
Dear Senator:

This is to let you know that we support Legislation (SSSB 172), to repeal the Little Davis-Bacon Act in Alaska (SSSB 172).

Almost all capitol projects of the City of Nulato are funded directly or indirectly by the State. Declining state revenue and increasing difficulty of acquiring state funding make it more important to stretch each available dollar as far as it will go. In attempting to achieve this goal of effective and efficient use of state funding, the City of Nulato finds the Little Davis-Bacon Act not only counter-productive but harmful as well, since it would reduce cost-efficiency on capitol projects and create an inflated wage scale on other programs as well. The City of Nulato feels that it would be almost impossible to provide capitol improvements as well as other municipal programs if union-level wages are mandatory. Projects such as water and sewer system, road improvements and public facilities could be threatened. In effect, necessary projects and programs that would benefit all citizens of Nulato could be threatened by an attempt to benefit a limited number of employees.

We feel that the Little Davis-Bacon Act does not allow for efficient use of available funds (not just for the City of Nulato but for all recipients of State funds). We feel that if the Little Davis-Bacon Act is repealed, we could provide a much more efficient use of available State funds, while still paying a fair wage to employees. The more efficiently and effectively we can spend available State funds, the more will be left available for future spending; at the same time, if funds can be effectively spent, the need for additional funds may actually decline. For these reasons, we ask for your support in repealing the Little Davis-Bacon Act in Alaska.



WHEREAS, a persistent need of funds to construct and maintain schools, water & sewer projects, airports, etc. are inflated due to the requirement stipulated under the Little Davis-Bacon Act for Alaska; and

WHEREAS, the States Capital could be distributed more evenly and rural Communities like Nunapitchuk could be awarded much needed sic needs like an airport; and

WHEREAS, the Reagan administration has cut federal programs drastically in U.S. thereby greatly increasing rural villages dependence in the State of Alaska; and

STATEMENT OF ALASKA NATIVE BROTHERHOOD, ROBERT WILLARD, EXECUTIVE VICE PRESIDENT, RE: TITLE 36 - ALASKA STATUTES.

The Alaska Legislature has before it Senate Bill No. 172 and House Bill No. 378, "An Act relating to wage rates on public construction," or the so-called "Little Davis-Bacon Act."

The Alaska Native Brotherhood is the recipient of a State appropriation in the amount of one million dollars (\$1 Million) to construct a Juneau Pilot Project - Community Building. Upon notification that the Governor would sign the appropriation measure into law, the ANB immediately proceeded with development planning. In this process encounter came to Title 36 of the Alaska Statutes namely the Little Davis-Bacon Act (hereinafter Davis-Bacon).

If the ANB Project were to fall under the interpolation and application of Davis-Bacon, it goes without question that the costs would increase by 25 - 30%. A value engineering report by qualified consultants have confirmed this reality.

In our opinion, and that of our consultants, if strict application of Davis-Bacon had been applied, this project would not have been feasible, because of the escalated costs.

It should be made clear that the Alaska Native Brotherhood, or its affiliates, is not opposed to unions -- or organized labor. There are some union or contractor practices which we are not in total agreement, but in the overall sense, the ANB is not necessarily averse to unions.

Upon reflection of the ANB project, and that of some projects which have been administered by the Tlingit and Haida Regional Housing Authority over the past ten years, it can be shown that full application of the Little Davis-Bacon Act resulted in increased construction costs


and created artificial costs of labor, thus decreasing the number of housing units that could have been built. Tlingit and Haida administrators estimate that by virtue of full application of the Davis-Bacon Act 23 - 27% more housing units could have been built. That equivalates to approximately one hundred and fifty (150) more families that could have had homes. The imposition of Davis-Bacon interpolated and applied to the rural areas have resulted in the creation of artificial costs of labor.

It is not the intent of the ANB to move towards the minimum wage. It is our concern that the "prevailing wage" as set by the Department of Labor in the populated areas and, as applied to the adjacent rural proximity of that urban center may not be reflective of the fair market value of labor and skilled services in the broad spectrum of enterprise in Alaska.

Moreover, this reality may be influenced by special interest groups such as unions and/or organized general contractors, and artificial influences such as labor-related requirements imposed by this legislation.

The Alaska Native Brotherhood, and its affiliates, urge passage of Senate Bill 172 and House Bill 378 thereby repealing Alaska Statutes 36.05.

AMENDMENTS TO "LITTLE BACON-DAVIS ACT"

WHEREAS Title 36 of the Alaska Statutes known as the "Little Davis-Bacon Act" is intended to assure that workers receive fair compensation on construction projects by state and local governments and to avoid undercutting of local wages by importing outside workers; and

WHEREAS the prevailing wage for local workers varies substantially throughout the state; and

WHEREAS the present laws actually encourage importing construction firms and labor from the large populations centers of the state and may artificially inflate the costs of construction for local governments beyond actual prevailing costs, which exacerbates local unemployment problems; and

WHEREAS local public construction is primarily a function of local government and administration and policy should be established at a local level to the greatest extent possible;

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Alaska Municipal League urges amendments to Title 36 consistent with the premises stated above as follows:

1. To provide for local government control in establishing prevailing wages, based on local needs and conditions.
2. To clarify the definition of public construction and, in particular, that public construction does not include projects of non-profit corporations funded by pass-through grants or projects for maintenance, repair, or minor construction.

WE URGENTLY RECOMMEND THIS BILL TO YOUR FAVORABLE ATTENTION BECAUSE IT IS A VEHICLE FOR CORRECTING DEFICIENCIES IN AS 36.05.

AS THIS STATUTE PRESENTLY EXISTS, ALL WAGE RATES ON PUBLIC CONSTRUCTION PROJECTS FUNDED BY GRANTS ADMINISTERED BY COMMUNITY AND REGIONAL AFFAIRS (AND POSSIBLY OTHER STATE AGENCIES) TO MUNICIPALITIES, PUBLIC NON-PROFIT CORPORATIONS AND OTHER COMMUNITY INTEREST GROUPS ARE MANDATED BY A DEPARTMENT OF LABOR SCALE TITLED "LABORERS & MECHANICS MINIMUM RATES OF PAY" DATED 10/15/82. NOT ALL COMMUNITIES ARE GEARED UP TO OUR FINANCED WELL ENOUGH TO PAY THESE WAGES AND THEY SERIOUSLY DISTORT OTHER WAGE AND SALARY PLANS EXISTING IN THE DIFFERENT AREAS INCLUDING THE FUELING OF UNNECESSARY INFLATION.

FOR EXAMPLE, A LINEMAN IN DILLINGHAM WOULD HAVE TO BE PAID A BASIC HOURLY RATE OF \$25.15 PER HOUR AND A CABLE SPLICER RATE WOULD BE \$26.90 PER HOUR. THESE RATES REPRESENT AN APPROXIMATE 25% INCREASE OVER NUSHAGAK ELECTRIC'S PREVAILING WAGE RATES WHICH ARE AMONG THE HIGHEST IN DILLINGHAM. OUR PERCEPTION OF EXISTING AS 36.05 IS THAT THESE RATES ARE PROBABLY GEARED TO LARGE CONTRACTORS' BENEFIT AND PROMOTED BY THE UNIONS IN THE RAIL BELT WHO ARE EAGER TO SEE THEIR CONSTITUENTS GET THE CONSTRUCTION JOBS IN THE RURAL AS WELL AS THE URBAN CENTERS OF THE STATE.

AS YOU ARE NO DOUBT WELL AWARE, THE RURAL ECONOMY DOES NOT ENJOY THE STABILITY THAT IS GENERALLY PREVALENT IN THE RAILBELT OR SOUTH EASTERN AREAS OF THE STATE AND WE MUST COMPENSATE FOR THIS FACT OF LIFE BY DOING THINGS OURSELVES TO REALIZE EFFICIENCIES NOT ALWAYS FOUND ELSEWHERE.

IN 1982, THE LEGISLATURE APPROVED A GRANT OF \$539,000 TO NUSHAGAK ELECTRIC WHICH WAS TO BE ADMINISTERED BY COMMUNITY AND REGIONAL AFFAIRS TO EXTEND A WASTE HEAT SUPPLY SYSTEM TO THE HIGH SCHOOL, COURT HOUSE, SOUTHWEST REGIONAL SCHOOL DISTRICT AND TO STATE SHOP FACILITIES. THE MANDATED WAGE RATES MAKE IT VERY DIFFICULT TO PERFORM THE PROJECT IN AN EFFICIENT MANNER BECAUSE THESE RATES ARE SIGNIFICANTLY HIGHER THAN LOCAL RATES AND THE PROJECT COST WAS BASED ON LOCAL WAGE RATE LEVELS. Dear Representative Hartmann:

We urgently recommend this bill to your favorable attention because it is a vehicle for correcting deficiencies in AS 35.05.

As this statute presently exists, all wage rates on public construction projects funded by grants administered by Community and Regional Affairs (and possibly other state agencies) to municipalities, public cooperative corporations and other community interest groups are mandated by a Department of Labor scale titled "Laborers & Mechanics Minimum Rates of Pay" dated 10/15/62. Not all communities are geared up to or financed well enough to pay these wages and they seriously distort other wage and salary plans existing in the different areas including the fueling of unnecessary inflation.

For example, a lineman in Illingham would have to be paid a basic hourly rate of \$25.15 per hour and a cable splicer rate would be \$26.90 per hour. These rates represent an approximate 25% increase over Nushagak Electric's prevailing wage rates which are among the highest in Illingham. Our perception of existing AS 36.05 is that these rates are probably geared to large contractors' benefit and protected by the unions in the rail belt who are eager to see their conditions get the construction jobs in the rural as well as the urban centers of the state.

As you are no doubt well aware, the rural economy does not enjoy the stability that is generally prevalent in the railbelt or South eastern areas of the state and we must compensate for this fact of life by doing things ourselves to realize efficiencies not always found elsewhere.

In 1962, the legislature approved a grant of \$539,000 to Nushagak Electric which was to be administered by Community and Regional Affairs to extend a waste heat supply system to the high school, court house, Southwest Regional School District and to State Shop facilities. The mandated wage rates make it very difficult to perform the project in an efficient manner because these rates are significantly higher than local rates and the project cost was based on local wage rate levels. Therefore, the

scope of the project will have to be reduced if NEC is forced to adopt wage rates mandated by the Department of Labor. This concept appears to be a very poor allocation of resources.

We would recommend that SB 172 as written be slightly amended to read as follows:

SEC. 36.05.130 APPLICABILITY OF CHAPTER

This chapter does not apply to public construction under contract to a municipality having a population of 5,000 or less or to a public non-profit corporation or to a public utility as defined in AS 42.05 operating in a community of 5,000 or less and this section is to be effective for all contracts executed after 1/1/83.

Dear Senator Mulcahy:

We urgently recommend this bill to your favorable attention because it is a vehicle for correcting deficiencies in AS 36.05.

As this statute presently exists, all wage rates on public construction projects funded by grants administered by Community and Regional Affairs (and possibly other state agencies) to municipalities, public non-profit corporations and other community interest groups are mandated by a Department of Labor scale titled "Laborers & Mechanics Minimum Rates of Pay" dated 10/15/82. Not all communities are geared up to or financed well enough to pay these wages and they seriously distort other wage and salary plans existing in the different areas including the fueling of unnecessary inflation.

For example, a lineman in Dillingham would have to be paid a basic hourly rate of \$25.15 per hour and a cable splicer rate would be \$26.90 per hour. These rates represent an approximate .5% increase over Nushagak Electric's prevailing wage rates which are among the highest in Dillingham. Our perception of existing AS 36.05 is that these rates are probably geared to large contractors' benefit and promoted by the unions in the rail belt who are eager to see their constituents get the construction jobs in the rural as well as the urban centers of the state.

As you are no doubt well aware, the rural economy does not enjoy the stability that is generally prevalent in the railbelt or South eastern areas of the state and we must compensate for this fact of life by doing things ourselves to realize efficiencies not always found elsewhere.

In 1982, the legislature approved a grant of \$539,000 to Nushagak Electric which was to be administered by Community and Regional Affairs to extend a waste heat supply system to the high school, court house, Southwest Regional School District and to State Shop facilities. The mandated wage rates make it very difficult to perform the project in an efficient manner because these rates are significantly higher than local rates and the project cost was based on local wage rate levels. Therefore, the

scope of the project will have to be reduced if NEC is forced to adopt wage rates mandated by the Department of Labor. This concept appears to be a very poor allocation of resources.

We would recommend that SB 172 as written be slightly amended to read as follows:


SEC. 36.05.130 APPLICABILITY OF CHAPTER
This chapter does not apply to public construction under contract to a municipality having a population of 5,000 or less or to a public non-profit corporation or to a public utility as defined in AS 42.05 operating in a community of 5,000 or less and this section is to be effective for all contracts executed after 1/1/83.

Since Nushagak Electric Co-operative, Inc. has not signed the contract with Community and Regional Affairs as of this writing, I included the effective date of 1/1/83 in my suggested change of SEC. 36.05.130 above in order to be covered under any possible change in this law.

We would appreciate your attention to this matter because we feel that the concept of a high standardized state wage rate mandated by law is not in the best interest of especially the rural communities that have generally made a practice of maximizing their resources in the most efficient manner possible.

We live in a small community with a high rate of unemployment. The opportunities for developing our community are limited, and the options for employment are very scarce, except for fishing, trapping and seasonal labor. Few of our residents have vocational training or high school education. Even if the people had education or vocational training, there are few jobs for which they would qualify in the community.

The Title 36 requirement has increased the cost of construction in our community. As a small community it is hard to justify needed facilities and services based on a population count. Title 36 forces small communities to import high cost labor when there is a ready and willing labor force available.

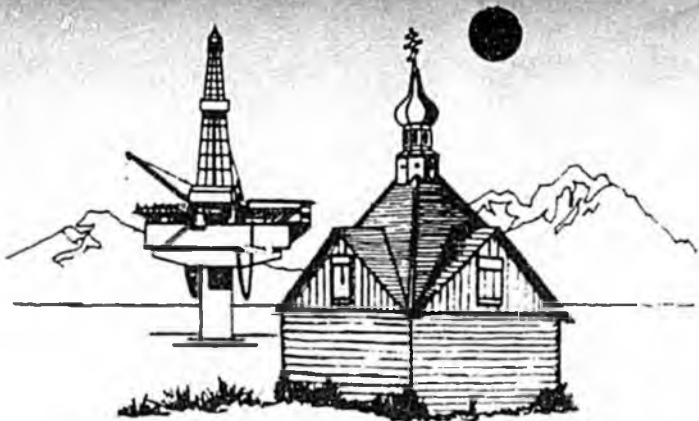



Detail Analysis Senate Bill 174

Under this bill, the Department of Labor will be required to closely scrutinize certified payrolls to assure that residents of an area, which has been designated as an area impacted by economic disaster, are given first preference for employment, where they are available and qualified, so that the economic effects of alleviating the disaster will be maximized. If resident labor is not available, the contractor will inform the department of the number of additional workers needed, the positions to be filled, and the efforts made at recruitment in the area. The department will investigate and, if it is determined that a good-faith effort has been made by the contractor, will authorize the recruitment of qualified and available workers from areas adjoining the area impacted by such economic disaster; then followed by residents of the region; and then by residents of the State at large. This expansion of auditing and investigative service will be significant and labor intensive.

Staffing would provide a technician in each regional office for full-time resident audits. The staffing would also provide a full-time investigator in each office to review audit results, make investigations of violations uncovered by the audits, and investigate complaints from sources outside the agency. The investigators would have a travel budget which provides a quick reaction capability to remote job sites where a majority of the violations occur.

Thank you for your comprehensive letter outlining your thoughts on the current practice of awarding contracts to out-of-state bidders. You raise some interesting points, and I do share your concerns.

I am a co-sponsor of two pieces of legislation that are a direct result of comments such as yours. SB 174 would require that worker hours on state funded construction projects be performed at least 50 percent by state residents. SB 293 further defines a joint venture to require that both parties qualify as Alaska bidders. This should ensure that an "Irby-Northface situation" does not again occur. Both these bills are progressing through the Committee process.

Jim, I have forwarded a copy of your letter to Senator Eliason, Chairman of the Labor and Commerce Committee, for his information.

Again, I appreciate hearing from you.

Have you noticed lately the amount of lower 48 general contractors that are bidding and are receiving big multi-million dollar contracts here in Alaska? I'm not talking about just a few thousand dollars, but hundreds of millions of dollars.

I receive a computer read out from an information system called "Dodge Scan". This information system gives the contractors information of projects that ^{are} ~~is~~ in the planning stages, bidding stages, low bidders, and start-up dates. This information system also tells you every general contractor's name, address, and telephone number. You cannot believe ^A the number of lower 48 contractors that are bidding on contracts here in Alaska, and also the ones that are GETTING these big multi-million dollar contracts!... All the way from New York!

Not only are the lower 48 contractors getting these multi-million dollar contracts, they are bringing 95% of their work force from their home office with them here to Alaska to do the work on these projects. Also, 75% of lower 48 contractors who win these bids, do not even have an office here in Alaska. All materials are bought in the lower 48 and are barged to the site to complete these projects. So if these contractors are awarded these big fat multi-million dollar contracts, bring 95% of their work force here to do the work on the projects, and buy 99% of their materials to complete the project from the lower 48, please tell me where do all these millions go? Do you think these lower 48 contractors bank all these millions here in Alaska banks? I hardly think so, and what about all the monies that are paid out for labor and material...


My suggestion^s is to give our Alaska state contractors, who have offices here in Alaska, and have Alaska license plates on their vehicles, a 15% advantage over the lower 48 contractors. With this 15% advantage, our state contractors could purchase all or 95% of all materials here in Alaska.

15% advantage

The way this method would work is as follows: Alaska state contractors would show all invoice slips of proof of purchase of buying materials in Alaska. Of course, there would be special items that are listed in the bid spec's or plans that our state suppliers do not have in stock and would have to be ordered from the lower 48 states, but 95% of all materials, monies and labor would be left in the state of Alaska.

Final Plea: Let's make it mand^gatory that all sub-contractors bids are open and read prior to opening of the low awarded general's bid. These sub-contractors spend lots of money and time figuring these bids. Also, there is too much hanky panky of han^tling these sub-contractors' bids by general contractors. These general contractors know who the low sub-contractors' bidder is before they submit their bids. If they didn't, they couldn't submit names of all low sub-contractors in same sealed envelopes before bid opening time.


Over the past three weeks, I have received numerous letters, telephone calls and POM's concerning this legislation. You and I, and the people, want to strengthen the employment position of Alaskans in the face of outside employers using outside labor on local projects.

SB 174 was fashioned after an executive order approved in White v. Mass, Council of Constr. Emp., the United States Supreme court decision announced on February 28, 1983. The Court upheld a City of Boston executive order which required at least 50% bona fide resident hire on "any construction project funded in whole or in part by City funds, or funds which... the City expends or administers, and to which the city is signatory." The Court, in the face of a federal constitution Commerce Clause challenge, held that "the application of the mayor's executive order to the contracts in question did not violate the Commerce Clause...".

A recent Washington Supreme Court decision, has cast legal doubt about the validity of AS 36.10 as presently constituted. SB 174 takes advantage of the White decision and puts AS 36.10 in a form that should create a constitutionally permissible employment preference statute.

Subsection (a) addresses employment preference in municipalities only, thus falling well within the boundaries established in White, and avoiding the Commerce Clause challenge.

Subsection (b) addresses employment preference on construction projects partly or wholly funded by state money. This subsection requires that 95 per cent of all workers on such projects be Alaska residents. It also requires that each craft of workers be composed of 95% Alaskan residents. This craft by craft provision will insure that Alaskans will be offered jobs in all craft areas and prevent the importation of a particular craft of workers at the expense of Alaskan residents.

During the years when the Trans-Alaska Pipeline was being built, the department maintained an effective resident hire program, both within the construction of the pipeline and public construction contracts. A resident hire unit for enforcement of Title 36 was located within the Wage and Hour Administration, which was staffed with 12 employees, eight professional and four clerical support. Their activities were supportive of the activities of the three staff members assigned to public construction enforcement. Many newcomers finding it difficult to obtain oilfield work turned to traditional construction activities for employment. The resident requirements for "pipeline" employment were substantially more stringent than those for public construction. The result was that employers hiring for public construction and the Title 36 enforcement unit could rely on the activities of the "pipeline" enforcement unit for much of the leg-work required to verify residency. It was a simple matter to check for the "resident card" required under Title 38.


In 1978 the Supreme Court in the matter of Hicklin v. Orbeck, overturned the residency aspect of Title 38. Subsequently, in the budget process all twelve "pipeline" positions were deleted and the entire staff was laid off. Consequently, since 1978 the department has not had any positions funded for enforcement of resident hire.

The Department recently completed a survey to determine the wages paid to non-residents that should have been paid to residents on public construction. Based on this survey we projected the figures for the entire fiscal year ending June 30, 1983. To arrive at the dollar value of wages lost by displaced residents we used a 40 hour work week and a base level wage, plus benefits, for the lowest paid job class subject to our wage surveys. Therefore, the actual dollar value of wages lost to residents in FY 83 would be more than the figure estimated from certified payrolls.

Number of displaced residents:	3767
Estimated value of lost wages:	\$3,394,160.00

The Department supports this legislation which addresses resident preference in light of recent court decisions. This bill, coupled with the necessary staff resources to enforce resident preference, will do much to increase employment opportunities for Alaskan residents.


Over the past three weeks, I have received numerous letters, telephone calls and POM's concerning this legislation. You and I, and the people, want to strengthen the employment position of Alaskans in the face of outside employers using outside labor on local projects.

SB 174 was fashioned after an executive order approved in White v. Mass. Council of Constr. Emp., the United States Supreme court decision announced on February 28, 1983. The Court upheld a City of Boston executive order which required at least 50% bona fide resident hire on "any construction project funded in whole or in part by City funds, or funds which... the City expends or administers, and to which the city is signatory." The Court, in the face of a federal constitution Commerce Clause challenge, held that "the application of the mayor's executive order to the contracts in question did not violate the Commerce Clause...".

A recent Washington Supreme Court decision, has cast legal doubt about the validity of AS 36.10 as presently constituted. SB 174 takes advantage of the White decision and puts AS 36.10 in a form that should create a constitutionally permissible employment preference statute.

Subsection (a) addresses employment preference in municipalities only, thus falling well within the boundaries established in White, and avoiding the Commerce Clause challenge.

Subsection (b) addresses employment preference on construction projects partly or wholly funded by state money. This subsection requires that 95 per cent of all workers on such projects be Alaska residents. It also requires that each craft of workers be composed of 95% Alaskan residents. This craft by craft provision will insure that Alaskans will be offered jobs in all craft areas and prevent the importation of a particular craft of workers at the expense of Alaskan residents.

Dear Co-Sponsor and Colleague:

Attached is a workdraft of a Sponsor Substitute for Senate bill 174. Over the past three weeks, I have received numerous letters, telephone calls and POM's concerning the bill. You and I, and the people, want to strengthen the employment position of Alaskans in the face of outside employers using outside labor on local projects.

The original SB 174 was fashioned after an executive order approved in White v. Mass. Council of Constr. Emp., the United States Supreme court decision announced on February 28, 1983.¹ The Court upheld an executive order issued by Boston Mayor Kevin White. The order provided for at least 50% bona fide Boston resident hire on "any construction project funded in whole or in part by City funds, or funds which ... the City expends or administers, and to which the city is signatory." The Court, in the face of a federal Commerce Clause² challenge, stated that "if the city is a market participant, then the Commerce Clause establishes no barrier to conditions such as these which the city demands for its participation. Impact on out-of-state residents figures in the equation only after it is decided that the city is regulating the market rather than participating in it, ..." 51 LW at 4213. The Court held that "the application of the mayor's executive order to the contracts in question did not violate the Commerce Clause ..." 51 LW at 4214.

The history of Alaska hire law has an interesting twist to it. Some years ago, professedly for the purpose of reducing unemployment in the State, the Alaska Legislature passed an Act entitled "Local Hire Under State Leases." AS 38.40.010 - 38.40.090 (1977). The key provision of "Alaska Hire" was the requirement that "all oil and gas leases, easements, or right-of-way permits for oil or gas pipeline purposes, unitization agreements, or any renegotiation of any of the preceding to which the state is a party" must contain a provision "requiring the employment of qualified Alaska residents" in preference to nonresidents. AS 38.40.030(a)(1977). The fate of that part of the "Alaska Hire" statute, as you well know, was decided in Hicklin v. Orbeck, 437 U.S. 518 (1978). The Supreme Court struck down one statute as contrary to the Privileges and Immunities Clause. (The Privileges and Immunities Clause places the citizens of each state upon the same footing with citizens of other states, so far as the advantages resulting from citizenship in the states are concerned.)

Oddly enough, the current employment preference statute, AS 36.10.010, was on the books at the time "Alaska Hire" was under debate, and had been enacted in 1960. Counsel on both sides of the case went to great lengths to circumvent any discussion of AS 36.10.010. And to date, this statute has never been challenged. Former Attorney General, Wilson Condon, in a June 17, 1982 opinion, file no. J66-282-82, recommended that the statute be enforced as is, and that such enforcement decisions be made subject to "independent budgetary restraints and not doubts as to the constitutionality of the law." Id. at p. 21. But the attorney general's opinion opened by stating that "the Hicklin decision has caused substantial uncertainty regarding the continued validity of AS 36.10." Id. at p. 2.

A recent Washington Supreme Court decision, moreover, casts legal doubt about the validity of AS 36.10. as presently constituted. Laborers Local Union No. 374 v. Felton Construction, 654 P.2d 67 (Wash. 1982). In Felton, the Washington court struck down an employment preference statute,³ under a Privileges and Immunities Clause analysis. The Court relied upon

an earlier Supreme Court case,⁴ and recognized as "fundamental" those privileges and immunities bearing upon the vitality of the Nation as a single entity [treating] all citizens, resident and nonresident, equally."

According to the Court, a two-tiered test must be applied to overcome the Privileges and Immunities Clause. Once within the ambit of the clause, a state must demonstrate a valid independent reason for discriminating against nonresidents by showing:

- (1) something to indicate that non-citizens constitute a peculiar source of the evil at which the discrimination statute is aimed.
- (2) the discrimination bears a substantial relationship and is closely tailored to the particular evil nonresidents present.

The state conceded, in its amicus brief, that the Washington law operated discriminate against nonresident workers in limited context on public works construction.

The proposed Sponsor Substitute takes advantage of the White decision and puts AS 36. 10 in a form that should create a constitutionally permissible employment preference statute. Subsection (a) addresses employment preference in municipalities only, thus falling well within the boundaries established in White, and avoiding the Commerce Clause challenge.

Subsection (b) is fashioned more closely after the language of the executive order approved in White and avoids the possible weakness (overbreath) denoted in Felton, and referred in White. The court in Felton noted as a significant factor in its decision that "[w]hile the economic impact of RCW 39.16 on the private sector is not as far ranging as the Alaska Hire statute, it nevertheless affects private employers who have no direct dealings with the State." The Supreme Court in White intimated, by citing Hicklin, that the overbreath of applicability of a preferential hire law is a significant factor in determining whether violation of Privileges and Immunities has occurred. The Sponsor Substitute takes into consideration the language of Hicklin, Felton, and White to provide a stronger, more defensible Alaska hire law.

Dear Senator:

Have you noticed lately the amount of lower 48 general contractors that are bidding and are receiving big multi-million dollar contracts here in Alaska? I'm not talking about just a few thousand dollars, but hundreds of millions of dollars.

I receive a computer read out from an information system called "Dodge Scan", this information system gives the contractors information of projects that is in the planning stages, bidding stages, low bidders, and start-up dates. This information system also tells you every general contractor's name, address, and telephone number. You cannot believe the number of lower 48 contractors that are bidding on contracts here in Alaska, and also the ones that are GETTING these big multi-million dollar contracts!... All the way from New York!

Not only are the lower 48 contractors getting these multi-million dollar contracts, they are bringing 95% of their work force from their home office with them here to Alaska to do the work on these projects. Also, 75% of lower 48 contractors who win these bids, do not even have an office here in Alaska. All materials are bought in the lower 48 and are barged to the site to complete these projects. So if these contractors are awarded these big fat multi-million dollar contracts, bring 95% of their work force here to do the work on the projects, and buy 99% of their materials to complete the project from the lower 48, please tell me where do all these millions go? Do you think these lower 48 contractors bank all these millions here in Alaska banks, I hardly think so, and what about all the monies that are paid out for labor and material...


no money, no labor, and no material.

My suggestions is to give our Alaska state contractors, who have offices here in Alaska, and have Alaska license plates on their vehicles, a 15% advantage over the lower 48 contractors. With this 15% advantage, our state contractors could purchase all or 95% of all materials here in Alaska.

The way this method would work is as follows: Alaska state contractors would show all invoice slips of proof of purchase of buying materials in Alaska. Of course, there would be special items that are listed in the bid spec's or plans that our state suppliers do not have in stock and would have to be ordered from the lower 48 states, but 95% of all materials, monies and labor would be left in the state of Alaska.

Final Plea: Let's make it manditory that all sub-contractors bids are open and read prior to opening of the low awarded generals bid. These sub-contractors spend lots of money and time figuring these bids. Also, there is too much hanky panky of hanling these sub-contractors bids by general contractors. These general contractors know who the low sub-contractors bidder is before they submit their bids. If they didn't, they couldn't submit names of all low sub-contractors in same sealed envelopes before bid opening time.
