

This letter is being written on behalf of the Baha'i community in Alaska. As you may know, 1986 was designated as the International Year of Peace by the United Nations.


Currently there is a House Joint Resolution, HJR 60 (copy enclosed), which was referred to your committee on February 25, 1986. This resolution resolves that the Alaska Legislature, among other actions, recognizes and endorses the International Year of Peace.

Carol Horos has informed me that of this date HJR 60 has not been calendared, which causes some concern to the Baha'i community with only 19 days left in this session. We believe the matter is important to many Alaskans and request that HJR 60 be calendared and acted on in sufficient time to enable the resolution to proceed to the Senate floor.

I have taken this opportunity to enclose with this letter a copy of a message from the supreme international administrative body of the Baha'i Faith - The Universal House of Justice, Haifa, Israel - to the people of the world, entitled "The Promise of World Peace." Since October 1985, we have met and discussed this message with most of the leaders in the state including 48 of your colleagues in the Alaska State Legislature. We have found all of these individuals receptive and concerned about the issue of world peace.

Thank you for your consideration of this request and any assistance you may be able to provide in this matter. We would appreciate notification of your action on this request. Our local business address is P.O. Box 708, Juneau, Alaska 99802.

TITLE: Promise of World Peace

WHEREAS, The Alaska Native Brotherhood and the Alaska Native Sisterhood are the organized bodies which were formed in 1912 to represent the Alaska native peoples, and throughout its eminent history have attained human rights, and maintained the dignity for its peoples, such as attaining the status of citizenship through Congressional Act, the right to vote through Congressional Act, the right to attend any school through Congressional Act, and the passage of the Alaska Native Land Claims Settlement Act through Congressional Act, and

WHEREAS, The Alaska Native Brotherhood and the Alaska Native Sisterhood have resolved that world peace is in the highest interest of the native peoples of Alaska and is the attainable goal toward which we, with the body of mankind, are striving, and

WHEREAS, An enduring world peace is predicated on the removal of the most deep-rooted problems of the planet: racism, the inordinate disparity between rich and poor, unbridled nationalism, religious strife, the full equality of men and women, the lack of universal education, and the fundamental lack of communication between peoples, and

WHEREAS, The abolition of war is not simply a matter of signing treaties and protocols, but is a complex task requiring a new level of commitment to resolving issues not customarily associated with peace, and

WHEREAS, The idea that collective security and enduring world peace predicated solely upon political agreements is an unrealistic expectation based on human history in this century alone, and

WHEREAS, It is our conviction that peace stems from an inner human state supported by a spiritual or moral attitude, and that by evoking this attitude, the possibility of enduring solutions can be found, NOW

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Alaska Native Brotherhood and the Alaska Native Sisterhood in Convention assembled at Klawock, Alaska during the week of November 11-16, 1985, contemplating the supreme importance of the task of achieving a lasting peace which now challenges the entire world, bow our heads in humility before the Divine Creator, hold firmly the conviction that all human beings have been created to carry forward an ever-advancing civilization, and reaffirm our belief in the potentialities inherent in the human race to bring about peace on earth, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Alaska Native Brotherhood and the Alaska Native Sisterhood believe that we are all one humankind, that extremes of wealth and poverty should be eliminated, that there exists an interdependence of nations, that women be accorded full partnership in all fields of human endeavor, that the concept of world citizenship should be taught, and that an international auxiliary language should be adopted, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Alaska Native Brotherhood and the Alaska Native Sisterhood authorize and direct the Grand Camp Presidents to seek through various means to make the cause of world peace and this resolution a matter of consultation among the native and non-native leaders in Alaska, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Alaska Native Brotherhood and the Alaska Native Sisterhood commend and praise the actions of the United Nations proclaiming 1986 the International Year of Peace, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Alaska Native Brotherhood and the Alaska Native Sisterhood commend Governor Sheffield and applaud his Executive Proclamation signed October 24, 1985, establishing 1986 the Year of Peace in Alaska, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Alaska Native Brotherhood and the Alaska Native Sisterhood recommend that Governor Bill Sheffield establish a World Peace Commission in 1986, comprised of members representative of the diverse population in Alaska, and appoint members to that Commission from among the membership of the Alaska Native Brotherhood and the Alaska Native Sisterhood, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Alaska Native Brotherhood and the Alaska Native Sisterhood strongly recommend to the President of the United States and to the President of the United Nations that a convocation of nations be immediately convened to enact, through a process of consultation, a binding treaty and covenant establishing a sound, inviolable and definite international union of nations with the authority to assure a lasting peace for the world, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Alaska Native Brotherhood and the Alaska Native Sisterhood recommend the adoption by the Alaska State Legislature of a joint resolution on world peace in 1986 and urge that funds be made available to promote this cause through various means, including the support of a gubernatorially established Commission on World Peace, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Alaska Native Brotherhood and the Alaska Native Sisterhood recommend to Senator Ted Stevens, Senator Frank Murkowski and Representative Don Young the introduction and active participation in the promotion of a joint resolution on world peace in the United States Senate and the United States House of Representatives, and

BE IT FINALLY RESOLVED that the Alaska Native Brotherhood and the Alaska Native Sisterhood authorize and direct the Grand Camp Presidents to present this resolution and the recommendations herein to the President of the United States, the President of the United Nations, the Governor of the State of Alaska, the members of Alaska's Congressional delegation, the Speaker of the Alaska State House of Representatives, and the President of the Alaska State Senate, as well as to those elected heads of the Alaska Federation of Natives and the United Tribes of Alaska.

A RESOLUTION RECOGNIZING THE
INTERNATIONAL YEAR OF PEACE IN JUNEAU.

WHEREAS, the United Nations has designated 1986 as the International Year of Peace, and

WHEREAS, peace is a universal hope, dream, and goal toward which all people of good will can work, and

WHEREAS, the concept of peace must be born anew in each heart to effect change in defensive and belligerent attitudes and policies toward which nationalist governments are inclined, and

WHEREAS, the growing wellspring of grassroots support for peace by people everywhere is demonstrated daily by small and great acts of individual commitment to ending the barriers to peace--hunger, poverty, racial discrimination, religious hatred, and ignorance, and

WHEREAS, the people of Juneau have acted in personal ways and as a community, to further the cause of peace: through giving money to aid the starving of Ethiopia, the earthquake victims of Mexico, and many other humanitarian efforts; in advancing racial harmony and honoring the man--Martin Luther King, Jr.--a champion of nonviolence, who raised the consciousness of nation and the world to the terrible injustice of racial discrimination; through developing the New Year's Eve Space Bridge to Moscow to build communication and understanding between our peoples; through efforts of Juneau's diverse religious communities and such groups as World Beyond War, Alaskans for World Peace, and other peace advocates; and cultural sharing through the upcoming goodwill tour to the Soviet Union of the Alaska Performing Artists for Peace, and

WHEREAS, the alternative to peace has become unthinkable with the development of nuclear weapons that can


virtually annihilate humankind;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE ASSEMBLY OF THE CITY AND BOROUGH OF JUNEAU, ALASKA:

1. That the Assembly recognizes and supports the International Year of Peace and calls on the people of the community to build a new commitment to global peace.

2. That throughout the year that the theme of peace be made a part of our public celebrations, such as the 4th of July parade, that Juneau schools be encouraged to study the issue of peace and how students might be involved, that organizations, businesses, and professional groups incorporate the theme of peace in their programs, and that churches and religious groups continue to uphold the doctrine that peace is possible, if not inevitable.

9 WHEREAS remote sensing of the ocean is playing an increasingly impor-
10 tant role in fishery research, fish harvesting, and marine safety along the
11 Pacific Coast of the United States and Canada; and

12 WHEREAS satellite sensors give a unique view of the ocean surface and
13 provide extensive and detailed images of sea surface temperature, color,
14 mixed layer depth, currents, and wave action; and

15 WHEREAS the oceanic measurements taken by the satellite are used in
16 determining variations in ocean conditions that play key roles in causing
17 fluctuations in stocks of fishes and their vulnerability to harvesting; and

18 WHEREAS this timely information on the changing ocean, rather than on
19 average ocean conditions, is necessary to understand and eventually predict
20 the effects of the marine environment on fish populations; and

21 WHEREAS up-to-date weather information can provide the fishing fleet
22 accurate weather data that will increase the safety and efficiency of fish
23 harvesting; and

24 WHEREAS the use of satellite sensors combined with conventional data
25 collection techniques provides a powerful tool toward ensuring the wise use
26 of living marine resources; and

1 WHEREAS these clues can lead the United States Coast Guard and other
2 enforcement agencies to the precise locations where harmful interception of
3 North American fish are taking place; and

4 WHEREAS several manufacturers have developed oceanographic color
5 displays designed to receive signals from a satellite and to display, in
6 color, an absolute surface temperature distribution for a large water area;
7 and

8 WHEREAS in order to provide this information to fishermen, enforcement
9 agencies, and research facilities, receiving stations need to be estab-
10 lished in Alaska to monitor the North Pacific region; and

11 WHEREAS an all-weather satellite is needed to provide this detailed
12 information because it is not dependent on cloud cover conditions; and

13 WHEREAS the National Aeronautics and Space Administration has aban-
14 doned the Gilmore Creek Satellite Receiving Station and this station can be
15 used by the National Weather Service to receive satellite data in Alaska;

16 BE IT RESOLVED that the Alaska State Legislature finds establishment

Please consider scheduling a hearing on CSHJR 67 (State Affairs). Attached please find a fiscal note and bill analysis prepared by the department of Fish and Game, and other backup material.

Analysis

The resolution requests congress to establish and fund two elements of a weather satellite system:

- 1) Gilmore Creek Receiving station (25 miles N.E. of Fairbanks) was abandoned by NASA on October 1st of 1984. Transfer to NOAA of this facility would greatly enhance the National Weather Service's ability to gather weather data.
- 2) Fund the placement of a color scanner and other all-weather equipment on the next available satellite with a view of the North Pacific.

The receiving station, and the satellite equipment form a powerful weather forecasting system, providing data on: ocean surface temperature, the depth of the mixed layer of water, ocean color, wind/current direction and speed, and wave heights. Computer analysis can produce a chart highlighting the areas where fish are likely to be caught.

My interest in this information comes from an enforcement angle. Data from this satellite system will show us where the foreign fishing fleets are fishing and perhaps targeting salmon of north american origin. If we know where they are likely to be fishing the Coast Guard or other enforcement agency can concentrate their limited resources to that specific area.

The Gilmore Creek Receiving station can easily be used by the Weather Service with little capital outlay. In fact, the data link from

Gilmore Creek to the weather computer in Anchorage is already in place. The station can receive data from foreign satellites like France's ERS-1 thus expanding the amount of weather information available in Alaska.

The Hawaii legislature has passed a similar resolution (attached). Other back-up information has been provided to your staff.

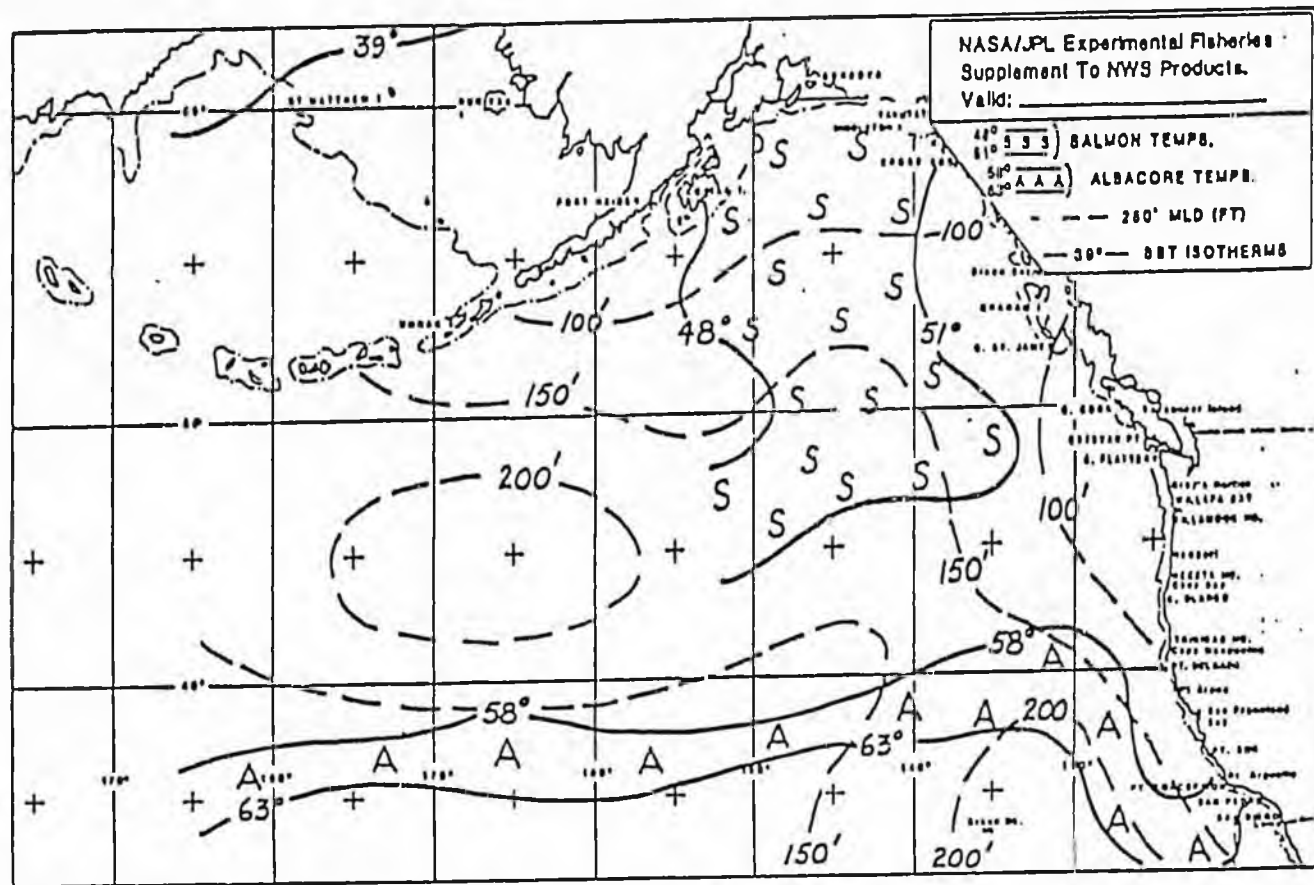

SAMPLE 3. PACIFIC BASIN (AREA 5) FISHERIES-AID CHART.






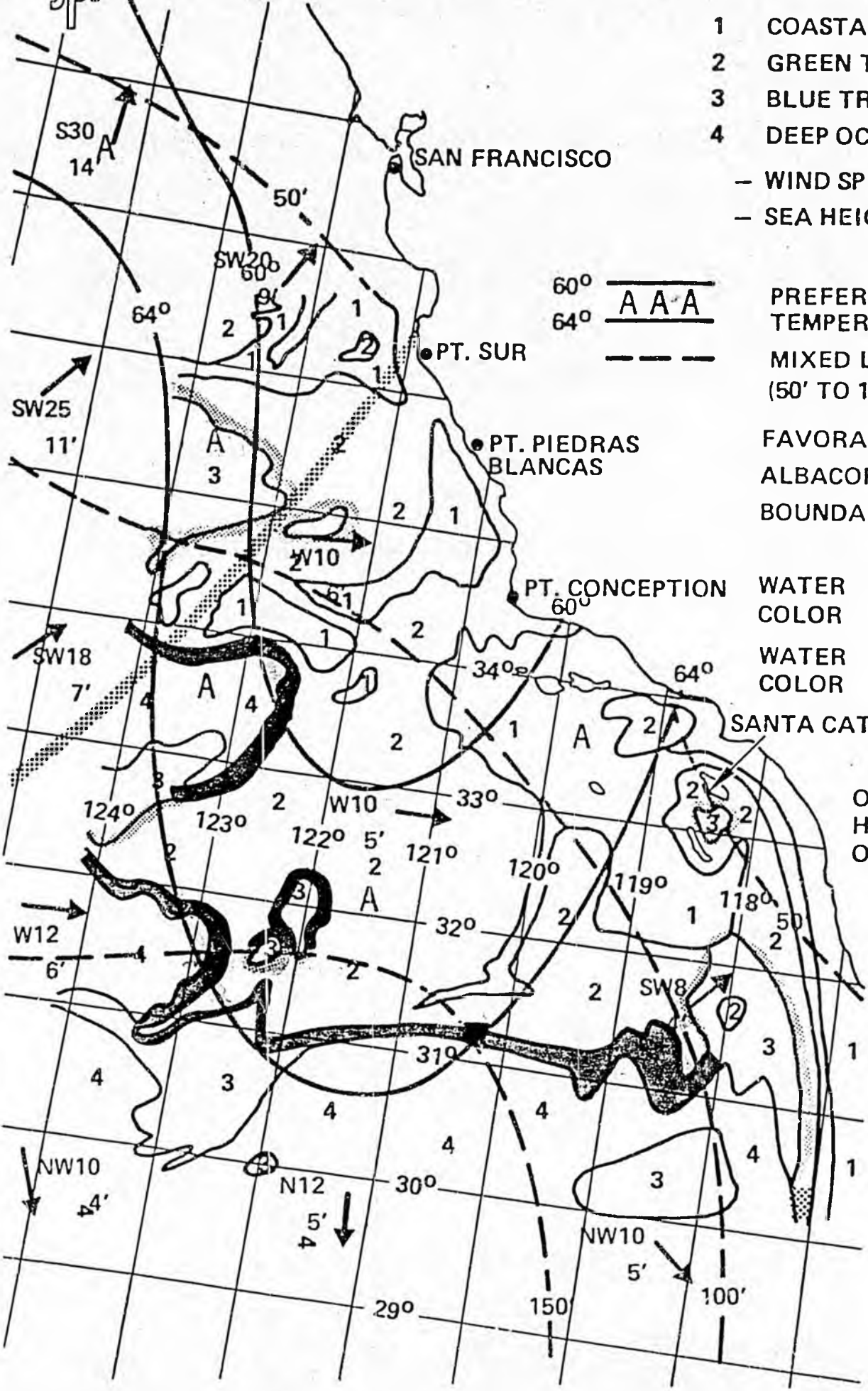

Under the authority of art. III, sec. 18, of the Alaska Constitution, I am transmitting a resolution regarding Alaska's special relationship with Heilongjiang Province of the People's Republic of China. You will recall last year's Legislative Resolve No. 2 on the friendship and cooperation between Heilongjiang and Alaska. I am also forwarding to you a translation of a letter that I received from Chen Lei, former governor of Heilongjiang Province, along with a copy of the envelope bearing Governor Chen's calligraphy.


As you remember, Governor Chen visited Alaska in February of 1985, at which time he and I signed an agreement establishing a special friendship relationship between the State of Alaska and Heilongjiang Province. Chen Lei retired from his position as governor in 1985 and is presently the chairman of the Provincial Advisory Council for Heilongjiang Province.

Governor Chen is a renowned poet and calligrapher. The letter is written in classical format and poetic style as you can see from the accompanying translation by Linda Dwyer. I have also been informed that Governor Chen has composed a series of poems about Alaska drawn from the experiences of his historic visit. The poetry is still in manuscript form.

I ask the Alaska State Legislature to join with me in extending warm greetings to Governor Chen. Furthermore, I urge that we join together in requesting Governor Chen to

provide Alaska with a copy of his poetry so that it can be translated into English, to be more readily understood by the people of this country.

I extend to you my most sincere greetings, respectfully wish that the friendly exchange between our two states develops continuously.

I hope that in this new year, you experience outstanding achievements in your career and success in ten thousand endeavors.

Commentary: The first two lines of the above letter are a poetic introduction which sets the mood for what is to follow. Here, the reference to both great distance and the sense of long separation is one that has a long tradition in China. It is used between good friends who are parted to convey the strength of the friendship.
