

I would appreciate your concurrence, when polled, in the following two contracts with the Institute of Social and Economic Research.

The first is \$15,000 for publication of the Citizen's Guide to Alaska's Constitution. The Guide has already been written under a previous contract funded by the Legislative Joint Committee on the Constitutional Convention. Since the joint committee was not extended, no funds were allocated to publish and distribute the Guide.

In 1982, Alaska voters will be faced with the critical question of whether or not to hold another constitutional convention. Several other states have found that public understanding of the constitution is a basic element of their action on revising the document. That is why the joint committee commissioned preparation of the Citizen's Guide. Since nothing else is being done to prepare for the 1982 referendum, I believe it critical to get out the Citizen's Guide to Alaska's Constitution, and suggest that \$15,000 be allocated through the State Affairs Committee. Publication would be through the Institute of Social and Economic Research which can readily integrate this into other projects and publications they manage. The \$15,000 amount would include editing, graphics, and publication and distribution of 5,000 copies.

REQUEST FOR PROPOSAL

The State of Alaska, Office of the Governor, is seeking a qualified training contractor to assist top management of State Government in developing and implementing a results-oriented planning, budgeting and program performance evaluation process within the Executive Branch of State Government. The contractor will conduct a brief refresher training course in management for results/management by objectives (MFR/MBO) for approximately 60 top Cabinet officials and their deputies. Additionally, the contractor will conduct an intensive training course at not less than three or more than six geographic locations for approximately 650 state directors, managers and analysts in management for results/management by objectives. At the conclusion of this training effort, the State will have a cadre of top- and middle-level managers who can manage effectively using management for results/management by objectives processes.

It is expected that the training will emphasize:

The nature of management and that MFR/MBO is a process to manage and not merely a technique to establish goals and objectives or conduct performance appraisal;

The difference between the accomplishment of results and the performance of a selected activity;

The setting of realistic and meaningful performance measures;

Demonstrate that the quality of results achieved can be planned and attained, as well as the quantity of results;

Management accountability for results can be achieved;

To the extent possible, public sector and actual agency missions, goals, objectives, policies and activities will be utilized as examples and in training materials;

#### Scope

Task 1 - Provide refresher training in MFR/MBO for Cabinet officials and their deputies;

Task 2 - Conduct MFR/MBO training for approximately 40 budget, planning personnel and management analysts at Juneau;

Task 3 - Conduct MFR/MBO training for approximately 550 division directors, deputy directors, section chiefs, and regional supervisors at not less than three nor more than

six geographic locations which will include as a minimum Fairbanks, Anchorage and Juneau;

Task 4 - Assess the effectiveness of training conducted and provide retraining as necessary to meet the stated expectations of this proposal.

Training will commence in November 1980 with an analysis of current conditions or customizing of materials to be completed prior to commencement. Training will be completed at the vendor's discretion but prior to March 1981. The vendor should take into account the impact of holidays, legislative session and budget cycles on staff availability.

#### Proposal Requirements

Proposals submitted in response to this RFP should include an overview of the contractor's approach for this effort, schedules and costs for task completion by task, personnel to be utilized including project manager(s), qualifications and experience of the firm(s) and their staff in performing similar work, basis of cost computation and schedules, and demonstrate the financial capability of completing the project.

CONTRACT BETWEEN  
STATE OF ALASKA  
LEGISLATIVE AFFAIRS AGENCY

AND

THE INSTITUTE OF SOCIAL AND ECONOMIC RESEARCH

The parties to this agreement are the LEGISLATIVE AFFAIRS AGENCY, on behalf of the Legislative Council's Senate State Affairs Committee, hereinafter referred to as the "AGENCY," and the Institute of Social and Economic Research, hereinafter referred to as the Institute.

THE PURPOSE OF THIS AGREEMENT is to provide publication and distribution of "A Citizen's Guide to Alaska's Constitution."

IT IS THEREFORE MUTUALLY AGREED THAT:

CLAUSE I. - STATEMENT OF WORK

- (A) The Institute shall provide publication and distribution of approximately 5,000 copies of the manuscript titled "A Citizen's Guide to Alaska's Constitution"; including final manuscript preparation, graphics, illustrations and cover design; specification of typeface, layout and paper quality; and other prepublication details.

CLAUSE II. - PERIOD AND DATES OF PERFORMANCE

- (A) The work under this contract shall be performed between December 1, 1981, and May 30, 1982.
- (B) This contract may be terminated by either party upon written notice to the other.

- (C) Unless extended by written agreement, this contract expires on May 30, 1982.

CLAUSE III. - PROJECT DIRECTOR

The Project Director shall be Senator Victor Fischer, acting on behalf of Senate State Affairs Committee.

CLAUSE IV. - COMPENSATION AND METHOD OF PAYMENT

- (A) For the work specified in this contract, the Consultant shall be compensated at the fixed price amount of \$15,000.
- (B) The Consultant shall be reimbursed for travel and other expenses authorized in advance by the Project Director, except that per diem shall be paid at prevailing State rates, and all air travel shall be reimbursed on the basis of coach class fares.
- (C) Billings may be submitted by the Contractor monthly, and should note thereon progress made to date.
- (D) Total payments under this contract, including expenses, shall not exceed \$15,000.

CLAUSE V. - OFFICE SPACE, EQUIPMENT, CLERICAL SUPPORT, TRAVEL

Office space, equipment and clerical support, and the expenses of authorized travel of the Consultant that will be necessary to carry out his obligations under this contract shall be supplied by the Institute at no cost to the Agency.

CLAUSE VI. - RECORDS, DOCUMENTS, AUDIT

The Institute shall maintain accurate records, including detailed time records, as may be required by the Project Director. The records are subject to inspection by the Agency or the Project Director at all reasonable times. All documents, reports and writings generated as a consequence of work done under this contract shall become the property of the State of Alaska and, on completion of the work or at the termination of this contract, shall be delivered to the Project Director.

CLAUSE VII. - REPORTS

The Institute shall keep the Project Director informed as to the progress of the work performed under this agreement and shall provide progress reports as specified by the Project Director.

CLAUSE VIII. - ALL WRITINGS CONTAINED HEREIN

This agreement contains all the terms and conditions agreed upon by the parties. No other understandings, oral or otherwise, regarding the subject matter of this agreement shall be deemed to exist or to bind either of the parties of this agreement.

RE: Update on status of contracts and staff

Upon your departure for Minnesota, it seemed likely that our troubles in obtaining approval for contracts was at an end. As it turned out, we were jacked around at every conceivable phase of the game. As of this morning, it seems that contracts for Jamie and Bill are prepared for signature, and I have left word with Greg Erickson in Juneau for Jamie to stop by and pick them up. (Jamie's message phones: 586-3118, 586-9782) (Genelle just called, met Jamie on the street. His is signed and will be "pouched" up.)

With regard to Ginger and Nan, the prospect is sunny but we have still met with delays and delays and more delays. On Monday following your return from Prince William Sound area I telexed a copy of the budget, as revised, down to Juneau for Pam Calhoon, and sent the original, signed copy to Senator Kerttula's office in Juneau to Autumn's attention (that letter was mailed Tuesday from Anchorage). According to Autumn, with whom I have been in perpetual contact, the [redacted] has not yet reached her hands. She stated that Jay has been having real trouble with his mail at every point. She has been waiting for Jalmar to call so she can go over things with him (she apparently needs his vocal approval before she can move things along) and she has obtained copies of the budget and personnel memos from Pam Calhoon, in preparation for his phone call. RE: Interim Work Program

Attached is the proposed State Affairs Committee program for work during the interim prior to the 1982 session. The program covers legislation currently pending in the committee as well as areas of investigation that should eventually lead to legislation and legislative policy.

Legislative oversight of public assistance programs in the Department of Health and Social Services will be carried out under aegis of the State Affairs Committee with concurrence by Senators Parr and Sturgulewski. Senator Parr suggested that rather than doing the work through the HESS committee, we should do it through State Affairs, since the latter has broad oversight jurisdiction anyway. Our work, which will concentrate on policy and management issues, will be coordinated with the Legislative Budget and Audit Committee.

A rough, tentative budget is also attached for your review. I'd like to discuss it with you.

Your support and endorsement of the proposed interim work program will be greatly appreciated.

PROPOSED 1981 INTERIM WORK PROGRAM - June 5, 1981

ETHICS CODE, FINANCIAL DISCLOSURE, LEGISLATIVE REFORM, ETC.

Measures pending before State Affairs cover a proposed ethics code (SB 175, 330), revision of APOC regulations on financial disclosure (HB 154, SB 183), changes in legislative procedures (HB 155, SB 333), and proposed constitutional amendments dealing with session length and legislative terms (SJR 6, 9 and 24).

Proposed repeal of the political campaign contribution tax credit (SB 82) was also subject to several public hearings, and the committee agreed to examine alternative schemes for public financing of campaigns.

RETIREMENT

Sixteen bills dealing with PERS and TRS retirement are in committee, and more may reach us before adjournment. These range from a measure that might affect only one individual to a comprehensive housekeeping bill for both state retirement programs.

Proposals will be screened for inclusion in one or several comprehensive retirement bills. The Department of Administration, APEA, and NEA-Alaska have agreed to cooperate in this committee effort.

Bills pending before the committee are SB 121, 143, 195, 196, 197, 262, 356, 360, 361, 394, 400, 402, 471, 472, 557 and 568. There are additional miscellaneous requests for service credit and membership in PERS and TRS.

STATE CONTRACTING, BONDING, BIDDERS PREFERENCE, ETC.

Principal emphasis lies in adjusting state law so as to enhance opportunity for Alaska firms, individuals, and small and minority businesses in bidding on state contracts, construction, and employment. Bills currently before the committee are SB 45, 414, and 415; additional legislation may be considered.

ECONOMIC POLICY, LONG RANGE POLICY PLANNING, ALASKA'S FUTURE

Wealth Sharing

A variety of concepts have been enacted, are pending, and are being talked about for providing means for state sharing of oil wealth with Alaskans. Specifically in State Affairs are SB 66 and 67, which provide for royalty oil premium payments to all individuals. Also before the legislature are proposals for PACE and a royalty oil trust.

We intend to review these and other proposals for state oil revenue distribution, examine alternative means of equitably sharing oil wealth with all Alaskans, and suggest criteria for accomplishing this most effectively.

#### State Bond Defeasance

Administration policy on retirement of outstanding state general obligation bonds has not yet been set. Committee hearings on SB 13, 296, and 297 begot general support for the concept, but we decided to pursue the issue further during the interim and prepare recommendations in the context of broader economic and expenditure policy. The work will be pursued in cooperation with the Department of Revenue and Governor's Office.

#### Permanent Fund

Work on the Permanent Fund will deal primarily with broad policy and long term economic aspects. Topics to be considered include long range (15-20-30 years) permanent fund goals, share of state revenues that should be included in the Fund to achieve long term targets, possible establishment of special endowments separate from the Permanent Fund, and the like. Work will be carried out in cooperation with the Budget and Audit subcommittee on the Permanent Fund, the Permanent Fund Board of Trustees, Department of Revenue, and others.

#### Comprehensive Approach to Alaska's Future

(Senator Terry Stimson, Subcommittee Chairman)

A series of future-oriented seminars will examine how Alaska relates to the nation and the world. Orientation will be on integrating Alaska into the national and international economic and political systems. Seminars will bring together key legislators, selected Alaskans, and nationally recognized futurists to discuss how Alaska can appropriately relate to its own future and to the national and international context in which it functions.

#### Alaska's Fiscal Future

This work component, to be carried out under contract, will include: (1) a detailed calculation of the asset value to the state of Prudhoe Bay revenues; (2) an analysis of potential revenues from other natural resources, including other petroleum revenues that may be available when Prudhoe Bay income is reduced; (3) calculation of how much can be spent out of assets each year to maintain certain assets level; and (4) analysis of likely timing and impacts on private and public sectors of forced reductions of expenditures and/or increases in taxes to compensate for reductions in future revenues.

Planning and Institutions

We will continue to examine alternatives for long range economic and policy planning dealing with the use of Alaska's wealth, economic development, human resources, and the like. The experience of other states will be examined in terms of applicability to Alaska. Review of ongoing planning activities of state agencies will be continued.

A major objective of this work component is to evolve a process and structure suited to Alaska's needs. Specific attention will be given to institutionalizing long range economic, resources, and development planning within the executive branch, and exploring the most appropriate manner in which the legislature could deal with broad economic policy issues on a continuing basis.

ANCHORAGE STATE OFFICE COMPLEX OVERSIGHT

Continuing oversight will be provided for activities of the Department of Administration and their consultants in planning, design, and other actions leading to site acquisition and construction of the Anchorage state office complex.

PUBLIC ASSISTANCE OVERSIGHT

A general oversight review of public assistance programs of the Department of Health and Social Services will be carried out in coordination with the Legislative Budget and Audit Committee. Oversight will cover effectiveness of the Division of Public Assistance in implementing programs and carrying out legislative intent, identification of program management problems and needs, determination of unmet needs in the area of social services, and other topics that may assist in judging compliance with law and need for additional legislation.

DECENTRALIZATION OF STATE GOVERNMENT

In pursuit of SB 93, a general review will be made of alternative approaches to decentralization of state decision making to regional, district, and local offices, and to limitation of the number of state employees in headquarters offices in the state capital, wherever it may be located. The work will result in proposals for followup through legislation, administrative action, or further, more detailed, analysis.

The parties to this agreement are the LEGISLATIVE AFFAIRS AGENCY, on behalf of the Legislative Council's Senate State Affairs Committee, hereinafter referred to as the "AGENCY," and the Institute of Social and Economic Research, hereinafter referred to as the Institute.

THE PURPOSE OF THIS AGREEMENT is to provide publication and distribution of "A Citizen's Guide to Alaska's Constitution."

IT IS THEREFORE MUTUALLY AGREED THAT:

CLAUSE I. - STATEMENT OF WORK

- (A) The Institute shall provide publication and distribution of approximately 5,000 copies of the manuscript titled "A Citizen's Guide to Alaska's Constitution"; including final manuscript preparation, graphics, illustrations and cover design; specification of typeface, layout and paper quality; and other , republication details.

CLAUSE II. - PERIOD AND DATES OF PERFORMANCE

- (A) The work under this contract shall be performed between December 1, 1981, and May 30, 1982.
- (B) This contract may be terminated by either party upon written notice to the other.

- (C) Unless extended by written agreement, this contract expires on May 30, 1982.

CLAUSE III. - PROJECT DIRECTOR

The Project Director shall be Senator Victor Fischer, acting on behalf of Senate State Affairs Committee.

CLAUSE IV. - COMPENSATION AND METHOD OF PAYMENT

- (A) For the work specified in this contract, the Consultant shall be compensated at the fixed price amount of \$15,000.
- (B) The Consultant shall be reimbursed for travel and other expenses authorized in advance by the Project Director, except that per diem shall be paid at prevailing State rates, and all air travel shall be reimbursed on the basis of coach class fares.
- (C) Billings may be submitted by the Contractor monthly, and should note thereon progress made to date.
- (D) Total payments under this contract, including expenses, shall not exceed \$15,000.

CLAUSE V. - OFFICE SPACE, EQUIPMENT, CLERICAL SUPPORT, TRAVEL

Office space, equipment and clerical support, and the expenses of authorized travel of the Consultant that will be necessary to carry out his obligations under this contract shall be supplied by the Institute at no cost to the Agency.

CLAUSE VI. - RECORDS, DOCUMENTS, AUDIT

The Institute shall maintain accurate records, including detailed time records, as may be required by the Project Director. The records are subject to inspection by the Agency or the Project Director at all reasonable times. All documents, reports and writings generated as a consequence of work done under this contract shall become the property of the State of Alaska and, on completion of the work or at the termination of this contract, shall be delivered to the Project Director.

CLAUSE VII. - REPORTS

The Institute shall keep the Project Director informed as to the progress of the work performed under this agreement and shall provide progress reports as specified by the Project Director.

CLAUSE VIII. - ALL WRITINGS CONTAINED HEREIN

This agreement contains all the terms and conditions agreed upon by the parties. No other understandings, oral or otherwise, regarding the subject matter of this agreement shall be deemed to exist or to bind either of the parties of this agreement.

Phil Holdsworth, Alaska Miners Association, stated that the Board of Directors supported the bill. He also stated that SB 666 will make the mining loan program more self supporting as it will not rely entirely on an annual appropriation from the legislature.

Senator Sturgulewski expressed concern about amount of money the legislature is putting into revolving funds, as the legislature loses its power to annually appropriate.

Phil Holdsworth suggested that the principal return to the mining fund and the interest go into the general fund.

Dave Massey, Deputy Director, Division of Business Loans and Veterans Affairs, Department of Commerce and Economic Development, stated the Department favors the bill. Because the FY 82 budget was passed at a late date, and because of the seasonal nature of the mining industry, loans totaled only \$5 million. Without passage of SB 666, the remaining \$25 million will lapse back to the general fund.

Senator Mulcahy put forth an amendment to SB 666 to delete "and interest" from page 1, line 12. The amendment was approved.

Senator Mulcahy made a motion to move the bill as amended with individual recommendations.

Senator Fahrenkamp suggested that the committee be thinking over a possible substitute for SB 275, which would add a new section to provide for a resident 5-year sport fishing, hunting and/or trapping license.

The Committee adjourned at 2:05 p.m.

The parties to this agreement are the LEGISLATIVE AFFAIRS AGENCY, on behalf of the Senate State Affairs Committee, hereinafter referred to as the "AGENCY," and WILLIAM T. SALAMENTA, hereinafter referred to as the "CONSULTANT."

THE PURPOSE OF THIS AGREEMENT is to provide the Senate State Affairs Committee with professional research assistance that will help the Committee examine alternative schemes for public financing of campaigns and evaluate their advantages and disadvantages.

IT IS THEREFORE MUTUALLY AGREED THAT:

CLAUSE 1 - STATEMENT OF WORK

- (A) The Consultant shall examine the operation of the political campaign contribution tax credit in Alaska prior to and subsequent to repeal of the personal income tax. The Consultant will also summarize methods used in other states and by the Federal government to obtain citizens' participation in financing of political campaigns and to provide public funds to assist in campaign financing. In addition, the Consultant will analyze theoretical and practical issues that have been raised in literature on the subject to justify and to oppose public financing of elections.
- (B) The Consultant shall provide a draft report covering work under (A). The draft report will include conclusions reached and may include any recommendations deemed appropriate by the Consultant.
- (C) The Consultant shall provide to the Project Director a final report subsequent to approval by the Project Director of the draft report. Reproduction of the report is the responsibility of the Agency.

CLAUSE II - PERIOD AND DATES OF PERFORMANCE

- (A) The work under this contract shall be performed beginning July 15, 1981, and shall be completed no later than October 15, 1981.
- (B) This contract may be terminated by either party upon written notice to the other.
- (C) Unless extended by written agreement, this contract expires on October 31, 1981.

CLAUSE III - PROJECT DIRECTOR

The Project Director shall be Senator Victor Fischer, acting on behalf of the Senate State Affairs Committee.

CLAUSE IV - COMPENSATION AND METHOD OF PAYMENT

- (A) For the work specified in this contract, the Consultant shall be compensated at the rate of \$25.00 (twenty-five dollars) per hour, with total compensation for this work not to exceed \$3,500.00 (three thousand five hundred dollars).
- (B) The Consultant shall be reimbursed for travel and other expenses authorized in advance by the Project Director, except that per diem shall be paid at prevailing State rates, and all air travel shall be reimbursed on the basis of coach fares.
- (C) The Consultant may submit monthly billings to the Project Director. All billings should be accompanied by a statement and description of the work accomplished to the date of the billing.
- (D) Total payments under this contract, including expenses, shall not exceed \$4,000.00 (four thousand dollars).
- (E) Payment of \$1,000.00 (one thousand dollars) will be made to the Consultant upon execution of this contract.

CLAUSE V - OFFICE SPACE, EQUIPMENT AND CLERICAL SUPPORT

Office space, equipment and clerical support of the Consultant that will be necessary to carry out his obligations under this contract shall be supplied by the Consultant at no cost to the Agency.

CLAUSE VI - RECORDS, DOCUMENTS, AUDIT

The Consultant shall maintain accurate records, including detailed time records, as may be required by the Project Director. The records are subject to inspection by the Agency or the Project Director at all reasonable times. All documents, report and writings generated as a consequence of work done under this contract shall become the property of the State of Alaska and, on completion of the work or at the termination of this contract shall be delivered to the Project Director and the Agency.

CLAUSE VII - REPORTS

The Consultant shall keep the Project Director informed as to the progress of the work performed under this agreement and shall provide progress reports as specified by the Project Director.

CLAUSE VIII - ALL WRITINGS CONTAINED HEREIN

This agreement contains all the terms and conditions agreed upon by the parties. No other understandings, oral or otherwise, regarding the subject matter of this agreement shall be deemed to exist or to bind either of the parties of this agreement.

as Related to Sunset Audits

As required by "sunset" legislation, your Committee has been assigned the oversight review of the Alaska Code Revision Commission. In addition to the audit reports released earlier by this Division, the following information may be helpful.

According to AS 44.66.050, the standing committee of legislative jurisdiction as provided in Rule 20 of the Uniform Rules of the Legislature shall hold one or more hearings to receive testimony from the public and other parties that have associated responsibilities or interests. In addition, the Committee shall consider Legislative Audit's report, the agency's proposed sunset, the agency's program performance report, and any other tools that might assist it in evaluating the conduct and activities of the agency being terminated.

It is important to note that the terminating agency shall have the burden of demonstrating a public need for its continued existence during the public hearings.

The determination of "public need" for continued existence shall take into consideration the following factors set out in AS 44.66.050(c):

1. The extent to which the board, commission or program has operated in the public interest.

2. The extent to which the operation of the board, commission, or agency program has been impeded or enhanced by existing statutes, procedures, and practices which it has adopted, and any other matter, including budgetary, resource, and personnel matters.
3. The extent to which the board, commission or agency has recommended statutory changes which are generally of benefit to the public interest.
4. The extent to which the board, commission or agency has encouraged interested persons to report to it concerning the effect of its regulations and decisions on the effectiveness of service, economy of service, and availability of service which it has provided.
5. The extent to which the board, commission or agency has encouraged public participation in the making of its regulations and decisions.
6. The efficiency with which public inquiries or complaints regarding the activities of the board, commission or agency filed with it, with the department to which a board or commission is administratively assigned, or with the office of the ombudsman have been processed and resolved.
7. The extent to which a board or commission which regulates entry into an occupation or profession has presented qualified applicants to serve the public.
8. The extent to which state personnel practices, including affirmative action requirements, have been complied with by the board, commission or agency to its own activities and the area of activity or interest.
9. The extent to which statutory, regulatory, budgeting or other changes are necessary to enable the agency, board or commission to better serve the interests of the public and to comply with the factors enumerated in this subsection.

The Legislative Audit reports have addressed these issues individually but only to the extent allowed by restricted audit scopes detailed within the reports.

The Law further states that the committee of reference shall, not later than the 60th day of the legislative session, submit a report to the presiding officer of each

house. The report is to include a summary of findings as to compliance with the "public need" factors enumerated above together with recommendations as to each of the following:

1. An identification of the problems or the needs that the programs and activities of the board, commission or agency are intended to address.
2. A statement, to the extent practicable, of the objectives of the program of the board, commission, or agency program, and its anticipated accomplishments.
3. An identification of any other programs having similar, conflicting or duplicate objectives.
4. An assessment of alternative methods of achieving the purposes of the program.
5. An assessment of the consequences of eliminating the board, commission or program and consolidating its activities with another program, or of funding it at a lower level.
6. A justification for the recommended continuation or extension of the board, commission or program, and an explanation of the manner in which it avoids duplication of or conflict with other efforts.
7. Any other information which, in the opinion of the committee, would improve the performance of the board, commission or agency with respect to its representation of and responsiveness to the public interest.

The committee of reference may introduce a bill providing for the reorganization or continuation of the agency being terminated as stipulated in AS 44.66.050(e).

In compliance with AS 44.66.050 and referral by the President of the Senate, the Senate Committee on State Affairs has conducted a sunset review of the Alaska Code Revision Commission.

The committee utilized Legislative Audit report 30-022-0025-R, A Performance Review of the Alaska Code Revision Commission, dated October 28, 1981; the 1981 Annual Report of the Alaska Code Revision Commission, dated February 1982; and the Commission's Proposed Budget for FY '83.

Testimony was received from the auditor, R.W. Pavitt, AICP; John W. Abbott, Chair; Billy G. Berrier, Executive Secretary; and James L. Baldwin, member of the Commission. Written communication was received from Patrick M. Rodey, member of the Commission, and Charles R. Webber, Commissioner of the Alaska Department of Commerce and Economic Development.

Findings required by AS 44.66.050 (d) follow:

(1) an identification of the problems or the needs that the programs and activities of the board, commission or agency are intended to address;

### Finding:

As a permanent commission of the legislature, the Commission is charged with the following duties:

- (1) examining the statutes of the state and judicial decisions to discover defects and anachronisms in the law;
- (2) reviewing and considering proposed changes in the law recommended by the National Law Institute, the National Conference of Commissioners on Uniform State Laws, the Alaska Judicial Council, the supreme court, the state or local bar associations, principal departments, agencies, boards and commissions of the legislative branch;
- (3) receiving and considering suggestions from the Alaska bench and bar, public officials, organizations, and individuals

as to areas of law needing review and remedy;

(4) recommending changes in law needed to eliminate antiquated and inadequate rules of law and to bring the law into harmony with current needs and conditions.

(2) a statement, to the extent practicable, of the objectives of the program of the board, commission, or agency program, and its anticipated accomplishments;

Finding:

The commission is directed to submit its report and recommendations, and draft legislation as to revision of law, to the Legislative Council, and distributes them to the governor, members of the legislature, and the chief justice of the supreme court. See 1981 Annual Report (attached Exhibit A) for a discussion of its accomplishments.

(3) an identification of any other programs having similar, conflicting or duplicate objectives;

Finding:

The duties and responsibilities assigned to the commission by the enabling act (AS 24.20.075) are substantially similar to those mandated to the Legislative Council, the Legislative Affairs Agency, and the Co-revisors of Statutes (AS 01.05.036; 24.20.060(4); 24.20.065(a); and 24.20.070(b)).

(4) an assessment of alternative methods of achieving the purposes of the program.

Finding:

Substantive revision of law in Alaska can be accomplished by legislatively-appointed special commissions (as in the case of the major Criminal Code revision), by a special committee of the legislature such as the committee that revised Title 4 (Alcoholic Beverages), or by the the Legislative Affairs Agency contracting with consultants.

(5) an assessment of the consequences of eliminating the board, commission, or program and consolidating its activities with another program, or of funding it at a lower level.

Finding:

Elimination of the Commission would remove the breadth of review and participation that accrue as a result of code revision being supervised by a multi-member group. Elimination would not, however, necessarily prevent needed code revisions from being accomplished (see preceding response). Elimination of the Commission would not result in any significant savings, as the Commission members receive no compensation for services rendered. The public member and the designee of the Alaska Bar Association board of governors do receive per diem and travel allowance.

(6) a justification for the recommended continuation or extension of the board, commission or program, and an explanation of the manner in which it avoids duplication or or conflict with other efforts;

Finding:


Its broad-based membership of legislative, executive and judicial branch representatives, as well as the public and Alaska Bar members, provide a breadth of legal knowledge, perception and experience that has much potential value as an advisory function to the lawmaking process. Particularly in areas of generally low legislative interest such as probate law, security law, real property conveyancing, bankruptcy law and the like, the Commission has shown that it can provide necessary expertise in recommending statutory revision that "will bring the law into harmony with current needs and conditions." (AS 24.20.075(c)(4)).



Finding:


The Committee acknowledges the numerous hours and efforts of the Commission but is concerned with the process the Commission utilizes to select topics for study and the duplication of responsibilities with other existing agencies. Therefore, the Committee recommends the following:


- 1) that the Commission be extended to June 30, 1985; and
- 2) that the Commission's duties be limited to reviewing and considering proposed changes in the law by the National Law Institute, and the National Conference of Commissioners on Uniform State Laws and any other matter referred to the Commission by a concurrent resolution of the legislature (see attached Exhibit "B").

**Sec. 24.20.062. Legislative internship program.** A legislative internship program established by the legislative council under AS 24.20.060(8) shall provide that

(1) the University of Alaska provide academic support and credit to the program;

(2) students enrolled and in good standing at any accredited postsecondary educational institution who have successfully completed at least two years of study are eligible to participate in the program;

(3) interns will be selected by a committee composed of members of the legislature appointed by the legislative council and representatives of the university appointed by the university;

(4) interns will be selected on the basis of their experience and interest in subjects which the legislative council feels are likely to be considered during a legislative session;

(5) legislative interns are entitled to receive academic credit and payment of \$30 for each day of participation in the program during the legislative session. (§ 11 ch 87 SLA 1979)

**Sec. 24.20.075. Alaska Code Revision Commission.** (a) The Alaska Code Revision Commission is established as a permanent commission of the legislature.

(b) The commission consists of two legislators, one from each house, appointed by the presiding officer; one public member, who is not an employee of the state government, appointed by the governor; a designee of the governor, who is an attorney employed by the executive branch of the state government; a designee of the chief justice of the supreme court; and a designee of the Alaska Bar Association appointed by the board of governors of the association. Legislative members serve at the pleasure of the presiding officer; the designee of the governor and the designee of the chief justice serve at the pleasure of the governor and chief justice, respectively; the public member and the designee of the board of governors serve terms of six years each, beginning July 1 and ending on June 30 six years later. Members may be reappointed or redesignated. A vacancy in the membership of the commission occurring other than by expiration of term shall be filled in the same manner as the original appointment but, with regard to the legislative members, the public member, and the board of governors' designee, for the unexpired term only. Members who are not state employees or legislators are entitled to receive the standard per diem and travel allowance provided for members of independent boards and commissions. Legislative members are entitled to receive the regular legislative per diem and travel allowance for days spent on commission business, and members who are state employees are entitled to receive

the regular state employees per diem and travel allowance for days spent on commission business. The commission selects its chairman and vice-chairman. The director of legal services for the Legislative Affairs Agency, or his designee, serves as executive secretary for the commission.

(c) The commission shall

(1) examine the statutes of the state and judicial decisions to discover defects and anachronisms in the law;

(2) review and consider proposed changes in the law recommended by the National Law Institute, the National Conference of Commissioners on Uniform State Laws, the Alaska Judicial Council, the supreme court, the state or local bar associations, principal departments, agencies, boards and commissions of the executive or judicial branch, and committees of the legislative branch;

(3) receive and consider suggestions from the Alaska bench and bar, public officials, organizations, and individuals as to areas of law needing review and remedy;

(4) recommend changes in law needed to eliminate antiquated and inadequate rules of law and to bring the law into harmony with current needs and conditions.

(d) The commission may

(1) hold public hearings and other meetings as necessary throughout the state and shall determine an appropriate quorum for conducting business;

(2) establish one or more subcommission to assist it in the performance of its duties.

(e) The staff of the Legislative Affairs Agency serves as staff for the commission. Subject to appropriation for the purpose, the commission may request the agency to contract with other agencies or persons for the performance of necessary services.

(f) The commission shall submit its reports and recommendations, and draft legislation as to revision of law, to the Legislative Council and shall distribute them to the governor, members of the legislature, and the chief justice of the supreme court.

(g) All branches of state government shall provide information and documents requested by the commission necessary to the accomplishment of its work.

(h) The commission shall make a formal request to the Legislative Council for funds it considers necessary for the per diem, travel, and contractual expenses of the commission. Funds appropriated to the commission are to be disbursed and accounted for under procedures required by the Legislative Affairs Agency. The commission chairman shall approve all expenditure documents. (§ 1 ch 114 SLA 1976; am § 1 ch 57 SLA 1977; am §§ 1, 2 ch 44 SLA 1980)

Effect of amendments. — The first 1979 amendment added subparagraph (G) to paragraph (4). The second 1979 amendment added paragraph (8) to paragraph (4).

**Sec. 24.20.062. Legislative internship program.** A legislative internship program established by the legislative council under AS 24.20.060(8) shall provide that

(2) review and consider proposed changes in the law recommended by the National Law Institute, the National Conference of Commissioners on Uniform State Laws, the Alaska Judicial Council, the supreme court, the state or local bar associations, principal departments, agencies, boards and commissions of the executive or judicial branch, and committees of the legislative branch;

(3) receive and consider suggestions from the Alaska bench and bar, public officials, organizations, and individuals as to areas of law needing review and remedy;

**Sec. 24.20.062. Legislative internship program.** A legislative internship program established by the legislative council under AS 24.20.060(8) shall provide that

- (1) the University of Alaska provide academic support and credit to the program;
- (2) students enrolled and in good standing at any accredited postsecondary educational institution who have successfully completed at least two years of study are eligible to participate in the program;
- (3) interns will be selected by a committee composed of members of the legislature appointed by the legislative council and representatives of the university appointed by the university;
- (4) interns will be selected on the basis of their experience and interest in subjects which the legislative council feels are likely to be considered during a legislative session;
- (5) legislative interns are entitled to receive academic credit and payment of \$30 for each day of participation in the program during the legislative session. (§ 11 ch 87 SLA 1979)

**Sec. 24.20.075. Alaska Code Revision Commission.** (a) The Alaska Code Revision Commission is established as a permanent commission of the legislature.

(b) The commission consists of two legislators, one from each house, appointed by the presiding officer; one public member, who is not an employee of the state government, appointed by the governor, a designee of the governor, who is an attorney employed by the executive branch of the state government; a designee of the chief justice of the supreme court; and a designee of the Alaska Bar Association appointed by the board of governors of the association. Legislative members serve at the pleasure of the presiding officer; the designee of the governor and the designee of the chief justice serve at the pleasure of the governor and chief justice, respectively; the public member and the designee of the board of governors serve terms of six years each, beginning July 1 and ending on June 30 six years later. Members may be reappointed or redesignated. A vacancy in the membership of the commission occurring other than by expiration of term shall be filled in the same manner as the original appointment but, with regard to the legislative members, the public member, and the board of governors' designee, for the unexpired term only. Members who are not state employees or legislators are entitled to receive the standard per diem and travel allowance provided for members of independent boards and commissions. Legislative members are entitled to receive the regular legislative per diem and travel allowance for days spent on commission business, and members who are state employees are entitled to receive

the regular state employees per diem and travel allowance for days spent on commission business. The commission selects its chairman and vice-chairman. The director of legal services for the Legislative Affairs Agency, or his designee, serves as executive secretary for the commission.

(c) The commission shall

- (1) examine the statutes of the state and judicial decisions to discover defects and anachronisms in the law;
- (2) review and consider proposed changes in the law recommended by the National Law Institute, the National Conference of Commissioners on Uniform State Laws, the Alaska Judicial Council, the supreme court, the state or local bar associations, principal departments, agencies, boards and commissions of the executive or judicial branch, and committees of the legislative branch;
- (3) receive and consider suggestions from the Alaska bench and bar, public officials, organizations, and individuals as to areas of law needing review and remedy;
- (4) recommend changes in law needed to eliminate antiquated and inadequate rules of law and to bring the law into harmony with current needs and conditions.

(d) The commission may

- (1) hold public hearings and other meetings as necessary throughout the state and shall determine an appropriate quorum for conducting business;
- (2) establish one or more subcommission to assist it in the performance of its duties.

(e) The staff of the Legislative Affairs Agency serves as staff for the commission. Subject to appropriation for the purpose, the commission may request the agency to contract with other agencies or persons for the performance of necessary services.

(f) The commission shall submit its reports and recommendations, and draft legislation as to revision of law, to the Legislative Council and shall distribute them to the governor, members of the legislature, and the chief justice of the supreme court.

(g) All branches of state government shall provide information and documents requested by the commission necessary to the accomplishment of its work.

(h) The commission shall make a formal request to the Legislative Council for funds it considers necessary for the per diem, travel, and contractual expenses of the commission. Funds appropriated to the commission are to be disbursed and accounted for under procedures required by the Legislative Affairs Agency. The commission chairman shall approve all expenditure documents. (§ 1 ch 114 SLA 1976; am § 1 ch 57 SLA 1977; am §§ 1, 2 ch 44 SLA 1980)

# ANNUAL REPORT FOR THE YEAR 1981

## INTRODUCTION

The primary objective of the Alaska Code Revision Commission, as established by AS 24.20.075, is to review and consider proposed changes in the law recommended by the National Law Institute, the National Conference of Commissioners on Uniform State Laws, the Alaska Judicial Council, the supreme court, the state or local bar associations, principal departments, agencies, boards and commissions of the executive or judicial branch, and committees of the legislative branch. The commission also seeks out on its own and works on parts of Alaska Statutes where it finds revision is needed to eliminate antiquated and inadequate law and to bring the law into harmony with current needs and conditions.

The commission consists of (1) two legislators, one from each house, appointed by the respective presiding officers; (2) one public member who is not an employee of the executive branch, appointed by the governor, and one member who is an employee of the executive branch, appointed by the governor; (3) a designee of the chief justice of the supreme court; and (4) a designee of the Alaska Bar Association, appointed by the board of governors of that association. The director of legal services for the Legislative Affairs Agency, or his designee, serves as the executive secretary for the commission.

The commission assists the legislature by carefully studying complex subjects, identifying major policy questions for legislative attention, gathering the views of interested persons and organizations, and drafting legislation for consideration by the legislature. Thus, the commission assists the legislature in accomplishing needed reforms that otherwise might not be made because of the heavy demands on legislative time.

## SUMMARY OF WORK OF COMMISSION

Presently in the Twelfth Legislature, Second Session, there are five bills that the commission prepared. One of the bills it prepared was enacted during the First Session of the Twelfth Legislature. The other bills now in the legislature are carried over from the 1981 session.

The Alaska Code Revision Commission was created in 1976. Since its creation it has generally reviewed the uniform acts proposed for adoption by the National Conference of Commissions on Uniform State Laws and has reviewed and discussed many parts of the Alaska Statutes for possible revision in depth. However, it has concentrated its attention on those projects described below.

Its first major project was revision of debtor and creditor law relating to exemption from execution. The resulting bill was introduced in 1979 and again in 1981. It is HB 74 and is in the House Judiciary Committee as this report is written. Commission members testified before that committee in 1981, and committee work on the bill has resumed in the 1982 session.

In 1978 the commission undertook a major revision of AS 4--Alcoholic Beverages. Since the legislature had established an interim committee specifically for this purpose, the commission forwarded its draft and extensive commentary to the Legislative Council for referral to the appropriate committee for further consideration. A complete revision of AS 4 was enacted as ch. 131, SLA 1980, which included much of the commission's work.

Also in 1978 a review of the real property conveyancing laws was begun. Then in 1979 this major project was divided into two areas: (1) recording and recorded documents; and (2) security interests in real property. The commission prepared draft legislation on each topic. In 1980 the draft bill on recording and recorded documents, which incorporates the Uniform Federal Lien Registration Act as amended by the commission, was submitted to the Legislative Council. However, no action was taken by the council on the bill in 1980, and it was introduced at the start of the First Session of the Twelfth Legislature in 1981 as SB 78. It passed out of the Senate Labor and Commerce Committee early in the session and presently rests in the Senate Judiciary Committee. The commission has provided testimony in both committees. The bill on security interests is in the House Judiciary Committee. The commission has offered to provide testimony on the bill when it comes up for consideration.

From its work on these real property bills, the commission saw the need for revision of the state law on acknowledgment that was based on a uniform law superseded in 1943. Various similar technical requirements of law also needed clarification and definition. The bill that resulted was SB 80 on oath, affirmation, acknowledgment, notarization and verification. It was enacted as ch. 137, SLA 1981.

In 1979 another major project was begun--a revision of Title 10--Corporations and Associations. This project began with an analysis of existing law and a comparison of Alaska law with other states' laws and the Model Act. Detailed drafting was done by a consultant in the field under contract with the commission. A draft of the proposed bill and commentary was completed and approved in November 1980. After forwarding the draft bill to the Legislative Affairs Agency for review, the review and final bill typing were completed in May 1981. After several meetings with the contractor and the staff member of the Legislative Affairs Agency, modifications were approved and the bill was retyped at the agency for introduction during the Second Session of the Twelfth Legislature.

Late in 1980 it was determined that a revision of the nonprofit corporations code should be undertaken, and a contract was entered into with the consultant who performed the work on the for profit code. An initial installment for review was received in February of 1981. After work throughout 1981, the final draft and commentary was approved during the November meeting and then forwarded to the Legislative Affairs Agency for review and bill typing. It is expected that the bill will be introduced sometime during the Second Session of the Twelfth Legislature. Also at the November meeting the contractor was given guidelines for preparation of a draft bill on native corporations. The first installment of that draft will be ready for consideration at the February 1982 meeting.

Also in 1980 a major project to revise the law on occupational licensing, AS 08, was begun. Six drafts were considered during 1981 and the commission gave final substantive approval to this revision and commentary at its January, 1982 meeting.

Throughout the years the commission has considered a variety of revisions. Several projects were either dropped or postponed so the commission could concentrate its efforts on revisions it believed to be more necessary and more consistent with the purposes for which it was created. Of the various topics considered, the following are worthy of note: the insurance code, the class action act, the uniform comparative fault act, the uniform marriage and divorce act, the uniform brain death act, the uniform limited partnership act.

guardians and conservators, the model product liability act, the administrative procedure act, domestic violence, small loans, and vital statistics.

In accordance with the intent of Title 24 and Title 44 of the Alaska Statutes, the Division of Legislative Audit was mandated to perform a "Sunset" review of the commission. A preliminary report including recommendations was presented to the commission in November. Consistent with "sunset" practices, the 1982 session of the legislature will determine whether the commission should be continued.

Each of the commission's bills was developed through a process of study of the available materials on the subject for revision including any pertinent uniform laws, inquiry of persons, groups and agencies concerned, and distribution of proposed drafting for comment.

During 1981 the commission held nine meetings consisting of eighteen working sessions. The time and place of these meetings was advertised in the major newspapers of the state, and special notice was given to the persons and groups thought to be most directly interested in the subjects to be taken up at particular meetings. Public participation has been encouraged in all phases of the commission's work.

## STATUS OF PROPOSED LEGISLATION

The status of legislation proposed by the commission, as detailed in its Annual Report of 1980, is as follows:

### Alaska Exemptions Act--HB 74

The bill was reintroduced in 1981 as HB 74 and was referred to House Judiciary. Although the committee held hearings on the bill, it remains in committee for further consideration in 1982.

### Uniform Commercial Code (Articles 8 and 9)--SB 77

The bill was reintroduced in 1981 as SB 77. It passed the Senate without amendment early in the session. On May 28, 1981, committee work on the bill was completed in the House, and it was referred to Rules for placement on the calendar. Although there appeared to be no opposition to enactment of these uniform amendments to the UCC, the bill was not placed on the calendar and remains in House Rules. Final passage is anticipated in the 1982 session.

### Uniform Disposition of Community Property Rights at Death Act--SB 79

The bill was reintroduced in 1981 as SB 79. It was referred to Senate Judiciary on January 14, 1981, and remains in that committee.

### Security Interests in Real Property--HB 403

The bill was introduced as HB 403 on March 25, 1981, and referred to House Judiciary. Committee hearings have not been held on the bill.

### Recording and Recorded Documents--SB 78

The bill was introduced as SB 78 and referred to Senate Judiciary January 16, 1981. Committee staff has sought to resolve differences that appeared over some aspects of the bill, and a Judiciary Committee substitute is expected to be introduced.

### Corporations--For Profit Code

The bill is scheduled for introduction early in the 1982 legislative session.

### Corporations--Nonprofit Code

The draft bill has been submitted to the Legislative

Affairs Agency for its review. Because of the volume and complexity of the bill it is uncertain when it will reach the legislature, but it should be during the 1982 regular session.

LEGISLATION ENACTED INTO LAW

Oath, Affirmation, Acknowledgment, Notarization and Verification

The commission's bill, SB 80 am H, was enacted in the form in which it was introduced, except for a nonsubstantive amendment, and became ch. 37, SLA 1981, effective September 22, 1981.

## WORK OF THE COMMISSION IN 1981

During the year, the commission worked on the revisions listed below.

### Corporations--For Profit Code

The commission's work on corporations law began in 1979. After review and analysis of problems in the state law on business corporations, the commission contracted for a comprehensive study of Title 10 by a leading expert on corporation law, Professor Daniel Wm. Fessler. On the basis of the study, a contract was entered into with Professor Fessler to redraft the business corporations code.

A draft was given the commission's approval late in 1979, and the review process in the Legislative Affairs Agency was begun in 1980. However, the large volume of the work product and some differences in drafting style from the standard adopted by the legislature caused the review process to be especially time-consuming and complex. The work of the commission on the draft during 1981, therefore, was concerned largely with preserving its substantive work on the bill as style and drafting changes were made. The bill is to be introduced in the 1982 legislative session.

### Corporations--Nonprofit Code

Work on the business corporations code led the commission to contract for a review of the nonprofit corporations code and then to carry through a project to revise the law on nonprofit corporations. Work on the project continued through the year in much the same way the work had been done with the consultant on the business corporations law. The consultant's advice on policy issues was reviewed and policy decisions were made, specific drafting was done by the commission on some sections, successive drafts of the consultant's work were reviewed and revised, and a draft was approved for submission to the Legislative Council in November. The draft bill with extensive explanatory notes and section analysis then was sent to Legislative Affairs for further review required by that agency before the bill could be introduced through the Legislative Council. Experience with the for-profit revision indicated that several months will be required for the review process, and the commission may have further work to do on the bill after the Legislative Affairs Agency review.

### Business and Professions--Occupational Licensing

Throughout the year, the commission's work on occupational licensing law continued. Study of the subject with
