Sport Fishing From Commercially Licensed Troll Vessels

WHEREAS, Section 5 AAC 46.060 and 5 AAC 49.060 (Alaska Administrative Code) prohibit a person to sport fish from a registered salmon hand troll or power troll vessel; and

WHEREAS, this would require the purchase of another boat to use for sport fishing, which the hand troller cannot afford; and

WHEREAS, subsistence fishing is done at a few select locations in Southeast Alaska and if a fisherman cannot be a subsistence user and is not allowed to sport fish off of their boat, they have little or no opportunity to take fish home; and

WHEREAS, the hand troller has to sell every fish he catches in order to make ends meet, and therefore has little opportunity to take fish home to feed the family; and

WHEREAS, the Limited Entry Commission issued 2050 hand troll permits; in the last four years only about 800 permits are active -- the rest of these fishermen are probably sport fishing already;

WHEREAS, the Board of Fisheries sets annual quotas for all troll fisheries and sports fishing and the sport fishing quota has never been filled; and

WHEREAS, there is concern that allowing hand trollers to sport fish would fill the sport fishing quota sooner; however, it is never taken into consideration that all of the "derby"-caught fish caught by sport fishermen is sold and counted against the commercial fishermen's quota; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Fish now allows sport fish for halibut from hand troll boats; this has been allowed under subsistence regulations for quite some time; and

WHEREAS, the hand trollers are allowed to sport fish from their boats until they register their boat for commercial fishing, which could be the day before the commercial fishing begins. This makes the regulation defective and practically unenforceable by the Department of Public Safety;


NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the 51st General Assembly of Central council of Tlingit and Haida Indian Tribes of Alaska assembled in Juneau on April 17 - 19, 1986, hereby support House Bill 492; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED copies be sent to Governor Bill Sheffield; State House of Representatives; and State Senate.

Dear Representative Herrmann:

This letter for you and the members of the House Resources Committee is in regards to HB 492, submitted by Representative Duncan of Juneau. HB 492 is a bill wishing to do away with current regulations concerning vessel registration. HB 492 wants it to be legal to commercial salmon fish and sport salmon fish from the same vessel. This same bill was introduced by Representative Duncan last year and was not adopted. The Elfin Cove Fish and Game Advisory Committee is, as we were last year and in previous years, opposed to HB 492.

Firstly, and perhaps most importantly, HB 492 is a Board of Fisheries matter. Our understanding of the system is that fish and game allocation matters are considered by the respective board, either Fisheries or Game. We, as an Advisory Committee, review proposals submitted to the boards and then make our advisory comments directly, first written then orally at the proper Board meeting. This way with due public notice of Fish and Game issues all concerned individuals, groups, etc., can get together and hammer things out at a meeting. We believe this to be a good regulatory-making process that gives anyone so inclined free direct access to the policymakers at a certain time at a certain place. When Fish and Game issues of an allocative nature surface in the Legislature, it's upsetting to us that lawmakers are not willing to use the proper forum to further their voters' wishes. We believe that HB 492 is this type of allocative fisheries issue.

We suggest that your Committee invite Dave Cantillion from the Juneau ADF&G office to speak to your Committee. The delicate balance of salmon allocation amongst the user groups would become clear once you were briefed to the regulations, allocation policies and fishing patterns and areas that the Troll Fishery operates by. Ask ADF&G the allocative ramifications of more commercial hand troll effort in July and August on the Coho stocks in Lynn Canal, Chatham and Icy Straights.

Of the 2,200 hand troll permits, almost 500 are held by people in the Juneau area and are not being used. Current regulations require a person to register their vessel either sport or commercial fish every year prior to the summer troll season, with no dual registration allowed. Therefore, many hand troll permit holders

in Juneau choose to register their boats (generally of fiberglass, 19 to 26 foot sport/pleasure type craft (the Juneau harbors are full of them)) for sport, in order to fish Kings in April, May and the first of June around Juneau on days off and weekends, and then later on fish in the Derby and also fish for Cohos.

If HB 492 carries, then this sport/hand troll fleet, numbering hundreds in the Juneau area alone, are from Auke Bay within two hours cruising time of fertile Coho fishing in Lynn Canal, Chatham and Icy Straights. So they want to enjoy the best of both worlds, sport fishing spawning sized kings in the Spring, and doing a little commercial hand trolling for Cohos during summer vacations. The hand troll fleet, by regulation, is allocated 20% of the total troll catch of Cohos; right now that is being maintained at about 18% though in 1980 it was 34% when 2,000 hand trollers fished because Limited Entry was coming in soon. So any substantial increase in hand troll effort on the Cohos will put that group over their allocation and they have to quit fishing.

This would really hurt the rural resident hand troller in Hoonah, Angoon, Gustavus, Elfin Cove and similar places who depend on Cohos for the large share of their fishing income. Also, the whole Troll Fishery could be tied up due to the Department's policy of monitoring the strength of the Coho run in Southeast Alaska by using run strength indicators in Northern Southeast, these are the Juneau sports fishery and the inside gill netters. If escapement and inside fishery allocation goals are not above the past ten year average, then the troll fleet, not the gill netters, seiners or sports, is closed totally for ten days.

The Department is very conservative with this policy. In the last three out of four years all criteria had been met but there was still a ten-day August closure. Hoonah had their fishing time reduced in Icy Straights to eight days on, six days off schedule from seven days a week not too long ago. They probably are not too interested in any extra fishing effort in their area. They will once again be asking the Board to repeal the "eight and six" at a meeting in Sitka this March. From my experience of attending board meetings for the last five years, all these issues -- early registration for vessels, 80/20 Coho allocation split, 10-day August Coho closure, "eight and six" in Icy Straights and similar proposals -- have come up for vote. Policy has remained the same because an allocation balance has been reached that provides for the stocks to regenerate and a viable allocation to each user group. Introduction of a new major user would have to be absorbed in respect to the plan the users are already

operating under, this could only fairly be done at a Board of Fisheries meeting.

We trust your Committee can see the value in keeping the job of making regulations in the proper forum and not give HB 492 a favorable recommendation for passage.

Unfortunately, we cannot send a representative to your Committee hearing on HB 492 for further information exchange, though we remain at your service. My number in Elfin Cove is 239-2222.

Dear Representative Goll:

At the 1985 Southeast finfish meeting, the Hoonah Advisory Committee's Proposal #338 requested that the Alaska Board of Fisheries ask the Legislature to identify charter vessel operations as a separate user group for which separate regulations could be written. The board agreed, and so I am writing to you as the Chairman of the House Special Committee on Fisheries and Hoonah's representative. The board also asked the Southeast Regional Council members to make their views known to their legislators.


For the past several years we have received a number of proposals which address charter boat fishing. It is apparent that most people view charter operations as a discrete classification. However since AS 16.05.251, which outlines the board's authority, does not refer to charter operations, the Department of Law has told us that we are on very shaky legal ground when we adopt regulations like the six line limit for charter vessels in Southeast.

This regulation was strongly supported by the Southeast charter vessel operators, who continue to be concerned that this regulation could be overturned in court. As this industry grows, I believe that more and more fishermen will want the board to address it separately. In order to avoid at least some confusion, it would be helpful if the board's authority to do so were clear.

CONTINUATION OF FISCAL NOTE ANALYSIS

For Bill/Resolution No. SSHB 510

It is estimated that there are perhaps five game bird farms operating in Alaska. If each of these farms purchased a game bird farm biennial license at a cost of \$20.00 instead of the current \$200.00, there would be an estimated loss of \$900.00 to the general fund every other year.

BACKGROUND/LEGISLATIVE INTENT
The intent of this bill is to reduce the license requirement for game bird farming from \$200 to \$20.

ANALYSIS OF BILL/PROGRAM EFFECTS
Game farming license receipts are deposited directly into the general fund. If this bill becomes law, the cost of a game bird farming license will become nominal, gross receipts to the general fund will be reduced, and the costs of administering the game farm licensing program may exceed license revenue.
As presently written, the bill language may be unnecessarily confusing in distinguishing among mammal, reptile, and game bird farming. Fur farming is addressed elsewhere in statutes. However, because "fur bearers" are also "game mammals," this bill may have the effect of reinstating the license fee for fur farming that the legislature repealed in 1983. Because non-"domestic" mammals (i.e. wild game) may not be farmed or propagated for commercial purposes and venomous reptiles may not be imported into the state, game farming in Alaska essentially applies only to "game bird farming." Therefore, a separate fee structure for game, reptile and game bird farming will have no effect on license receipts.

AMENDMENTS PROPOSED
To simplify the bill without affecting revenues and to eliminate possible confusion over licensing requirements for fur farmers, the bill could be reworded to read:

(14) Fish or game farming:
 (A) Fish farming biennial license 200
 (B) Game farming biennial license 20

ANALYSIS OF BILL/PROGRAM EFFECTS (continued)

Reducing licensing fees for game bird farming may result in administrative costs exceeding license receipts. Because very few game farmers purchase licenses, little revenue is generated in any case. The program, nevertheless, has value to the Department.

Game farmers are required by statute (AS 16.05.940(12)) to keep their animals "under positive control, as in a pen...which is completely enclosed by a generally escape-proof barrier." Because the license identifies game farmers and the law requires adequate fencing, the state can retain some control of the introduction and release to the wild of many exotic animals. License fees are one means of funding the appropriate agency (DNR, DPS) for the cost of inspecting facilities.

Re: HB 510 - Game Bird Farming

I notified Judi Rivard on Monday, March 10th about HB 510 being placed on the House Finance calendar for Friday March 14, 1986.

She did mention that she had recently talked to Mr. Lewis Pamplin, Director of Game, Dept. of Fish and Game in Anchorage, and that he had told her there would probably be no opposition from the Dept. of Fish and Game on HB 510. This statement by Mr. Pamplin is somewhat contradictory to the Bill Analysis sent to our office on February 17, 1986. This analysis stated opposition to the bill and a suggestion for clarification.

Judi Rivard indicated previously that she may be flying to Juneau to testify for HB 510. However, since she had talked to Mr. Pamplin who gave her a favorable comment on the bill, she probably will not be coming to Juneau to testify.

Dear Ron,

We proposed changes in the statutes in reference to game farming as we felt that the term "game" was used to liberally. We are interested in separating game birds from the term game so they may be treated on an individual basis. The popularity of raising game birds in captivity in Alaska is on a steady increase and it is definitely time for both the state statutes and the game regulations to reflect this increase in interest. At the same time the biennial fee of \$200. for a Fish and Game Farming License is absurd and unduly harsh to those people raising \$15.00 birds. We have made a study of the game regulations of several other states and have found they charge between \$10 and \$15 annually for a game bird farming license. This is a more realistic figure and will encourage more people to obtain the license and operate within the law.

At this time we recommend that AS16.05.340(a)(14) be amended to read:

- (14) Fish or Game Farming:
 - (A) Fish, game mammal, or game reptile farming biennial license..... 200
 - (B) Game Bird Farming biennial license.. 20

Dear Ron,

We received your recent letters today, thank you for keeping us informed. If HB 510 becomes law it should not substantially reduce the gross receipts to the general fund nor should the costs of administering the game licensing program exceed the license revenue. In 1982 the receipts from game farming licenses issued were \$100., in 1983 they were \$100., in 1984 they were zero, and as of July, 1985 they were \$200. for the 1985/86 license period. That totals \$400. in revenue received for game farming over a five year period, 1982 thru 1986. These figures were made available to us on July 31, 1985, by the Fish and Game Licensing Section of the Department of Revenue.

The costs of administering the game licensing program are very nominal and will remain that way no matter how much the license fee. As far as we can determine the only cost to the state for this program is the time and material necessary for the Dept. of Revenue to issue the license. At present there appears to be no provision for the inspection of facilities or other administrative functions that would cost the state under this program. The ADF&G inspected us once when we originally applied for a permit to capture native grouse. As far as we have been able to find out the fish and game has no regulations governing game farming, especially game bird farming.


We would have no problem with the proposed amendment prepared by Phil Koehl; (14) Fish or Game Farming; (A) Fish farming and (B) Game farming. We did not propose this above change as the ADF&G non game dept. felt it would be advisable for future use to keep the mammals and reptiles under the more expensive license. Venomous reptiles may not be imported into the state but there are other numerous non-venomous species of reptiles that one can have in the state.

We would appreciate being informed as soon as possible the date that HB 510 will go before the Finance Committee and when testimony will be taken. There is a possibility that one of us may be able to appear.

We were quite distressed recently when we found out that there are absolutely no laws or regulations in effect for fur farming. Neither a license or a permit is required and there are no guidelines for control of escapes. Which will do more damage to native wildlife and domestic livestock, an escaped game bird or an escaped fox?

Alaska statute AS 16.05.340, License and Tag Fees presently reads, section (14) Fish or Game Farming Biennial License.....200. Representative Ron Larson has introduced a house bill, HB 510, in an attempt to lower the license fee for game bird farming. His bill would change AS 16.05.340 to read as follows:

- (14) Fish or Game Farming:
 - (A) Fish, game mammal, or game reptile farming biennial license.....200
 - (B) Game Bird Farming biennial license....20

The only change here is the amount you and I will have to pay for a license to legally sell game birds in Alaska. We feel \$200. every two years is far to much for any game bird hobbyist/breeder to pay. For some reason the Department of Fish and Game is opposing this change. HB 527 changes the definition of resident for the purposes of the fish and game code.

The bill would require that in order to claim state residency for fish and game purposes, a person would have to have maintained a place of abode in the state and maintained a voting residence in the state for the preceding 12 consecutive months.

This would mean that people who had lived in Alaska for 12 consecutive months, then moved away, maintaining a residency but not a place of abode, and then returned, would not be eligible for a fish and game resident license until they had been in Alaska for 12 consecutive months.

In researching the need for this measure I found no one who had any idea what purpose the deleted section provided and all parties contacted at Fish and Wildlife Protection agreed that the addition of the words referring to the preceding twelve months would help with enforcement.



Below is a brief summary of the terms of the contract:

1. Legislative action - This is a long-term negotiated contract requiring legislative approval, so a bill for legislative approval was introduced at the request of the governor. (Although the Administration disputes the constitutionality of statute requiring legislative approval, the Administration has required it as a matter of contract.)

2. Parties - Petro Star, Inc. and Chevron U.S.A., Inc. Contract has two parties in order to accommodate Petro Star's small size. Total sale volume approximates Petro Star's refinery charge, with Chevron purchasing what would otherwise be Petro Star's return oil. Instead of selling the whole amount to Petro Star with an option on the return oil, the state sells the "return oil" to Chevron for a premium. Petro Star and Chevron side agreement (contract Exhibit A) arranges for Petro Star to run Chevron's oil through the Petro Star refinery.
3. Price - Petro Star premium 35 cents. Chevron premium 50 cents. Basic price term is in-value, but is based on the Prudhoe Bay in-value amount, adjusted for the Kuparuk Pipeline tariff and the TAPS quality bank adjustment. The Prudhoe Bay in value price is comparatively higher, due to the different mix of lessees in the two fields. The prices will be adjusted for the outcome of Amerada Hess, with interest at whatever interest rate results from the resolution of the litigation.
4. Term - 10 years, from late 1986 to September 30, 1996.
5. Quantity and Source - Total sale of approximately 6500 bpd - up to 2500 bpd to Petro Star and about 4000 bpd to Chevron. Kuparuk field.
6. Security - Chevron will post a 90-day letter of credit, and Petro Star will post a 60-day letter of credit. 30 days of Petro Star's letter of credit is replaced with Chevron's agreement to take oil on 5 days' notice if Petro Star defaults. Petro Star has agreed to pay \$1.12 per barrel into an escrow for Amerada Hess.
7. Continuation - Although the purchases are tied together, the contract does not specify conditions under which either Petro Star or Chevron could continue to purchase oil if the other party defaults or terminates. These conditions are details in paragraph 2.14 of the contract.
8. Other Terms - Most other terms of the contract are drawn from other long-term in-state refiner contracts.

The Prudhoe Bay in value price is comparatively higher, due to the different mix of lessees in the two fields. The prices will be adjusted for the outcome of AH, with interest at whatever interest rate results from the resolution of the litigation.

- ② *Security - Chevron will post a 90 day letter of credit, and Pstar will post a 60 day letter of credit. 30 days of Pstar's LC is replaced by Chevron's agreement to take oil on 5 day's notice if Pstar defaults. Pstar has agreed to pay \$1.12 per barrel into an escrow for AH.

- *Continuation - Although the purchases are tied together, the contract does specify conditions on which either Pstar or Chevron could continue to purchase oil if the other party defaults or terminates. These conditions are detailed in §2.14 of the contract.

- *Other Terms - Most other terms of the contract are drawn from other long-term in state refiner contracts.

CS HB 561 (FINANCE)

It is the intent of the Legislature that citizens of the State and visitors to the State be able to enjoy the natural environment to the greatest extent possible. The establishment of new public cabins may be particularly appropriate in areas of heavy recreational interest or use. In more remote locations public use cabins should be established only after consideration of the weather and physical environment in the surrounding area, and the reasons the area is most often used. Public cabins should be established on a priority basis with more remote cabins being added to the system only after a specific need for public facility is determined. Such need shall be based on Department findings and public comment from users and residents of the area.

This fiscal note provides a more reasonable estimate of program receipts. Additionally, expenses are limited to revenues generated by charging fees for the use of the cabins. If additional revenues are generated in future years, the Department may seek additional operating funds through the annual budget process.

Funds are divided equally between supplies and contractual since these are the only expenses that the department can not be expected to absorb within normal budget appropriations. These funds will be used to purchase supplies needed to renovate cabins and to pay necessary cabin labor and air fare to remote sites.

Each cabin is expected to generate approximately \$3,000 in fees. This fiscal note assumes that 15 cabins will generate this much in FY 87. The original fiscal note assumed 24 cabins would generate \$3,000, but only 12 are currently in operation. It is very unlikely that 12 additional cabins will be renovated in time to generate an additional \$36,000 in FY 87.

HB 561 is the House companion to SB 397 which the committee has previously heard. The House made two changes to HB 561 that differ from the committee has previously looked at. These changes are marked on the enclosed bill. The first change (page 3, lines 12 - 18) is designed to eliminate any possible constitutional problem with dedication of funds. The second change (page 4, lines 10 - 13) specifies that the state is not liable for damages a person using a public use cabin may suffer unless the injury was caused by the gross negligence of the state.

The proposed Resources CS would make two deletions to the House bill. These deletions were suggested by Senator Josephson's office because it was felt that the language suggested for removal was unneeded and caused confusion. Senator Josephson is the prime sponsor in the Senate. The first proposed deletion is on page 3, lines 24 - 27, and the second is on page 4, lines 22 - 29. Both of these changes are marked on the enclosed bill. Deletion of these passages will not cause any policy change in the bill.

Attached in this packet is a copy of the write up for SB 397 plus a fiscal note and sectional analysis for HB 561.

SB 397 will set up the Alaska Public Use Cabin System using unclaimed trespass cabins and other cabins that will come into state ownership in future years. The new cabin system is modeled on the public rental cabin system administered by the U.S. Forest Service.

The bill gives the Department of Natural Resources the responsibility to make necessary improvements to the cabins and allows the Department to cooperate with private groups and other government agencies to improve the cabins in the system. Once established, the Department will publicize the state cabin system and take reservations from the public.

In this packet is a letter and fiscal note from DNR. The letter suggests a number of technical amendments and these amendments are incorporated in the proposed CS. An identical CS was recently adopted by the House Resources Committee.

I am writing to suggest some amendments to SB 397, on public use cabins.

The department strongly supports the concept of the proposed bill. After adopting regulations for privately owned cabins on state land in 1984, we have made an important new beginning for cabins on state land. The bill before you will allow the people of the state to make beneficial use of abandoned and unauthorized cabins and may help reduce recreational and land disposal pressures statewide. The bill also provides our citizens better access to public lands and resources.

Contrary to a recent newspaper editorial, there is no conflict between this bill and SB 269, passed out last year by the committee. The intent of SB 397 is to establish a system of specially designated cabins for general public use, a very different goal from that in SB 269, which would provide for the sale of state land to owners of some cabins built without authorization on state lands. Although the department does not support the passage of SB 269, I believe that both bills could be passed by the Legislature without conflict.

The purpose of each suggested amendment is given on the attached pages.

John Ellis has requested a sectional analysis of the above described bill.

As a preliminary matter, note that a sectional analysis or summary of a bill should not be considered an authoritative interpretation of the bill and the bill itself is the best statement of its contents. If you would like an interpretation of the bill as it may apply to a particular set of circumstances, please advise.

Section 1 of the bill states legislative purpose in the establishment of a public use cabin system.

Section 2 of the bill amends AS 41.21.020(a), a section dealing with the duties of the Department of Natural Resources with regard to AS 41.21, Parks and Recreational Facilities. A new paragraph (14) is added relative to the subject of this bill.

Section 3 of the bill provides the substantive provisions of the bill. It adds a new section, Sec. 41.21.880, to article 7, an article relating to "trails, footpaths, and campsites." The section establishes the "Alaska Public Use Cabin System."

Sec. 880(b) provides that the commissioner may establish a fee schedule for use of cabins within the "system". Considerations to be used in setting the fees are provided.

Sec. 880(c) provides that the commissioner may renovate the cabins "constructed on public land without proper authority". The authority to build or acquire cabins is also granted.

Sec. 880(d) permits the commissioner to "cooperate with local groups" and with other state and federal agencies to maintain and improve the "system."

Sec. 880(e) requires the commissioner to make an annual report to the legislature on stated aspects of the "system."

Sec. 880(f) defines the term "public use cabins".

Section 4 of the bill provides an immediate effective date.




