Continuation of FISCAL NOTE ANALYSIS

For Bill/Resolution No. SSHB475

SUBJECT OF PROPOSED BILL:

SSHB475 amends AS 44.12, modifying the days recognized by the State as legal holidays.

ANALYSIS:

Automated statewide Leave and Payroll systems must recognize State Holidays in order to maintain accurate leave records and pay employees correctly.

If in the process of implementing new and changed paid holidays for the different groups of state employees, we are required to provide for different sets of holidays depending on employee group (Bargaining Unit), then there will be a one-time cost for modifying the central leave and payroll computer systems. There would also be an on-going increase in manual effort required to ensure that employee pay is correctly calculated.

Any differences we currently have are built into numerous computer programs and any change or expansion of these differences will require computer system changes.

The following additional operating costs will be experienced if different holiday sets will result:

One time cost to update computer systems:

Estimated Analyst/Programmer hours = 400
Cost = Annual Programmer Cost of \$55 X 400 hours
= \$22,000

Additional on-going operating cost:

\$3,000 per year.

CONTINUATION of FISCAL NOTE ANALYSIS

For Bill/Resolution No. _____

SUBJECT OF PROPOSED BILL:

This bill would amend AS 44.12.010 by establishing January 15 as a legal holiday for Martin Luther King's birthday.

SUMMARY/EXPLANATION OF INTENT:

The fiscal note reflects the overtime costs the State would incur for paying those employees needed to perform functions which could not be shut down during the additional holiday (law enforcement, corrections, airports, hospitals, Pioneers' Homes, snow removal, etc.). The salary costs for overtime were obtained from departmental personnel offices. Retirement and other percentage-based benefits costs were added using FY 87 budget factors, and the assumption that the salaries and benefits costs for overtime would not increase in subsequent years was made. The figures in this fiscal note do not include any costs for the Legislative or Judicial Branches nor the University of Alaska employees. (A small part of the cost is not General Fund; however, we do not have the detailed information required for an accurate calculation.)

By designating January 15 as a legal State holiday the bill will reduce State employee productivity by approximately .4% (one of the two hundred and thirty-eight days per year will convert to nonproductive time). This loss of productivity will not increase the State's salary costs. Lost production is approximately \$2.4 million for the Executive Branch.

Consideration should also be given to non-State costs. Businesses outside State Government such as banks and local government would be required to acknowledge January 15 as a legal holiday which would have the same effects as on the State: overtime costs for those who must work and lost production costs for those who do not. These costs were not included in this fiscal note.

Dear Senator Fischer:

Your staff has requested this department's initial reaction to SB 347 which would allow State employees to take Martin Luther King Day as a holiday in place of a legal holiday listed in AS 44.12.010. We fully support recognition of Martin Luther King Day. Elevating the day from a day of observance to a holiday status would enhance recognition of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.'s efforts and devotion to justice, equality, and human dignity.

We believe that allowing employees to individually choose to observe Martin Luther King Day as a holiday in trade for another holiday creates substantial scheduling and record keeping problems. There are also costs associated with these problems which we will attempt to quantify in a Fiscal Note.

The scheduling problem is best described by a hypothetical example. Suppose 3,000 Executive Branch employees choose to observe Martin Luther King Day and to trade equally for one of the eleven other holidays. Overall, State operations would be reduced on January 15. In sporadic locations whole offices might be closed, but in general, State operations would proceed. On each of the other eleven holidays, approximately 270 employees would be expected to work. These employees would be scattered throughout the State. Access to buildings would have to be provided, along with heat and lights. In many cases, related offices or facilities required for production work would not be available. On Thanksgiving, Christmas, and New Years, the mainframe computer systems are not available, for example. The public does not expect services on these holidays, so any employees who are primarily direct public contact would have no "customers" for the day. In general, the 270 employees are not sufficient for meaningful operations. Where employees are expected to work and security concerns (buildings, data, available supervisors, etc.) prevent them from working, the employees will still be paid for the day under terms of their collective bargaining agreements.

SB 347 would also require additional record keeping. Records would be needed of those employees who choose to observe Martin Luther King Day. Records of not working on January 15 and of working on the traded holiday would be needed. An adjustment would be required for each employer who observes January 15 as a holiday and separates before working the traded holiday.

We have been unable to propose an alternative plan involving any sort of individual "trade" that does not encounter these problems. We prefer a plan that would apply uniformly to all employees. It would be even more beneficial to the State if any change brought us more in line with Federal holidays. You may wish to consider the following individually or in combination:


Designating the third Monday in January as Martin Luther King holiday (instead of January 15),

Combining Lincoln's birthday and Washington's birthday into President's Day, and

Combining or eliminating Seward's Day or Alaska Day (perhaps designating the other as a day of observation).

We appreciate this opportunity to comment on SB 347. We look forward to working with you as the bill works its way through the Senate.

AT THE SECOND SESSION

Began and held at the City of Washington on Monday, the twenty-third day of January, one thousand nine hundred and eighty-four

An Act

To establish a commission to assist in the first observance of the Federal legal holiday honoring Martin Luther King, Jr.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That the Congress finds that—

(1) January 20, 1986, marks the first observance of the Federal legal holiday, established by Public Law 98-144, honoring the birthday of Martin Luther King, Jr.;

(2) such holiday should serve as a time for Americans to reflect on the principles of racial equality and nonviolent social change espoused by Martin Luther King, Jr.; and

(3) it is appropriate for the Federal Government to coordinate efforts with Americans of diverse backgrounds and with private organizations in the first observance of the Federal legal holiday honoring Martin Luther King, Jr.

Sec. 2. There is established a commission to be known as the Martin Luther King, Jr. Federal Holiday Commission (hereinafter in this Act referred to as the "Commission").

Sec. 3. The purposes of the Commission are—

(1) to encourage appropriate ceremonies and activities throughout the United States relating to the first observance of the Federal legal holiday honoring Martin Luther King, Jr., which occurs on January 20, 1986; and

(2) to provide advice and assistance to Federal, State, and local governments and to private organizations with respect to the observance of such holiday.

Sec. 4. (a) The Commission shall be composed of—

(1) four officers from the executive branch, appointed by the President;

(2) four Members of the House of Representatives, appointed by the Speaker of the House of Representatives in consultation with the minority leader of the House of Representatives;

(3) four Senators, appointed by the President pro tempore of the Senate in consultation with the majority and minority leaders of the Senate;

(4) Coretta Scott King and two other members of the family surviving Martin Luther King, Jr., appointed by such family;

(5) two individuals representing the Martin Luther King, Jr. Center for Non-Violent Social Change (a not-for-profit organization incorporated in the State of Georgia), appointed by such organization; and

(6) fourteen individuals other than officers or employees of the United States or Members of Congress, appointed by the members of the Commission under paragraphs (1) through (5) of this subsection from among individuals representing diverse interest groups, including individuals representing labor, business, civil rights, and religious groups, and entertainers.

(b) Not more than half of the members of the Commission appointed under each of paragraphs (2), (3), (5), and (6) of subsection (a) shall be of the same political party.

(c) Members shall be appointed for the life of the Commission. Any vacancy in the Commission shall not affect its powers, but shall be filled in the manner in which the original appointment was made.

(d) Members of the Commission shall serve without pay, but may, subject to section 7, be allowed travel expenses, including per diem in lieu of subsistence, while away from their homes or regular places of business in the performance of services for the Commission.

SEC. 5. (a) The Commission shall first meet within 80 days after the date of the enactment of this Act. At this first meeting the Commission shall elect a chairperson from among its members and shall meet thereafter at the call of the chairperson.

(b) The Commission may encourage the participation of, and accept, use, and dispose of donations of money, property, and personal services from, individuals and public and private organizations to assist the Commission in carrying out its responsibilities under this Act.

(c) The provisions of the Federal Advisory Committee Act shall not apply to the Commission established under this Act.

SEC. 6. (a) The Commission may appoint a director and a staff of not more than five persons, without regard to the provisions of title 5, United States Code, governing appointments in the competitive service. Subject to section 7, the Commission shall set the rates of pay for the director and staff, except that the director may not be paid at a rate in excess of the maximum rate of pay payable for grade GS-18 of the General Schedule under section 5332 of title 5, United States Code, and no staff member may be paid at a rate in excess of the maximum rate of pay payable for grade GS-18 of such General Schedule.

(b)(1) Upon the request of the Commission, the head of any department or agency of the United States may detail, on a non-reimbursable basis, any of the personnel of such department or agency to the Commission to assist it in carrying out its responsibilities under this Act.

(2) Each head of such department or agency is authorized to cooperate with and assist the Commission in carrying out its responsibilities under this Act.

SEC. 7. All expenditures of the Commission shall be made from donated funds.

Sec. 8. Not later than April 20, 1986, the Commission shall submit a report to the President and the Congress concerning its activities under this Act.

Sec. 9. The Commission shall cease to exist after submitting its report under section 8.




To amend title 5, United States Code, to make the birthday of Martin Luther King, Jr., a legal public holiday.

"Birthday of Martin Luther King, Jr., the third Monday in January."


SEC. 2. The amendment made by the first section of this Act shall take effect on the first January 1 that occurs after the two-year period following the date of the enactment of this Act.

AN ACT relating to holidays.

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the Commonwealth
of Kentucky:

1 Section 1. KRS 2.110 is amended to read as follows:
2 (1) The 1st day of January (New Year's Day), the
3 third Monday [~~15th--day~~] of January (Birthday of Martin
4 Luther King, Jr. [Day]), the 19th day of January (Robert

Section 4.

The composition and number of Commission members shall be determined by the Governor. Commission members, including co-chairpersons, shall be appointed by the Governor for one-year terms and shall continue to serve at the pleasure of the Governor.

Section 5.

Citizen members of the Commission shall not receive remuneration for their services, but shall serve on a basis that is totally voluntary. The Commission will receive staff support from the Governor's Office of Minority Affairs and such additional assistance as is appropriate from the Executive Office of the Governor.

b. Draw upon the members' resources and expertise in creating programs designed to educate the people of New Jersey about Martin Luther King Jr. and the Civil Rights Movement;

c. Meet with other interested parties willing to assist with the coordination of events and seek volunteers who are willing to donate their talents;

Arbitrator may break impasse on Martin Luther King holiday

SALEM, Ore. — A labor union representing state employees asked Gov. Vic Atiyeh Monday to allow an arbitrator to break an impasse over the celebration of Martin Luther King Jr.'s birthday as a state holiday.

The request is contained in a three-part

offer to Atiyeh from the American Federation of State, County and Municipal Employees Local 75.

The AFSCME plan calls for trading one day of vacation or personal leave time for a state holiday honoring the slain civil rights leader, to go immediately to arbitration and

that both sides agree to follow the arbitrator's recommendation.

Atiyeh said the offer is a "positive step in the right direction," but that he will not act on the proposal until he has a recommendation from his staff.

Press aide Denny Miles said Atiyeh also

wants to know how other unions representing state employees feel about the AFSCME proposal.

Atiyeh and the unions have waged a two-week dispute over how state employees will be allowed to celebrate the first Martin Luther King Jr. Holiday on Jan. 20th.

SUBJECT: HB 512 (Appointments to the boards of fisheries and game)

This piece of legislation is very straight forward and deals with the appointments to the Fish and Game Boards by the Governor.

The bill would require the Governor to publish the name of proposed appointees 30 days before the appointments are actually made so that the public may comment on the choices.

This bill was drafted to help members of the public have a better opportunity to affect the appointment process before it becomes a political matter during the confirmation process.

Members of numerous Advisory Committees have expressed their frustration with Board appointments and wondered why the public wasn't allowed to comment before the Governor made his choices final.

As a practical matter there seems to be no reason why this should not be allowed. In light of past controversies such a screening may remove some of the political risk involved when a Governor makes appointment before all the facts are known about the individual being appointed.

Finally, I believe that the Boards of Fish and Game are extremely important bodies that were designed to represent the public's interest. It is fitting indeed that the public be as involved as possible in the formation of those Board.

SUEJECT: House Bill 512

The Governor's office of Boards and Commissions does not support House Bill 512.

As is now stands with the Governor making appointments and the Legislature confirming appointments, the public has most of the session to respond to the fitness of the appointee. The hearing process provided for in the confirmation of appointments is to solicit public participation. This participation is more applicable in the legislative arena, it is impractical for the boards and commissions office.

House Bill 512 places an unnecessary burden on the Governor's appointment power and would tend to prolong the process of making timely appointments.

HB 534 - "An act relating to violent crimes compensation; and providing for an effective date."

This bill would clarify a present deficiency in the Act. The present Act awards compensation only for pecuniary loss to a dependent of the deceased victim. The Board has had before it several cases where there is a real pecuniary loss to a spouse of the deceased victim, but that spouse is not technically a dependent of the deceased victim. This amendment would clarify a situation where a spouse of the deceased victim is not a dependent of the victim, e. g., the victim is a homemaker, but the surviving spouse does suffer pecuniary loss.

There would be no increased cost as the Board is presently compensating the surviving spouse under the provisions of 18.67.110 (4) which allows the Board to order the payment of compensation for "any other loss resulting from the ... death of the victim which the Board considers to be reasonable." The Board believes that the proposed language would give it a firmer basis for its awards in the situations described.

Under the authority of art. III, sec. 18, of the Alaska Constitution, I am transmitting a bill relating to violent crimes compensation. This bill makes a clarifying amendment, addressing an ambiguity in existing law.

Currently, the Violent Crimes Compensation Board is authorized to award compensation to, or for the benefit of, one or more of the dependents of a victim of certain incidents or offenses, in a situation in which the victim dies. AS 18.67.080(a)(3). However, a dependent is currently defined as a relative of the victim who is dependent upon the victim's income. AS 18.67.180(2). Although the board may award compensation for any other loss the board determines to be reasonable under AS 18.67.110(4), the current practice of awarding compensation to a spouse of a victim, for child care and housekeeping expenses, when the victim was a homemaker and therefore didn't contribute monetary support to the spouse, could be subject to question. This results from the ambiguity in the interrelationship of three provisions: AS 18.67.080(a)(3), 18.67.110(4), and 18.67.180(2).

Redefining "dependent" to include a relative who is dependent on the victim's services, as well as one who is dependent on the victim's income, would correct this ambiguity.

I urge your prompt and favorable action on this bill.
