Harold M. Brown was born in Colon, Panama, on October 2, 1940. He grew up primarily in Colebrook, New Hampshire, where he graduated from the Colebrook Academy in 1958. He attended the University of New Hampshire and graduated with a B.A. degree in 1963. He attended law school at Boston University in Boston, Massachusetts, and graduated with an LL.B. degree in 1968.

For two years prior to attending law school, "Hal" toured America as a member of a folksinging group called the Brandywine Singers.

Following graduation from law school he spent one year as an associate with a small Boston law firm and then two years (1969-1971) as a member of the Criminal Division staff of the Department of Attorney General of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts. He left that position to become District Attorney in Ketchikan, Alaska, in August of 1971.

He left the Ketchikan District Attorney's office in 1973 to return to Boston University where he received an advanced law degree in Taxation (LL.M.) in 1974.

He returned to Ketchikan in May of 1974 and practiced law for over 11 years as a partner in what is now the law firm of Ziegler, Cloudy, King, (Brown) and Peterson.

He was a member of the Board of Governors of the Alaska Bar Association from 1982 to 1985, serving as President of the Bar for the 1984-1985 term.

He was appointed Attorney General by Governor Bill Sheffield and took office on July 9, 1985.

Mr. Brown was married to Susan Murphy of North Andover, Massachusetts, on June 20, 1970, and has two children: Molly, age 11, and Katy, age 9.

PROCEDURE FOR ALL APPOINTMENTS.
TEXT Appointments shall be made in the following manner:

(1) The appointing authority shall, within 30 days of the convening of the legislature in regular session, present to the legislature for confirmation the names of the following persons: (A) persons appointed to a position or membership who have not previously been confirmed by the legislature or either house of it; (B) persons appointed by him subject to confirmation to fill an existing position or membership vacancy; (C) persons to be appointed subject to confirmation to fill a position or membership the term of which shall expire before July 2, following the session of the legislature. If an appointment is made after the deadline but while the legislature is in session, the appointing authority shall, within five calendar days after the appointment is made, present to the legislature for confirmation the name of the person appointed. The deadline may be extended by the legislature by the approval of a concurrent resolution.

(2) When appointments are presented to the legislature for confirmation,

(A) the presiding officer of each house shall assign the name of each appointee to a standing committee of that house for a hearing, report and recommendation; standing committees of the two houses assigned the same person's name for consideration may meet jointly to consider the qualifications of the person appointed and may issue either a separate or a joint report and recommendation concerning that person; then

(B) the legislature shall, before the end of the session in which the appointments are presented, in joint session assembled, act on the appointments by confirming or declining to confirm by a majority vote of all of the members the appointments presented.

(3) When the legislature declines to confirm an appointment, the legislature shall notify the appointing authority of its action and a vacancy in the position or membership exists which the appointing authority shall fill by making a new appointment. The new appointment shall be presented for confirmation to the legislature within 20 calendar days following receipt by the appointing authority of the legislature's notification of its refusal to confirm the prior appointment. If the name of a person is submitted and is not confirmed, the appointing authority may not, upon resubmission of appointments, submit again the name of the person whose confirmation was refused for the same position or membership during the session of the legislature at which confirmation was refused. The person whose name is refused for appointment by the legislature may not thereafter be appointed to the position or membership during the interim between legislative sessions. Failure of the legislature to act to confirm or decline to confirm an appointment during the session in which the appointment was presented is tantamount to a declination of confirmation on the day the session adjourns.

(4) Pending confirmation or rejection of appointment by the legislature, persons appointed shall exercise the functions, and have the powers and be charged with the duties prescribed by law for the appointive positions or membership.

SECTION 24. Each principal department shall be under the supervision of the governor.

SECTION 25. The head of each principal department shall be a single executive unless otherwise provided by law. He shall be appointed by the governor, subject to confirmation by a majority of the members of the legislature in joint session, and shall serve at the pleasure of the governor, except as otherwise provided in this article with respect to the lieutenant governor. The heads of all principal departments shall be citizens of the United States.

(The amendment to this section was approved by the voters of the state August 25, 1970 and became effective October 10, 1970. The words "secretary of state" were changed to "lieutenant governor".)

Boards and
Commissions

SECTION 26. When a board or commission is at the head of a principal department or a regulatory or quasi-judicial agency, its members shall be appointed by the governor, subject to confirmation by a majority of the members of the legislature in joint session, and may be removed as provided by law. They shall be citizens of the United States. The board or commission may appoint a principal executive officer when authorized by law, but the appointment shall be subject to the approval of the governor.

Recess
Appointments

SECTION 27. The governor may make appointments to fill vacancies occurring during a recess of the legislature, in offices requiring confirmation by the legislature. The duration of such appointments shall be prescribed by law.

ARTICLE IV

THE JUDICIARY

Judicial
Power and
Jurisdiction

SECTION 1. The judicial power of the State is vested in a supreme court, a superior court and the courts established by the legislature. The jurisdic-

tion of courts shall be prescribed by law. The courts shall constitute a unified judicial system for operation and administration. Judicial districts shall be established by law.

Supreme
Court

SECTION 2. (a) The supreme court shall be the highest court of the State with final appellate jurisdiction. It shall consist of three justices, one of whom is chief justice. The number of justices may be increased by law upon the request of the supreme court.

(b) The chief justice shall be selected from among the justices of the supreme court by a majority vote of the justices. His term of office as chief justice is three years. A justice may serve more than one term as chief justice but he may not serve consecutive terms in that office.

(The amendment to this section was approved by the voters of the state August 25, 1970 and became effective October 10, 1970. Subsection (b) was added.)

Superior
Court

SECTION 3. The superior court shall be the trial court of general jurisdiction and shall consist of five judges. The number of judges may be changed by law.

Qualifications
of Justices
and Judges

SECTION 4. Supreme court justices and superior court judges shall be citizens of the United States and of the State, licensed to practice law in the State, and possessing any additional qualifications prescribed by law. Judges of other courts shall be selected in a manner, for terms, and with qualifications prescribed by law.

SECTION 5. The governor shall fill any vacancy in an office of supreme court justice or superior court judge by appointing one of two or more persons nominated by the judicial council.

SECTION 6. Each supreme court justice and superior court judge shall, in the manner provided by law, be subject to approval or rejection on a nonpartisan ballot at the first general election held







LLEWELLYN (LEW) WILLIAMS, JR., 56, is publisher and part owner of the Ketchikan Daily News. His wife, Dorothy, who came to Alaska 28 years ago as a school teacher, is co-publisher, business manager and the other owner of the newspaper.

SUBJECT: Guardianship for incapacitated persons
(Work Order No. 14-0647)

TO: Senator Pat Rodey

You have requested a review of the procedures concerning guardianship for incapacitated persons, particularly as to a natural parent becoming a guardian for their child. The relevant statutory provisions are contained in AS 13.26.005 - 13.26.155. As you may recall, the statutes concerning guardianship underwent comprehensive revision in 1981, specifically as to incapacitated persons.

The guardianship laws are designed to promote and protect individuals who cannot, because of impairment, do so themselves. Guardianship is also intended to be limited to the extent necessitated by the person's mental and physical abilities. The process that results in this particular kind of guardianship does not hinge on the age of the person, but relates to the ability to provide for essential physical health or safety. Therefore a persons status as an adult or a minor is not relevant to initiating or reviewing the guardianship of an incapacitated person. Guardianship of a minor is an entirely separate procedure, and terminates when the minor reaches the age of majority, which in Alaska is 18.

Assuming that a person is incapacitated and a parent or other person wished to have a guardian appointed for health or safety reasons, the process starts with the filing of a petition in Superior Court. A hearing is held on the petition and the person alleged to be incapacitated is entitled to legal counsel for these proceedings. Also the court is required to appoint an independent professional to

perform an evaluation. This person writes an evaluation report that includes recommendations regarding the type and extent of assistance needed, and the appropriate type of guardianship, if any, that should be implemented. Assuming that the court finds that guardianship is necessary, then the court may appoint either a full or partial guardian. The court then enters an order that appoints a guardian and adopts a guardianship plan. The duration of the term of guardianship is determined by court order.

Concerning changes in a guardianship order, the court may review an order at any time upon receipt of a "report or other information", if the court determines that the hearing is in the best interests of the ward. Concerning changes in the guardian, AS 13.26.125 provides that the ward, the guardian, or anyone interested in the welfare of the ward can petition the court for removal of the guardian and appointment of a successor. These procedures appear to be quite straightforward, and designed to place the best interest of the ward before all other considerations.

Natural parents are given some priority as guardians, under AS 13.26.145, assuming that the parent is qualified. These priorities are not binding on the court however, and again it is the question of who is best qualified and willing to serve as guardian, that is the determining factor. Without changing this basic premise, it is difficult to see how the present law regarding guardianship could be changed to make it easier for a natural parent to become a guardian. It is not difficult to foresee that in specific cases, it may be a very close question as to who is best qualified to serve as a guardian. However the statutes provide for appointment of legal counsel for the person who is claimed to be incapacitated, for appointment of a professional in the field of law, medicine, mental health care, or related area, to do an independent evaluation, and also for appointment of a guardian ad litem, to assist the ward in regard to explaining the legal proceedings. In making a final determination the court must base it's decision to either appoint a guardian or choose an alternative form of protection based on clear and convincing evidence.

In conclusion, it would appear that the procedures to determine the guardianship of incapacitated persons are designed to place the needs of that person foremost, and favor natural parents only if they are qualified as guardians, as determined by the court. Guardianship is a process that is

selected only after the court has determined that no other alternative is available. In this sense it requires the court make a detailed and careful examination of the person claimed to be incapacitated. Likewise changes in a guardianship require that the court make a careful review to insure that the best interests of the ward are foremost in any decision, and that the proposed guardian is qualified to meet the needs of the ward.

This review of the law of guardianship has been quite general of course, and is not intended to address particular guardianship cases. If you have specific issues or sections of the statutes that you wish me to examine further please let me know.
