

The meeting was called to order by chairman, Bob Mulcahy.

He introduced SB 81. There was no one present from the Governor's Office to testify. Bradley recommended the bill be put aside.

Judy Crondell from the Department of Administration testified on SB 91.

She said the reason the amount they were asking for was un-budgeted was because the department was not aware of the additional expenses. The total amount needed for the additional ASHA costs was \$17,300.

The labor relations figure last session was \$55,000 - prior to the amendment an appropriation request was submitted, the amendment was then added then the department changed its mind and dropped two positions. The Governor vetoed the amendment back to the original cost. Now the Labor Relations positions were back and the additional funding was needed.

The expenses are both incurred and to be incurred.

No one was present from the Labor Relations Board to explain the expenses.

Rodey said the way labor relations is handled by the state needs to be looked into.

~~Richard Holden from DOT spoke favoring SB 87. Holden said,~~ as a result of a flood on the Tanana River the state was building a series of dikes to help the severe erosion problem at the Fairbanks Airport. Because the Tanana was changing its course there was lost ground and the river was now within 50 feet of the runway - if it breaks any further there is a chance of losing the runway. He said DOT is working with the Corp of Engineers to change the course of the flood. If the Corp does more work it can only be done in the winter. During the interim an ice revetment would keep the high water off of the bank.

Holden said the money would go to the Airport fund not the general fund. He proposed that the money not be appropriated to design and construction as the design was 2/3 complete.

Senator Rodey said he was familiar with the department's recommendation and supported it - if for no other reason to protect the state's investment in the airport.

The meeting was adjourned.

Please revise Robert S. Gates' memorandum to you of August 1, 1978 on the above subject to include the following matters.

Attached you will find a copy of a letter from the Deputy Director of Data Processing which indicates they will need approximately 179.6 for the Telecommunications Network (component 02-95-6-02-04-00) in order to meet the RCA increases effective this year.

We will soon be contacting the University of Alaska regarding their intentions to delegate this Department authority to negotiate a collective bargaining agreement on their behalf and whether they intend to fund the costs of our services. However, we seriously doubt if funding is available since the University did not ask for the participation of the Department of Administration. In any event, the Department of Administration is required to participate in negotiations between the Board of Regents and funding will be required under both relationships to comply with AS 23.40.212. This Department cannot absorb these responsibilities without seriously diluting its efforts in settling seven contracts which will be coming up for negotiation this year. Costs are estimated in the attached letter from Hunt to Lind of August 9, 1978 and a supplemental appropriation will be necessary..

You will also note in the attached letter from Bradley to Lind of August 9, 1978 that a supplemental need exists in the federal surplus property program to cover deficits incurred during FY 77 and FY 78. A deficit first occurred late in FY 77. The lack of an adequate amount and quality of federal surplus property led to a reduction in receipts. This deficit was first realized late in FY 77 but promises by the federal government to increase the amount of property available for donation caused us to continue the program. Yet, these increased revenues came late in FY 78 and were not sufficient to offset past or existing fiscal year deficits. In addition, our accounts receivable collection controls were inadequate. We are now implementing more effective controls to insure timely payments. We anticipate a revenue surplus during FY 79 based upon an improved

August 15, 1978

program and more effective financial controls. Consequently, we are requesting a supplemental appropriation for about 24.0.

✓ In addition, we are estimating a need for between 5 and 10.0 additional for the Labor Relations Agency. Per our conversations with Steve Hafling this date he has advised that our original estimates noted to you in Commissioner Allen's attached letter of July 7, 1978 are valid. He advises that Jim Lucas will require about 30.0 and Nutshell will expend about 2.0 per month. Expenditures last year were 28.0 for Lucas and 14.0 for Nutshell. The increase in expenditures for Nutshell Business Service is largely a result of a need to conduct more investigations on complaints and verification of election ballots. Since these amounts alone equal the total FY 79 budget of 55.0 it leaves no funds for travel and other incidental costs. These amounted to almost 5.0 in FY 78. Due to this limitation we have restricted the Nutshell Business Service Contract to 20.0 pending availability of the supplemental request.

✓ Due to an oversight we failed to budget for ASHA and fire insurance costs at the Kodiak and Fort Yukon combined facilities. ASHA costs were 3.0 and 8.0 respectively, while fire insurance amounted to 1.0 for both facilities. In addition, we were advised that H&SS failed to budget for 6.0 in ASHA and fire costs related to space the Division of Personnel occupies in the Fairbanks Regional Office building. This space had been assigned at budget preparation time to the Department of Health and Social Services. I have been advised that Kip Roloff has been asked by Ron Lehr to confirm whether funds were budgeted or not. If not, a supplemental will be needed or use of the Governor's contingency fund. Other funds cannot be made available without seriously jeopardizing program objectives or current plans in progress upon which substantial efforts have been devoted.

SUBJECT: FY 79 Supplemental Requests

In response to your December 7, 1978 memorandum, attached are the FY 79 Supplemental Request Analysis forms for the Department of Administration except for the Pioneers' Homes delete/add supplemental. That information is still being gathered and will be submitted under separate cover by December 27.

As has been indicated in your previous memo dated October 4, 1978 or in previous conversations my staff has had with budget analysts, the following supplemental requests have already been recommended as approved by Budget and Management.

A total of 12.0 was requested to cover unbudgeted ASHA costs and related insurance for the Kodiak and Fort Yukon combined facilities as was noted in my letter to you dated 8/15/78. However, an additional 8.6 is needed as indicated in Commissioner Allen's letter (attached) to you dated 11/21/78. We originally requested funding from the Governor's Contingency Fund as this was the past procedure. In subsequent conversations with Alison Elgee it has been suggested that these two requests be handled similarly. I also believe it is necessary that in the future an agency be required to budget for their space on the basis of their allocation at the time of the budget, and that Budget and Management should confirm this to avoid future problems of this nature. Please advise if you are not able to do this and any thoughts you have to resolve the problem.

In my memo to you dated 8/15/78, the importance of getting a supplemental for the Labor Relations Agency was pointed out. Because of the need to conduct more investigations on complaints, verification of election ballots, and increased costs related to copying hearing transcripts contractual services will be overexpended by 16.5. However, less than anticipated expenditures in travel will offset 3.0 of that shortfall so the total need is 13.5.

It is requested that Governor Hammond and you approve these requests and submit them to the legislature for their approval.

The Department of Administration has requested \$20,600 general funds to cover unbudgeted ASHA costs and related fire insurance premiums for Kodiak and Fort Yukon combined facilities, the Fairbanks Regional Office Building, and the Valdez Court and Office Building.

After reviewing the request I have determined that all but the Valdez Court and Office Building space were in fact unbudgeted costs. The Department of Health and Social Services has restricted funding in the Social Services Southcentral Region budget which apparently was budgeted for the Valdez space but not paid as they are no longer utilizing that space. However, I have spoken to Ken Ryals about utilizing that funding to cover \$3,300 of the ASHA obligations due to the Valdez building, and I therefore, am recommending a reduction of the supplemental request to \$17,300.

PURPOSE OF THE SALARY COMMISSION

The written policy as expressed in House and Senate Committee Substitute for Senate Bill #499, "An Act relating to compensation, benefits and classifications of public officers and employees; creating the Alaska Salary Commission; and providing for an effective date" states that the Commission is to determine salary and retirement benefits for public officers based upon equitable relationships being maintained among various positions.

Employees covered by Salary Commission recommendations are the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Department Commissioners, Deputy Commissioners, Directors, the Judiciary, Legislature and three of the four Regulatory Commissions (the Alaska Transportation Commission was removed from review by the Legislature in 1978.)

FOREWARD

The Act establishing the Salary Commission calls for a biennial report, with submission of a preliminary report by November 15, and the necessity for soliciting public comments prior to submission of final recommendations within 10 days of the opening of the Legislature.

The Salary Commission met in January and March 1978, to elect a Chairman and reach agreement on a schedule of meetings to develop salary and benefit recommendations for submission to the Legislature in January 1979. The agenda also included a policy question as to whether the Salary Commission should consider submission of 1978 amendments to its recommendations issued January 18, 1977, (as amended on March 2, 1977) in response to Administration and Court System requests for clarification of certain recommendations, and revision of others. By majority vote, the Salary Commission decided not to issue amendments, but limit itself to developing recommendations for 1979, which would include any clarification or revision of the 1977 recommendations deemed necessary.

During 1978, and 1979, the Commission met a total of 13 days.

As provided in AS 39.23, the Division of Personnel and Labor Relations, Department of Administration, provided staff assistance, and the Commission wishes to thank those men and women for their support. Also, as provided by the enabling legislation, the Commissioner of Administration did provide the Commission with recommendations regarding compensation and retirement benefits.

During its organizational meeting, the Commission immediately established:

1. An overall plan for achieving its objective;
2. A timetable consistent with provisions of the Act;
3. Staff liaison and support personnel and facilities;
4. A method of gathering data necessary to meet Commission requirements;
5. Meeting dates.

Again, as provided by the AS 39.23, the Commission called upon various State agencies for information, and the information was provided in a prompt manner. The Salary Commission, therefore, wishes to acknowledge the valuable assistance of numerous individuals and divisions within State government.

The Commission made time available for those who wished to present information to the Commission.

Some of the resource materials utilized include Department of Labor Cost of Living Statistics, comparative data from "The Book of the States," comparative data from the Council of State Governments, statistical data

from the Department of Administration, comparative data from the "1975 Citizens' Conference on State Legislators," returns from research requested by the Commission of certain salaries and benefits from selected states, position paper and analysis provided by the Judicial System. The "Survey of Salaries and Benefits" compiled and published in December, 1977, by the Division of Personnel and Labor Relations also provided valuable aid for the Commission.

A combination of factors was considered in arriving at salary recommendations; among them were: inflation and its affect on cost-of-living, salaries and benefits paid in other states, salary relationships to other State employees and the fact that recommended salaries would prevail for two years without further review. Additionally, on October 13, 1978, President Carter's Council on Wage and Price Stability issued guidelines which established maximum wage levels allowable for both private and public sector employees.

The Commission made a conscious compromise decision in 1976 to bring salaries only to 1977 levels, even though they would be in effect for two (2) years. This was done because the significant raises voted in 1975 by the Legislature were nullified by the August, 1976 referendum and the mood of the taxpayer about those raises was perceived to continue to prevail after the referendum.

The Salary Commission also reviewed substantial public input on its preliminary recommendations received in the form of written comments addressed to the Commission.

Giving due regard to the public input, considering the factors outlined above, and following regulations established by the President's Council on Wage and Price Stability, the Commission recommends salary adjustments listed on the following pages of this report.

RECOMMENDATIONS

1) GOVERNOR

The Salary Commission recommends

- A. A salary of \$57,231 annually for the Governor of Alaska.
- B. Beginning January 1, 1980, the above salary of the Governor shall be increased in an amount equal to the increase, expressed in terms of percentage, in the United States Department of Labor Consumer Price Index (Urban and Clerical Workers) for Anchorage, Alaska from January, 1979, to January, 1980. Any salary adjustment shall be made in an amount calculated to the nearest tenth of a percentage point increase in the Consumer Price Index.
- C. The Governor remain in the Public Employees Retirement System.

2) LIEUTENANT GOVERNOR

The Salary Commission recommends:

- A. The salary of \$51,088 annually for the Lieutenant Governor of Alaska.
- B. Beginning January 1, 1980, the above salary of the Lieutenant Governor shall be increased in an amount equal to the increase, expressed in terms of percentage, in the United States Department of Labor Consumer Price Index (Urban and Clerical Workers) for Anchorage, Alaska from January, 1979, to January, 1980. Any salary adjustment shall be made in an amount calculated to the nearest tenth of a percentage point increase in the Consumer Price Index.
- C. The Lieutenant Governor remain in the Public Employees Retirement System.

3) DEPARTMENT COMMISSIONERS

The Salary Commission recommends:

- A. A salary of \$51,088 annually for Department Commissioners.
- B. Beginning January 1, 1980, the above salary for Department Commissioners shall be increased in an amount equal to the increase, expressed in terms of percentage, in the United States Department of Labor Consumer Price Index (Urban and Clerical Workers) for Anchorage, Alaska from January, 1979, to January, 1980. Any salary adjustment shall be made in an amount calculated to the nearest tenth of a percentage point increase in the Consumer Price Index.

C. The Department Commissioners remain in the Public Employees Retirement System.

4) DEPUTY COMMISSIONERS

The Salary Commission recommends:

A. A salary of \$45,762 annually except that those State employees who accept appointment as Deputy Commissioner whose annual salary exceeds \$45,762 shall continue to receive that higher salary.

B. Beginning January 1, 1980, the above salary for Deputy Commissioners shall be increased in an amount equal to the increase, expressed in terms of percentage, in the United States Department of Labor Consumer Price Index (Urban and Clerical Workers) for Anchorage, Alaska from January, 1979, to January, 1980. Any salary adjustment shall be made in an amount calculated to the nearest tenth of a percentage point increase in the Consumer Price Index.

C. The Deputy Commissioners remain in the Public Employees Retirement System.

5) DIRECTORS

The Salary Commission recommends:

A. Directors remain on State pay plan (AS 39.27.011). We continue to recommend entry level of new directors be in the 'A' step of the salary range at which they are hired. We recognize that promotions to Director may sometimes necessitate that those receiving the promotion move into a step other than 'A' in order to be assured a salary increase. In such cases, that person receiving the promotion should enter at the lowest step necessary to insure a salary increase.

B. Salary progression follow the steps outlined in the State salary schedule in AS 39.27.011 to a maximum of \$50,000 annually. Directors whose salaries exceed \$50,000 annually on December 31, 1978, remain at that salary without further increases.

C. All Division Directors who, as of December 31, 1978, are on frozen salary shall, as of January 1, 1979, be placed within the salary schedule at the appropriate range closest to but not less than their current salary and shall progress in step according to the schedule within that salary range, provided that their salary shall not exceed a maximum of \$50,000/year.

D. Any State employee who, without a break in continuous service, is appointed to a position of Division Director after December 31, 1978, shall be placed at the time of appointment within the salary schedule at the appropriate range and step closest to but not less than his current salary, and shall progress in step according to

schedule within that salary range, provided his salary shall not exceed \$50,000/year.

E. Directors remain in the Public Employees Retirement System.

F. These recommendations apply to base salaries, exclusive of geographic differential payments.

6) ALASKA PUBLIC UTILITIES COMMISSION

The Salary Commission recommends:

A. That members of the Commission be paid \$44,353 annually.

B. The Chairman of the Commission be paid an additional \$500 annually, prorated as part of the regular salary.

C. Beginning January 1, 1980, the above salary of each Alaska Public Utilities Commissioner shall be increased in an amount equal to the increase, expressed in terms of percentage, in the United States Department of Labor Consumer Price Index (Urban and Clerical Workers) for Anchorage, Alaska from January, 1979, to January, 1980. Any salary adjustment shall be made in an amount calculated to the nearest tenth of a percentage point increase in the Consumer Price Index.

D. Alaska Public Utilities Commission members remain in the Public Employees Retirement System.

7) ALASKA COMMERCIAL FISHERIES ENTRY COMMISSION

The Salary Commission recommends:

A. A salary of \$44,353 annually for members of the Alaska Commercial Fisheries Entry Commission.

B. The Chairman of the Commission be paid an additional \$500 annually, prorated as part of the regular salary.

C. Beginning January 1, 1980, the above salary of each Alaska Commercial Fisheries Entry Commissioner shall be increased in an amount equal to the increase, expressed in terms of percentage, in the United States Department of Labor Consumer Price Index (Urban and Clerical Workers) for Anchorage, Alaska from January, 1979, to January, 1980. Any salary adjustment shall be made in an amount calculated to the nearest tenth of a percentage point increase in the Consumer Price Index.

D. Commissioners remain in the Public Employees Retirement System.

8) ALASKA PIPELINE COMMISSION

The Salary Commission recommends:

- A. A salary of \$44,353 annually for members of the Pipeline Commission.
- B. The Chairman of the Commission be paid an additional \$500 annually, prorated as part of the regular salary.
- C. Beginning January 1, 1980, the above salary of each Alaska Pipeline Commissioner shall be increased in an amount equal to the increase, expressed in terms of percentage, in the United States Department of Labor Consumer Price Index (Urban and Clerical Workers) for Anchorage, Alaska from January, 1979, to January, 1980. Any salary adjustment shall be made in an amount calculated to the nearest tenth of a percentage point increase in the Consumer Price Index.
- D. Commissioners remain in the Public Employees Retirement System.

9) SUPREME COURT JUSTICES

The Salary Commission recommends:

- A. Annual salary of \$57,231 for Supreme Court Justices.
- B. Beginning January 1, 1980, the above salary of each Supreme Court Justice shall be increased in an amount equal to the increase, expressed in terms of percentage, in the United States Department of Labor Consumer Price Index (Urban and Clerical Workers) for Anchorage, Alaska from January, 1979, to January, 1980. Any salary adjustment shall be made in an amount calculated to the nearest tenth of a percentage point increase in the Consumer Price Index.
- C. No change in the retirement benefits now applicable to Supreme Court Justices.

10) SUPERIOR COURT JUDGES

The Salary Commission recommends:

- A. Annual salary of \$52,462 for Superior Court Judges.
- B. Beginning January 1, 1980, the above salary of each Superior Court Judge shall be increased in an amount equal to the increase, expressed in terms of percentage, in the United States Department of Labor Consumer Price Index (Urban and Clerical Workers) for Anchorage, Alaska from January, 1979, to January, 1980. Any salary adjustment shall be made in an amount calculated to the nearest tenth of a percentage point increase in the Consumer Price Index.

C. No change in retirement benefits now applicable to Superior Court Judges.

11) DISTRICT COURT JUDGES

The Salary Commission recommends:

A. Annual salary of \$44,353 for District Court Judges.

B. Beginning January 1, 1980, the above salary of each District Court Judge shall be increased in an amount equal to the increase, expressed in terms of percentage, in the United States Department of Labor Consumer Price Index (Urban and Clerical Workers) for Anchorage, Alaska from January, 1979, to January, 1980. Any salary adjustment shall be made in an amount calculated to the nearest tenth of a percentage point increase in the Consumer Price Index.

C. No change in retirement benefits now applicable to District Court Judges.

12) LEGISLATORS

The Salary Commission recommends:

A. A salary of \$12,690 annually for State Legislators.

B. The Senate President and House Speaker each receive an additional \$500 per year payable on the opening day of each regular session of the Legislature or upon confirmation by the House or Senate after the opening of a regular session of the Legislature.

C. Legislators receive an annual allowance to a maximum of \$4,320.

D. Beginning January 1, 1980, the above salary of each Legislator shall be increased in an amount equal to the to the increase, expressed in terms of percentage, in the United States Department of Labor Consumer Price Index (Urban and Clerical Workers) for Anchorage, Alaska from January, 1979, to January, 1980. Any salary adjustment shall be made in an amount calculated to the nearest tenth of a percentage point increase in the Consumer Price Index.

E. Participation in the Public Employees Retirement System remain voluntary for Legislators.

F. Legislators receive per diem at the same rate as State employees, including regional variations where applicable. (See per diem rate schedule for administrative State employees. Appendix II.) Legislators who do not live in their city of residence during regular or special legislative sessions will receive per diem at the short-term rate; interim committee work should be paid at the short-term per diem rate; however, per diem is to be paid at

the long-term (lower) rate if Legislators are able to stay in their city of residence while on legislative business.

G. We concur with action by 1978 legislative session adopting a 1977 Salary Commission recommendation that each Legislator shall be reimbursed at cost, and upon presentation of proof, for one round-trip to his home district during each regular session.

 This fiscal note shows the funds needed to add to the FY 80 budget for the impact of SB 182 on executive and judicial branches only. Impact on the legislature would be prepared by the legislative affairs agencies. Funds in this fiscal note would be appropriated to the Governor's Office for further distribution.

By contrast, the FY 80 impact of HCR 2 on the executive and judicial branches, fully implementing Salary Commission recommendations, is \$509,200. The salary schedule used in calculating the figures herein is the schedule proposed in HB 220. The fiscal note for HCR 2 assumed a 7.0% COLA adjustment effective 1/1/80. If a similar assumption is made for SB 182, so that all salaries expressed as a percentage of range 24 E are increased by 7% on 1/1/80, then this fiscal note would be increased by \$166,100 to a total of \$399,000 for FY 80 and subsequent years.

Peggy Berck has requested two alternate committee substitutes for your committee's review. They are enclosed; I believe them to be responsive to your request.

Some comments on the contents of the two bills:

1. Definition of "felony involving moral turpitude."
I did a computer run on the phrase moral turpitude. It occurs some 40 or more times in Alaska Statutes. Somewhat significantly, the only time the Legislature sought to define the term is in present AS 15.05.030. The closest I came to a definition in the encyclopedias that I view as useful and accurate was found at 22 C.J.S., Criminal Law, §8; there the suggestion was offered that the concept of crimes mala in se [immoral as wrong in itself as opposed to merely prohibited in law] was substantially identical to the concept of crimes involving moral turpitude.

A modification of that concept is found in the bills that are enclosed. See AS 15.05.035(d) in each bill. I found it useful to give some examples of the crimes found to involve moral turpitude. The list is obviously partial and expressed in common law concepts. If the committee is dissatisfied with that approach, the only significant improvement that I can offer would be an encyclopedic recital of the actual crimes viewed by the Legislature as constituting felonies involving moral turpitude.

If the committee does not find the definition offered adequate, then I will undertake a comprehensive listing.

2. The problem of out-of-state imprisonment. As I see this question, it has two aspects:

(a) Persons convicted of a crime in the state courts of Alaska. Whether they are imprisoned in Alaska or elsewhere, they remain during their entire imprisonment in the "custody of the commissioner of Health and Social Services." AS 33.30.090. As such, a direction to the commissioner as under draft secs. AS 11.05.075(c) and AS 15.05.035(c) seems a complete answer to the concern.

(b) Persons convicted in a court other than an Alaska state court. If the individual was not an Alaska resident before his conviction or if he had been but was convicted by a court other than an Alaska court, I see no mechanism for advising him that his rights have been restored. Obviously, of course, the election offices will have the correct information and on attempts to register or obtain information, they will provide it. That seems an adequate mechanism and, as it is implicit in the election code, no specific provision is suggested in the bills.

3. I believe that the phrase "position of private trust" has well established meanings. Black's Law Dictionary states that a trust it describes is:

"One established or created for the benefit of a certain designated individual or individuals, or a known person or class of persons, clearly identified or capable of identification by the terms of the instrument creating the trust, as distinguished from trusts for public institutions or charitable trusts."

As such it describes the role of trustee for a private trust [but not, I think, the role of the trustor or beneficiary].

STATE AFFAIRS COMMITTEE

February 28, 1979

The meeting was called to order by Senator Tim Kelly.

The first bill on the agenda was CSHB 102 pertaining to works of fine art.

Bill author, Dick Eliason said that early in January a Sitka artist contacted him saying that if a work of art were in a gallery and the gallery went bankrupt, even though the work was on consignment it would be subject to seizure.

This bill would prevent the art from being seized. At present the best the artist can do to recover art under these circumstances is to litigate which is very costly, at worst to lose the art.

There were no questions. Senator Bradley recommended the bill "do pass".

SB 182 was introduced - a committee substitute by the sponsor had been distributed to each member. Bradley recommended for purposes of discussion that the substitute be used as the working draft for the meeting. There were no objections.

Senator Colletta explained the the original bill picked up and suggested inactment of what the people had voted to repeal a couple of years ago. The substitute corrected that but it still needed work. He explained the comparative list that was attached to each members bill.

Colletta said in essence the reason for the bill was that in the political arena salaries should be left up to political bodies.

The bill suggested that legislator's salaries be cut back to \$9,000. This was a substantial reduction. Adjustments could be made with the committee substitute, however, not to reduce but to increase only when warranted. This would merely do away with an automatic blanket increase.

Ziegler said he'd always voted against an increase for his own salary but it would be difficult to favor a bill that would give him a decrease even though he agreed with the bill.

Colleta said the substitute would keep the same rate that "we're" on but would affect future pay increases.

Kelly recommended a work session.

Kay Diebels, chairman of the Salary Commission said she didn't care if they abolished the salary commission but she did have some concerns with the bill.

She pointed out that salaries reducing pay increases for the Governor and Lt. Governor could not take place constitutionally until there was a new Governor. She also questioned the fact that the bill would pay justices more than the Governor and said that all members of the committee felt the Governor should be the highest salaried person on the state payroll - even if that meant giving him \$75,000 so he could make more than Alaska Ferry Engineers. She noted the bill addressed salaries of deputies but not directors and that these would have to be addressed at some point. She also noted that while other commissions were included in the legislation the Alaska Transportation Commission was not included.

She said the definition of the bill would make it hard to follow for someone who was interested in the bill - that since it was abolishing the Salary Commission it should state so in the title.

She also was concerned about legislative salaries - at the time the commission was formed it was done so because the public was upset with the large increase that the legislature had voted for itself.

Ziegler recalled that the Commission had made recommendations for salaries last fall and that the report had changed from the time it was written and the time it was introduced for public comments.

The chairman said that was true - an initial report had been drawn up in September and by the time it was released for public input in November had been altered.

Diebels said that new Presidential guidelines would not allow as much of an increase as they had originally thought - 7% per year average and 7% per multiple contracts - one may assume an 8% cost of living increase.

Kelly said from the preliminary to the final had every figure been increased by 8%.

Diebels said yes, with the exception of the Regulatory Commission that was increased by 12.6% because they were behind the other commissions.

Kelly apologized for having the figures so late. He said there would be a working session and the committee would like the commissions suggestions. He said he didn't feel the Commission had done a poor job but since the legislature was taking the heat for setting salaries they might as well do the work also.

Diebels said no problem but the legislature was given an opportunity to reject the commission's final report.

Kelly put the bill aside until a work session could take place - he tentatively set a new hearing for Wednesday, March 7.

SB 191 was introduced by Kelly. This pertained to the appropriation for the Eagle River Road North. Kelly said that Parks and Recreation had set aside \$220,000 to purchase Paradise Haven.

The road improvements are needed for easier access - the Iditerod Trail head is also at Paradise Haven.

The school bus also will not travel on the Eagle River Road at present so students are walking up to two miles to catch the school bus.

Senator Kelly read the report attached in the file. He explained if the bill were passed on to the Finance Committee that it would push for a bond package to finance the road, that he did not expect money.

Ziegler said he understood the need, that Kelly had explained the problem but where was the money?

Ziegler would not make the recommendation to move the bill out of committee, Bradley had been excused to testify at another meeting so Kelly gave the chair to Ziegler and moved the bill out of committee.

The meeting was adjourned.

Enclosed is the bill you requested repealing the salary commission statutes, and returning the statutory sections pertaining to salaries of certain public officers and employees to their pre-1976 status. There is, however, one difference between the pre-1976 language of these sections and the language I have used in the enclosed bill. Before 1976, the salaries of the top ranking state officials were tied to the salary schedule established in AS 39.27.010; specifically, they were typically tied to Step E, Range 28 of the salary schedule. As a result of a reorganization of the salary schedule, however, continuation of the reference to Step E, Range 28 would lead to a substantial boost in salary for these state officials. As an example, I would note the following changes in judicial salaries which would ensue from continuing the reference to Step E, Range 28:

- (1) The salary commission's recommendation of 1977 (approved by Legislative Resolve 94) set salaries of supreme court justices at \$52,992; a reference to Step E, Range 28 analogous to that before 1976 would result in a salary of \$64,958.40;
- (2) The salary commission's recommendation of 1977 set salaries of superior court judges at \$48,576; a reference to Step E, Range 28 analogous to that before 1976 would result in a salary of \$59,545.20;
- (3) The salary commission's recommendation of 1977 set salaries of district court judges at \$41,068; a reference to Step E, Range 28 analogous to that before 1976 would result in a salary of \$50,342.76.

Since I did not believe these large salary increases were intended and since the state constitution restricts reductions in judicial salaries (see Article IV, sec. 13), I have taken the liberty of changing the reference to Step E, Range 24. This would result in salaries of \$54,028.80 for supreme court justices, \$49,526.40 for superior court justices, and \$41,872.32 for district court justices. Please let me know if you would prefer the original reference to Range 28 or if you would like to discuss any other aspect of this bill with me.

III. ANALYSIS (See Fiscal Note Preparation Instructions, Section III)

This fiscal note shows the funds needed to add to the FY 80 budget for the impact of SB 182 on executive and judicial branches only. Impact on the legislature would be prepared by the legislative affairs agencies. Funds in this fiscal note would be appropriated to the Governor's Office for further distribution.

By contrast, the FY 80 impact of HCR 2 on the executive and judicial branches, fully implementing Salary Commission recommendations, is \$509,200. The salary schedule used in calculating the figures herein is the schedule proposed in HB 220. The fiscal note for HCR 2 assumed a 7.0% COLA adjustment effective 1/1/80. If a similar assumption is made for SB 182, so that all salaries expressed as a percentage of range 24 E are increased by 7% on 1/1/80, then this fiscal note would be increased by \$166,100 to a total of \$399,000 for FY 80 and subsequent years.

SUMMARY

This bill abolishes the Salary Commission and redefines the annual salaries of the Governor, Lt. Governor, legislators, chief justices and associate justices, superior and district court judges, executive department heads and deputy heads, and members of the Commercial Fisheries Entry Commission, Alaska Public Utilities Commission and the Alaska Pipeline Commission. It also redefines the additional annual allowance to legislators for postage, stationary, stenographic services and other related expenses.

SUPPORTING INFORMATION

SB 182 returns the statutory sections pertaining to salaries of certain public officers and employees to pre-1976 status. There is one difference between the pre-1976 language of the statutes and SB 182. In 1975 salaries were set in accordance with Step E, Range 28 as established in AS 39.27.010 (Session Laws of Alaska, 1975.)

Step E, Range 24 is implemented in SB 182 rather than Step E, Range 28, because Range 28 would have substantially raised salaries which was not the sponsor's intent. However, Step E, Range 24 still increases salaries except for the Governor and the Lt. Governor. Range 24 was used because the State Constitution restricts reduction of judicial salaries (Art. IV, Sec. 13). The sponsor feels this bill is still not satisfactory and he is submitting a Committee Substitute which will be received before the meeting. The redraft ties salaries to the old pre-1975 salary schedule, giving specific

Under both SB 182 and AS for SB 182 commission chairmen will not receive the additional \$500.00 for acting in that capacity. The President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House will still receive an additional \$500.00 on top of their set salaries.

ALASKA SALARY COMMISSION (Under Department of Administration)

Created in 1976 by statute, the Alaska Salary Commission consists of five members appointed by the Governor and serve four year staggered terms (one member serves one year and is replaced, one serves 2 years and is replaced, one member serves three years and is replaced, etc.) Public officers or employees cannot serve on the Salary Commission.

Members of the Commission are compensated with per diem and travel only.
