

Basic Overview

The Division of Public Health intends to use these Federal Funds in the following areas to emphasize projects in health education that; promote tobacco education and behavior change, education toward the prevention of cancers, and provide health information and education at the community level. The division will make available grant funds for preventive health services under the Health Education/Risk Reduction Projects. The Division will provide planning, technical, and administrative assistance to grantees and related organizations with similar interests.

Health Education/Risk Reduction Projects

The Division provides grant support to non-profit corporations, state agencies, and political subdivisions of the State of Alaska for community based programs for the purpose of demonstrating and evaluating optimal methods for organizing and delivering comprehensive preventive health service for defined populations.

To receive a competitive grant under this program, the applicant must:

- address a specific health problem or high risk population
- develop a behavioral or health educational intervention program to meet the identified need.
- be fully intergrated into existing service programs and financially independent from block grant funding at the end of two years funding period.
- incorporate an evaluation tool to measure the accomplishments of the project.
- be able to serve as a model for future service projects directed at similar problems.

These grants will be awarded for a maximum of a two year period. The maximum amount of support is \$40,000 for each grant. These grants are intended to supplement agency efforts to address division priorities in health education. It is not intended to supplant existing funding of services.

The Division anticipates that it will continue to fund the efforts of the following projects funded during FY88. These efforts have shown progress and impact on their identified groups.

- Alaska Crippled Children & Adults: Smokeless Tobacco \$10.0  
Public information, instructional video's, PSA's and written information targeting youth and smokeless tobacco usage.
- Alaska Health Fair Project: Health Education & Screening \$25.0  
Training for local coordinators to implement rural health fairs. Develop and health educational displays.
- Alaska Lung Association: Tobacco Education \$20.0  
Provide a public information campaign and instruction concerning the issue of pregnant women and smoking.
- Crisis Inc.: Public Health Information \$10.0  
A library of health information is available to the entire state via a toll-free number. Also known as Tel-Med.
- Kodiak Area Native Association: Tobacco Education \$21.3  
Local education campaigns cessation programs targeting the villages of Kodiak Island.
- Municipality of Anchorage: Tobacco Education \$20.0  
Education program through the Dramady players program for elementary schools. Coordinated media campaign aimed at teenage smoking.
- Providence Hospital: Injury Prevention \$20.0  
Community education targets seasonal injury awareness. aimed at preschoolers and youth.
- Southeast Regional Resource Center: Tobacco Education \$9.4  
Assist smokers in rural southeast villages to quit smoking through local cessation and education programs
- Yukon-Kuskokwim Health Corporation: ATV Safety \$6.4  
Locally developed program to call attention to All Terrain Vehicle (ATV) Safety through the use of music. It will emphasize recommended and safe riding practices, and proper riding equipment.

Tobacco Education and Cancer Prevention

The Division of Public Health will emphasize new projects in the area of cancer education targeted at specific high risk population groups. During State fiscal year 1988, these activities will focus on several areas, smoking in women, smokeless tobacco usage, and smoking in the native population. Implementation of this program will be conducted through a grant(s) to appropriate service agencies. These funds will be intergrated as supplemental resources for service agencies to enhance their abilities to address this health problem.

Coordination and Administration

Professional staff, within the Division of Public Health is assigned to coordinate health promotion activities within the state. These activities are under the auspices of the Preventive Health Block Grant. This position is responsible for the administration of the grants derived from this grant award as well as to administer the award from the U.S. Department of Health & Human Services. Projects concerning school health education will be supported through activities with the Department of Education.

Support funds are utilized for travel to perform site visits, program planning and technical assistance. Other costs include; communication, advertising, subscriptions, and office supplies.

Rape Prevention

\$6,100 of this Block Grant is required to be used for rape prevention activities. The funds are RSA'd to the Council on Domestic Violence and Sexual Assault, Dept. of Public Safety. They support training activities in Rape Prevention Protocol for field personnel training sessions for Public Health Nurses in the three regions.

The grant enabled the Division of Public Health to dedicate one staff person to coordinate health education and promotion activities in the state. Many of these activities centered around the funds granted from this Federal Grant. Funds were utilized for travel to project sites, communications, advertising, supplies.

The Maternal and Child Health block grant was created in 1982 to enable each state to:

- 1) assure mothers and children (in particular those with low income or with limited availability of health services) access to quality maternal and child health services,
- 2) reduce infant mortality and the incidence of preventable disease and handicapping conditions among children, to reduce the need for inpatient and long-term care services, to increase the number of children (especially preschool children) approximately immunized against disease and the number of low income children receiving health assessments and follow-up diagnostic treatment services, and otherwise to promote the health of mothers and children, and prenatal, delivery, and postpartum care for low income mothers),
- 3) provide rehabilitation services for blind and disabled individuals under the age of 16,
- 4) provide services for locating, and for medical, surgical, corrective, and other services, and care for, facilities for diagnosis, hospitalization, and after care for children who are crippled or who are suffering from conditions leading to crippling.

The amounts awarded to Alaska have been as follows:

A state has two years in which to expend each year's grant award.

In FY 88 the amount of the MCH block grant is likely to be same as FY 87 due to Graham Rudman. As a long term goal, the Section of Family Health recommends using approximately half of the MCH Block grant for maternal care and half for child health services.

This grant will be used for continuation of previous activities in improving the outcome of pregnancy, improving availability and quality of prenatal care, and improving family planning services and genetics counseling. The other half would then be used for the Handicapped Children's Program, maintenance of Child Development Services and Communicative Disorders Program. The speciality medical, audiological,

and treatment clinics made possible with these funds are fulfillment of the Federal mandate to locate and treat crippling conditions of children.

For FY 88, it is suggested that the following percentage be established for this grant:

Public input is sought on this allocation. Any increase to one type of program will necessitate a decrease in the other program.

On October 1, 1986, the first day of the new Federal fiscal year, the State of Alaska had been awarded block grant funds for the provision of alcohol and drug abuse services. These funds were allocated subsequent to the beginning of the State fiscal year. The State, on a yearly basis, undertakes a complex and extensive process whereby agencies and individuals offer proposals to the Department of Health and Social Services for the provision of alcohol and drug abuse services throughout the state. It was decided that the FFY 86 funds would not be expended until the beginning of the next State fiscal year, July 1, 1986 (SFY 87). The State included these block grant funds with appropriation of State general funds and funded services at this new, increased level.

Beginning on July 1, 1986, and in compliance with the State's grant-in-aid regulations, Public Law 97-35 and consistent with the block grant application as well as those program activities begun under sections 301 and 312 of the Comprehensive Alcohol Abuse and Alcoholism Prevention, Treatment, and Rehabilitation Act of 1970 and sections 409 and 410 of the Drug Abuse Prevention, Treatment, and Rehabilitation Act, the Department issued grants to some 47 different program agencies.

In developing the grant awards, the State in compliance with section 1914(b) did not use any block grant funds received under section 1913 to:

- 1) provide inpatient hospital services in the case of amounts provided for alcohol or drug abuse programs,
- 2) make cash payments to intended recipients of health services,
- 3) purchase or improve land, purchase, construct, or permanently improve (other than minor remodeling) any building or other facility, or purchase major medical equipment,
- 4) satisfy any requirement for the expenditure of non-federal funds as a condition for the receipt of federal funds, or
- 5) provide financial assistance to any entity other than a public or non-profit private entity.

The funds for the third year of utilization of the block grant were allocated in accordance with the three year State plan for the delivery of alcohol and drug abuse services in a unified system to provide an equity of service to all those in need throughout the State to the limit of the available funding. The utilization of these funds as well as the State general funds were based in part on the local and area health plans and public input.

These two items are addressed in the grant applications and possible revisions submitted by the individual grant applicants to the Department in consideration of funding. The final factor utilized by the State to provide that the funds are spent in a consistent manner with the needs of the State's population were the legislative hearings and the Governor's advisory board public meetings. In addition to the use of these public input activities, the State agreed to replace the lost funding which several programs suffered as result of the block grant program. Prior to the block grant program, the Cook Inlet Native Association, the Gateway mental health Center and South Kachemak, Inc. received federal discretionary funding under the Uniform Alcoholism and Intoxication Act. The Department replaced these lost federal funds with a portion of the State's block grant. The goal of the State's plan for the use of the block grant funds for SFY 87 was to:

"use federal block grant funds to replace lost federal formula and discretionary funds and to fund additional projects according to the regulations, statutes and the three year plan of the State Office of Alcoholism and Drug Abuse."

The two objectives under this plan were:

1A. To use block grant funds received in FFY 1986 to replace federal discretionary funding under the Uniform Alcoholism and Intoxication Act for Cook Inlet Native Association, Gateway Mental Health Center, and South Kachemak, Inc., in SYF 1987.

1B. To use federal block grant funds to replace lost federal formula funding under the Uniform Alcoholism and Intoxication Act to make grants to community alcohol and drug abuse programs in the State in SFY 1987.

The State and local plans, public input, statutory guidelines, etc., mandated that the State establish the following priorities for the use of the block grant funds in order to ensure the provision of a full range of alcohol and drug abuse services throughout the State:

- Outreach
- Emergency Care Services
- Inpatient Care Services
- Intermediate Care Services
- Outpatient Care Services
- Aftercare Services
- Follow-up Services
- Criminal Justice Diversion Service
- Counseling to Corrections Services
- Women's Services

These services were provided to residents of Alaska. They were provided to any individual residing or employed in Alaska regardless of ability to pay for such services, current or past health conditions, or any other factor. These services were available and accessible promptly, as appropriate and in a manner which preserves human dignity and assures continuity and high quality care.

The State, utilizing federal block grant funds, purchased through grants the following services:

With this menu of services which the State considered appropriate under the block grant program, the State reviewed the goals and objectives of the grant applications as negotiated and revised. The State, in compliance with Section 1915 allocated the total available funding under the block grant program to five components; prevention and early intervention, alcoholism/alcohol abuse services, drug abuse services, discretionary, and women's services. The State did not utilize any of the funding for the administration of the block grant program. The State expended State general funds to operate the program. All of the funding was allocated to the grant-in-aid program. The State set aside \$300,880 for the prevention and early intervention activities, \$526,540 for the alcohol abuse activities, \$526,540 for the drug abuse activities, \$45,740 for the discretionary activities and \$104,700 for new or expanded women's services. The total block grant funding available for SFY 87 was \$1,504,400. Upon the allocation of funding into separate components and the review of activities proposed by the grant applicants, the Department awarded grants to applicants consistent with both the State and block grant goals and objectives in order to purchase the appropriate services and activities.

The block grant funds for new or expanded services for women was used to provide additional funding to a 28 day residential (24 hour) treatment program for women alcohol and other drug abusers in the Anchorage area and to provide aftercare services to residents completing the treatment program.

Activities initiated and/or expanded in this program include increased admittance into the program. A goal of 60% of residents admitted will complete treatment, and of those residents completing treatment 60% will maintain the gains made in treatment at a six month follow-up measured by freedom from substance abuse and productive life styles. A weekly aftercare life planning and relapse prevention group is conducted at the facility.

The social stigma attached to women who abuse alcohol and other drugs and the corresponding reluctance of these women to enter the traditional institutional-based treatment setting makes it necessary to provide a home-like treatment facility. This facility is in Anchorage but serves women throughout the state.

This program has gone a long way towards helping Alaska's women solve their alcohol and other drug addiction problems. It is the intent of this program to continue to provide these services to the women of Alaska.

SOADA will survey (review) this component of service on an annual basis.

In all, the State's alcohol and drug abuse program served in excess of 12,500 clients, provided the "Here's Looking At You" youth education/prevention curriculum to approximately 19,000 youth, served 1,850 clients in the detox facilities, served more than 10,682 persons in outpatient and intermediate care settings, provided intensive short-term care to 335 clients and after-care to more than 714 clients. The federal share of these levels is 11 percent. Though the Department does fund programs according to the primary problem with which the grantee affects results and the reporting system does report the primary substance abuse problem, the Department is finding that a clear distinction between alcohol abuse and other substance abuse is rare with the vast majority of abuse problems in this state being polysubstance.
