



IV Analysis: The cost of this bill will be borne entirely by the PERS employers other than the State of Alaska. The individual employer contribution rates will increase on an average of .24% of PERS payroll.

Position Paper

HB 91

The treatment of sick leave is an area to be addressed through the collective bargaining process by individual employers; retirement benefits are not. We do not feel it is appropriate for the legislature to force this type of liability on employers in the system through a change in retirement law. Other avenues such as personal leave or various forms of cash pay out are available and can be exercised locally taking into account differences that exist in both practice and philosophy.

The department is opposed to this bill for these reasons and the dangerous precedent it would establish.

Subject: HB 91 Opposition

The Alaska Municipal League urges that any legislation which increases the cost of the Public Employees Retirement System or the Teachers Retirement System due to increased benefits be borne by contributions from the employee. HB 91 does not apply to State employees and, therefore, has no direct fiscal impact to the State. However, HB 91 does mandate that municipalities, as political subdivisions, credit their employees, with no additional employee contribution, for unused sick leave; a fringe benefit, not an employee right. The potential municipal fiscal impact of the bill is \$894,000 in FY 86 alone. More importantly, the bill inappropriately involves the Legislature in an area properly left to individual, local collective bargaining agreements.

Therefore, the Alaska Municipal League opposes HB 91 on the grounds of local control and interference in the collective bargaining process; and on the basis of its fiscal impact, especially when municipalities are trying to continue to provide services at the lowest possible cost and to manage their budgets in the face of decreases in State and federal financial assistance.

You have asked for a sectional analysis of HB 91.

Section 1 adds a new section to the Public Employees' Retirement System. Subsection (a) permits certain employees of participating political subdivisions or public organizations to add their unused sick leave credit to the total years of credited service when they retire.

Subsection (b) limits employees who have retired and then returned to work for a participating employer to receiving credit in the retirement system only for sick leave accrued during employment after July 1, 1985.

Subsection (c) requires that an eligible employee may add unused sick leave to credited service only after the employee is terminated from covered employment and has asked in writing to do so.

If I may be of further assistance, please advise.

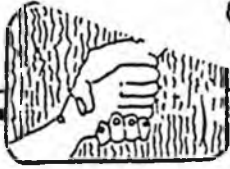

Chairman Abood announced that HB 443 will be held over by request of the sponsor.

Rep. Koponen comes to the stand as sponsor of HB 277. He said, "It is generally known by members of the legislature that most public employees have some means by which to favorably dispose of unused accumulated sick leave upon retirement or termination. However, there is a group of about 4,000 to 5,000 public employees, who serve school districts across Alaska, who are not allowed any means by which to favorably disburse their unused accumulated sick leave upon termination or retirement". He was referring to classified or non-certificated employees of school districts, (those employees who are hired to support the educational endeavors to include

mechanics, custodians, secretaries, nurses, librarians, etc.).

Rep. Koponen continued his testimony and said that inequity abounds in this area because these employees are not statutorily recognized for collective bargaining purposes, but teachers were. He said that HB 277 addresses unused accumulated sick leave credited to the individual's retirement account, leaves us with another area where equity is absent. It is not unusual for a retiring employee to lose from 50 to 150 days of sick leave at retirement or termination. He felt that there was no incentive for an employee to "stay well"; the contrary is evident. When an employee loses this accumulated sick leave, the employee is being penalized for his/her prudent use of his/her sick leave.

Ken Humphreys comes to the stand representing the Department of Administration, Division of Retirement and Benefits. He said that the Department of Administration was opposed to HB 277 for the following reasons:

1. Administration did not believe that any inequity was demonstrated between the teachers and the public employees, and that it was not a matter of the classified employees being treated differently than the teacher; simply two different retirement systems.
 2. The mandate should be up to the employer.
 3. If HB 277 was passed, it would impose liability on political subdivisions on the state i.e. municipality of Anchorage.
 4. It addressed only a small group of people.
- Mr. Humphreys said that if it was the desire for the committee to pass out something of this nature, they could institute a system where an

employee could convert sick leave into annual leave, then receive retirement credit as well. Chairman Abood asked about the fiscal note for HB 277. He wanted to know why it was a zero fiscal note, when the state would not be affected?

Edna Evans of Soldotna/Kenai, representing Carol Butler, David Bishop, William Haywood and Marlene Fraids comes on teleconference line. We recommend the following as substitutes for paragraphs "a" and "b" of the proposed AS 39.35.315.

Sec. 39.35.315. CREDIT FOR UNUSED SICK LEAVE.

(a) An employee who is employed on or after July 1, 1982, and who retires after July 1, 1983, may elect to add unused sick leave credit to the total number of years of credited service under AS 39.35.370(c). Unused sick leave shall be credited on a day-for-day basis. Employee contributions may not be required for credited unused sick leave.

(b) An employee retiring before July 1, 1983,

who returns to membership service on or after July 1, 1983, and who subsequently retires is eligible for unused sick leave credit only with respect to sick leave accrued during membership service on or after July 1, 1983.

Chairman Abood asked Mr. Humphreys how much money he would be talking about if the amendments were included?

Mr. Humphreys guessed about \$1 million dollars for FY '85. Mr. Humphreys said that Administration would still be opposed to the bill even with the amendments.





Analysis: Passage of this bill would decrease the current monthly salary for legislators and would consequently reduce monthly benefit payments to some members of the Elected Public Officers Retirement System (EPORS). We estimate that 17 current EPORS retirees would receive reduced benefits and that six future retirees would also be affected.

The projected FY 86 savings would be \$298.2 and is estimated to increase by 8% each year thereafter.

One of the bills introduced today is called "An Act relating to compensation of legislators; establishing a commission on legislative compensation".

The issue of legislative pay is a topic of considerable discussion both in these legislative halls and on the streets by the general public. Consequently, a number of legislative bills have already been introduced relating to the issue. All of the bills, however, deal only with the specific item of actual compensation. None, except HB107, address the issue in terms of the decision making process.

The Compensation Commission bill introduced today is a section of HB107. It will allow future legislators to work without the pressure of looking after their own salary levels. A Commission composed of five members appointed by the House and Senate leadership will review legislators salaries at least every two years and make appropriate recommendations. This arrangement is beneficial to elected officials, administrators and the general public. The bill is patterned after the one successfully being used in the Municipality of Anchorage.

Public concern about the pay raise is justified. There are not too many people working today who have the luxury of giving themselves a fat salary increase whenever they desire it. In reality, the average worker must earn a merit increase before it is granted by a higher authority. The same should be true of public officials, only in our case, the higher authority is the general public.

A Compensation Commission would be a fair, objective intermediary to recommend a legislative pay level. The legislature will, however, not escape the responsibility to appropriate. Your consideration would be appreciated. Please call me if you have questions.

This bill is composed of five sections. The first four sections of this bill are re-enactments of previous statutes that were repealed during the 1983 legislative session when the current salary levels for legislators was established.

SECTION 1

This section provides for the payment of per diem as prescribed according to current statutes (applicable statutes are attached). There are two classes of per diem: short-term rate and long-term rate that apply depending on whether a legislator is travelling from his/her home district, or from Juneau. So there are four variations of per diem spelled out in Section 1, lines 16 through 29, highlighted in green on the copies I've provided you. Again, I want to emphasize that this is a re-enactment of the situation that existed prior to the last pay raise. Incidentally, the per diem amount would be \$80.00 per day. For a 120-day session, that is \$9,600.00.

In 1975, the 9th Legislature enacted a new retirement provision along with a salary increase. These retirement benefits were repealed by the voters in a referendum during the 1976 primary election when the pay raise was retracted.

Subsequently, a court decision (Hammond vs. Allen) directed that the retirement system enacted by the Legislature could not be nullified by voter action. Consequently, there are 17 former legislators currently receiving retirement benefits under this EPORS who are impacted by our actions today. The reason that all retired legislators are not affected is because the EPORS was in effect for a period of only ten months.

If we pass any legislation pay bill that decreases current salary levels, these 17 former members will also receive a decrease in benefits. Attached is a list of former legislators of which the 17 are included. Current law prohibits disclosing the specific names. Perhaps the Committee would like to hear testimony from some of these legislators. In any event, I have provided a suggested amendment to allow these retired legislators the opportunity of reverting back to the original 1975 retirement system. In this way, they have the option of choosing their top three salary years for retirement purposes. Essentially, it's the same option each of you will have if you continue your legislative service.

Analysis:

Passage of this bill would decrease the current monthly salary for legislators and would consequently reduce monthly benefit payments to some members of the Elected Public Officers Retirement System (EPORS). We estimate that 17 current EPORS retirees would receive reduced benefits and that six future retirees would also be affected.

The projected FY 86 savings would be \$298.2 and is estimated to increase by 8% each year thereafter.

Statutory Language

APPLICATION. This chapter applies to persons who are elected public officers on the effective date of this chapter and to persons who become elected public officers after the effective date of the chapter.

AN INITIATIVE

For an Act entitled: "An Act relating to the compensation for state legislators."

BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF ALASKA:

* Section 1. As 24.15.010 is reenacted to read:

Sec. 24.15.010. Legislature per diem.

(a) During the legislative session, each member of the legislature is entitled to receive per diem at the same rate allowed for a state employee under AS39.20.110 and 39.20.160, including regional variations in the rate where applicable.

(b) A legislator is entitled to receive per diem at the short-term rate during a legislative session if he does not live in his place of permanent residence during the session.

(c) A legislator is entitled to receive per diem at the long-term rate during a legislative session if he lives in his place of permanent residence during the session.

(d) When the legislature is not in session, instead of receiving per diem a legislator is entitled to be reimbursed for actual expenses incurred while he is on committee business for an interim committee of the legislature in a place which is not his place of permanent residence.

(e) In this section

(1) "long-term rate" means the long-term per diem rate established in regulations adopted by the commissioner of administration under AS 39.20.160;

(2) "short-term rate" means the short-term per diem rate established in regulations adopted by the commissioner of administration under AS 39.20.160.

* Section 2. AS 24.15.020 is amended to read:

Sec. 24.15.020. Salary of legislators. The monthly salary for each member of the legislature is equal to Step A, Range 10, [22] of the salary schedule in AS

39.27.011(a) for Juneau, Alaska. The president of the senate and the speaker of the house of representatives are each entitled to an additional \$500 a year during tenure of office.

* Section 3. AS 24.15.040 is amended to read:

Sec. 24.15.040. Method of Payment. Salaries, per diem and additional allowances for members of the legislature shall be paid by warrants drawn on vouchers approved by the legislative fiscal officer. The legislative fiscal officer shall, by January 31 of each calendar year, file with the Office of Management and Budget a report of all vouchers approved for payment pursuant to this section during the preceding calendar year. The report shall provide, by legislator, the date of each voucher, the amount paid and the basis for approval for payment.

* Section 4. Any provisions of the Alas^k. Statutes inconsistent with this Act are hereby repealed.

You requested this agency to provide information on two issues:

- the adoption date of a \$4,000 expense allowance for legislators; and
- the per diem limitations imposed by the proposed initiative on legislative salary and per diem.

Expense Allowance

Alaska Statute 24.15.030 states that each member of the legislature is entitled to receive an annual allowance for postage, stationary, stenographic services and other expenses. Allowances amounting to \$4000 became effective in 1970. These allowances have not increased since that date. The following table provides the legislative history of expense allowances:

Section 4, ch. 58, SLA 1979, purported to add a paragraph (25). Section 9 of ch. 58 provided that the amendment take effect on January 1, 1980, if approved by a majority of the votes cast in a special election conducted before January 1, 1980, by the Department of Administration among the active members of the public employees' retirement system. The amendment was rejected.
