Jurisdiction generally. — The question of a court's jurisdiction goes to its power to hear and adjudicate the subject matter in a given case. *K.C.M. v. State*, Sup. Ct. Op. No. 2326 (File No. 4764), 627 P.2d 607 (1981).

Where a court is one of general jurisdiction, such as a superior court, it has traditionally been regarded as having the power to hear all controversies which may be brought before a court within a legal bounds of rights or remedies, except insofar as has been expressly and unequiv-

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Order for sterilization of mental incompetent. — A superior court, as a court of general jurisdiction, does have, as part of its inherent *parens patriae* authority, the power to entertain and act upon a petition seeking an order authorizing the sterilization of a mental incompetent. *K.C.M. v. State*, Sup. Ct. Op. No. 2326 (File No. 4764), 627 P.2d 607 (1981).

(Proposed Amendment)

Section 10. Commission on Judicial Conduct. The Commission on Judicial Conduct shall consist of nine members, as follows: three persons who are justices or judges of state courts, elected by the justices and judges of state courts; three members who have practiced law in this state for ten years, appointed by the governor from nominations made by the governing body of the organized bar and subject to confirmation by a majority of the members of the legislature in joint session; and three persons who are not judges, retired judges, or members of the state bar, appointed by the governor and subject to confirmation by a majority of the members of the legislature in joint session. In addition to being subject to impeachment under Section 12 of this article, a justice or judge may be disqualified from acting as such and may be suspended, removed from office, retired, or censured by the supreme court upon the recommendation of the commission. The powers and duties of the commission and the bases for judicial disqualification shall be established by law.

Editor's notes. — This amendment was proposed by Legislative Resolve No. 36, SLA 1981, and will be voted upon at the next general election to be held in

November, 1982.

Section 8. Judicial Council. The judicial council shall consist of seven members. Three attorney members shall be appointed for six-year terms by the governing body of the organized state bar. Three non-attorney members shall be appointed for six-year terms by the governor subject to confirmation by a majority of the members of the legislature in joint session. Vacancies shall be filled for the unexpired term in like manner. Appointments shall be made with due consideration to area representation and without regard to political affiliation. The chief justice of the supreme court shall be ex-officio the seventh member and chairman of the judicial council. No member of the judicial council, except the chief justice, may hold any other office or position of profit under the United States or the State. The judicial council shall act by concurrence of four or more members and according to rules which it adopts.

"Term". — With the exception of Alaska Const., art. IV, §§ 4 and 13, wherever "term" or "service at the pleasure of" appears in the constitutional text originally adopted, the reference is to a period of service for a particular office. *Buckalew v. Holloway*, Sup. Ct. Op. No. 1938 (File No. 4058), 604 P.2d 240 (1979).

Section 9. Additional Duties. The judicial council shall conduct studies for improvement of the administration of justice, and make reports and recommendations to the supreme court and to the legislature at intervals of not more than two years. The judicial council shall perform other duties assigned by law.

Section 10. Commission on Judicial Qualifications. I was asked to submit a resume to the Governor for his consideration of my nomination by the Alaska Bar Association to the Commission on Judicial Conduct. I do not have a resume because it has been over fifteen years since I have applied for a job and I simply have not kept copies of the very old resumes. I will set forth concisely, however, my background in this letter and request that it suffice in place of a formal resume. I hope this doesn't cause any inconvenience but since the request is on quite short notice I felt this was the fastest way to comply.

Professional Experience





Jurisdiction generally. — The question of a court's jurisdiction goes to its power to hear and adjudicate the subject matter in a given case. *K.C.M. v. State*, Sup. Ct. Op. No. 2326 (File No. 4764), 627 P.2d 607 (1981).

Where a court is one of general jurisdiction, such as a superior court, it has traditionally been regarded as having the power to hear all controversies which may be brought before a court within a legal bounds of rights or remedies, except insofar as has been expressly and unequiv-

ocally denied by the state's constitution or statutes. *K.C.M. v. State*, Sup. Ct. Op. No. 2326 (File No. 4764), 627 P.2d 607 (1981).

Order for sterilization of mental incompetent. — A superior court, as a court of general jurisdiction, does have, as part of its inherent *perens patriae* authority, the power to entertain and act upon a petition seeking an order authorizing the sterilization of a mental incompetent. *K.C.M. v. State*, Sup. Ct. Op. No. 2326 (File No. 4764), 627 P.2d 607 (1981).

(Proposed Amendment)

Section 10. Commission on Judicial Conduct. The Commission on Judicial Conduct shall consist of nine members, as follows: three persons who are justices or judges of state courts, elected by the justices and judges of state courts; three members who have practiced law in this state for ten years, appointed by the governor from nominations made by the governing body of the organized bar and subject to confirmation by a majority of the members of the legislature in joint session; and three persons who are not judges, retired judges, or members of the state bar, appointed by the governor and subject to confirmation by a majority of the members of the legislature in joint session. In addition to being subject to impeachment under Section 12 of this article, a justice or judge may be disqualified from acting as such and may be suspended, removed from office, retired, or censured by the supreme court upon the recommendation of the commission. The powers and duties of the commission and the bases for judicial disqualification shall be established by law.

Editor's notes. — This amendment was proposed by Legislative Resolve No. 36, SLA 1981, and will be voted upon at the next general election to be held in

November, 1982.

Cross references. — For provisions on the powers and duties of the Commission on Judicial Qualifications, see AS

Section 8. Judicial Council. The judicial council shall consist of seven members. Three attorney members shall be appointed for six-year terms by the governing body of the organized state bar. Three non-attorney members shall be appointed for six-year terms by the governor subject to confirmation by a majority of the members of the legislature in joint session. Vacancies shall be filled for the unexpired term in like manner. Appointments shall be made with due consideration to area representation and without regard to political affiliation. The chief justice of the supreme court shall be ex-officio the seventh member and chairman of the judicial council. No member of the judicial council, except the chief justice, may hold any other office or position of profit under the United States or the State. The judicial council shall act by concurrence of four or more members and according to rules which it adopts.

"Term". — With the exception of Alaska Const., art. IV, §§ 4 and 13, wherever "term" or "service at the pleasure of" appears in the constitutional text originally adopted, the reference is to a period of service for a particular office. *Buckalew v. Holloway*, Sup. Ct. Op. No. 1988 (File No. 4058), 604 P.2d 240 (1979).
Meaning of phrase "position of profit". — See *Begich v. Jefferson*, Sup. Ct. Op. No. 481 (File No. 894), 441 P.2d 27 (1968).

And its intent. — The term "position of profit" was intended to prohibit all other salaried non-temporary employment under the United States or the State of Alaska. *Begich v. Jefferson*, Sup. Ct. Op. No. 481 (File No. 894), 441 P.2d 27 (1968).

Section 9. Additional Duties. The judicial council shall conduct studies for improvement of the administration of justice, and make reports and recommendations to the supreme court and to the legislature at intervals of not more than two years. The judicial council shall perform other duties assigned by law.

Section 10. Commission on Judicial Qualifications. The Commission on Judicial Qualifications shall consist of nine members, as follows: one justice of the supreme court, elected by the justices of the supreme court; three judges of the superior court, elected by the judges of the superior court; one judge of the district court, elected by the judges of the district court; two members who have practiced law in this state for ten years, appointed by the governing body of the organized bar; and two persons who are not judges, retired judges, or members of the state bar, appointed by the governor and subject to confirmation by a majority of the members of the legislature in joint session. In addition to being subject to impeachment under section 12 of this article, a justice or judge may be disqualified from acting as such and may be suspended, removed from office, retired, or censured by the supreme court upon the recommendation of the commission. The powers and duties of the commission and the bases for judicial disqualification shall be established by law. [Amendment approved August 27, 1968]






