the commissioner.

Sec. 14.36.020. COMMUNITY SCHOOLS GRANT FUND CREATED: LIMITATIONS ON USE. There is created a community schools grant fund as an account in the general fund. The fund shall be used to make community school grants to local attendance areas or school districts under this chapter. Legislative appropriations for community school grants shall be deposited in this fund.

Sec. 14.36.030. GRANTS (a) A district operating an approved community school program may elect to receive a grant of one per cent of its total public school foundation support or a flat grant, the amount of which is to be determined by the department.

In order to avoid some areas of possible confusion when your committee reviews the Community Education files, I would like to bring the following points to your attention:

1. When the districts apply for funds in early May of each year, they complete their budget sections utilizing the figure they would receive if they were fully funded.

When the actual allocations are established, they are notified as to the pro-rated amount. They then complete a budget sheet reflecting the correct amount.

We have seen this as a duplication of effort. This year, the districts will only submit a budget sheet when they know the correct funding level.

It is possible that more than one budget sheet will be found on the left hand side of the folders. The budget sheet which is signed off is the one which is currently being used.

2. It appears that the committee was interested in the travel section of the budgets. Please note that on the instructions to the review committee that they were asked to be very critical of large travel budgets.
3. When looking over the individual budget sheets please refer to the budget explanation section for a breakdown of each area of concern.

The budget explanation section is usually following the budget line item sheet.

If concerns are still voiced after reviewing the budget explanation section, it may be necessary to refer to the goals and objectives section of each individual grant.

4. The grant application process has been reviewed/evaluated by the department and individuals in the field. It was decided from this review to produce a new application form. This new form was sent to you with the Community Education files for FY79.

Please note that each of the items asked for on the new application form is an item from the Community Education regulations of the Law of 1975.

5. The piece of green shorthand notebook paper on the left hand side of the folder is meant to help keep me abreast of the payments that a district receives.

The administrative assistant has a ledger of all Community Education grant payments which I check my records against and, of course, fiscal keeps the master sheets for both of us to check against. In this manner there are three sets of records to insure accuracy.

6. There should be a master review sheet on the left hand side of each folder. Please note that:
 - a) The number of x's after pass/fail is not indicative of how strong or weak the application was.
 - b) There is a difference between administrative support and community support.
 - c) These are a compilation of comments made by the review committee members.
7. When reviewing the grant applications you will notice that there are approximately nine grants which are marked "fail."

These (nine) grants are the ones that were not originally accepted by the review committee and were rewritten by the districts to correct the noted areas of deficiency.

Once the areas of deficiency were corrected, the applications were approved and funded. Three other grant applications were not accepted, or corrected satisfactorily, and hence did not receive funding.

We hope these points clarify some questions you might have. If we can be of any assistance, please do not hesitate to contact us.

In accordance with the request of the H.E.S.S. Committee, I am forwarding to you the FY'79 Community Education operational grant folders for your perusal. As each folder is opened, you will notice the review sheets of the grant review committee on the left hand side, immediately followed by a letter of acceptance or rejection to the district. The review sheets objectively state the strengths and weaknesses of each grant request as they were reviewed by the committee of practitioners.

Also, on the left hand side are the actual grant applications, encumbrance sheets and report and records of local expenditures. It is important to note that the budget sheets need to be correlated with the budget explanation and the goals and objectives of the grant. The budget line item sheets do not give a true picture of why the monies are placed in each category.

When the Community Schools Act of 1975 was passed, there were no provisions for the handling of local education agency grants other than the procedures which were outlined by the Department of Education. In FY'78 the grant process was finalized and a yearly grant review committee was established. I have attached a list of the past review committee members for your perusal (attachment 1).

During FY'79 the actual grant application has been revised into a concise packet (attachment 2). The grant review committee will be chosen by April 1, and will review the grant applications for FY'80 on May 15 and 16.

4 AAC 05.070. PROGRAM PLANNING AND EVALUATION. (a) The chief school administrator of a school district shall develop and have approved by the governing body of that district, annually and no later than that body's first meeting in October, an education plan for each of the three years of operation after the effective date of this section: (i) for each school established under section 40 of this chapter, and (ii) for each school or partial program established on or after the commencement of the 1976-77 school year in communities not having a preexisting school or partial program of the same grades.

(b) An educational plan shall include as a minimum the following:

(1) A description of the process used by the school to secure community participation in program development and evaluation;

(2) A statement of philosophy and goals of the school;

(3) The program goals for each subject area;

(4) A description of each course or subject area, which shall include the following information:

- (i) Course or subject area title;
- (ii) Credit toward graduation awarded upon completion;
- (iii) Whether course or subject area is required or elective;
- (iv) General outline of topics to be covered;
- (v) General description of types of teaching materials and instructional methods;
- (vi) certificate type of instructor or supervisor;

(5) The number of instructional personnel of the school (including part-time);

(6) The operational budget for the school;

(7) The projected enrollment, by grade;

(8) The planned ^{time} ~~term~~ schedule for courses to be offered;

and

(9) Such other information as the commissioner may from time-to-time require.

(c) As near as practicable to the close of each school year for which an educational plan must be developed under (a) of this section, but no later than the governing body's last meeting in the fiscal year, the chief school administrator shall prepare and submit to the governing body of the school district an evaluation of each new school operated by the district.

(d) The evaluation shall include a survey of parents in the community and students and teachers at the school, who shall be asked, at a minimum, whether they believe the school program as a whole is performing adequately, and whether they have suggestions for improving the school. All comments received shall accompany the evaluation. The evaluation shall specify each aspect of the school program which differed from the plan for the period evaluated and shall include such other information as the commissioner may from time-to-time require.

(e) The chief school administrator shall assure maximum ongoing local community participation in the development and preparation of each educational plan and evaluation required by this section. The chief school administrator or his/her designee shall involve local citizens (including members of the local school committee and students) during the initial drafting of the educational plan and evaluation. Local citizens shall be provided access to adequate information and materials to enable them to participate in the development of the plan and evaluation.

The chief school administrator or his/her designee shall conduct in the local community a public meeting on the draft plan for the school in that community after reasonable notice of the meeting has been given. The chief school administrator shall prepare the final plan taking into account the evaluation required by this section and the record of the public meeting. The chief school administrator shall submit a report to the governing body explaining any significant changes made in the draft plan, shall notify the local school committee of any such changes, and shall afford members of the community the opportunity to be heard by the governing body on the final plan.

(f) A copy of each plan and evaluation developed under this section must be maintained on file for public inspection in the school district office. No later than ten (10) days after (i) an educational plan has been approved by the governing body of the district, or (ii) an evaluation has been submitted to the governing body of the district, a copy of such plan or evaluation must be filed with the commissioner, Pouch F, Juneau, Alaska 99811 and furnished to the local school committee of the community to which the plan or evaluation relates.

(g) A school shall be operated to the extent practicable in conformity with the educational plan, provided that where significant departures from the plan appear to be necessary the plan may be modified during the school year in accordance with the procedures set forth in subsection (e).

(h) The commissioner will return incomplete or inadequate plans under this section to the chief school administrator for further development. After November 15, following adoption of this section, no public school foundation monies available under AS 14.17 will be distributed to a school district having a school for which a plan must be developed under (a) of this section if the school district is in material non-compliance with this section. "Material non-compliance" includes, but is not limited to, failure by the district to submit an educational plan which meets the criteria set forth in this section for each school for which a plan must be developed under subsection (a); failure to submit an evaluation, and failure to involve the local community in the development of the plan and evaluation.

(i) The chief school administrator may apply to the commissioner to shorten the period for compliance set forth in (a) of this section by one, two, or three years with respect to each school, upon a showing that the district has previously developed with local community participation as set forth in (e) of this section, an educational plan which meets the criteria in (b) of this section; has implemented such plan in the school; and has conducted with local community participation as set forth in (e) of this section an evaluation which meets the requirements in (d) of this section.

Under the authority of art. III, sec. 18 of the Alaska Constitution, I am transmitting a bill relating to community schools. The bill would make a number of changes in AS 14.36 which deals with the community school program. Most of the proposed changes (secs. 1, 3, 4, 5, and 6) are relatively minor in nature and are designed to clarify or streamline the existing statutory program.

Section 2 of the bill proposes a new approach to state funding of community school programs by repealing and re-enacting AS 14.36.030 which deals with state grants for those programs. Under the proposed changes, a district could elect to receive either one-half of one per cent of its public school foundation support for the year or \$10,000, effective with the beginning of FY 80. Additionally, districts electing the one-half of one per cent grant could also receive, effective with the beginning of FY 81, up to an additional one-half of one per cent on a dollar-for-dollar matching basis with funds allocated to the community school program by the district.

In support of HB204, I would request that you include an amendment to the bill as follows:


Implement part B of Section 14.36.030 in FY80.

Dear Rep. Hurlbert:

Recently, when I was in the capitol for a few hours, I contacted several people in regard to Community Education Legislation. I was there with other people from this District. Unfortunately, you were in a committee meeting at the time and we could not make contact with you. When I was visiting with Representative Buchholdt about the Community Schools Legislation, she informed me that you were on the committee that is presently considering the Community Education Legislation.

She also said that you had information from areas of your constituency which caused you to question whether community school funds were being utilized for community school purposes. We want to assure you that in Iditarod Area School District, all community education funds which we have received have been spent directly to the intent of community education.


In fact, we have found state funding for community school activities very inadequate for carrying out any kind of meaningful program unless the funding is supplemented by other sources. We have been able to develop community school activities in each of the villages of our school district through the creative use of CETA funds. If it were not for CETA, we would only be able to afford a small amount of district level administrative promotion of the community school concept. However, with CETA we have successfully employed Native Community School Coordinators in the villages and we have conducted a number of local adult education activities. I am enclosing a summary of our adult education activities in this district. When you review the summary, please bear in mind our school district population is approximately 1200 people (all ages) and that our services are scattered among nine villages.

So, you might ask, "Why do we need ~~state~~ community school money?" For us, the answer is that CETA funding is short term and indirect. Four of our Community Education Coordinators have been in those positions since the fall of 1977. In the beginning of this coming school year, these four individuals will no longer be eligible for CETA funds and we will be required to lay them off or pay them with non-CETA funds. As you know, CETA is a tenuous program having undergone much national criticism.

We talk a lot about the necessity for good education for rural residents. From your own experience in the bush, I expect that you will agree with me that there is a need to demonstrate how education can really benefit rural residents. Community Schools are a way to respond to what people want. Too often schools try to tell people what they need. I believe that adult education and adult involvement in local schools is the best way to generate a positive and practical educational climate in the villages.

Please give strong support to fully funded Community School Legislation. Community education should be considered a basic and required component of education in rural Alaska. Thank you.
