Moved from Finance to Rules 3/29/82 by unanimous consent. Reported from Rules 3/31/82; taken up immediately. Advanced to second reading 3/31/82. Postponed until 4/5/82 by unanimous consent. State Affairs committee substitute adopted by unanimous consent 4/5/82. Amended 4/5/82 and postponed until 4/6/82 by unanimous consent. Amendment 2 withdrawn 4/6/82; bill advanced to third reading by unanimous consent. Passed third reading 4/6/82 with effective date vote same as passage.

Action Taken: Bill was amended and reported out. NOTE: Several of the amendments made during this hearing were later withdrawn, as explained at the end of Action Narrative of these minutes.

The meeting was called to order by Chairman Martin at 1:04 p.m. Members present were: Representatives Martin, Bylsma, Gardiner, and Rogers. Rep. Randolph was absent. Before the committee was CSSSSB 630 (State Affairs) amended.

Number 005

Rep. Rogers moved, page 2, lines 14-16, to delete underlined language. Rep. Bylsma objected. Rep. Rogers explained his motion.

Number 015

Margo Waring, staff to Senator Sturgulewski, explained why the language was included. She said Sen. Sturgulewski supports the language as it accomplishes their purpose. Waring said they want to avoid a free conference committee on the bill. There was discussion of timeframes for the bill.

Number 049

Rep. Rogers asked about continuing the ABC Board (referring to page 1, line 17). There was discussion.

Number 058

Rep. Rogers motion regarding page 2, lines 14-16, was discussed. Waring suggested deleting all of (c). Rep. Rogers explained his intent in moving to delete only the underlined language. On the question: there being no objection, the motion passed.

Number 073

Rep. Rogers moved, page 1, line 19, to delete 1983 and insert 1982. Waring said there had been no sunset audit yet. Rep. Rogers said there had been a sunset audit, and that the decision had been made to sunset the Board in 1983. He felt this was a mistake and that the board should be sunsetted sooner. There was discussion of the motion and the need to sunset the Alaska Transportation Commission.

- Number 114 On the question, there being no objection, the motion passed.
- Number 119 Rep. Gardiner asked if an audit had been done on the ABC Board. Waring said an audit had been done in 1980 and the board had been extended to 1983 with recommendations to make changes. There was discussion.
- Number 142 Rep. Martin, referring to page 1, line 20 (State Parole Board), said Sen. Parr had sent over a bill to extend the Board to 1986. Rep. Martin moved to extend the Board to 1986. Rep. Rogers asked him to change his motion to extend the Board to 1984. Rep. Martin changed his motion. There being no objection, the motion passed.
- Number 161 Rep. Gardiner brought up (page 1, line 27) extending the date on the Alaska Code Revision Commission. There was discussion.
- Number 180 Rep. Gardiner moved, page 1, line 29, to extend the Commission to 1986. Rep. Martin asked him to change the motion to extend the Commission to 1984. Rep. Gardiner changed his motion. There being no objection, the motion passed.
- Number 195 Rep. Rogers moved to incorporate the changes into a Labor & Commerce committee substitute. There being no objection, the motion passed.
- Number 198 Rep. Rogers moved to report the bill out of committee. There being no objection, the motion passed.
- Number 203 The committee had a general discussion concerning bills still in committee. No action was taken.
- Number 253 There being no further business to come before the committee, the meeting was adjourned at 1:22 p.m.

NOTE: Although several changes were made to this bill during this meeting of the House Labor & Commerce Committee, it was recommended by Legislative Affairs legal counsel that changes made to the sunset dates on the various boards and commissions be deleted from the committee substitute as they may not be legal. Therefore, the only

change reflected in the actual committee
substitute is the deletion of the underlined
language on page 2, lines 14-16.


Dear Mr. Speaker:

Section by Section Analysis

Section 1. This section adds an additional panel to the Alaska Workers' Compensation Board which may sit in any judicial district in the event regular panel members are unable to attend scheduled hearings. Members of the board, except the Chairman or his designees, are citizens appointed pursuant to AS 23.30.005 and at times have scheduling conflicts with their own occupational duties. The amendment will insure that disputed claims are heard expeditiously by a full board panel and will provide the resources to conduct additional board hearings when the workload requires.

Section 2. The repeal and reenactment of AS 23.30.040 is necessary if the second injury fund is to continue to meet its statutory obligations to rehabilitate the injured and disabled worker and to reimburse employers/carriers on subsequent injury claims.

This section expands the base for contributions to the second injury fund and incorporates a contribution schedule which will insure the solvency of the fund. It changes the base for payments to the fund from permanent partial disability to permanent total, permanent partial, temporary total and temporary partial disabilities. Under Section 7, an initial contribution rate of 6 percent is established, which will build reserves before a sliding rate scale takes effect in 1983. It also allows a more realistic maintenance allowance of \$200 a month and total maximum expenditures for retraining to \$10,000 in order to adequately cover the inflationary rise in expenses encountered for rehabilitation or retraining. The section also transfers the administrative expenses of the state from the resources of the second injury fund to the general fund.

Section 3. The amendments in AS 23.30.155 are administrative "housekeeping" changes to enable the Division and Board to streamline the prompt processing of claims and provide current and accurate claim status information and injury statistical data to the public and private sectors. This section 1) clarifies a controverted claim and the requirements under which a notice of controversion must be filed; 2) requires notice be filed with the board whenever payment of compensation has begun, terminated or changed and provides penalties for failure to file such notice; and 3) requires periodic reporting of all payments made on claims which will be used to provide the public and private sectors with current and accurate injury statistical data.

- Section 4. This section is amended to include a definition for the term "reserve rate" as used in Section 2.
- Section 5. This section repeals provision AS 23.30.155(g) due to proposed legislation.
- Section 6. This section clarifies that the amount of payment to the second injury fund and the conditions under which payment is required, is in accordance with the version of AS 23.30.040(b) that was in effect on the date of injury to the employee.
- Section 7. This section establishes an initial contribution rate of 6 percent beginning July 1, 1981 and ending December 31, 1982, which will build reserves before a sliding rate scale takes effect in 1983.
- Section 8. This section provides for an effective date for the bill of July 1, 1981.

Under the authority of art. III, sec. 18, of the Alaska Constitution, I am transmitting a bill on boiler and pressure vessel safety standards (AS 18.60). The bill would adapt the Alaska Statutes to the Boiler and Pressure Vessel Code of the American Society of Mechanical Engineers and make some alterations in the procedure of qualification for boiler and pressure vessel safety inspectors. A section-by-section description is attached for your convenience.

SECTION-BY-SECTION DESCRIPTION

Section 1 exempts from inspection requirements pressure vessels of five cubic feet or less in places of public assembly and those having an inside diameter of six inches or less. Unfired pressure vessels and hot water supply boilers or domestic water heaters will also be exempted from the inspection requirements where their BTU capacities and water temperature do not exceed the limits specified by the Boiler and Pressure Vessel Code.

Sections 2 and 3 require that both deputy inspectors, who are employed by the Department of Labor, and special inspectors, who are employed by owner-users or insurance companies and certified by the state, pass a national examination. The bill also specifies that companies authorized by the Department of Commerce and Economic Development to insure against certain types of losses may employ special inspectors.

Section 4 requires inspectors to use reporting forms adopted by the Department of Labor rather than by the American Society of Mechanical Engineers for certification inspection. It also specifies the kind of dangerous condition which a special inspector must report to the department.

Section 5 specifies that the examination for both special and deputy inspectors will be the standard National Board of Boiler and Pressure Vessels Inspectors examination.

Section 6 spells out grounds for revocation or suspension of a state commission for either a special or deputy inspector. "Untrustworthiness" is removed as a ground for suspension or revocation. "Incompetence" remains. Conviction of specified crimes -- bribery and perjury -- in connection with official duties is inserted as a ground for revocation or suspension, and falsification is expanded and clarified to permit the penalty only for intentional falsification of any material matter in connection with an inspection report or an administrative or judicial proceeding. Substituting "intentional" for "wilful" in AS 18.60.200(a)(3) is intended to conform this terminology to that in the new criminal code.

Section 7 specifies the types of internal and external examination required for specific types of boilers, depending upon construction. The period of time within which certificates of inspection are required is also clarified.

Section 8 requires that each inspection be made by a deputy or special inspector.

Section 9 changes the recipient of fees from the deputy inspector to the Department of Labor. The section also repeals time limits on the validity of the inspection certificates; those limits are unnecessary because of the amendments to AS 18.60.320.

Section 10 requires any company authorized by the Department of Commerce and Economic Development to insure boilers or unfired pressure vessels to notify the Department of Labor each time it discontinues the insurance for a boiler or pressure vessel in Alaska. Reinspection is then required only if the insurance was terminated because of a condition dangerous to life or property.

Section 11 requires the owner or user of the boiler or unfired pressure vessel inspected by a deputy inspector to pay the inspection fee to the department rather than to the deputy inspector.

Sections 12 and 13 change the definitions of boilers covered by second and third class boiler operators' licenses to clarify the maximum capacity for the steam boiler and the maximum heat output for the high temperature or high pressure water boiler.

We have reviewed the referenced version of House Bill 146(L&C) and believe that this proposed legislation is both unnecessary, as it applies to this Department, and not in the best interest of the State, in general. Should it be determined, however, that it should be pursued, the following comments and recommendations are hereby offered for your consideration.

It is recommended that subsection 36.90.001(a) be deleted. The payment, to the contractor, of 20% of the contract amount prior to beginning work is not only fiscally unsound but also would increase the risk of contractors not performing the work in a timely manner.

This Department already operates under policies which minimize the requirements of interim financing by Contractors without increasing the risk to the bondsmen or increasing the premium. In most contracts, a mobilization pay item allows the contractor to recover move-in and set-up costs very early in the job. Contractor payments are made monthly or semi-monthly at the Contractor's request. Retainage is held to a bare minimum on lump sum contracts and is not held at all on most highways, airports and harbors contracts. Provisions are made which pay for stockpiled materials on the job site prior to incorporation into the project and on buildings contracts bonding, insurance and bidding expenses are paid immediately after the notice to proceed is issued. These policies were developed through cooperative efforts with the contracting industry in an effort to minimize financial problems while still maintaining a competitive bidding atmosphere.

Regarding subsection (b), the language "Initiate Payment" is unclear. The initiation of the payment process may be interpreted to mean anything from the approval of a Contractors invoice or the signing of a monthly pay estimate to the actual mailing of the warrant to the Contractor, a process which could entail from three to ten days (or more), depending on the remoteness of the project site or its distance from the finance office.

It is suggested that the term "Intitate payment" be replaced with "Issue Payment", in which case the period of time allowed should be changed to 30 days in order to allow for the time necessary to transmit pay estimates or bills from a remote project site and to allow for the review and approval of complex pay estimates such as those involving multi-million dollar contracts with a multitude of pay items which must all be verified and approved prior to issuing a warrant.

It should also be pointed out that where subsection (b) uses the language "... the contractor submits... a bill for materials or services...", this terminology is not applicable to most all of the construction contracts administered by DOT/PF. Firstly, payment for public works contracts is not made directly for materials or services but for items of work for which unit prices are bid. Secondly, in most cases the contractor does not submit a bill. Instead, a pay estimate is prepared by the State and approved by the Contractor.

It is also unclear whether the Contractor under (b) would be paid on the regular basis as set up in the contract (monthly or semi-monthly), or whether he/she could submit weekly or even daily bills.

Subsection (b) is silent concerning the consequences of the Contractor's failure to submit the sworn statement regarding prevailing wages.

The following language is suggested for subsection (b) in order to clarify the above points:

- (b) The State shall issue payment to the Contractor, for the amount due under the public construction or public works contract, within 30 days following the end of the pay period for which payment is being made. The Contractor shall submit a sworn statement, to the State at the end of the pay period, certifying that all employees employed on the project during the pay period by the Contractor and all subcontractors have been paid not less than the established prevailing rate of pay as determined and published by the Department of Labor. Failure, by the Contractor, to submit the above sworn statement shall be cause for the State to delay payment, without interest or penalty, until such a sworn statement is submitted.

In reference to subsection (c), it must be stated that this Department strongly opposes the principle of a penalty, other than interest on late payments. This Department has, we believe, an excellent record for making timely payments to Contractors and it is not anticipated that such a penalty provision would ever

be used, were it inacted. Our general contract provisions, in every construction contract, contain an administrative claims clause which provides the vehicle to remedy inequities or disputes whenever they may occur. Such an avenue has always been available to our Contractors and is believed to be much more equitable than an automatic penalty for an event, regardless of its causation or circumstance.

It is recommended that the interest payment provision in (c) be retained, but that the 10 percent penalty provision be deleted.

Regarding subsection (d), interest on retainage, the following language is suggested for the second sentence in order to clarify the beginning of accrual of interest:


Interest on retainage accrues from the thirtieth day following the end of the pay period from which the retainage is withheld until the date of payment to the Contractor.

Under definitions, Section 36.95.010, the term Contractor must apply only to the prime Contractor as the contract is only between the prime Contractor and the State. The term "unskilled" in (2) should not be used to describe a mechanic or a surveyor but could apply to a laborer. In (3), "Public Construction" or "Public Works", the terms "onsite" and "real property" would not apply to State ferries constructed under contract with this Department. It is suggested that "on-site" be deleted and the term "real Property" be changed to "public Property". (Reference Blacks Law Dictionary for these terms.) The definition of "retainage", (6), would be improved by re-wording as follows:

(6) "Retainage" means money, or other contingency which the Contractor has earned as evidenced by approval of the applicable pay estimate, which is withheld from the Contractor until the completion of the contract.

The above comments are made in the interest of making the proposed legislation a more meaningful and concise document, as it would apply to the Department of Transportation and Public Facilities, which will hopefully accomplish its intended purpose without unduly increasing the cost or adversely affecting the quality of construction projects built with public funds.
