New Jersey Board of Public Utilities

The New Jersey BPU considers the Optional Low Use Measured Service offered by New Jersey Bell since 1976 to be a form

of lifeline service. Low Use Measured Service allows for a 36% discount from the monthly flat rate with a 20 message unit allowance; additional message units are billed at 10 cents each. There are 4 rate groups with a composite rate of \$4.76 per month. The New Jersey BPU indicated that consumer response to this offering has been favorable but subscription gain has been slow; to date only 2% of flat rate residences subscribe to Low Use Measured Service.

New Jersey opposes H.R. 151 for three reasons: historical precedence of like legislation; the potential cost of such legislation to New Jersey ratepayers; and the ability of the States to address these concerns locally and more efficiently. The New Jersey BPU estimates that 1,000,000 subscribers would qualify for assistance under H.R. 151 and that the yearly costs of managing H.R. 151 would be \$7.2 million.

New York Department of Public Service

Lifeline service will be implemented by New York Telephone by June 1, 1985. Lifeline service will be priced at the Basic Budget Service Rate with a 50 cents/month discount starting June 1, 1985. This discount will increase to 50% of the Basic

Budget Rate at the conclusion of New York Tel.'s pending rate case. Eligible customers will be those who receive State financial aid and who subscribe to Basic Budget Service. This plan would require residential ratepayers to fund the lifeline rate.

The administrative costs of the plan are estimated to be \$20,000 annually and the local charges deferred are estimated to be \$12 million annually. The impetus for such a plan came from the New York DPS.

The New York DPS is opposed to H.R. 151. It believes that the question of lifeline service is best left to the individual States. The Commission estimates that between 1 and 2 million customers would qualify for assistance under H.R. 151.

Average local exchange rates per residential customer are contained in Appendix E.

North Carolina Utilities Commission

Southern Bell suggested a possible lifeline service plan in its most recent rate case but did not actually propose one. No lifeline service has been implemented or proposed in North Carolina.

The North Carolina Utilities Commission did not express its views on H.R. 151.

North Dakota Public Service Commission

There is no prohibition against the implementation of lifeline service by the North Dakota PSC. However, no lifeline service

has been implemented or proposed in the State.

North Dakota did not express its views on H.R. 151.

Oklahoma Corporation Commission

In November, 1982 Southwestern Bell proposed a lifeline service plan which was not implemented by the Oklahoma CC.

The Oklahoma CC has not formulated a position on H.R. 151. It estimates that if H.R. 151 became law it would result in approximately \$15,000 in administrative costs and 150,000 customers would be eligible for its assistance. Average local exchange rates per residential customer are contained in Attachment J.

Oregon Public Utility Commissioner

Oregon has a general statutory prohibition against discriminatory rates which is viewed by the Commissioner as prohibiting any service options not made available to all residential customers. Therefore, lifeline service, within the narrow definition of the term, is not available. However, Stayton Coop. Tele. Company, Pacific Northwest Bell and United Tele. Co. of the Northwest all offer Budget Measured Service options which the Commissioner views as alternatives to strict lifeline service.

Stayton's option has 7 subscribers, United's option has 317 subscribers and Pacific NW Bell's option has 20,762 subscribers.

The Oregon Commissioner is opposed to H.R. 151 for several reasons: (1) Welfare programs should be funded from income tax revenues; (2) Public Utility Commissions should not be required to act as legislatures and welfare agencies; (3) Welfare payments, in order to maximize aid, should be made in cash; and (4) a tax placed on long distance calling will create additional pressure to bypass the long distance system.

Pennsylvania Public Utility Commission

Pennsylvania does not have a specific prohibition against the setting of lifeline telephone rates but there are general statutory prohibitions against discriminatory rates. No lifeline service options have been implemented or proposed in the State.

The Pennsylvania PUC is opposed to H.R. 151. The Commission believes that this issue is best left to the State utility commissions working in conjunction with their State legislators. Also, the PUC does not believe that lifeline service should exclude LMS as an acceptable methodology.

Average local exchange rates per residential customer are as follows:

Rhode Island Public Utilities Commission

New England Telephone offers a Statewide Optional Local Measured Service which the Rhode Island PUC does not view as lifeline service but which operates as an alternative. The option is offered to all residential subscribers at \$5.88/month plus charges based on length and frequency of calls.

In general, Rhode Island views H.R. 151 as "targeted to lifeline purposes and subscribers of need." Rhode Island questions whether 1/1/86 may be a reasonable deadline for development of lifeline rates.

Average local exchange rates per residential customer are

South Carolina Public Service Commission

Currently, South Carolina has no lifeline service program but the PSC has encouraged Southern Bell (70% of access lines) to implement optional Low Use Measured Service in all exchanges where it is technologically possible to do so. The South Carolina PSC views Low Use LMS as an alternative to strictly-defined lifeline service. By the end of 1985 it is estimated that 60% of Southern Bell's customers could avail themselves of this option.

The South Carolina PSC expressed no view on H.R. 151.

Average local exchange rates per residential customer are contained in Appendix F.

South Dakota Public Utilities Commission

South Dakota law prohibits the imposition of lifeline service rates. SDCL 49-31-11.

The South Dakota PUC did not express its views on H.R. 151.

The South Dakota PUC did not provide average local exchange rate data.

Tennessee Public Service Commission

The Tennessee PSC views TCA 65-521 as creating a possible statutory bar to the imposition of strictly-defined lifeline service. Both South Central Bell and Tennessee Tel. have, however, implemented several residential service options which the Tennessee PSC views as alternatives to strictly-defined lifeline service.

South Central Bell offers Standard Measured Service (63,405 subscribers) at 70% of the flat rate plus a usage rate for local calling. The rate includes a \$7.50 allowance for local calling. Lifeline Message Service (61,572 subscribers) is available at 50% of the flat rate plus 10 cents per outgoing local call. The rate includes a \$3.00 allowance for local calling. Finally, Economy Measured Service (18,972 subscribers) is available at 40% of the flat rate plus a usage rate for local calling. The rate includes a \$1.00 allowance for local calling.

Tennessee Tel. offers an Optional Local Message Rate Service in 2 exchanges for 50% of the local exchange access rate plus \$.10 per message for usage and \$.04 per message for detailed billing.

Tennessee is opposed to H.R. 151. It believes that decisions on lifeline service should be made at the State level after careful study. Also, Tennessee expressed the view that the January 1, 1986 deadline would be impossible to meet.

Public Utility Commission of Texas

There is no bar to the implementation of lifeline service by the Texas PUC. While strictly-defined lifeline service has not been imposed by the Texas PUC, Southwestern Bell, United Tel. and Palo Pinto Tel. all offer residential service options which the Commission views as helping to preserve universal service.

SW Bell offers a low cost message rate option which currently has 25,119 subscribers. United and Palo Pinto offer an optional Measured Service with a basic flat rate and usage charges based on time of day, length of calls and distance.

Texas has not formed an opinion on H.R. 151.

Utah Division of Public Utilities

Utah Code Annot. §54-3-8 prohibits preferential rates between classes of service and in *Mountain States Legal Foundation v. Utah PSC*, 636 P.2d 1047 (Utah Sup.Ct.) lifeline electric service rates for senior citizens were rejected. However, the Utah

DPU does not consider the above to be a prohibition against the implementation of lifeline telephone rates. In Case No. 83-999-11 the Division recommended to the PSC the establishment of a State universal service fund, with contributions from a surcharge on the minutes-of-use by intrastate interexchange carriers and private systems offering intrastate intralata and interlata switched access services. The fund would provide revenues to support a lifeline rate for low-income customers. The Division recommended the establishment of a separate docket to consider the specific details for implementation of the proposal.

The Division stated that with several amendments H.R. 151 could be supported. More specifically, it stated: (1) imposition of a January 1, 1986 deadline is impractical; (2) the provision which calls for an FCC determination of whether lifeline charges are reasonable is an improper delegation of responsibility; (3) the bill does not address the need for a complete exemption from interstate end user access charges; and (4) lifeline subscribers may be prohibited from receiving extended area service by the bill.

Utah estimates that implementation of H.R. 151 would cost approximately \$5.5 million and that 50,000 customers would qualify for its service.

Vermont Department of Public Service

A joint resolution of the Vermont General Assembly has mandated a Dept. of Public Service study of the lifeline issue and the development of a recommended program. The DPS is currently undertaking such a study. The legislative mandate calls for the development of a program containing a means test.

The Vermont DPS had no comment on H.R. 151. It did indicate that if H.R. 151 is passed approximately 30,000 customers, or 15% of the current residential base, would qualify for assistance.

Vermont did not provide its average local exchange rates.

Washington Utilities & Transportation Commission

The Attorney General of Washington has construed RCW 80.36.130 as creating a statutory prohibition against the implementation of lifeline telephone service. However, the Washington UTC has authorized several budget services that are available to all customers and act as an alternative to strictly-defined lifeline service.

Pacific NW Bell offers Two-Party Measured (11,076 subscribers),

Budget Local Measured (24,093 subscribers), and Basic Local Measured (56,182 subscribers) Services. United Telephone also offers a Local Measured Service in selected offices. Pioneer Tele. Co. will also offer LMS beginning in February 1985. There was initially a very low customer response to these offerings but in recent years subscription rates have increased.

In addition, Pacific NW Bell recently filed with the UTC a proposal for creation of a Residential Lifeline Plan. Households would become eligible for lifeline service by either (1) being the recipient of assistance from a Washington Department of Social Health Services program, or (2) being 65 or older and meeting low income level guidelines. The service would be based on the Budget Measured Service Rate but would include the ability to preselect up to 5 local telephone numbers to which subscribers would have unlimited calling at no charge. This service would be funded from other Pacific NW Bell local exchange rates.

Washington is opposed to H.R. 151. It believes that this issue should be addressed at the State level.

Average local exchange rates per residential customer are contained in Attachment G.

Public Service Commission of West Virginia

West Virginia Code §24-1-1(a)(4) and West Virginia Code §24-2-2, as well as the decisions of the Commission in M.C. Case No. 21001 and 82-158, prohibit the implementation of lifeline local exchange service. However, there is a proposal currently

pending before the West Virginia Legislature which would authorize C & P of West Virginia to provide lifeline service to low income individuals meeting a yet to be developed needs test.

C & P proposes to price the service at \$5.00 - \$7.50/month per Local Measured Service access line, including \$2.00/month in intralata usage. Calls would be measured on a time of day, distance, length of call and frequency of call basis.

West Virginia supports H.R. 151 in all but two respects. It disagrees with the bill's prohibition against lifeline Local Measured Service and it takes issue with the bill's failure to address low income users' short haul toll needs in areas with little or no extended area service.

Public Service Commission of Wisconsin

Wisconsin Bell commenced a lifeline service plan on January 1, 1984. There are no qualifications to subscribe to the service. However, service change charges are waived for customers meeting low income criteria. Criteria used are the Low Income Energy Assistance Guidelines of the State Department of Health and Social Services. The service is priced at a \$3.50/month access

rate plus 24 cents per local call. Waivers were granted to 2,589 customers in 1984 and there are 13,027 customers currently subscribing to this service.

The Wisconsin PSC has not taken a formal position on H.R. 151. It estimates that if H.R. 151 becomes law 230,000 customers in Wisconsin would qualify for assistance.

Wisconsin did not provide local exchange rate information.

Wyoming Public Service Commission

Wyoming Statutes §37-3-104 contains a prohibition against the implementation of lifeline service by the Wyoming PSC.

Wyoming did not express its views on H.R. 151.

Wyoming did not provide local exchange rate information.

In 1982, the FCC decided that the provision of telephone instruments (technically known as customer premises equipment or CPE) did not need to be a regulated telecommunications service. Therefore, effective January 1, 1983, new CPE was deregulated and thereafter would have to be purchased or leased from utilities or other suppliers at prevailing market prices. CPE which was in-place or in inventory at that date continued to be regulated for the time being. To further implement its policy the FCC dictated that the cost of the telephone instrument be separated from the basic service rate to eliminate this charge for new CPE customers and to better inform old CPE customers of their costs and options. In a related action, the FCC had mandated that customers pay the full cost of their telephone installations (primarily designated as inside wiring) rather than a nominal fee.

In response to these federal policies, the AFUC required all regulated local exchange utilities to unbundle (break down) their monthly telephone rates into separate components for CPE, inside wiring, and access lines. Almost all companies have either completed the unbundling process or at least filed proposed unbundled rates. The rates shown below reflect the monthly rates in effect for single party residential service on December 31, 1983. All customers pay the access line charge, but customers who own their inside wiring and/or telephone instruments do not pay the respective charges.

A3. BASIC LOCAL EXCHANGE SERVICE

A3.1 GENERAL

- a. Rates for basic local exchange service are related to the total main station lines; main Centrex station lines, ESSX-1 main station lines and private branch exchange trunks in the local calling area.
- b. Basic Rate Areas, Zone Rate Areas, and Exchange Service Areas for each exchange are identified on maps filed as a supplement to this tariff.
- c. The rate for service and equipment not specifically shown in this section are presented in other sections of this tariff.
- d. Individual and party line residence and business service is comprised of the following:

Main Station Line - Serving central office line equipment, all outside plant facilities needed to connect the serving central office with the customer premises, and wiring to Network Interface. These facilities are Company-provided and maintained and provide access to and from the telecommunications network for message toll service and for local calling appropriate to the tariffed use offering selected by the customer.

Wiring Charge - The recurring charge for inside wiring per Residence main station line service is \$3.50 and for Business main station line service is \$1.00 (USOU: WRC). This charge is applicable only when wiring is placed by the Company and is not applicable when line terminates in Key Telephone Service.

You have requested a sectional analysis to HB 539 and asked questions concerning its effect.

SECTIONAL ANALYSIS

Section 1 permits a public utility to grant low-income customers discounted service or a reduced rate for essential telecommunication services despite the prohibition contained in AS 42.05.301 against granting unreasonable preferences or advantages in services.

Section 2 permits discounted service or reduced rates despite the prohibition contained in AS 42.05.391(a) against granting an unreasonable preference or advantage in rates.

ISSUES RAISED

1. May appropriations be added to HB 539?

The Alaska State Constitution requires in Article II, Section 13, that "bills for appropriations shall be confined to appropriations." HB 539 is not an appropriation bill and therefore, no appropriation could be added to it.

Your letter indicates that there is no administrative agency to handle the funds. Since these sections are part of AS 42.05, the Public Utilities Commission has responsibility for implementing the program. AS 42.05.141(3)) gives the commission power to

make or require just, fair and reasonable rates, classifications, regulations, practices, services and facilities for a public utility.

2. If HB 539 is enacted, could the Alaska Public Utilities Commission establish a lifeline program without further statutory authority?

Under the power given to the APUC by AS 42.05.141(3), the commission could establish a lifeline program if this bill became law. Under AS 42.05.151(a)

The commission may adopt regulations, not inconsistent with law, necessary or proper to exercise its powers and to perform its duties under this chapter.

Since the sections permitting reduced rate and services are part of AS 42.05, the APUC has authority to implement them.

ALASKA TELEPHONE ASSOCIATION TESTIMONY ON H.B. 539

Presented by Gordon Parker, Executive Director
February 7, 1986

I want to thank the House Special Committee on Telecommunications for again allowing us the opportunity to comment on its work. Today we have before us H.B. 539, relating to reduced rates and discounted service for low-income telecommunications customers.

First, I again want to compliment the Chairman and members of the Committee for the work you have done. You have taken a responsible approach to sorting out the complexities of one of the most confusing issues facing our state: the future of telecommunications service.

Having said that, I must tell you that the 23 members of the Alaska Telephone Association can not endorse the bill before you today. We have agreed that the subject of Lifeline rates must be reviewed. But we have been consistent before this Committee in our position. We maintain today the position we outlined in our comments filed with the Committee in October. For the purposes of discussion, I will briefly review that position.

First, we view a Lifeline subsidy as a social issue which should continue to be provided the way it is currently being provided in Alaska: through the various entitlement programs administered by the State. Under the Food Stamp program, which is, by the way, funded 100 per cent by the federal government, recipients are entitled to a telephone standard included in the Standard Utility Allowance. The telephone standard varies according to region from a low of \$15.00 to a high of \$20.00. The low figure of \$15.00 is enough to pay 53 per cent of the highest basic local charge in Alaska and is 430 per cent of the lowest basic local charge. In addition, the regulations provide that if a household's basic telephone charge is higher than the telephone standard, then the higher rate will be paid.

Second, there must be a clear delineation between Lifeline and the larger issue of Universal Service. The bill does appear to make that distinction by referring to "low income customers." In making that distinction, the Committee is in line with other states, the majority of whom have used enrollment in various assistance programs as the qualifier for Lifeline.

Third, we believe that telephone companies should not be placed in the position of qualifying recipients for subsidy. That is an unfamiliar role for private industry and one better suited to existing government agencies. We understand that in an attempt to draft a permissive bill, the Committee

did not wish to get into such specific issues; given the Committee's desire for a permissive bill, that is proper.

Finally, there is the issue of how a Lifeline program will be supported financially. In Staff's memo outlining options for the Committee, I understand three options were provided: 1) The State funds it; 2) A surcharge is placed on intrastate calls; and 3) Telephone companies fund it through tariff, i.e., by filing for rate increases.

In the first instance, we have already noted that the State is currently providing a Lifeline subsidy. We have also already pointed out that under the Food Stamp program, provision is made to fund the full local service cost and, in some instances, more than that amount.

If a surcharge on intrastate calls were mandated, a worse time to do it couldn't be found. In our earlier testimony we said the current Joint Board proceeding on Alaska rate integration is one of the most critical events in our State's history. While that proceeding is far from over, it would appear that no matter what happens, there will be tremendous pressure to raise the already high intrastate rate. A surcharge, of course, will simply push the rate higher thereby bringing more ratepayers into the endangered category.

The third option, funding by local telephone company tariff action, follows suit. It is likely that many companies in Alaska will have a shortfall on the local side at the end of the eight year phase in period of interstate access charges and reallocation of costs. We are still in the process of determining the extent of the truthfulness of that statement. But to shift additional costs to the local column would serve to exacerbate that problem. In addition, there are costs associated with a rate case, often substantial, which also must be included in the rate base. Rate cases are never simple and always include the possibility that opposition to increases will appear no matter how justified the increase may be.

That summarizes our position on Lifeline. I would only add our earlier statement to the Committee that we believe the most pressing issue of the day to be the larger issue of Universal Service. The increasing pressures on local and intrastate rates which exist today and which could, in the blackest of scenarios, threaten the tremendous progress we have made in extending telephone service to the smallest of communities must take precedence for without the presence of Universal Service the issue of Lifeline becomes moot.

We again thank the Committee for allowing us the time to present our views. I will attempt to answer any questions.
