SUMMARY

A Performance Report on the Board of Barbers and Hairdressers

The Board, created in 1980, has a membership of two licensed barbers, two licensed hairdressers, and one public member.

** The Legislative Audit recommended that the Board of Barbers and Hairdressers should be allowed to terminate on June 30, 1984. **

This recommendation was based on the following findings:

- 1.) The Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC) inspects barber shops, hairdressing, or cosmetology establishments for cleanliness and sanitation standards.
- 2.) The Department of Education (DOE) issues Certificates of Registration to barber and beauty schools.
- 3.) The Department of Revenue issues business licenses to those in business.
- 4.) The Division of Occupational Licensing could license practitioners who have met predetermined educational or experience qualifications. These qualifications could be obtained from either schooling or apprenticeship at the hourly requirement already established in regulations.

During their review of the Board's activity, the audit found:

- a.) In two instances after the practical exam, Board members reviewed the grades and changed six individual's failing grades to passing grades;
- b.) State examinations have been held exclusively in Anchorage and Fairbanks. This presents an economic hardship on applicants who must pay travel and living expenses for themselves and their model for up to three days;
- c.) Numerous complaints have been made concerning Board's conduct;
- d.) Board issues duplicate and unnecessary licenses.

** However, if the Board is reestablished, the following changes should be made. **

- 1.) The Department of Education should license schools when issuing the Certificate of Registration.
- 2.) Eliminate the license requirements of a school owner. The necessary information could be recorded with the Department of Education.

3.) The Department of Environmental Conservation should license shop owners.

4.) Licensing of instructors based only on a current practitioner's license and three years of practice, or one year of practice and six hundred hours of school instruction.

5.) Repeal statute which authorizes licensing of shops and requires shop owners be a licensed practitioner.

6.) The Board should improve their procedures for the administration of the State examination.

7.) The Board should not require that a photograph accompany an application for licensure.

Many have been concerned about untrained persons working in the field if the board is terminated. Most seem to think that termination of the board means the end of licensure.

(c) A person who holds a current valid license from a board of barbering in another state, but who has not completed the training or work experience required for a license under AS 08.13.100(d)(2) may complete the training or work experience by practicing under the supervision of a barber who is licensed in the state. A person who wishes to practice barbering under this subsection shall first obtain a temporary permit valid for a period of one year. A supervising barber shall maintain a record of the barbering services performed by the person being supervised. The board may not establish any additional requirements for a supervising barber or a person practicing under this subsection."

Renumber the remaining bill section accordingly.

Dear Senator Eliason:

My letter is to address the Board of Barbers and Hairdressers that are up for Sunset Review by your committee on March 6, 1984 at 1:30 p.m.

I would like to address two issues. One, would be to have statute changes regarding AS .08.13.010, AS .08.13.030 and AS .08.13.040 all of which I have highlighted on page 7 of the attached Statute booklet.

Secondly, I would like to address things I feel would greatly improve the function of the Board. Things that are necessary if the public is to remain unharmed or damaged by anything that could go wrong in a shop or school.

These are my suggestions in regard to Statute changes I feel need to be made; When a person applies for application to serve on this Board that he/she must be licensed in the State of Alaska at least 3 years before even being considered for the appointment. That they may not have a conflict of interest such as being instructors in beauty culture schools or school owners. That they may not test anyone who has been or is currently under their instruction whether it be in a school or in an apprentice program. That a public member may not aid in any form of examinations, practical or written. Senator, I strongly feel that if these changes were made that the Board would not only have more experience but that there would be much less problem in getting an effective job done for the people of this State.

Currently, there is a conflict on our existing Board and that relates directly to this section I have just referred to. After studying the above Statute, I then turned to page 31 in the Statute booklet, which I have also highlighted for your information, and found a regulation made by the Board, that sets duties and functions for proctors at a level far exceeding the current Statute rules and regulations set forth by the Legislators for the Board. This is an area where I see that to be a Board member you need nothing but to be licensed as a Barber or a Hairdresser or be a member of the public. Other than that nothing is required and since our Board was combined in 1980, no Statute change has been introduced to even change the wording so that the two professions are combined to form a complete Board. By this I mean that merely combining the Boards into one unit, that does not complete the job. The entire structure of licenses needs to be broken down and changed. If this is not done then you have conflicts at exams when Barbers are grading Hairdressers and vice-versa. All you get is arguments and that is not the professional approach to anything. These need to be combined, above and beyond any other minor problem currently facing the Board. Another reason I believe problems have arisen stem back to lack of rules and regulations regarding selection of Board members. We have had a rather large turn-over in members of the last four years and I feel that this can be changed with higher standards set.

I would like to mention that when a public member is on the Board that they should be exempt from taking part in any examinations. This is totally unprofessional. I feel that they should observe the other Board members in this function, but in no way should they be allowed to actually grade a student in their performance. Afterall, they are not licensed in this profession and it stands to reason that this makes no sense at all.

A public member is very important to have on a Board but not for grading purposes. A public member can do so many other things relating to the Board afterall, licensing is important but it is not the main function of the Board. The Board is there to protect the public.

Senator, at this time I need to also suggest that the Board be given authority to perform shop and school inspections. I believe this would require statute change as well. Currently the Department of Environmental Conservation and Health and Social Services do inspections. However, I have been a shop owner in Juneau since January 1981 and I was inspected before I could open. I was inspected again in January 1983 and again last month. This inspection was a joke. I felt more like the person inspecting was a building inspector instead of a sanitation inspector. They were so busy picking apart the fact that my shampoo sink did not have a back stop regulator and that I did not have the trim work in my shop complete yet that they totally ignored the fact that I have sun tan beds and how do I clean them or where my refuse goes or how I care for my equipment I use on my customers. My inspection was not on sanitation and I felt they had no right four years down the road to pick my sink apart. The Board knows what to look for in inspections and I feel more inspections will be done by them than is currently being done now. This is the most important area to protect the public. As I understand, the Board only has the authority to see that proper licenses are displayed. They can come in and look around for general cleanliness but not thoroughly inspect. They can make recommendations to the proper Departments but because those Departments are understaffed, the inspections of our businesses are low priority. They will even tell you they are too busy.

Areas I feel would improve Board functions are:

1. Combine licensing
2. Create separate licenses compatible with other States so people moving to Alaska can work here too.
3. Provide Grandfather and Comody licensing for Barbers, who just want to be Barbers and do no chemical work. That is there livelihood, why should they have to change.
4. Separate personal feelings from professional ones. Don't get on the Board to show everyone who you are, but what you can do to help them.
5. Keep the public safe at all times. Keep the public in mind when considering all Board business.

Concerning the Legislative Audit, I see some very legitamate concerns about the Board, however, I know that these areas will be taken care of if some Statute changes are made.

I do want to address the Audits concluding remarks found on page 5 of that audit.

question 1. Does the unlicensed practice pose a serious risk to the consumers' life, health, safety, or economic well being?

The answer is clearly, yes. Without licensing or regulation of any kind the public will be the ones to suffer. God only knows what kind of confusion and chaos will develop from it. I personally went thorough 2000 + hours to receive my license in the State of Alaska. I feel that by combining licenses and creating additional licenses for skin care, nails and electrical work (electrolosis) that the hours for Hairdressing or Barber Styling can be reduced to perhaps 1500-1600 hours. But without any form of licensing I feel that the State would be responsible for any legal action a customer harmed would cause and also by de-regulating licenses at all of how that would cause loss of livelihood for those of us currently licensed. Our profession would suffer too. How could we work next to someone who didn't know what they were doing and let them do harm to someone. That would set us up for potential lawsuits as well. Sounds like a can of worms I do not want to be a part of.

Please go over the information I have given you and please vote to retain the Board of Barbers and Hairdressers considering the changes I have outlined for you.



Dear Mr. Treager,

Since you recently wrote asking for suggestions for improvements to the Board of Barbers & Hairdressers, I thought I'd write to you about a problem I & probably others had with the statutes on license fees.

Under Sec. 08.13.185. Fees (6+7) it states that the "initial 2 year" license fee for hairdressing is \$55.00 and the "initial 2 year" license fee for cosmetology is \$45.00. This tells me that for those initial fees, totaling \$100.00, I should get 2 licenses, each good for 2 years. However, that is not the case. I took my exam in January of this year & sent in my \$100.00 for my licenses. I received only one piece of paper with both titles on it and it was only good until June 30, 1983. Since the license was issued March 7, 1983, this means I paid \$100.00 for a 3 month (almost 4 months) license. I subsequently had to pay another \$70.00 to renew my licenses. I feel this is extremely unfair & the wording or the licensing procedure should be changed. If the words "initial 2 year" are to be kept in the description then the license should be good for 2 years regardless of when it was purchased.

I realize that currently all licenses come due at the same time every 2 years and that a system of prorating is written into the statutes.

In 12 AAC 02.030. Prorating Licensing Fees - it gives the schedule of prorating with the "Catch-22" in paragraph (d) stating that "Licensing & renewal fees in the amount of \$60.00 or less will not be

promoted by the department, but must be paid in full...

A quick check of the 12 Fees listed in Sec. 08.13.185, reveals that only 3 of the fees are over \$60.00. What we have here is a case of the few-benefitting; and the many having to pay.

Since I paid a total of \$100.00 & received only 1 piece of paper, I thought I should qualify for prorating. But I was informed by Wanda Fleming that the Fees were considered separately and so did not qualify for prorating. If the Fees are considered separately, how come the licenses are not separate instead of combined into one?

If the licensing procedure is to be kept the same, wouldn't it be more appropriate & less misleading to just say "initial license fee" in Sec. 08.13.185 Fees - and thereby circumvent the idea that - a license is for 2 years when in reality it may be for much less.

I don't expect a refund at this late date but I would like to see some changes so that this doesn't happen to anyone else. Since this wouldn't happen again until 1985 there is plenty of time to give the matter consideration & possibly make some changes.





In reply to your memo of June 9, 1983, This is what I believe should be done to the board.

Alaska Statute Sec. 08.13.160 allows non professionals to open a shop and practice our trade. I think that in the interest of maintaining professional standards, and in the best interest of the public, this regulation should be eliminated. I dont see any reason to have a state board if this is to remain in effect.

Our state board issues licenses for Hairdresser, Barber, and Cosmetician. It appears to me that barbers licenses includes facials and shaves, but a hairdresser must buy a cosmetitions license to do facials. I suggest that the state board issue licenses in these catagories:

Haircutter - Does all types of haircuts and beard trims.

Chemical Work - Does all permanent and semi-permanent hair color, all permanent waves and straightening.

Cosmetition - Includes all facials and shaving

I think shampoo and sets and air waving needs no regulation and could be done by an assistant to a haircutter or chemical work licensee. Nothing should be regulated if the effect can be removed by one shampoo.





In response to your letter requesting possible alternatives for cosmetology evaluation to the State Board, I have formulated the concept of an apprenticeship program. The overall purpose behind this program would be to provide those cosmetologists who are truly qualified to obtain licenses. At present, it appears that too many students in cosmetology school are obtaining licenses without being thoroughly trained. Institution of such a program could provide longer and more concentrated training. Achieving professional status would be determined by a master stylist having a minimum of eight (8) years experience. The uncertain length of tenure would ensure only those students that have a true desire to be cosmetologists would obtain the license. Limiting the number of students in this manner would produce a greater quality of work since instruction could become more concentrated.

Costs of this program could be kept at a minimum by limiting the number of qualified students and thus, reduce the amount of government red tape and paper work. It appears that the amount of a grant distributed now exceeds the costs for a student to complete the necessary schooling. This has resulted in abuse of funds at the state's expense. A student can obtain a license, never utilize the experience learned, and still have available funds for an alternative use. A reevaluation of these costs could reduce the amount of funds distributed, or possibly encompass more students within the BEOG program.

Therefore, the combination of the elimination of the State Board, and institution of such an apprenticeship program will benefit both the cosmetology profession and state government operations.



Reference your letter of June 9, 1983 regarding the Sunset Legislation and the termination of the Board of Barbers and Hairdressers. Although I feel that the board should be terminated, some confusion has been generated by your letter.

Many licensed practitioners are of the opinion that upon the board's termination, that there will no longer be any licensing requirements for barbers and hairdressers working in the state of Alaska. This, however, is not the intent of the Department of Commerce. Barbers and hairdressers would still require the proper education and a state license to work.

I strongly recommend that you send a letter to all licensed barbers and hairdressers in the state to clarify this. Many operators who may prefer that the Board of Barbers and Hairdressers be terminated are fearful to express their opinion for fear that all licensing and control of barbers and hairdressers will end when the board terminates on June 30, 1984.

I hope that you will consider this proposal so that the state can receive a true accounting of those who desire that the Board of Barbers and Hairdressers be terminated.





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
