



As the Department grew in management techniques and responsibilities and the hunt pressure increased so did the responsibilities of my position resulting in a new job classification.

July 1970-December 30, 1985 FISH AND GAME TECHNICIAN V

The main purpose of this position was to assist the Area Game Biologist in all phases of game management duties in the Kodiak area. In his absence assume all the responsibilities of the Area Game Biologist.

Primarily, duties consisted of setting up and accomplishing the mammal inventories and aerial and ground surveys. Issue permits and harvest tickets for hunts in Alaska; inform hunters as to where, when and how to hunt on Kodiak. Continual elk and deer range evaluations to determine the condition of the winter food supply. Collecting data and specimens from various animals. Answer correspondence from the public on securing permits, licenses, and other information on hunting, viewing, photographing wildlife on Kodiak and adjacent islands in GMU 8. Also during the open hunt seasons went on enforcement patrols which required checking hunters for licenses and permits. Conducted winter mortality transects for deer and elk. This work consisted of in the field inspections of key winter areas; searching the area for deer/elk carcasses; determine sex and age, physical conditions and cause of death. When time permitted I also gave talks to civic groups, school classes, sportsmans groups on hunting and wildlife management programs. Attend all meetings held by the public and speak on game regulations and policies in an effort to secure public support for our programs; inform people on regulations and laws. There was also the need for capturing of live animals, use of drugs in the captures and utilizing other marking equipment.

Because of the close work with the public and the Kodiak/Aognak/Shuyak area guides it was extremely important to have a knowledge of the State and Federal laws and Alaska State Game Regulations. In this way it is easier to to make recommendations to the staff regarding changes in the hunting and trapping regulations that the public and guides were most concerned about. Then these regulation changes would be recommend to the Board of Game.

Kodiak shrimp trawl fishery, the food/bait Herring trawl fishery Kodiak.

Been involved in joint venture trawl operations around Kodiak Island and have been involved with the domestic shore-based bottom fisheries for the past three winters. I also have participated in the Halibut fishery for several years.

On the West coast, I fished for Albacore tuna for several years, spent a short time in the salmon troll fishery, fished for Dungeness crab, and gill-net salmon on the Columbia River.

I am currently employed in the Tanner crab pot fishery, Kodiak Island, will be changing over into domestic trawl bottom fish fishery soon, will participate in the Halibut longline openings, operate in Cook Inlet this summer as a salmon drift fisherman, and most likely fish the food/bait Herring season in Kodiak during 1987.

Concerning the meeting attendance percentage: I would like to say I could give 100% of my time and effort to the position. I have taken the steps to have an alternate skipper run the vessel I own and operate while I would be away. This then would be in theory, able to leave me free. Though the people I have employed are stable, responsible adults, I cannot say that a situation could not arise that I would be called upon to remedy for the short term. Specific example, something unexpectedly happening to my skipper, health, family, etc. The fall is no problem, the vessel is normally in maintenance. On the other hand, March is presently the peak month for trawling. April again is a slow month.

**SUBJECT:** Illegal leasing of  
entry and interim-use

At the confirmation hearing on Resource Agency appointees yesterday morning, you inquired generally about the leasing of entry and interim-use permits in the commercial fisheries. I responded that leasing was illegal [AS 16.43.150(g)] and explained my understanding of the rationale behind the prohibition. Then I stumbled around when you asked whether or not the Commission was enforcing the provision. The purpose of this memorandum is to clarify that answer.

To guard against illegal leasing, the Commission requires that all transfers of entry permits be accompanied by a copy of the contract, bill of sale, or any other instrument disclosing the agreement between the parties. If a transfer is determined to be proposed pursuant to a statutory prohibition, it is denied. The transferor and the proposed transferee are allowed to request a hearing on the determination. At hearing, they are allowed to present evidence and testimony on the nature of their proposed transaction. If it is found that their agreement (as originally drafted or as modified) does not violate any statutory prohibitions, the transfer is allowed to go forward. More than 1200 permanent transfers of entry permits are proposed every year and all such proposals receive this scrutiny.

Attempts to mask a lease agreement are harder to discern. When confronted with a transfer agreement which, on its face, is innocent, the Commission is most often willing to assume the good faith of the parties. Subsequent behaviour (a return transfer in a very short period of time, a rescinded transfer agreement with a demand for the return of a permit, legal action by one party against the other in which the permit is at issue, etc.) can lead the Commission to block a proposed transfer, temporarily suspend the permit's transferability, and conduct an investigation. An investigation can result in the exoneration of the parties, or it can result in the Commission issuing a "Notice to Show Cause" (why the permit should not be revoked) to the permit holder suspected of illegally leasing a permit.

During the past few years, eighteen (18) such Notices have been executed by the Commission. One resulted in the revocation of a Cook

Inlet drift and net permit, while the results of the others ranged from complete exoneration to payment of substantial fines (and, in the case of one attorney, suspension of authority to represent clients before the Commission).

Currently, there are seven (7) cases still in the adjudication phase and approximately six (6) cases under active investigation. Any or all of these could lead to permit revocation and/or payment of a substantial administrative fine.

Please let me know if I can provide you with any more information. At any rate, I hope this information is somewhat more cogent than my somewhat befuddled response to your question.



Please consider this letter as my application for appointment to the Alaska Board of fisheries.

I am a thirty year resident of Alaska and have made my livelihood during that time as a Commercial Fisherman and an Alaska State Trooper. I also am an active sports fisherman and hunter. Prior to 1964, I fished from Southeastern to the Bering Sea and since 1964, on a part time basis in Prince William Sound and Kodiak. I am presently owner/operator of a sixty foot combination boat engaged in Herring and Salmon Tendering and Longlining for Cod and Halibut.


