- HB 154 would allow non-teaching service to be credited in the TRS.
- It is estimated, based upon information provided last year (SB 377), that 12-15 employees would qualify for benefits.
- Estimate FY 80 covered TRS payroll to be \$231,000,000.
- Increase in combined TRS State Match and employer contribution rate would be .02%.

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LEGISLATION

Commissioner Lind commented on the letter received from Representative Russ Meekins Chairman, House Finance Committee, inviting the department's response to a 15% reduction below the level of the FY-79 adjusted budget. He noted that Bill Thomson would be asking for the Board's recommendation for the department to respond to this letter later in the meeting.

Steve Hole reviewed various bills before the House and Senate, and explained the effect of each bill. Dr. Cole commented on HB-98, which would prohibit surveys or questionnaires in public schools which make inquiries into private family affairs not otherwise matters of public record or observation without parent or guardian permission, and responded to questions of the Board.

Following extensive discussion on the effect of each bill, the Board took the following action:

Beverly Horn moved and June Nelson seconded the motion that the State Board of Education go on record as opposing HB-145, "An Act establishing a tuition credit under the Alaska net income tax; and providing for an effective date," and any related bills. Jack Townshend abstained from voting. MOTION CARRIED. MOTION

Vince Casey moved and Beverly Horn seconded the motion to support HB-151, "An Act relating to unemployment compensation for nonprofessional school employees; and providing for an effective date." Jack Townshend abstained from voting. MOTION CARRIED. MOTION

Vince Casey moved and June Nelson seconded the motion to support HB-154, "An Act relating to creditable service under Teachers Retirement System for Territorial employment; and providing for an effective date." MOTION CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY. MOTION

Jan Hohman moved and June Nelson seconded the motion to support HB-204, "An Act relating to community schools; and providing for an effective date." Jack Townshend abstained from voting. MOTION CARRIED. MOTION

Vince Casey moved and Beverly Horn seconded the motion to support HB-211, "An Act relating to public elementary and secondary education; and providing for an effective date," with the provision that those students presently enrolled in centralized Correspondence Study be allowed to complete their school program in Correspondence Study if they so desire. Jack Townshend abstained from voting. MOTION CARRIED. MOTION

In follow-up to my testimony on House Bill 154, I would like to provide the following information on Ms. Betty V. Young who, as I understand, prompted this legislation and would qualify for additional benefits if HB 154 became law.

If Ms. Young were placed on retirement 4/01/79, at age 60 years and 5 months, her annual benefit based upon 27.0 years credited service would be \$18,326.82; \$20,159.52 if she remained in Alaska and drew the Alaska cost of living allowance (COLA).

If she were given credit for her 2 years and 4 months service with the Department of Taxation (covered under HB 154), the increased service would entitle her to an additional annual benefit of \$1,696.93; \$1,866.61 if she remained in Alaska and drew the Alaska COLA.

Ms. Young would not have to make retroactive contributions for that service as current statutes preclude contributions for service prior to January 30, 1955 (AS 14.25.061).

Based upon the 1971 Group annuity mortality tables Ms. Young's life expectancy is an additional 23.25 years. Thus, the additional benefit that would be provided under HB 154 would amount to \$39,453.62; \$43,398.68 if she remained in Alaska. During Ms. Young's life expectancy, this additional benefit combined with her original benefit amounts to \$465,552.19; \$512,107.41 if she remains in Alaska.

Ms. Young has contributed \$22,075.44 to the Teachers' Retirement System.

Dear Jim:

The Haines Borough is still seeking a Legislative appropriation for the balance of the construction funds needed to cover the alternates which were not possible under the \$218,000.00 EDA Grant that was received last year toward the completion of the construction of the Sheldon Museum and Cultural Center. Mrs. Elisabeth Hakkinen, curator of the Museum, reports that in a conversation with your office last week it was suggested that an updated budget be prepared and sent to you, and to the others representing our area in the current legislature. This has been prepared, covering the alternates as well as some other important items which have come to our attention that were not covered in the basic bid for the work just completed by Teigland Construction. Of course, inflation has raised the prices approximately 10%. A specific budget of our needs is attached.

As you know, an appropriation of \$92,100.00 was approved by the Legislature last year, then eliminated by veto. Since that time, the Haines Borough has provided \$15,000.00 toward the necessary carpentry, taping and painting. This \$15,000.00 Municipal appropriation allowed beneficial occupancy of the building and use of the building. Most of the carpentry has been done, the taping is complete in the main areas, and much of the interior painting has been done. The building has received a coat of oil-based stain to protect the plywood exterior until the urgently needed siding and stone veneer are in place.

A summary is enclosed, updated to show 1978's contributions made to the Museum project. Of the total of \$382,079.47, you will notice that \$15,000.00 came from the State of Alaska as a Bicentennial grant, that four separate federal grants have been involved, that the City of Haines and the Haines Borough have contributed, and that numerous private donations have been received.


As you see, last year's approved request for \$92,100.00 less the Borough's contribution of \$15,000.00 plus 10% for inflation falls very close to the figure of \$87,200.00 which we are now requesting. The slight additional amount is for Project Administration, which we thought might be different from that required last year.

The Steve Sheldon collection has been housed in the Haines area for many years in numerous make-do places. Haines Women's Club, which instigated the project, and the Chilkat Valley Historical Society have been working toward a proper museum facility for several years, and have finally come very close to achieving a first-rate building in a prime location overlooking the boat harbor, on Main Street, on historic Presbyterian Mission Property. This structure, with its good design, and excellent location will be a major tourist attraction for Haines and will be the pivotal improvement on Main Street which can stimulate local plans to upgrade the downtown area.


We have high hopes that you can assist our community in finalizing this very important project. It is so near to completion that it would be tragic to see it left unfinished on both the interior and exterior as is the current situation. The community of Haines is becoming very committed to stimulating the tourist industry in the light of the present economic low of the area. This facility is a major objective toward that goal.

Dear Representative Miller:

You have asked that we provide the estimated costs associated with Representative Eliason's proposed amendment to CSHB 174.

Your office has indicated that the greater share of the costs of this amendment should be borne by the political subdivisions currently participating in the PERS. If this is the case, I would suggest that the current employer, at the time of the employees' claim for service credit, should assume the costs of providing benefits on earlier service.

The amendment to CSHB 174, as written, obligates the state to the entire past service cost. This cost is .4% of the total PERS payroll (\$487,000,000) or an annual cost of \$1,948,000 for active and retired employees.

If you split the costs between the state and political subdivision proportionate to the number of claims you will receive from current participants of each, the ratio is 3 to 1 with the political subdivisions assuming the greater share. Under this method of funding the political subdivision pays .6522% of payroll (\$224,000,000) or \$1,460,928. The state costs are .1852% of state payroll (\$263,000,000) or \$487,072. These costs include both active and retired employees.

Should you choose to draft language that will permit a split of costs between the state and political subdivisions as indicated above, an amendment should most appropriately be made to AS 39.35.590. This section covers the designation of eligible employees under the political subdivisions. Suggested language for an amendment to this section is enclosed. (A change to this section will also necessitate administrative amendments to the existing participation agreements between those



Additionally, AS 39.35.360, which covers employment with the State, will require an amendment to permit the claim of prior political subdivision employment by an employee who serves three years with the state after January 1, 1961. Drafted language for AS 39.35.360 is also enclosed.

TO: CSHB 174

AS 39.35.360(a) is repealed and re-enacted to read:

(a) An employee who completes three years of credited service with the state after January 1, 1961, for which the employee makes contributions required by this chapter is entitled to credited service (1) before January 1, 1961, as an employee of the state and former Territory of Alaska or of a participating political subdivision; (2) after January 1, 1961, as a peace officer or correctional officer of a participating political subdivision of the state provided the employee is vested and is an active peace officer in the system as of July 1, 1980; or (3) as (A) a commissioned officer of the United States Public Health Service; (B) an employee of the United States District court and the United States Commissioner's court serving the Territory and State of Alaska succeeded to by the Alaska court system; (C) a United States marshal, United States deputy marshal, Civil Aeronautics Administration security guard or United States Corps of Engineers security guard; (D) an employee of the Alaska Jail System of the United States Department of Justice; (E) a Civil Aeronautics Administration heavy equipment operator; (F) an employee of the United States Fish and Wildlife Service; (G) an employee of the Alaska Road Commission or Bureau of Public Roads; (H) an employee of the Alaska Communications System. The retirement benefits payable to an

employee under this section shall be reduced by the amount of the retirement pension benefits paid to him by the United States government for the same period of service. An employee is not eligible for credited service under this section if the employee is eligible to receive credit for the same service under AS 39.35.590.

AS 39.35.590 is amended by adding a new subsection to read:

(b) For purposes of this section "past service" shall mean (1) designated service performed as an employee for a participating employer prior to the effective date of participation in the system by that employer; or (2) designated service performed as an employee prior to January 1, 1961, for any other participating employer.

You have asked if the state is governed by the proposed regulations developed by the Department of Labor on the provisions of AS 23.10.375-400, Transportation of Employees. It is a uniform and well established rule that in statutory construction, the government, as sovereign, is not bound by the restrictive terms of statutes unless expressly mentioned. Alaska Rural Rehabilitation Corp v. Ubert, 10 Alaska Reports 509, 517 (1945) and cases cited therein.

Examples of Alaska Statutes in which the state is included are AS 23.30.265(12) which relates to workman's compensation, and AS 18.60.030(6) which relates to occupational safety and health standards.

Therefore, it is the opinion of the department that the state is not governed by the proposed regulations developed by the Department of Labor on the provisions of AS 23.10.375-400, Transportation of Employees.

We believe the present law is sufficient, and any changes are not necessary.



Under the authority of art. III, sec. 18 of the Alaska Constitution, I am transmitting a bill relating to transportation of employees.

The bill would amend AS 23.10.380 which deals with an employer's obligation to make certain provisions for the return transportation of employees to whom the employer provided (i.e., furnished or paid for or advanced funds to pay for) transportation from the place of hire to the place of work. The Department of Law recently interpreted AS 23.10.380 as requiring only that an employer provide the same kind of assistance for the return trip as he provided on the initial trip (e.g., if the employer advanced or loaned funds to the employee to pay for the trip to the job, the employer must also advance or loan the employee the necessary funds to return to the point of hire.)

The Department of Labor believes that the statute as it currently reads does not provide adequate protection for employees who may be enticed to travel long distances to Alaska to work for little more than the minimum wage in the mistaken belief that, if the job does not work out, they will not have to bear the expense of returning to their homes. Apparently many employees from the Lower 48, especially in the fish processing industry, have been stranded or "dumped" in Alaska upon termination of their employment without adequate funds to pay for the return trip.

To address this problem the bill would require that, in any situation that the employer provides any assistance to the employee in getting to the place of work, the employer must actually furnish or pay for the employee's return transportation. The obligation is placed squarely

on the employer to see to it that the employee gets home and is not left stranded in Alaska.

Additionally, the bill would make clear what return transportation or costs of return transportation must be borne by the employer. Under the bill, these would include, in addition to the costs of transporting just the employee, the costs of moving household goods and the costs of transporting members of the employee's family, if the employer assisted the employee in transporting them to the place of work, unless the employer and employee have agreed, in writing, at the time of hire that the employer would not be responsible for either or both of these elements.

Finally, the bill would also clarify that an employee who is entitled to return transportation by the employer is also entitled to receive subsistence for up to 10 days while waiting for available transportation. The subsistence could be either room and board or compensation in an amount equal to state per diem rates for the area in which the employee worked.



Under the authority of art. III, sec. 18 of the Alaska Constitution, I am transmitting a bill relating to the Alaska Police Standards Council.

In making several housekeeping amendments, the bill defines "chief administrative officer" of a police department; narrowly defines "police officer" so as to differentiate a police officer from a peace officer;" and authorizes the council to hire an administrator and staff as necessary to implement its statutory duties. The bill also adds, as members to the council, the special agent in charge of the Federal Bureau of Investigation in Alaska or his designee, and the Director of the Criminal Justice Center of the University of Alaska or his designee, at an estimated cost of \$3,600 per year. In addition, the bill requires chiefs of police who have operational duties in addition to administrative duties to meet minimum training standards required of police officers in Alaska. Further, the bill precludes exclusion from the provisions of the Police Standards Act of any municipality with a police training program unless that program meets the standards required by the Police Standards Act.

This act repeals AS 15.45.110 and AS 15.45.340 which requires that petitions be circulated throughout the state only by a sponsor and only in person. The effect of these two repeals would be to allow the petitions for an initiative or referendum to be circulated in whatever method the sponsor decided to use with a probable limitation that the method could not be clearly unreasonable.

It also repeals secs. 15.45.130 and 360 which are the sections containing the certification of the sponsor, that he has complied with the circulation requirement and that it be circulated only by a sponsor and only in person. In addition, the certification requirements are that the signatures were made in the sponsor's actual presence and that to the best of his knowledge the signatures were genuine.

Sec. 15.45.260. Filing application. A referendum is proposed by filing an application with the lieutenant governor. A deposit of \$100 must accompany the application. This deposit will be retained if a petition is not properly filed. If a petition is properly filed, the deposit shall be refunded. (§ 9.32 ch 83 SLA 1960; am § 23 ch 125 SLA 1962)

Sec. 15.45.270. Form of application. The application shall include (1) the act to be referred, (2) a statement that the sponsors are qualified voters who signed the application with the proposed bill attached, (3) the designation of a referendum committee of three sponsors who shall represent all sponsors and subscribers in matters relating to the referendum, and (4) the signatures and addresses of not less than 100 qualified voters. (§ 9.33 ch 83 SLA 1960)

Section implements constitutional provision. — The state legislature has interpreted and implemented Alaska Constitution, art. XI, § 2, passing this section requiring the application for a referendum petition to include the act to be referred. 1963 Op. Att'y Gen., No. 17.

The application for referendum petition relating to borough legislation

was not in proper form, and it was necessary for the proponents of the measure to prepare an application containing the text of ch. 52, SLA 1963, and secure the necessary number of signatures to this application before they could validly prepare a petition for circulation under § 3, art. XI, of the Alaska Constitution. 1963 Op. Att'y Gen., No. 17.

Sec. 15.45.280. Manner of notice. Notice to the referendum committee on any matter pertaining to the application and petition may be served on any member of the committee in person or by mail addressed to a committee member as indicated on the application. (§ 9.34 ch 83 SLA 1960)

Sec. 15.45.290. Designation of sponsors. The qualified voters who subscribe to the application are designated as sponsors. The referendum committee may designate additional sponsors by giving notice to the lieutenant governor of the names and addresses of those so designated. (§ 9.35 ch 83 SLA 1960)

Sec. 15.45.300. Time of review of application for certification. Within seven calendar days after the date the application is received, the lieutenant governor shall canvass the application and shall either certify

it or notify the referendum committee of the grounds for denial. (§ 9.36 ch 83 SLA 1960)

Sec. 15.45.310. Bases of denial of certification. The lieutenant governor shall deny certification if he determines (1) that the application is not substantially in the required form, or (2) that there is an insufficient number of qualified sponsors, or (3) that more than 90 days have expired since the adjournment of the legislative session at which the act being referred was passed. (§ 9.37 ch 83 SLA 1960)

Sec. 15.45.320. Preparation of petition. If the application is certified, the lieutenant governor shall, within seven calendar days after the date of certification, prescribe the form of, and prepare, a petition containing (1) a copy of the act to be referred, if the number of words included in both the formal and substantive provisions of the bill is 500 or less, (2) an impartial summary of the subject matter of the act, (3) the warning prescribed in § 330 of this chapter, (4) sufficient space for signatures and addresses, and (5) other specifications prescribed by the lieutenant governor to assure proper handling and control. Petitions, for purposes of circulation, shall be prepared by the lieutenant governor in a number reasonably calculated to allow full circulation throughout the state. The lieutenant governor shall number each petition and shall keep a record of the petitions delivered to each sponsor. Upon request of the referendum committee, the lieutenant governor shall specify the number of persons who voted in the preceding general election. (§ 9.38 ch 83 SLA 1960)

Sec. 15.45.330. Statement of warning. Each petition shall include a statement of warning that a person who signs a name other than his own to the petition, or knowingly signs his name more than once for the same proposition at one election or who signs the petition knowing he is not a qualified voter, upon conviction, is punishable by a fine of not more than \$1,000 or by imprisonment for not more than one year, or by both. (§ 9.39 ch 83 SLA 1960)

Sec. 15.45.340. Circulation by sponsor. The petitions may be circulated throughout the state only by a sponsor and only in person. (§ 9.40 ch 83 SLA 1960)

Sec. 15.45.350. Manner of signing and withdrawing name from petition. Any qualified voter may subscribe to the petition by signing his name and address. A person who has signed the referendum petition may withdraw his name only by giving written notice to the lieutenant governor before the date the petition is filed. (§ 9.41 ch 83 SLA 1960)

Sec. 15.45.360. Certification of sponsor. Before being filed, each petition shall be certified by an affidavit by the sponsor who circulated the petition. The affidavit shall state in substance that (1) the person signing the affidavit is a sponsor, (2) the person is the only circulator of

the petition, (3) the signatures were made in his actual presence, and (4) to the best of his knowledge, the signatures are the signatures of persons whose names they purport to be. In determining the sufficiency of the petition, the lieutenant governor shall not count subscriptions on petitions not properly certified. (§ 9.42 ch 83 SLA 1960)

Sec. 15.45.370. Filing of petition. The sponsors may file the petition only within 90 days after the adjournment of the legislative session at which the act was passed and only if signed by qualified voters equal in number to 10 per cent of those who voted in the preceding general election and resident in at least two-thirds of the election districts of the state. (§ 9.43 ch 83 SLA 1960)

Sec. 15.45.380. Review of petition. Within not more than 60 days of the date the petition was filed, the lieutenant governor shall review the petition and shall notify the committee whether the petition was properly or was improperly filed and at which election the proposition shall be placed on the ballot. (§ 9.44 ch 83 SLA 1960)

Sec. 15.45.390. Bases for determining the petition was improperly filed. The lieutenant governor shall notify the committee that the petition was improperly filed if he determines that (1) there is an insufficient number of qualified subscribers, or (2) the subscribers were not resident in at least two-thirds of the election districts of the state, or (3) the petition was not filed within 90 days after the adjournment of the legislative session at which the act was passed. (§ 9.45 ch 83 SLA 1960)

Sec. 15.45.400. Submission of supplementary petition. Upon receipt of notice that the filing of the petition was improper, the committee may amend and correct the petition by circulating and filing a supplementary petition within 10 days of the date that notice was given if 90 days have not expired after the adjournment of the legislative session at which the act was passed. (§ 9.46 ch 83 SLA 1960)

Sec. 15.45.410. Preparation of ballot title and proposition. The lieutenant governor, with the assistance of the attorney general, shall prepare a ballot title and proposition if he determines that the petition is properly filed. The ballot title shall, in not more than six words, indicate the general subject area of the act. The proposition shall, in not more than 100 words, give a true and impartial summary of the act being referred. (§ 9.47 ch 83 SLA 1960)

Sec. 15.45.420. Placing proposition on ballot. The lieutenant governor shall place the ballot title and proposition on the election ballot for the first statewide general, special, or primary election held more than 180 days after adjournment of the legislative session at which the act was passed. (§ 9.48 ch 83 SLA 1960; am § 36 ch 69 SLA 1970)

Sec. 15.45.430. Display of act being referred. The lieutenant governor shall provide each election board with 10 copies of the act being referred, and the election board shall display three copies of the act in a conspicuous place in the room where the election is held. (§ 9.49 ch 83 SLA 1960)

Sec. 15.45.440. Rejection of act. If a majority of the votes cast on the referendum proposition favor the rejection of the act referred, the act is rejected, and the lieutenant governor shall so certify. The act rejected by referendum is void 30 days after certification. (§ 9.50 ch 83 SLA 1960)

Section adopts language of Constitution. — This section adopted almost verbatim the language of Alaska Constitution, art. XI, § 6, for establishing the time when an act rejected by referendum shall become void. Walters v. Cease, Sup. Ct. Op. No. 182 (File No. 447), 388 P.2d 263 (1964).

Sec. 15.45.450. Insufficiency of application or petition. No referendum submitted to the voters shall be held void because of the insufficiency of the application or petition by which the submission was procured. (§ 9.51 ch 83 SLA 1960)

Sec. 15.45.460. Judicial review. Any person aggrieved by any determination made by the lieutenant governor may bring an action to have the determination reviewed within 30 days of the date on which notice of the determination was given by any appropriate remedy in the superior court. (§ 9.52 ch 83 SLA 1960)
