HOUSE BILL NO. 593, by Reps. Liska, Barnes and Bussell.  
Amends section of statute relating to fines imposed on a defendant (AS 12.55.035) by adding language that states: "(e) If a defendant is sentenced to pay a fine, the clerk of the court shall increase the fine by a penalty of 20 percent of the actual fine imposed, excluding any amount that is suspended." Section 2 of the bill spells out the Legislative intent, stating: "It is the intent of the legislature that an amount equivalent to the 20 percent penalty collected under AS 12.55.035(e) be appropriated annually to the crime victim compensation fund (AS 18.67.162)." Does not provide for an effective date (becomes law 90 days after Governor signs bill).

HOUSE BILL NO. 595, by Reps. Bussell, Cowdery, Fritz, Furnace, Hurlbert, Lindauer, Liska, Martin, Pestinger, and Ward. Would include the Administrative Director of the Alaska court system in the Public Employees' Retirement System (the Director is currently included under the Judicial Retirement System) and entitle the Administrator to credited service for employment as Administrative Director.

Repeals AS 22.25.012 (statute enabling the Director to be included in Judicial plan) and AS 39.35.680(21)(c)(vii) (Public Employees' Retirement System. Definition. "(21) 'member' or 'employee' . . . (C) Does not include. . . (vii) the administrative director of courts. . . unless he becomes a member. . .").

## INTRODUCTION OF BILLS (House)

HB 596, (cont'd)

Introduced February 9 and referred to Health, Education & Social Services, State Affairs..

In his message accompanying the bill, Governor Sheffield stated:

Under the authority of art. III, sec. 18, of the Alaska Constitution, I am transmitting this bill making several changes pertaining to the school construction functions of the Department of Transportation and Public Facilities (DOT/PF). This bill augments the recent amendments (ch. 92, SLA 1982). It attempts to complete the job, clarifying the responsibilities for school construction, and removes uncertainties and inconsistencies in the pertinent statutes.

Sections 1 and 2 correct what seem to have been oversights in ch. 92, SLA 1982. Although secs. 5 and 6 of that Act amended AS 35.15.080(a) and (c), respectively, to delete references to educational facilities and regional educational attendance areas, so that DOT/PF would no longer have primary responsibility for school construction, similar references were left in AS 35.15.080(d) and (f). Section 1 of this bill, recognizing the changes made by the 1982 amendments, inserts in (d) a cross reference to AS 14, the education title, to make clear that the various planning, design, and construction provisions of AS 35 and regulations adopted under AS 35 apply to schools as well as other public facilities. The present reference to a regional educational attendance area (REAA) assuming responsibility under "this section" is not correct since the 1982 amendments took REAA's out of that section -- AS 35.15.080 -- and enacted provisions governing them in AS 14. Similarly, sec. 2 of this bill deletes language pertaining to the commissioner of DOT/PF specifying grant contract provisions and adopting administrative regulations on school construction. Even when the DOT/PF performs the construction functions under a reimbursable services agreement with the Department of Education, it is the latter department that is responsible for the grant contract provisions and the regulations.

Section 3 amends AS 35.25.020(2), the general definition of "department" for the purposes of AS 35, "Public Buildings, Works, and Improvements." Reference to assemblies, councils, and regional school boards (i.e., school districts, under AS 14.12.010) that have assumed responsibility under AS 14.11.020 is added to this definition, with regard to schools, because ch. 92, SLA 1982 provided for school districts to assume responsibility for school construction. (See AS 14.11.020 which appeared as AS 14.07.190 in sec. 3, ch. 92, SLA 1982.) It also transferred certain responsibilities from the Department of Transportation and Public Facilities to the Department of Education. Other than AS 35.25.020(2), there is no definition of "department" that is generally applicable to AS 35.10 and 35.15 (although both chapters contain definition sections applicable to individual articles in those chapters). This amendment does should make clear that, when a school district assumes construction responsibility under AS 14.11.020, the district rather than the Department of Transportation and Public Facilities is responsible for functions under the following statutes:

- AS 35.10.010, "Standard Plans and Specifications and Limitations on Cost," which refers to "school buildings in incorporated cities" and excludes them from certain departmental duties unless built in whole or in part with state funds;
- AS 35.10.180, "Physical Facility Procurement and Planning Policies," in which subsec. (a) refers to "rural schools;"
- AS 35.15.100, "Responsibility of Department," which refers to "regional educational attendance areas;"
- AS 35.15.110, "Title to Site and Completion of Project," which refers to "school buildings" and "regional educational attendance areas;"
- AS 35.15.120, "Definitions," in which para. (2) refers to "regional educational attendance areas;"

- AS 35.27.020, "Art Requirements for Public Buildings and Facilities," in which subsec. (c) refers to "schools;" and
- AS 35.27.030, "Definitions," in which para. (2) refers to "schools."

Section 4 amends the definition of "department" in the chapter on art works in public buildings and facilities. AS 35.27.030(1). Reference to the school districts is added to the definition for the same reasons as mentioned in connection with sec. 3, above. The definition of "building" or "facility" in AS 35.27.030(2)(A)(i) is not being amended because there is no intent to delete the requirement for art work in public buildings -- just to make the responsibility for it clear in conjunction with ch. 92, SLA 1982.

Section 5 makes a similar amendment in the definition section -- AS 35.30.040 -- for the chapter on consistency with local government plans and ordinances.

These amendments do not include references to the court system because, although ch. 160, SLA 1980 transferred construction responsibility for court facilities from DOT/PF to the supreme court (see AS 22.05.025 and AS 35.05.010), sec. 3 of that Act, as amended by sec. 2, ch. 70, SLA 1982, terminates that transfer as of June 30, 1984.

Section 6 gives this bill an immediate effective date since these amendments simply seek to complete the job of the 1982 amendments.

I urge your favorable action to preserve the intent of ch. 92, SLA 1982 and eliminate, for the benefit of the public, cluttered, inconsistent provisions.

State Election

HOUSE BILL NO. 597, by the Rules Committee by Request of the Governor. Amends state election laws (see Governor's letter). Provides Act takes effect immediately.

Introduced February 9 and referred to State Affairs, Finance.

In his message transmitting the bill, Governor Sheffield stated:

Under the authority of art. III, sec. 18, of the Alaska Constitution, I am transmitting a bill which amends or repeals several provisions of the state's election laws.

Sections 1 and 2 of the bill remove from the division of elections the burden of identifying and automatically reinstating the voter registration of certain felons who have been unconditionally discharged. Instead of suspending the registration of a person convicted of a felony involving moral turpitude, the division will cancel the registration until the person provides proof of unconditional discharge. Section 3 of the bill amends AS 15.07.160, concerning unlawful acts, to conform to the changes made by secs. 1 and 2 of the bill.

Section 4 of the bill repeals AS 15.15.198(b), which allows to be counted certain questioned votes of voters whose names have been purged from the registration lists. As a result of the repeal, voters whose registrations have been cancelled under AS 15.07.130(b) will have to reregister in order to have their votes counted. Since AS 15.07.130(b) requires the division to mail a notice of imminent registration cancellation to the affected voter, and AS 15.07.125 requires the division to post the list of registered voters 40 days before an election, a voter has adequate opportunity to preserve his or her voting rights.

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The Department of Transportation & Public Facilities supports the purpose of House Bill 596 to clarify Ch. 98, SLA 1982 relating to the administration of school construction functions of DOT&PF and the Department of Education. This bill clarifies the responsibilities of both departments and the local school districts with regard to school construction, and would make clear that the provisions of AS35 concerning public buildings, apply to a school constructed by a local district when it has assumed responsibility for school construction just as they do to a school constructed by the DOT&PF.

The Department of Education concurs with our position on HB 596.

Dear Representative Hayes:

Under the authority of art. III, sec. 18, of the Alaska Constitution, I am transmitting a bill that would eliminate the cost-of-living-adjustment (COLA) requirement in the library assistance grant program. This change was requested by the Department of Education, the state library, and several community libraries. Due to the uncertainty of revenues, public library funding entities are experiencing difficulty in maintaining local funding for library services. Requiring an annual cost-of-living increase in local funding jeopardizes continuation of local library support and handicaps the purpose of the Library Assistance Grant Program to help local libraries provide service.

Usually communities that can increase local support of their public libraries do so. The COLA requirement implies that all communities need to be motivated by a legal requirement when that might be needed for only a few.

Section 1 amends the first sentence of AS 14.56.330(b) to remove the COLA requirement and to make clear that, if a library did not exist in fiscal year 1980, the amount to which the prohibition on using the state money to supplant the local money applies is the amount equal to local expenditures in the first year a matching grant is awarded. Section 2 would make this change effective immediately.

The legislation creating this program in 1981 passed both houses unanimously, and I urge early passage of this bill.

IV. Analysis

This bill would remove from the library assistance grant program a requirement for a cost of living increase in local operating expenditures of libraries seeking grants. The requirement for COLA creates a hardship for some communities and endangers continuation of the local library service. The COLA requirement has an effect contrary to the intent to strengthen local library services with the grant program.

Increases in local expenditures for local libraries are better determined by local needs and capabilities.

From legislative appropriations to the fund, the department shall make grants to eligible libraries for public library operations or for interlibrary cooperation or for both. (§ 1 ch 36 SLA 1981)

Sec. 14.56.310. Eligibility. (a) Libraries eligible for grants under AS 14.56.300 are:

(1) public libraries operated by municipalities or by public library nonprofit corporations; and

(2) libraries sharing resources or providing services to other libraries.

(b) A library described in (a) (1) of this section is eligible for a public library assistance grant. A library described in either (a) (1) or (2) of this section is eligible for an interlibrary cooperation assistance grant. (§ 1 ch 36 SLA 1981)

Sec. 14.56.320. Applications. An eligible library may apply to the department for a grant under AS 14.56.300 — 14.56.340 in accordance with regulations adopted by the board. (§ 1 ch 36 SLA 1981)

Sec. 14.56.330. Limitations. (a) A public library assistance grant under AS 14.56.300 — 14.56.340 may not exceed \$10,000 for each local public library service outlet in any one fiscal year. However, no amount over \$5,000 may be granted unless it is equally matched by local money.

(b) State money granted to a library under AS 14.56.300 — 14.56.340 may not be used to supplant local money equal to local expenditures for that library in fiscal year 1980, as adjusted annually by the commissioner to conform approximately to changes in the United States Department of Labor Bureau of Labor Statistics consumer price index for Anchorage, Alaska. A library that uses state money to supplant local money forfeits eligibility for grants under AS 14.56.300 — 14.56.340 for two years. (§ 1 ch 36 SLA 1981)

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**Sec. 14.56.340. Regulations.** The board shall adopt regulations necessary to carry out the purposes of AS 14.56.300 — 14.56.330. (§ 1 ch 36 SLA 1981)

**Editor's notes.** — Section 3, ch. 36, SLA 1981, provides: "Administrative regulations adopted under a provision repealed by sec. 2 of this Act remain in effect until amended or repealed by the state Board of Education."

The Cost of Living Allowance or inflation percentage requirement applied to local support of the local public library as a provision for receiving a Library Assistance Grant from the State was intended to assure that local governments would increase local support of local libraries at least at the rate of inflation.

There are two main problems with the COLA provision. They are:

1. Inflexibility- even though local support were increased, it might not be increased enough to meet a fixed percentage; and,
2. Indirect control of local decision - local support beyond maintenance of local expenditures in the base year should be decided by the local community, not by a fixed grant program.

By FY 1984, the COLA provision has become a potential liability to the local libraries. In some of the smaller communities there may not be any more money available for offsetting inflation. This currently would mean loss of the grant and deterioration of the library service. Since matching grants for Public Library Assistance had to be prorated this year at 73%, the State moved into a position of requiring local governments to spend more to receive less.

This position is not supportive of the purpose of the Library Assistance Grant Program or of the local libraries. Local libraries are part of their communities. The grant program is meant to assist public libraries with their operating costs and to be part of the Alaska Library Network. In addition annual reports from the majority of libraries indicate increases in local support since 1980. The increase in the number of eligible library outlets from 64 in FY 1982 to 89 in FY 1984 shows that both the communities and grants are working positively to improve library service in Alaska.

Removal of the COLA provision represents removal of a built-in conflict which creates a negative result for library service.

Your Basic Public Library Assistance grant is being processed for FY 1984. I am pleased to see your plan to purchase a microfiche reader. It should be very useful to you and your library users.

Please start keeping circulation records and train volunteers to keep them, too. We use circulation statistics frequently as a measure of library activity and it is necessary to include Eagle.

I am concerned about your grant application for FY84 in that you request matching funds. Probably this is a repeated warning but if you start having matching for local funds, you must continue the amount plus cost of living increases or forfeit your grant for at least two years. Some libraries are running into this problem already. Since what you plan to do with your local money may relate to repairs and maintenance, I wonder if you will be able to have local money in the future. I really just want to be sure you understand the commitment you are making.

The following information is what was requested on October 24th for our 1983 State Library Grant.

The library is kept open fifty weeks out of the year. We have \$1101.94 left from the 1982 grant. The following orders are outstanding: World Book Encyclopedia @ \$473.00; and Story House Corp. @ \$310.00. That leaves about \$319.00 to cover continues cataloging (card kits and labor) until the new grant arrives.

The library use statistics show the following community patron use: from November, 1980 to June, 1981 was 95 items - Cantwell started receiving television that year. July, 1981 to June, 1982 was 150 items. July, 1982 to June, 1983 was 300 items. July, 1983 to November, 1983 was 233 items. The library has one entire wall physically open to the main entrance hallway of the building with about only 35' of hallway reaching to the main doors. I had tried some evening hours in 1981, but haven't tried since then as I had had very little response. I'll be glad to approach the community about hiring someone as I as taking night classes. I do check books out for people any time I am in the building for classes or meetings. The school is still the major center for 95% of the meetings that are held in the community, and all of the adult education classes.

A Community of Cantwell, Inc. meeting was held November 9, 1983. It was decided that I should not apply for the matching grant monies even though the library has been designated to receive monies from them again. I was asked to get the complete procedures for the library grant and the matching grants. Margaret, this is the first time I have ever been told about the community being obligated forever and ever with cost of living increases. I would appreciate receiving ALL the information possible regarding this matter. Thank you.

STAFF REVIEW

HB 611, "An Act relating to dentists and dental hygienists," by Representative Walt Furnace, makes several changes to current law regarding dentists and dental hygienists. The Department of Commerce and Economic Development, Division of Occupational Licensing, estimates the fiscal impact of HB 611 to be \$2,700 for FY 85, \$1,300 for FY 86, \$1,400 for FY 87, \$1,500 for FY 88, and \$1,600 for FY 89 (Please see fiscal note for greater detail).

Sections 1 - 6 of the bill amend AS 08.32, relating to the practice of dental hygienists. Many of the amendments in these sections transfer regulations applying to hygienists from AS 08.36, regulating dentists, to AS 08.32.

Sections 17 - 21 of the bill effect amendments to the practices of the Board of Dental Examiners which regulates both dentists and dental hygienists.

Sections 22 - 40 of the bill amend AS 08.36, relating to the practice of dentistry.

The bill does not provide for an effective date and would therefore become law 90 days after the Governor signs the bill.

Pursuant to your direction, I have prepared a proposed House HESS Committee Substitute for House Bill 611; "An Act relating to dentists and dental hygienists."

The proposed House HESS Committee Substitute for House Bill 611 is identical to the House Labor and Commerce Committee Substitute, except that on Page 6, lines 10 - 11, of the proposed House HESS Committee Substitute, after the phrase "the direct," the words "or indirect" are inserted, so that the sentence now reads:

"[A person licensed to practice the profession of dental hygiene in the state may,] if certified by the board and under the direct or indirect supervision of a licensed dentist, administer anesthetic agents."  
(Emphasis added to indicate insertion).

This language had been in the original version of the bill, but was removed in the Labor and Commerce Committee Substitute. Our office has received numerous requests from dentists, dental hygienists, and the general public to have the language reinserted.

You have asked for a sectional analysis of CSHB 611 (HESS). The bill can be considered in three parts. Sections 1 - 16 amend AS 08.32, regulating the practice of dental hygienists. Many of the amendments transfer regulations applying to hygienists but codified in AS 08.36, regulating dentists, into AS 08.32.

The second group of amendments, found in sections 17 - 21, relate to the Board of Dental Examiners which regulates both dental hygienists and dentists.

The third part of the bill amends the regulation of dentists and is contained in sections 22 - 40.

Sections Relating to Dental Hygienists

Section 1 Clarifies the requirement that a dental hygienist be registered as well as licensed.

Section 2 Corrects reference to the Joint Commission on National Dental Examinations and permits an applicant to apply before graduating from school if the applicant will have graduated by the time of the examination.

Section 3 Makes changes to correct references.

Section 4 Permits dental hygienists licensed in another state to apply for a temporary license to pending receipt of the Alaska licensing examination results.

Section 5 Adds reference to licensing by credentials, created in section 4, and corrects reference to the fee section.

Section 6 Clarifies the composition and content of the licensing examination and permits the board to administer a laboratory examination as a prerequisite to the clinical examination.

Section 7 Renewal of registration is deleted from this section because the next section addresses the subject.

Section 8 Adds a new section to AS 08.32 to transfer provisions found in AS 08.36.250 for registration requirements for dental hygienists.

Section 9 The penalty established under AS 08.01.100(b) for late renewals \$10.

Section 10 Gives the board power to set licensing fees by regulation. AS 08.36.190 currently lists fees for dental hygienists and dentists.

Section 11 Paragraph (6) adds reference to the board's certification process for administering local anesthetic agents.

Section 12 Permits the board to regulate functions, both intra-oral and extra-oral, that may be performed by a licensed dental hygienists.

Section 13 Paragraph (1) adds reference to registrations. Paragraph (2) adds fraudulent billing for services as a basis for imposing discipline. Paragraph (6)(A) substitutes "dependence" for "severe dependence." Paragraph (6)(B) adds failure to keep informed of or use current professional theories and practices as a ground for imposing discipline.

Section 14 Adds a new section to AS 08.32 to transfer provisions found in AS 08.36 that apply to dental hygienists. In subsection (c), the board is given power to suspend the license of a dental hygienist who refuses to submit to a physical or mental examination.

Section 15 A class B misdemeanor is punishable by a fine of no more than \$1000 (AS 12.55.035) or imprisonment for no longer than 90 days (AS 12.55.135).

Section 16 Adds new provisions modeled on AS 08.36.350, which applies to dentists only, to permit hygienists in the categories listed to practice without a state license.

Sections relating to the Board of Dental Examiners

Section 17 Requires that the dental hygienist on the Board of Dental Examiners have practiced in Alaska for five years.

Section 18 Adds language to suspend a dentist or dental hygienist from the board if an accusation is filed against the person under the Administrative Procedure Act. The suspension lasts until the decision of the board is final under AS 44.62.520.

Section 19 Permits a majority of the board to call a meeting in the absence of a call of the president.

Section 20 Adds specific authorization for the department to reimburse board members for expenses.

Section 21 Paragraph (3) expands the required content of the board's annual report. Paragraph (a)(10) requires that the board publish information about its disciplinary decisions annually. Paragraph (a)(11) allows the board to set standards for specific procedures requiring training and education beyond the basic training provided to all dental hygienists and dentists and requires the board to issue certificates or permits to those who meet the requirements. Paragraph (a)(12) clarifies existing powers of the board.

Paragraph (b)(1) allows the board to order a professional to submit to a physical or mental examination if capacity to practice safely is at issue. Paragraph (b)(2) permits the board to authorize the inspection of records to monitor compliance with the licensing chapter for dental hygienists or for dentists.

Sections relating to Dentists

Section 22 Deletes reference to permits because the section allowing dentists to practice by permit instead of by license is repealed.

Section 23 Requires that all applicants for licensing as dentists pass the national board examination before taking the state exam. It also permits applicants to apply before

graduating if they will have graduated by the time of the examination.

Section 24 Requires that applications be signed and filed 45 days before the examination is given.

Section 25 Clarifies the composition and structure of the dentist licensing examination.

Section 26 The penalty established under AS 08.01.100(b) for late renewal is \$10.

Section 27 Requires that dentists licensed in another state who are seeking licensure in this state have passed the national licensing examination.

Section 28 Deletes the requirement that dentists register with the clerk of the superior court.

Sections 29 and 30 Require that applicants for specialist licenses be eligible for diplomate status with a specialty board and that a licensed specialist take part in the licensing procedures.

Section 31 Adds subsection (b) requiring that dentists who are renewing their registrations report to the board any suits filed against them based on the quality of their professional services.

Section 32 Rewrites the fee section to allow the board to set fees by regulation instead of providing specific fee amounts by statute.

Section 33 Paragraph (2) adds fraudulent billing for services as a basis for imposing discipline. Paragraph (5) deletes "intentionally or negligently" from the paragraph permitting discipline for dentists who perform patient care below minimum professional standards. Paragraph (7)(C) permits disciplining dentists whose "dependence," rather than "severe dependency", on drugs or alcohol impairs their ability to practice. Paragraph (10) permits the board to discipline a dentist who fails to report a death that occurred at the office.

Section 34 Deletes reference to imposing discipline on dental hygienists (AS 08.32) because new sections were added to that chapter relating to discipline.

Section 35 Adds language to permit the board to suspend the license of a dentist who refuses to submit to a mental or physical examination.

Section 36 A class B misdemeanor carries a maximum fine of \$1000 (AS 12.55.035) or imprisonment for no more than 90 days (AS 12.55.135).

Section 37 Paragraph (a)(5) exempts from licensing requirements licensed clinicians from other states who are providing limited instruction in this state. Paragraph (a)(6) exempts dentists providing emergency care from the state licensing requirements. Subsection (b) holds dentists exempt from licensing to the same standard of care as licensed dentists.

Section 38 Paragraph (7) defines the practice of dentistry to exclude owners and managers of dental facilities.

Section 39 Adds a new section to provide rights to dentists. Paragraphs (3) and (4) permit dentists supervising research in a research institution chartered with the state or in a school accredited by the American Dental Association to perform procedures that would otherwise violate the licensing chapter. Paragraph (4) requires that the dentist notify the board of any procedures to be performed on patients. The board may disapprove the procedures.

Section 40 Repeals five sections of the law.

08.36.140 permits the board to hold a licensing examination outside the state.

08.36.150 permits students in their last year of dental school to take the licensing examination and permits the board to give the exam in an out-of-state dental school.

08.36.170 permits students who are at least 19 years old to take section I of the state examination and then take the rest of the examination after graduation.

08.36.200 permits the board to waive the state written examination for applicants who have passed the national board examination.

(1) secured a license through deceit, fraud, or intentional misrepresentation;

(2) engaged in deceit, fraud, or intentional misrepresentation in the course of providing professional dental services or engaging in professional activities;

(3) advertised professional dental services in a false or misleading manner;

(4) has been convicted of a felony or other crime which affects the dentist's ability to continue to practice dentistry competently and safely;

(5) intentionally or negligently engaged in or permitted the performance of patient care by persons under the dentist's supervision which does not conform to minimum professional standards of dentistry regardless of whether actual injury to the patient occurred;

(6) failed to comply with this chapter, with a regulation adopted under this chapter, or with an order of the board;

(7) continued to practice after becoming unfit due to

(A) professional incompetence;

(B) failure to keep informed of or use current professional theories or practices;

(d) The board may reinstate a license which has been suspended or revoked if the board finds, after a hearing, that the applicant is able to practice with skill and safety.

I am writing to request your support of HB 617.

This bill would provide a one-time \$180,000 appropriation to the Alaska State Council on the Arts for summer Fine Arts Camps in Sitka, Palmer, and Fairbanks.

These programs provide intensive training in visual, performing, and literary arts for more than 730 junior and senior high students from sixty-seven communities throughout the state.

#### Problem Addressed by HB 617

Fine Arts Camps are not new programs. They have been in existence for years. HB 617 is a one-time appropriation which addresses a very specific problem that cannot otherwise be easily resolved- Fine Arts Camps of necessity must take place in late June and July.

This fact creates a serious financial problem- the camps must be conducted prior to determination of State Arts Council funding due to the timing of the state's fiscal year and the Arts Council's funding cycle. While Arts Council funding (\$162,032 in 1983) comprises only 38% of the total costs of the camps with the remainder coming from private-sector and program revenues, the camps cannot be operated without this support.

At present, the camps must sign contracts to provide services before they know what level of funding they will receive from ASCA. This is fiscally untenable for both the Fine Arts Camps and ASCA.

HB 617 will provide the camps with a special forward-fund to cover start-up costs. This will avoid the necessity for camps to contract for services supported by State Arts Council before they know whether or not ASCA grants can or will cover such costs.

#### Why Support HB 617?

Why support HB 617 during a time when the state is experiencing decreasing revenues and is confronted with so many basic human and physical problems?

Until I had the opportunity to visit the Sitka Fine Arts Camp, I had an inadequate appreciation of the exceptional value of these programs to young Alaskans. Having seen students involved in learning music, visual art, theatre, dancing, and writing with an excitement and intensity which cannot be found in schools, my estimation of

the value of these programs changed radically.

Self-expression, self-confidence, and self-esteem are irreplaceable qualities to give young Alaskans. These qualities carry over into all aspects of a students future life and career. Fine Arts Camps provide these qualities to thousands of young people over the years. They therefore deserve your full support.

I appreciate your consideration and support of HB 617. Best wishes.

FINE ARTS CAMPS -- FACT SHEET

The three Fine Arts Camps in Palmer, Sitka, and Fairbanks encourage your support and passage of HB617 on the basis of the following facts:

THE PROBLEM:

To do adequate planning, the camps must enter into contracts with faculty and staff, for facilities, food services, and materials before operating funds have been awarded. This awkward situation was created several years ago when the camps were transferred from the Department of Education's budget to the State Arts Council's budget. The timing of the transfer, the state's fiscal year, and the Council's funding cycle immediately combined to cause the problem of ASCA's reviewing camp funding requests after the camps had begun to operate.

THE SOLUTION:

HB617 provides for a one time appropriation that would enable the camps and the State Arts Council to establish a forward funding cycle. It would work this way: the supplemental appropriation provided by HB617 will fund this spring's start-up costs as well as the remaining costs of the 1984 camps. Both start-up and continuing costs for the 1985 camps would then be included in the State Arts Council's FY85 funding request to the legislature.

FINE ARTS CAMPS MEET A CRITICAL NEED:

These camps provide intensive arts experiences in music, theatre, dance, visual arts, and creative writing for Alaskan students who would otherwise not have them. Although some students have arts activities available in their communities, most students have their first and only opportunity to explore their talents and interests at camp. The camps also provide a valuable alternative for students who do not excel at sports or academics but who nonetheless have talents that must be developed--for their benefit and the state's.

In 1983, the three camps served a total of 731 students from 67 Alaskan communities, villages, and logging camps.

TOTAL BUDGETS AND ASCA GRANTS OF THE FINE ARTS CAMPS:

The funds to cover the remainder of the total budget are raised from businesses, organizations, corporations, schools, individuals, and students' camp tuition.

## CHILKOOT CULTURAL CAMP

In the summer of 1982, Austin Hammond and members of Chilkoot Indian Association constructed a smokehouse at the old Chilkoot village site to teach young people how to dry fish and berries for winter food supply. An educational permit was issued by the Alaska Department of Fish and Game to take by traditional means 200 sockeye and 200 pinks from the Chilkoot River from July 1st to August 30 for this purpose. Because of the late construction of the smokehouse, no fish were taken or processed that summer.

In 1983, as soon as the snow left the ground at Chilkoot Village, Austin and members of Chilkoot Association began constructing a traditional walkway and fish boxes in the river. Twelve foot long poles with gaff hooks were made. A new educational permit was issued from the Department of Fish and Game for 200 sockeyes and 200 pinks to be taken from the river.

Platforms were built for 2 tents and an outhouse was made. The Raven's Wing building was donated and moved from the Folta house at Lutak to the campsite. This building was used for housing a caretaker, cooking and dining as well as evening storytelling.

Chilkoot Tlingit Cultural Camp was held in a 10-day session in August, 1983, with these campers travelling from Juneau, Hoonah and Haines to attend the camp:

The registration cost for each of these participants was \$100.00 which covered the cost of food at \$7.00/day and a supplies fee of \$3.00/day.

The campers arrived by ferry and were transported by truck to Raven House to see the film "Haa Shagoon", moving then out to the campsite. Most of the camp construction was completed by this time, but the youth were challenged to make their tents homey by adding shelves, mattresses, extra blankets, mirrors, etc.

Three children from Haines attended camp on a day-camp basis.  
These children were:

Rob Figdor  
Reed Scott X  
Leif Asper

Each camper made a drum with steamed wooden base and goat hide skin drum head. David Andrews helped us know how to stretch the drum heads over the frames. Some of the campers sketched their clan designs on their drums and will paint them during the winter. Several hours each day the youths practiced singing, drumming and dancing skills. They took great pride in teaching and learning from each other. Some campers who had never sung or danced before performed in Tlingit Park with the Eagle-Raven Dancers. Dixie Johnson came several afternoons to help the campers learn new songs.

Austin Hammond worked closely with each of the children, telling Raven stories, the history of Chilkoot Villate and shared "how to live" stories. This was the real magic of camp. The youth listened intently to the stories and yearned for more opportunities to learn from their elders.

Campers took part in the Deer Rock Celebration held along the Chilkoot River to commemorate the reconstruction of Deer Rock. They picked berries and made fried seaweed for the feast which followed the celebration. The campers also spent one day at the Southeast Alaska State Fair.

Each camper cut five fish to be dried in the smokehouse. The fish were donated by Fish and Game from the Chilkoot weir samples. The youth shared this fish with visitors and took some to their homes to share with their families. Some campers prepared dried berry cakes.

Although the campers fished every day, no fish were caught by gaff hooks. The Elders believe this is because the fish are not schooling after they come through the weir one by one, and the fish are moving up to the lee on the opposite side of the river.

Next year, in the early spring, more rocks will be moved when the water is low to encourage the fish to move again in their traditional channels.

PROPOSED PLANS FOR CHILKOOT CULTURAL CAMP  
FOR July and August, 1984

The Chilkoot Indian Association would like to plan two sessions for camp this summer, with the possibility of a weekend retreat for older teens and young adults.

The first session will be for young children ages 5-9, as a day-camp experience. The children will come from Haines each day for learning activities, including:

- fish cutting
- fire building
- berry picking
- making a family tree
- listening to stories
- making puppets to play the stories
- making headbands with beaded designs

Lunch will be provided to provide opportunities for children to sample Tlingit foods. We hope to do some outdoor cooking as a part of this experience. Resource teachers who are skilled in Tlingit food preparation, stories and history, and beadwork will be hired to teach their skills for two hours in the morning and two hours in the afternoon of each of these days for a one week period. The video-equipment owned by the Chilkoot Association will record the happenings. The fee will be \$50.00

The second session will be a 10-day, live-in experience for youth ages 10-14. Each family will pay \$100.00 which will include food and camp expense costs. The learning activities will include:

- catching fish in the river
- cutting fish for drying
- fire building
- survival skills in the mountains and woods
- making a family tree
- berry picking
- making berry cakes
- carving skills
- beading skills
- drummaking
- listening to stories
- learning to retell stories

Teachers skilled in preparing Tlingit foods, survival skills, beading, and stories and history will be hired to teach their skills for four hours each day for ten days.

The Institute of Alaska Native Arts will provide Artist-In-Residence funds for Nathan Jackson to teach carving and design skills to the campers in the 10-day session. He will live at camp with the youth.

We have the committment of three adult volunteers who will also live at camp as counselors for the 10-day session.

We will hire a full-time cook who is skilled in preparing Tlingit camp food. We want to do some outdoor cooking this year.

We are seeking funds for the following items and we welcome your support:

- camp tools and equipment
- activities supplies
- cook's salary
- Raven's Wing repairs
- camper scholarships

## BACKGROUND

Alaska's arts camps which begin typically in early July, get a major portion of their money through grants from Alaska State Council on the Arts. The Arts Council, which gets its money from the Department of Education through the Legislature does not know what its budget for arts camps grants will be until a month or two into the new fiscal year, that is, not until the arts camps are in progress or even completely over. This has been a serious management problem.

## THE BILL

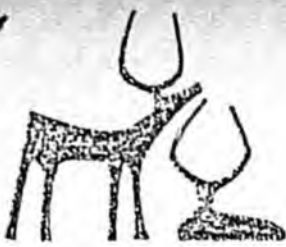
HB 617 makes an FY84 supplemental appropriation to Alaska State Council on the Arts equal to the amount the Arts Council expects to grant the arts camps in FY85. This allows the Council to hold whatever money it eventually receives from the legislature for FY85 in reserve for the beginning of FY86. The bill is thus a forward funding mechanism which allows both the camps and the Arts Council to make their budgets based on the money they have, not what they hope to get. It is a one time only appropriation.

## THE BUDGET

Both the House and Senate Education Finance Subcommittees have added \$180 to the FY85 Arts Council budget for the purpose of forward funding arts camps. We are extremely pleased as this would correct much of the problem after July 1985. However, only a supplemental appropriation to the FY84 budget will correct the problem in this fiscal year, in time for this summer's arts camps. In addition, the \$180 appropriation is \$25,000 below the figure needed for the four arts camps expected to qualify for grants from the Arts Council.

Dear Alison:

While I was in Juneau last week for budget meetings, we discussed the Fine Arts Camps in the state which receive funding through the Alaska State Council on the Arts. I mentioned that the Arts Council and the Fine Arts Camps were not satisfied with the present method of funding: grants which occur either at the beginning or end of the state's fiscal year and which do not allow for advance planning or proper cash flows. We and the camps suggested that the State Arts Council request a budget increment in our FY85 grants budget to begin forward funding for the camps.

Last week you suggested that since this would be a one time cost, a special appropriation might be a better solution than a budget increase. I am writing to say that I am in agreement and to provide you with some figures on the camps. Our goal for FY85 is to obtain funds for both the management and programs costs of the 1984 summer season as well as to grant out funds for the 1985 summer season. Program and planning costs for all three fine arts camps begin mounting up in January of a given year; Arts Council grants are not awarded until late July of the same year - after the camp season is over. The forward funding process will enable us to grant funds in July for programs and planning which will begin in January and end in mid-July. The special appropriation will enable us to "get over the hump" in terms of the extra money needed for the first year of the program.



Since we are attempting to overcome a lack of funds for advance planning and to begin forward funding of all three camps, I would suggest that the Legislature be approached for a special appropriation of \$ 200,000.

Arts Council staff is still in the process of revising our project grant application for use by the Fine Arts Camps. As soon as that is done and the completed applications have been submitted to us, I will send copies to you. The applications will give you a detailed breakdown of what grant funds are used for, proportion of cash match, tuitions, etc.

STAFF REVIEW

House Bill 631, "An Act relating to runaway children," by Representative John Liska, adds a new subsection to AS 47.10.080 (Delinquent Minors and Children in Need of Aid. Judgements and Orders) that makes certain minors wards of the state if they refuse to return home, or stay at home, as ordered by a court; and requires the Department of Health and Social Services to place the child into a child care facility. !

The bill also amends sections that outline legal custody, guardianship and residual rights and responsibilities by addition of language stating that a parent has no responsibility for support of a minor child who refuses to voluntarily reside with the parent and whose legal custody has been transferred from the parent by court decree, unless custody has been transferred from the parent because of abandonment, abuse, or neglect.

The bill also amends the section relating to temporary detention of a minor, providing that a peace officer, upon receiving a report that a minor is evading the person having legal custody, shall make reasonable efforts to locate and detain the minor for the sole purpose of either returning the minor to the proper custodian or taking the minor to an office specified by the Department of Health and Social Services.

The bill does not provide for an effective date and becomes law 90 days after the Governor signs the bill.
