Date: May 5, 1982

I recently talked with your staff concerning our willingness to utilize any funding provided by the legislature for technical assistance to resolve problems with Haines area Native allotment applicants. Since that time, I have talked with Reed Stoops, Director of our Research and Development Division, which provides technical assistance throughout the state for that purpose. Mr. Stoops expressed a willingness to commit \$25,000 of the Department's existing FY 83 funding for Native allotments to those same Haines area applicants, if intent language to do this is placed in the FY 83 operating budget. This would obviate the need to allocate an additional \$25,000 in a fiscal note to SB 796.

Please contact either Reed Stoops or myself if you have any questions.

Bob Grogan of the Legislative Finance Division staff can provide information on where to locate this language in the budget.



SUBJ: HB 886, "An Act relating to financial statements
of corporations"

The phrase, "financial statements of the corporation," found in the Alaska State Business Corporation statutes (AS 10.05), needs to be defined to protect the directors, creditors, and shareholders of corporations from any liability associated with payment of excessive dividends. AS 10.05.219 (1) protects directors of Alaska business corporations from such liability, both jointly and severally, only if he relied in good faith on the financial statements of the corporation for his analysis in determining a legal dividend. Confusion exists in the present phrase "financial statement of the corporation," upon which the directors rely when determining dividend amounts. Under AS 10.15.216 (a), directors become liable to the corporation when excessive dividends are made

Therefore HB 886 amends and adds a new subsection to AS 10.15.825, defining the phrase "financial statements of the corporation." The clarification and legal definition of the phrase would not only protect the directors, creditors and shareholders, but would also alleviate common concerns and fears of possible liability if excessive dividends were disposed according to the directors determination.

This concept has also been incorporated by the Code Revision Commission, in its working draft of the corporation statutes. The American Institute of Certified Public Accountants, the SEC and the Code Revision Commission, all endorse this concept because they produce economically meaningful data. Also, it protects the shareholders and creditors from the manipulation of financial data.

I urge your support for HB 886. Thank you.

Mr. Chairman:

My name is Elizabeth Johnston, General Counsel for Bristol Bay Native Corporation. I am here to testify in support of Senate Bill 801.

Senate Bill 801 amends the profit corporation statutes to specifically define the phrase "financial statements of the corporation." Why is this definition needed?

"Financial statements of the corporation" is a key phrase in determining a director's defense against personal liability for dividend payments. AS 10.05.219(1). Yet the phrase is ambiguous. This ambiguity creates unnecessary risks for directors attempting to comply with statutory requirements. Clarity would serve to protect directors from ex post facto definitions and liability.

The definition of "financial statements of the corporation" in Senate Bill 801 contains two basic concepts. The first is that the financial statements will be prepared according to generally accepted accounting principles then applicable. The second is that the statements will be consolidated, where appropriate. Both of these concepts are

basic to the published financial statements required by the Securities Exchange Commission to be sent to all shareholders. Both concepts have also been incorporated by the Code Revision Commission, in its working draft of the corporation statutes. The American Institute of Certified Public Accountants, the SEC and the Code Revision Commission, all endorse these concepts because they produce economically meaningful data and because they protect shareholders and creditors from the manipulation of financial data.

In short, I support the definition because it will protect directors and it will protect creditors and shareholders as well..

SENATE BILL 801

Alaska corporate law makes directors of a profit corporation jointly and severally liable for excessive dividend payments. AS 10.05.216(a). However, this same law also provides a defense or a safe harbor. A director is not liable for excessive dividends if he in good faith relied on the financial statements of the corporation for his analysis of a legal dividend source. AS 10.05.219(1).

The problem is that the scope of this defense is ambiguous. The meaning of "financial statements" is unclear and therefore, creates unnecessary risks for directors as they try to comply with dividend requirements.

The solution is to define the "financial statements of the corporation." The definition proposed in Senate Bill 801 includes, where appropriate, consolidated balance sheets and income statements prepared according to generally accepted accounting principles. While other financial documents are useful for other corporate purposes, only the preceding are useful for an analysis of a legal source for dividends under AS 10.05.219(1).

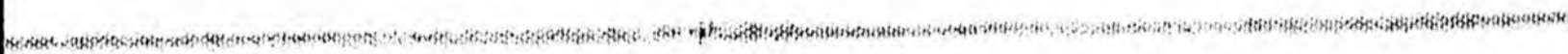

Re: SB 817

Because of the current underfunding of the General Relief Medical Program, SB 817 becomes crucial to the Department of Health and Social Services to protect those people most at risk against the use of GRM for Emergency Only Regulations currently planned.

SB 817 adds two new groups to the list of Medicaid eligibles:

Low income children - those who do not qualify for the Medicaid AFDC category primarily because they are in two parent families. The Department predicts the addition of 4,000 children, about 3,300 of whom are native and would receive 100% Federal funding in IHS facilities.

Low income pregnant women - It is especially important to provide quality prenatal care in Alaska considering the high incidence of congenital abnormalities and Fetal Alcohol Syndrome.

SB 817 also changes eligible services to Medicaid from GRM to maximize the use of Federal dollars rather than spending 100% state funds for these services as in the past.

SB 817 changes the definition of "clinic services" to allow inclusion of the three IHS clinics in Juneau, Ketchikan and Fairbanks in the Medicaid program. These three clinics will be able to collect about \$1.5 million a year of totally federal dollars.

SB 817 gives a priority list for funding optional services and categories if funding should be insufficient to meet all costs. This list was worked out cooperatively with the Department and the Senate HESS Committee.

SB 817 has no fiscal impact since the plan is to use available GRM funds to pay for inclusion of the two new eligible groups, to buy Medicare Part B for low income elderly, pick up transportation funding dropped by the IHS, and make up the 2% difference in federal match. Although there are no additional General Funds requested, the state will pick up over \$9 million federal dollars and thus maximize the Medicaid program.

1. BACKGROUND

The Alaska Medicaid program was created by the Legislature in 1972 and sections in the statutes were created to list all categories of service and groups of eligibles. The original legislation created a program providing basic medical coverage for individuals eligible for cash payments under the Aid to Families with Dependent Children (AFDC) and the Adult Public Assistance (APA) programs, individuals in long term care facilities, and children under supervision of the Department in foster homes and private child-caring facilities. Since 1972, the Legislature has amend the statutes several times to add new groups of eligibles or categories of service.

The new groups of eligibles added to AS 47.07.020 since 1972 have been institutionalized individuals for whom the state had previously paid all of their cost of care. By adding them to the Medicaid program, the state was able to receive federal funds to partially offset state funds.

The new categories of service added to AS 47.07.030 since 1972 have been fairly low cost services when compared to the total Medicaid program. Several of the new categories of service had the effect of permitting the state to receive federal funds to partially offset state funds being used to provide services.

II. NEED FOR CHANGES IN MEDICAID AND GRM

At this time the Department is anticipating having to make reductions in the Medicaid and General Relief Medical (GRM) programs during FY 83 as the funds requested will not cover expenditures based on historical usage. Since the Medicaid categories of service and groups of eligible are set out in statute, the only flexibility available to the Department is to limit access to services or reduce payment to providers. Since GRM categories of service and eligibility requirements are not in statute, the Department has more flexibility to make program changes. Attachment C breaks down the Medicaid and GRM programs to allow identification of the areas in each program where the Department can make changes to remain within expected FY 83 program budgets without passage of SB 817.

For Medicaid, the Department has proposed: (1) limiting access to providers in an attempt to reduce the amount of services individuals receive; and (2) reducing the rates of payment to hospitals and long term care facilities so that in many cases, payment will be below the amount that would be paid if the Department was paying for the full cost of providing care to Medicaid eligibles.

For GRM, the Department has proposed: (1) limiting GRM eligibility to one two-month period of coverage during any 12 months except for

emergency medical needs; and (2) reducing the rates of payment to hospitals and long term care facilities as proposed under Medicaid. It should also be added that the income and resource limits under the GRM program have not been increased since 1977 and are far below the limits for Medicaid.

SB 817 could be used to permit the Department to make adjustments in the Medicaid and GRM programs if the changes discussed below are made in the bill and in the FY 83 appropriation for the Medicaid and GRM programs. These proposed changes are based on the assumption that one primary goal of the Medicaid and GRM programs should be to provide financial assistance to those persons least able to provide for their own needs.

The present Medicaid program provides coverage for financially needy aged, blind, and disabled individuals through their eligibility for APA. Coverage is also available for financially needy children in AFDC households where there is only one parent. However, because the Alaska AFDC program does not provide financial assistance to families with two employable adults regardless of their financial need, many needy children are not receiving the full range of health care services available under Medicaid. While a limited range of health care services are available under GRM to children in families without other medical resources, few truly needy children are covered by GRM because income and resource standards under GRM are considerably lower than they are for Medicaid.

By passage of SB 817, Medicaid coverage for needy children not in AFDC households would be established. This new Medicaid coverage could be provided without new funds if changes are made in the FY 83 appropriation. The GRM budget request unit should be incorporated in the Medicaid budget request unit and specific intent included giving the Department authority to move funds between components in order to comply with the changes made in the Medicaid program as a result of changes made by SB 817. This change in budgeting would permit the Department to use GRM as the state matching funds needed to earn federal Medicaid funds. Attachment A contains a draft summary sheet for a Medical Assistance BRU to replace the Medicaid and GRM BRUs, with proposed intent language to accomplish this change.

The remaining GRM funds would be used for three things: (1) to eliminate the Medicaid penalty in the FY 83 budget and continue providing Medicaid services at present levels without limiting access to health care services and without reducing the rates of payment to hospitals and long term care facilities; and (2) to absorb Medicaid transportation costs associated with reduction in IHS funding; and (3) to continue the GRM program as an emergency medical assistance program for single employable individuals and employable couples with or without children, to the extent permitted by available funding.

The theory behind the second proposal is based on the Department's experience administering the Catastrophic Illness program. Except in cases of extremely costly medical care, individuals usually have the ability to work out some type of payment agreement with health care providers, often over an extended period of time if there is some reasonable expectation of payment. While it may be desirable for the state to provide that payment on behalf of needy employable individuals, funding limitations often force priorities to be assigned. In the case of state funding for health care services, individuals least able to

provide for themselves should receive a higher priority rating than employable individuals.

III. PROPOSED AMENDMENTS TO SB 817

Section 1 should be amended to eliminate proposed subsection (9). Subsection (9) would add employable adults and, given the present state funding limitations, it would be a better use of scarce resources to provide a full range of health care services, including preventive screening services and dental care, to a maximum number of needy children.

Section 2 would create a Medicaid medically needy program. While this would provide some financial assistance for individuals with income above the level presently covered by Medicaid, it should not be included in SB 817 because it represents new costs. Instead, Section 2 should be limited to adding pregnant women under Medicaid, coverage which is presently provided under GRM for a limited number of individuals could be expanded with funds from the GRM program.

Sections 4 and 5 contain a drafting error which causes the definition of clinic services to be moved from AS 47.07.080, the definitions section, to AS 47.07.030, the section listing services covered under Medicaid. The amended definition of clinic services should remain in the definitions section.

IV. EFFECT OF SENATE BILL NO. 817

Section 1 of the bill amends AS 47.07.020 by adding all children with income below the need standards for payment under the AFDC program, but who are not eligible because they do not meet the definition of dependent children under the AFDC program as discussed above

Section 3 would transfer from GRM to Medicaid the cost of providing the following categories of service to Medicaid eligible individuals: physical and occupational therapy, prescribed drugs, and prosthetic devices and medical supplies. In addition, SB 817 would give the Department increased flexibility in the area of long term care services.

The Department has projected some cost savings resulting from this amendment. Since the Medicaid program permits eligible individuals free choice of medical providers, individuals eligible for Medicaid and the Indian Health Service can choose between private providers and IHS facilities when they seek medical treatment. While experience has shown that the "crossover" to private health care providers under Medicaid is a small percentage of total Medicaid-IHS dual eligibles, changes in IHS funding or policies could result in increased crossover.

With the passage of the Omnibus Reconciliation Act of 1981, Congress provided increased flexibility to states in the management of the Medicaid program. States may now receive federal funds for certain noninstitutional services when these services are provided to keep an individual out of a long term care facility. The following home and community-based services (other than room and board) may be covered

under the long-term care noninstitutional category of service: case management, homemaker and home health aide, personal care, adult day health, habilitation, respite care, and minor physical adaptation to an individual's home.

While there will probably be no cost savings initially by the addition of this new category of services, over the next several years the rate of growth of long term care institutional services should decrease as individuals receive services at home, in residential care facilities, and other less costly living situations rather than in institutions. While the fiscal note does not reflect any increase in cost to implement this provision, it should be clearly stated that the Department be permitted the flexibility to transfer funds between BRUs and to use Medicaid program funds to provide the case management services necessary to make the program work. The Medicaid nursing home budget request for FY 83 is \$21,831,300 so even the deferral of as little as 5 percent of that total could provide over \$1 million for noninstitutional services.

Sections 4 would revise the definition of clinic services to add physician clinics. While this will not add any new private providers to the Medicaid program, it will permit clinics owned by the Indian Health Service to receive 100 percent federally-funded reimbursement under Medicaid. Without a change in statute, these clinic will continue to be barred from collecting approximately \$1,500,000 in federal Medicaid funds. Since IHS in Alaska is experiencing funding problems, these new federal Medicaid funds should permit clinics to continue operating at their historical service levels and help avoid increasing demand for services from private providers which would be covered under Medicaid using state and federal funds rather than federal funds only.

V. DEPARTMENTAL POSITION

The Department supports SB 817 with the amendments to the bill and the Medicaid and GRM FY 83 appropriations proposed by this position paper.

COMMITTEE REPORT - CS SB 824

The Transportation Committee has considered CS SB 824, relating to the establishment and operation of in bond merchandise businesses at state owned and operated international airports. The purpose of this report is to express the Committee's understanding of the purposes of the bill and to make clear the Committee's intent with regard to certain aspects of the bill.

In bond merchandise, which includes merchandise of foreign origin (not manufactured in the United States) and United States alcoholic beverages and tobacco products handled in bond, is sold to foreign-bound passengers. For a number of years, the state has entered into exclusive contracts authorizing the establishment and operation of an in bond merchandise business at each of the state's international airports. These exclusive contracts have been extremely beneficial to the state by providing substantial revenue to the state, increasing employment in the state, and aiding the tourism industry, while at the same time facilitating the orderly administration of the state's international airports. For the reasons stated in Section 1 of the bill and elaborated upon by the official of the Department of Transportation and Public Facilities who testified before the Committee in support of the bill, the Committee believes that conferring exclusive rights for the establishment and

operation of an in bond merchandise business at each international airport is good state policy.

Recently, legal questions have been raised concerning the granting of exclusive in bond contracts. This bill is designed to resolve all legal questions once and for all with regard to all existing and future exclusive in bond contracts. In particular, CS SB 824 is designed to ensure that "state action" immunity from the operation of the federal antitrust laws [see, California Retail Liquor Dealers Assn. v. Midcal Aluminum, Inc., 445 U.S. 97 (1980)] exists with regard to the establishment and operation of in bond merchandise businesses at international airports in the State of Alaska, including the conferral of exclusive rights in this field. Thus, the bill clearly and affirmatively states that it is the policy of the State of Alaska that only an exclusive contractor be allowed to offer to sell, sell and deliver in bond merchandise at each international airport, and that the Department of Transportation and Public Facilities may not permit, nor confer any right upon, any person other than the exclusive contractor to offer to sell, sell or deliver in bond merchandise at an international airport. In addition, the bill requires the issuance of exclusive in bond contractors in the future, and requires that the Department actively supervise the operations under each exclusive in bond contract. CS SB 824 is also specifically intended to, and does, provide an express immunity and exemption for the activities required under this bill from the operation of Alaska's antitrust laws,

AS 45.50.562 et. seq., and any other applicable state laws that would otherwise affect the validity of those activities. See e.g., Section 1(e) of the bill. By providing these immunities, CS SB 824 will enable in bond merchandise sales in Alaska to continue to be maximized, thereby maximizing the state's revenue from this source and providing the other substantial benefits described above.

The Committee also intends that the exclusivity mandated under Section 2 of this bill encompasses, with one limited exception, every aspect of the establishment and operation of an in bond merchandise business at an international airport. That limited exception is for the delivery of in bond merchandise as cargo to airlines. For purposes of this bill, cargo has been specifically defined. As defined in Section 4 of the bill, cargo is intended to have four characteristics. First, cargo is carried by an airline in return for payments made by the shipper to the airline, which payments are computed by reference to a specific cargo tariff; in contrast, the carriage of baggage is included in the price of a passenger ticket (with any additional charges computed on the basis of the excess number of pieces of baggage, or the excess weight of baggage, to be carried, according to an excess baggage schedule). Second, cargo is carried under an airway bill, rather than under a passenger ticket. The portion of the definition of cargo that refers to goods carried "under an agreement between the shipper and the airline other than a passenger ticket" is intended to require both of these

characteristics. Third, cargo is accepted, carried and handled at facilities, and under procedures, different from those used for baggage. Finally, cargo is delivered by the airline at the destination airport to a facility (e.g., an air cargo terminal) separate from that which receives baggage to be delivered to deplaning passengers, and is not brought to a baggage claim area, but must be picked up by the consignee at the facility described above. For a delivery to qualify as cargo, it must satisfy all of these criteria.

Under the authority of art. III, sec. 18, of the Alaska Constitution, I am transmitting a bill relating to the sale and delivery of in-bond or duty-free merchandise at state international airports.


As you may know, for years the state has entered into exclusive contracts which grant the privilege of using commercial space at state-owned and -operated international airports for the sale and delivery of duty-free merchandise to foreign-bound passengers. Under these contracts, the state receives substantial revenues for the International Airport Revenue Fund. Last year, for example, the fund received approximately \$5,300,000 from these contract payments. If this source of revenue is diminished, the lost revenues will have to be made up from other sources, such as increased landing fees and fuel flowage fees which would be passed on by the airlines to passengers in the form of higher fares. The obvious detrimental effects of these increases on Alaska's tourism industry could be serious.

Recently, legal questions have been raised concerning the granting of these exclusive contracts. Decisions from the United States Supreme Court and from other courts indicate that these legal questions can be resolved through state legislation that (1) makes it clear that the granting of exclusive contracts furthers an important state policy, and (2) provides a level of oversight by the state on the activity performed under the exclusive contracts.

This bill includes legislative findings that clearly express the important state benefits that are fostered through exclusive contracts for the sale and delivery of duty-free merchandise. Additionally, the bill directs that the Department of Transportation and Public Facilities shall grant exclusive contracts for the sale and delivery of duty-free merchandise at state international airports. The bill also provides guidelines for the department's oversight of the contractors' activities.

Since I am in favor of fostering competition, in this particular instance I am convinced that exclusive contracting is clearly in the best interests of the state only after competitive bidding. This bill will resolve once and for all any legal questions surrounding the state's granting of exclusive contracts for in-bond merchandise at airports.

Justification

The addition of the Municipal Assistance program will create additional work for the staff assigned to administer the State Revenue Sharing Program. The administrative capabilities of present State Revenue Sharing staff in the Division of Local Government Assistance are already spread thin to properly implement what has become an increasingly complex and comprehensive program. It could be argued that the Department of Revenue, whose responsibilities will be reduced as a result of transferring the Municipal Assistance Program out of their agency, could look at a staff reduction or simply the transfer of Municipal Assistance staff to the Department of Community and Regional Affairs. This Department, however, has been advised by the Department of Revenue that this transfer is not possible due to the other related duties performed by Municipal Assistance staff. Therefore, one additional staff person is requested to assist in the administration of a jointly administered State Revenue Sharing/Municipal Assistance Program.





DEPARTMENT OF COMMUNITY AND REGIONAL AFFAIRS
Position Paper On S.B.830 and S.B.836

S.B. 830 and S.B. 836 would extend the time during which the Departments of Administration and Community and Regional Affairs make payments to municipalities and unincorporated communities under Chapter 60, SLA 1981 and would extend the lapse date on related appropriations.

The Department strongly supports this legislation. To date the Department has received applications from 22 of the 94 unincorporated communities eligible for funding and disbursed or committed \$3,541,000 of a total appropriation of \$19,377,800 for unincorporated communities.

There are some significant reasons why many unincorporated communities have not applied for this funding. A major one is fear of government. Many residents moved to these rural communities to get away from governmental or organizational restrictions. As a result, many of the communities of 25 people or more that are eligible for the program have not, as yet, formed any type of non-profit community organization that can receive and expend State funds.

Another more prevalent problem relates to organization that may already exist in many communities. Chapter 60 currently requires that the Department deal with a legally constituted organization that does not possess sovereign immunity. Many unincorporated communities have IRA or traditional councils that may be capable of receiving and expending State funds, but because they possess sovereign immunity are legally barred from doing so. Eligibility for funding in those instances would require additional action by the existing councils to incorporate as non-profit corporations under State law. Although this incorporation is a fairly simple process, it is foreign to most rural communities.

These problems along with lack of expertise and experience in dealing with State Government are the biggest roadblocks to successful implementation of the program.

The Department strongly supports enactment of these bills and the addition of language to allow the award of grant funds to IRA or traditional councils that waive sovereign immunity for the purpose of receiving the grant. The Department feels that these steps, combined with an expanded outreach and technical assistance program planned for this spring, will increase the number of successful applicants and assure appropriate expenditure of State funds.

SUBJECT: SB 830, SB 836

Ch. 60, SLA 81 (SB 168) authorizes a one time payment to incorporated and unincorporated communities in the amount of \$1000 per person to be paid during the fiscal year ending June 30, 1982. Ch. 61, SLA 81 (HB 1) appropriated \$380,000,000 GF to the Department of Administration and \$24,987,000 GF to the Department of Community and Regional Affairs for payment of the entitlements authorized in SB 168. These appropriations carried a lapse date of June 30, 1982.

Subsequent to the passage of SB 168 and HB 1 it became necessary due to budgetary constraints to split the payment of the \$1000 per person entitlement into two year appropriations, i.e., a portion of the funds were made available for expenditure during FY 82 with the balance available during FY 83. This was accomplished in Sections 63-64, Ch. 92, SLA 81 (HB 297).

The purpose of SB 830 is to amend Ch. 60, SLA 81 (SB 168) to allow for payment of the \$1000 per person entitlement over a two year period rather than one year as originally envisioned. This was clearly the intent of the legislature when they split the entitlement into two year appropriations in HB 297. Similarly the purpose of SE 836 is to amend the appropriations made in H3 297 to allow those appropriations available for expenditure during FY 82 to be carried forward into FY 83. All unexpended and unobligated funds will lapse into the General Fund on June 30, 1983.
