



Educational funding is the largest expenditure in the operating budget and justifiably so. We have put a priority on educating our children and the one thing that we can do to keep this as stable as possible is to pass legislation that will insure that school districts will know in advance what funding they will have. Decisions in education have to be made slowly to insure that all ramifications are addressed. This keeps the best interest of the students in the forefront and expediency in the background. The legislature, in not moving this concept forward, is essentially forcing school districts into scurrying around in the summer to revise budgets for the coming school year. This leaves very few options when there is a reduction in funding. Contracts are already signed, maintenance costs are set and this leaves school districts in a bind.

There are two reasons why now is the time to move on this issue. We are all aware of the declining revenue situation and that there is a good chance that it will take several years for the price of oil to come back up. This means that we are looking at reductions in foundation support. Schools usually make curricular plans in terms of years and cycles. They should also be able to make their budgetary plans also in advance. The second reason that this is an opportune time for forward funding is that having an accurate picture of what funding a district could expect would enhance labor negotiations. We use the term "good faith negotiations" but fail to give the districts the information that they need to negotiate monetary consideration in a contract. An analogy that could be used is that of buying a house sight unseen and having to take a cut in pay at the same time.

Senate Bill 215 is an act that will use funds from the undistributed account to forward fund education in a two year cycle. There has been a lot of speculation about using the undistributed account for a myriad of proposals. These proposals have met opposition from those who feel that the money should not be spent at all. We are going to fund education anyway, so why not enhance the planning and budgeting abilities of school districts. Putting the money to use in a forward funding scheme would not spend the money.

There has been criticism of school district for carrying over large sums of money from year to year. Forward funding would eliminate the need for this to happen. This is by no means a panacea for education but it will enable school districts to operate in a more efficient manner and as mentioned before, be able to plan changes in staffing and programs with ample time to involve the community in making the best possible decisions.

I am attaching supportive correspondence that I have received from around the state. This is one issue that school boards, administrators and teachers can all agree upon. I would ask you to join with us and support this much needed legislation.

RE: SB 215

SB 215 is presently in the Senate HESS Committee. I would like you to schedule it for hearing at the earliest possible date.

During this session we will be looking at the funding problems facing education in the state. Teachers, Administrators, and School Boards statewide agree that forward funding will alleviate some of the budgeting problems that our schools face.

Forward funding will enhance the planning capabilities of school districts. Accurate staffing and programatic funding would be based on the figures that the district will be receiving not a guess. Labor issues in negotiation would be dealt with in a more equitable manner because both parties would know the parameters that they are dealing with in the budget.

Dear Senator *John*

I am not sure if I mentioned to you or not but the teacher's union through the State NEA office in Fairbanks is suing the school district because we have refused to require the Principal-Teachers in the district to be represented by the teacher's association. The board has recognized and met with the Principal-Teachers and Principals of the district as a unit of their own and have reached agreement with them. We have since reached agreement with the Teacher's Association on a three year contract but they are still pursuing the law suit trying to force us to let them represent the Principal-Teachers in the district. The Principal-Teachers in our district by secret election have opted out and desire to be represented by their own group. The State Law regarding opting out of the Teachers Union is very unclear in that it states that Principals and Assistant Principals as well as other Administrative types may opt out of the teachers union bargaining group, however, the Teacher's union is maintaining that Principal-Teachers are not Administrators.

I would like to request that you consider an amendment to that current law which would simply allow Principal-Teachers to be included in the group that can opt out. We are not asking that they be denied the right to collective bargaining, but only allow them to decide what group would represent them in collective bargaining. There would be nothing to prevent them from going with the Teacher's Association if that was their wish or they could be represented by their own group. To me, I know the Teacher's Union will totally oppose this. However, I don't see how they can get much support for forcing some group to be represented by them that wishes other representation.

Subj: SB-217, an Act relating to participation in a negotiating unit by administrators who also teach.

Today, I introduced SB-217, and it was referred to the Health, Education, and Social Services Committee. I am very interested in the bill and would appreciate your scheduling it before the committee as soon as possible.

Attached, is a letter that I received from Dr. Joe B. Cooper, the Superintendent of the Yukon-Koyukuk School District, which I think outlines the need for the bill. SB-217 simply places in statute the right for those who both teach and serve in an administrative capacity to choose which bargaining unit they prefer to represent them in contract discussions with a given school district.

adoption information. Adult adoptees would continue to have access to the name and address of their biological parents. However, the biological parents would be notified of the request by certified mail, and be given 90 days to respond. If no response was received, disclosure would be made.

In addition, because of the demand for non-identifying information on the biological parents (blood type, ethnic background, etc.), SB 187 would require that a petitioner for adoption file with the state registrar specific "non-identifying" information regarding the biological parent. This information would be released upon the request of an adoptive parent or child.

SB 192, Waiving restrictions on use of sick leave banks.

SB 192 would waive the limit on the amount of sick leave a teacher may draw in cases of severe illness or extreme hardship. This waiver would be at the discretion of the local school board.

Currently, school boards may establish sick leave banks from which a teacher, in an unusual circumstance, may draw up to twice the number of days of sick leave accumulated before the first day of school, or 24 days whichever is greater. However, in an isolated case of severe illness, a teacher may not have accrued enough sick leave to sufficiently cover the duration of an illness. SB 192 would allow individual school boards to consider the merits of each request before granting approval.

SB 217, An Act relating to participation in a negotiating unit by administrators who also teach.

Under current statute, certificated employees in a school district may by majority vote designate an educational organization to bargain for them, and the school board must recognize the organization as the bargaining agent for all certificated staff. However, current statute also allows certificated administrative personnel groups, including principals, to "opt out" and negotiate independently of the other certificated personnel.

A specific category of certificated personnel, "principal-teachers", is not addressed in existing law. SB 217 would clarify that teachers who also serve as administrators may "opt out" and choose to bargain with the certificated administrative personnel rather than with the teachers.

The National Education Association (NEA) and the Yukon Koyukuk School District are currently involved in litigation over the ability of principal-teachers to opt out.

All administrators must have a current teaching certificate. "Teacher-principals" and even principals are not required by state law to have an administrative certificate. However, many districts will require an administrative certificate for principals. (Superintendents must have one.)

AMENDS THE TEACHER'S COLLECTIVE BARGAINING LAW, WHICH CURRENTLY ALLOWS CERTIFICATED TEACHERS AND ADMINISTRATORS TO BE REPRESENTED BY A BARGAINING AGENT (N.E.A....), BUT ALLOWS ADMINISTRATORS TO "OPT OUT" AND BE REPRESENTED AND NEGOTIATE SEPARATELY. THE LAW DOES NOT ADDRESS TEACHER-PRINCIPALS. SACKETT INTRODUCED THE BILL BECUASE OF A LAWSUIT FILED BY N.E.A. AGAINST THE YUKON-KOYUKUK SCHOOL DISTRICT, WHO ALLOWED ITS TEACHER-PRINCIPALS TO OPT OUT AND BARGAIN WITH THE ADMINISTRATORS.

QUESTIONS:

1. WHAT IS THE STATUS OF THE LITIGATION? WOULD PASSAGE OF THIS LEGISLATION HAVE ANY EFFECT ON THAT LAWSUIT? (Legal has advised that technically legislative action has no effect on an ongoing lawsuit. However, the court is attempting to interpret what the legislature was authorizing principal-teachers to do when they enacted the statute, and a legislative clarification at this time could render that point moot.)
2. THE GOVERNOR HAS INTRODUCED BINDING ARBITRATION LEGISLATION. DOES IT ADDRESS THIS PROVISION? (Not specifically, but it would establish a labor relations agency, consisting of 3 governor's appointees, to administer the collective bargaining law. One thing they could do is decide the fate of the teacher-principals, and NEA prefers to have this group of professionals make this decision rather than have it set in statute.)
3. DO WE HAVE MANY TEACHER-PRINCIPALS IN THE STATE? (Probably close to 100, generally in rural or very small schools.)
4. WHY IS N.E.A. OPPOSED TO TEACHER-PRINCIPALS OPTING OUT? (NEA feels they share more interests and responsibilities with teachers than with administrators. IS N.E.A. CONCERNED ABOUT A REDUCTION IN THEIR MEMBERSHIP?)

SENATE BILL NO. 219 by Senators DeVries, Falke, Rodey, Vic Fischer and Sturgulewski, entitled:

"An Act establishing a special unit for the investigation of criminally exploited and missing children; and providing for an effective date."

was read the first time and referred to the State Affairs Committee, the Health, Education and Social Services Committee and the Judiciary Committee.

The State Affairs Committee considered SENATE BILL NO. 219 (establishing a special unit for the investigation of criminally exploited and missing children; efd) and a majority of the committee recommended do pass. The report was signed by Senator Abcoy, Chairman and concurred in by Senators DeVries, Ray and Kelly.

"Letter of Intent

SB 219: 'An Act establishing a special unit for the investigation of criminally exploited and missing children; and providing for an effective date.'

It is the intent of the legislature that funding for the core Special Unit for the Investigation of Criminally exploited and Missing Children be utilized to establish an investigative unit to combat the problems presented by the criminal exploitation of children and missing children.

The Unit will function with a manpower structure based upon that employed by the METRO Drug Units. The core unit will be based in Anchorage, but the Unit is expected to provide assistance to other law enforcement agencies.

The funding for the Unit is envisioned as a budgetary addendum to the Department of Public Safety pass through grant to the Municipalities."

SENATE BILL NO. 219 was referred to the Health, Education and Social Services Committee.

The Health, Education and Social Services Committee considered SENATE BILL NO. 219 (special unit for the investigation of criminally exploited and missing children; efd) and recommended do pass. The report was signed by Senator Fahrenkamp, Chairman and concurred in by Senators DeVries, Josephson,

Dear Legislator:

We are aware, as are each of you, that funding must be prioritized. A first priority must be those needs that preserve the safety and well being of people and most particularly children. The children of Alaska are today facing a crisis. An epidemic is upon them that before they reach their eighteenth birthday will strike one in every four girls and one in every nine boys. This menace is health and life threatening and often leaves severe mental and emotional handicap.

One of the answers to controlling this menace is by stopping the carrier of this disease from continuing in acts of personal gratification through the literal torture of children. While many of you have recognized the danger and have been helpful in committee passage of SB 219 and HB 330, others of you have indicated that you don't know how this state could fund the Child Exploitation Law Enforcement Unit this year. Can you, in all good conscience, afford not to protect the children of Alaska?

We do not speak to in vague generalities about a nebulous problem. I only wish you could be here with us when we try to explain to distraught parents why their sexually injured child's case cannot be a priority with law enforcement . . . I wish you could have been here when we took the twenty-six page statement from the teenager who revealed in graphic detail what it was like to live in a "whore-house for children", or the months of visiting our two teenage friends in API, victims of sexual abuse, drugs, and witchcraft, forever shadows of the bright young people they could have been. I would send you the bereaved mothers, fathers, and grandparents of the little ones and teenagers lost and missing. Runaways are not police matters, or there just isn't enough evidence or enough time. They beg for help, for hope, something -- anything. If you were here perhaps you could find a way to tell parents to be careful, that there is a monster who would lure teenagers into a brutal sado-masochistic "club" or of the slime who is reported to be filming children in sex acts with animals.



In response to your request for information, I offer the following.

SB 219 establishes a criminally exploited and missing children investigative unit under the Department of Public Safety. The purpose of the unit is to investigate incidents of missing children and the criminal exploitation of children in the state. This unit would be located in Anchorage.

Presently, a similar unit exists in Anchorage. This unit is composed of state troopers and Anchorage police. Unfortunately, this unit is under staffed, and thus has been unable to investigate a number of cases involving pedophilia. These cases take a tremendous amount of work up, since they usually involve serial victims. Priority has been assigned to incest cases, and "standard" sexual abuse matters.

I bring this to your attention because of the need to adequately fund a statewide unit. Without sufficient staff and resources, this unit will not be able to address the Anchorage needs, much less statewide needs. There is a need now for "experts" to be available in the investigation of these cases. SB 219 is a vehicle which could supply needed law enforcement for these complicated matters.

SB 219, Establishing a special unit for the investigation of criminally exploited and missing children.

SB 219 would establish within the Department of Public Safety a special unit for investigating incidents of missing children and the criminal exploitation of children. A letter of intent adopted by the Senate State Affairs Committee envisions a core unit based in Anchorage that will provide assistance to other law enforcement agencies, with funding provided through the Department of Public Safety.

In FY 85 the Municipality of Anchorage received \$150,000 as a line item grant for the creation of a child exploitation investigative unit. The unit consists of six Anchorage Police Department investigators; one state trooper investigator works with the Anchorage unit. The Department of Public Safety is charged with the enforcement of all criminal laws of the state, which includes the abuse and exploitation of children, but a specialized unit for investigation of these crimes has not been established.

SB 242, Relating to educational attendance area school boards.

Current statute provides for dividing a regional educational attendance area into sections for the purpose of electing school board members. Such division is proposed by a regional school board or by petition, and established by the Departments of Education and Community and Regional Affairs based on population. The proportion of members which may represent each section is specified by law.

SB 242 would allow for variance in the number of members per section upon a determination by the Department of Education that there have been substantial population fluctuations within the REAA which could result in under or overrepresentation of sections.

The bill is aimed at a situation in Southeast Alaska, where migratory populations associated with logging camps have resulted in significant population shifts within REAA's.

For Bill/Resolution No. SB 219

The Department of Law has been asked to submit a revised fiscal note on SB 219, a bill which established a special unit for the investigation of cases of criminally exploited and missing children. The bill does not specify the size or precise structure of the proposed investigative unit, however, and the department has based its cost assumptions on the staffing plans of the Alaska State Troopers and the Anchorage Police Department should SB 219 become law.

In a memorandum to DPS Commissioner Robert Sundberg, dated August 29, 1985, AST Director Colonel Michael Kolivosky described the law enforcement requirements for adequate staffing of the investigative unit contemplated in SB 219. For purposes of this fiscal note the Department of Law has assumed, based upon that memorandum, that the existing joint APD/AST child sexual abuse investigative unit in Anchorage will be augmented by the addition of two APD investigators, two AST investigators, and two clerks, all to be paid for by state funds. In addition to this increase in the existing APD/AST investigative unit, a statewide child sexual abuse and exploitation investigative unit (modelled on AST's statewide metropolitan drug enforcement unit) will be created in the Department of Public Safety. This unit will include two sergeants, an analyst/programmer, and a clerk/typist, all to be located at the Criminal Investigation Bureau (CIB) in Anchorage. Three other AST investigators will also be added in other parts of the state--one each in Palmer, Fairbanks, and Juneau.

These changes would result in a total increase statewide of two supervisors, seven investigators, one analyst/programmer, and three clerks devoted to investigations of missing children and child sexual abuse and exploitation cases. These cases are generally quite complicated; they are time consuming both to investigate and to present in court. Factors such as the young age of the victim, the frightening and humiliating nature of the abusive conduct, and the emotional trauma the child has suffered combine to make these types of cases among the most difficult to successfully prosecute.

Based upon the department's past experience in prosecuting cases generated by the existing APD/AST child sexual abuse unit in Anchorage, the criminal division will need three additional attorneys (two in Anchorage and one in Fairbanks), one paralegal assistant (Anchorage), and two legal secretaries (one

in Anchorage and one in Fairbanks) to handle the additional cases which will be generated by the increase in investigative personnel which will result from the adoption of SB 219.

The attorneys will work closely with the law enforcement officers during the course of these complicated, lengthy investigations to advise them on legal issues and to assist in obtaining search and arrest warrants. The attorneys will present the cases to the grand jury, handle discovery and pretrial motion matters, present the state's case at trial, and represent the interest of the victims and the public at sentencing hearings. The paralegal assistant will assist the attorneys in preparing witnesses for grand jury and trial, issuing subpoenas, maintaining regular contact with the victim and family members, assisting victims in obtaining the return of property seized as evidence, and advising victims on such things as application for violent crimes compensation awards and obtaining psychological counselling. The legal secretaries are needed to type charging documents, motions, memoranda, and other necessary legal pleadings related to the new cases.

The two Anchorage attorneys will assist the Palmer District Attorney's Office in handling cases generated by the additional trooper investigator in Palmer. The Department of Law has requested an additional prosecutor for the Juneau District Attorney's Office in its general fund increment request for FY87. If that position is not funded, however, an additional prosecutor in Juneau will also be needed to handle the increased caseload which will result from the addition of a child sexual abuse investigator in Juneau.

FISCAL IMPACT

The Court System's estimate of fiscal impact is based upon estimates of caseload provided by the Department of Public Safety and upon the Court's experience with similar enforcement programs.

Public Safety is anticipating a 50 percent increase in the number of investigations conducted as a result of this legislation. The Court expects a similar increase in the number of case filings. This increase in activity will require additional clerical staff. The Court does not anticipate needing additional judges to handle the new caseload.

This bill relates to the establishment of a special unit of Alaska State Troopers for the purpose of investigating incidents of criminal exploitation of children. The Department of Public Safety has requested an additional 18 positions for this program while the Department of Law is requesting 7 more positions to handle the additional cases generated by criminal prosecution and Child in Need of Aid petitions. The Office of Public Advocacy will require a minimum of 5 additional positions to respond to the children who will be the subject of Child in Need of Aid petitions. The provision of statutorily mandated Guardian ad Litem services to the subject children will require an Attorney III, an Associate Attorney II, and a Legal Secretary I for Anchorage and an Associate Attorney II and a Legal Secretary for Fairbanks.

The Office of Public Advocacy must provide Guardian ad Litem services in rural areas through contract professionals. Further, the Office of Public Advocacy must frequently provide contract legal representation to non-offending parties in Child in Need of Aid proceedings. The increased number of cases generated by additional staffing of the departments of public safety and law will necessitate at least 75.0 in contract expenditures for the Office of Public Advocacy.

For Bill/Resolution No. SB219

This bill relates to the establishment of a special unit of state troopers for the purpose of investigating incidents of criminal exploitation of children. Public Safety has requested an additional 18 positions for this program while the Department of Law is requesting 7 more positions to handle prosecutions of these cases. The Public Defender Agency will need a minimum of 5 additional positions to be able to respond to these new prosecutions. In order to provide the constitutionally required defense for the accused in the new cases which will result from such a concentration of law enforcement personnel and prosecutors, an Attorney IV, an Attorney III and a Legal Secretary I for Anchorage, and an Attorney III and a Legal Secretary I for Fairbanks will be necessary.

You have requested a sectional analysis of Senate Bill 219 which establishes a special unit for investigation of criminally exploited and missing children.

Section 1 is legislative findings. The legislature finds there is an escalation of crime committed by and against children and that delinquent acts by children are frequently the result of their criminal and sexual exploitation. It further finds the need to establish a cooperative local, state and federal effort to combat incidents of certain named crimes against children.

Section 2 creates a new section of law, Sec. 18.65.086.

(a) Establishes a special unit within the State Troopers for investigating incidents of missing children and criminal exploitation of children.

(b) Requires the commissioner of public safety to annually submit to the legislature a report concerning the activities of the special unit. The report must be submitted within 30 days of convening of the legislature. The paragraph also contains a nonexclusive list of matters which must be included in the report.

(c) Contains definitions of terms as used in this section. A child is a person under 18. Criminal exploitation of children means the use of a child by an adult in a criminal manner for gratification or profit of the adult.

Section 3 provides that this act takes effect July 1, 1985.

It is to be noted that the investigative power of the special unit is cast in broad, general terms while the findings are in specific terms. The specificity is guidance for the special unit but is not limiting except for the stress in the findings on cooperative efforts.
