SB 227
FISCAL IMPACT ANALYSIS

1. Operating budget: The Commission currently runs a tape match of defaulted borrowers against the permanent fund dividend file, so there would be no additional administrative expense associated with this bill.
2. Loan fund (Capital): SB 227 will produce a positive revenue source for the student loan revolving fund. Since the amount of the dividend varies, and since the number of defaulters applying will also vary, it is not possible to predict the fiscal impact with any accuracy. However, if the terms of SB 227 had been in place in FY87, the impact would have been:

<u>Default Match</u>	<u>Claims Filed</u>	<u>Dividends "missed"</u>	<u>Funds Not Received</u>
2,000	800	1,200	\$673,200

Hence, this bill could produce \$400,000 to \$800,000 annually if the application and default rate remains relatively constant.

Sr 227 /HB 223

The Division of Occupational Licensing has experienced approximately 3% of NSF checks submitted annually for licensing fees in FY 86 and FY 87. At that rate, 3% of the projected FY 88 revenue will total \$36,600.00.

SB 227 will allow the division to recover funds for NSF checks through filing a claim against an individual's permanent fund dividend check, after all other attempts to recover the funds are unsuccessful. The impact of the bill should discourage future non-compliance with attempts to recover funds.

Assumptions:

- 1) It is assumed that the term "state agency" does not include the court system.
- 2) It is assumed that all state agencies which now execute judgments by serving the Department of Revenue with writs will instead use the procedure prescribed in this bill. In 1986, the department received approximately 5,000 writs from state agencies under AS 43.23.065(b)(4).
- 3) Given the ease by which the debtor agency is allowed to attach the PFD, an estimated increase of 3,000 claims is expected.
- 4) It is assumed that certified claims filed before April 1 of each calendar year will be returned to the agency as the department will not be holding revenue for the individual until he files a PFD application. Claims filed between April 1 and December 31 will be held and matched against the current year dividend file and will be honored in the order provided in AS 43.23.065.
- 5) Competing claims from different agencies will be honored in the order received.
- 6) Since Section 1 of the bill requires the Department of Revenue to send a notice to the address on the PFD file, the department will hold the claim until the PFD application is on file before sending the notice.

Program Summary:

The Department of Revenue will print a form for state agencies to use in claiming the permanent fund dividend of eligible individuals. This will ensure a uniform presentation of information required by the bill and will facilitate processing of the claim. Claims received will be matched against the PFD file. Except for claims filed between April 1 and July 31 of each year, if a payable application is not on file, the claim will be returned to the agency, marked "no funds available." If, on the other hand, a payable application is on file, the Department of Revenue will send the applicant a notice as described in Section 1.

During the period of April 1 - July 31 of each year, the current year's PFD file is being compiled. Agency claims filed during this period will be held until the current year PFD file is completed and will then be matched, resulting in either a notice of no funds available to the agency or a notice to the dividend applicant.

The provision of subparagraph (c) in the new Sec. AS 43.23.067 implies that the Department of Revenue will hold hearings under AS 44.62.330 - 44.62.630 if requested by the dividend applicant within 10 days of the date of the aforementioned notice. It would seem much more appropriate and practical for the agency making the claim to defend against any challenge, and we would therefore recommend that the bill be amended to provide that any challenge to the execution should be made to the agency making the claim. Unless the claim is released, it will be honored at the time of payment. Without access to the factual record supporting the claim and without the specialized program knowledge of the agency filing the claim, it would be impossible for Revenue to provide such a hearing.

At the time of payment of the dividend, a notice of payment and/or garnishment will be sent to the applicant, notifying him of the attachment(s) and/or assignment(s) and/or dividend contributions which reduced his dividend.

I am writing on behalf of the Alaska Court System to ask the Senate Judiciary Committee to consider introducing legislation which would prohibit an employer from firing an employee because of the employee's absence due to jury service.

I have attached a draft of proposed legislation which would establish such a prohibition. The draft is based upon Section 17 of the Uniform Jury Selection and Service Act (copy attached). However, the court system takes no position with regard to the appropriate sanction.

The House Judiciary Committee has also considered this request, and it is my understanding that legislative counsel has provided a work draft with somewhat different wording.

Thank you for considering this request. Please let me know if I can provide additional information or answer any questions.

SB-245 (AN ACT RELATING TO EMPLOYMENT PROTECTION OF JURORS)

THIS BILL WAS INTRODUCED BY THE JUDICIARY COMMITTEE AT THE REQUEST OF THE COURT SYSTEM. THE BILL SIMPLY ADDS A SECTION TO THE ALASKA CODE OF CIVIL PROCEDURE THAT PROTECTS JURORS FROM BEING FIRED FOR JURY SERVICE.

IF A PERSON IS FIRED FOR JURY SERVICE, THE PERSON CAN SUE FOR LOST WAGES AND REINSTATEMENT. THE PERSON COULD HAVE SUED FOR WRONGFUL TERMINATION EVEN WITHOUT THIS, BUT THIS MAKES IT VERY CLEAR IN THE LAW.

AS AN ASIDE, IT IS INTERESTING TO NOTE THAT THE COURT SYSTEM HAS BECOME MORE CONSIDERATE OF PROSPECTIVE JURORS' ECONOMIC SITUATIONS THIS YEAR. NOW, JURORS ARE QUESTIONED IF THERE WILL BE AN ECONOMIC HARDSHIP IF THEY SERVE. BEFORE THIS YEAR, JURORS WERE NOT EXCUSED FOR ECONOMIC HARDSHIP. THIS YEAR THE PRACTICE IS TO EXCUSE A PERSON WHO IS HAVING ECONOMIC PROBLEMS.

THIS IS A VERY SIMPLE PIECE OF LEGISLATION, AND WILL HOPEFULLY PROTECT PEOPLE WHO ARE CALLED TO DO THEIR CIVIL DUTY.

§ 17. [Protection of Jurors' Employment]

(a) An employer shall not deprive an employee of his employment, or threaten or otherwise coerce him with respect thereto, because the employee receives a summons, responds thereto, serves as a juror, or attends court for prospective jury service.

(b) Any employer who violates subsection (a) is guilty of criminal contempt and upon conviction may be fined not more than [\$500] or imprisoned not more than [6] months, or both.

(c) If an employer discharges an employee in violation of subsection (a) the employee within [] days may bring a civil action for recovery of wages lost as a result of the violation and for an order requiring the reinstatement of the employee. Damages recoverable shall not exceed lost wages for 6 weeks. If he prevails, the employee shall be allowed a reasonable attorney's fee fixed by the court.

COMMENT

In substance derived from Section 13 of the 1969 Maryland Jury Act and Michigan C.L.A. \S 600.1348. The civil remedy provided in subsection (c) parallels that provided in Section 5.202(6) of the Uniform Consumer Credit Code (relating to wrongful discharge for garnishment), with the addition of the allowance of a reasonable attorney's fee to the prevailing plaintiff.

Idaho. In subsec. (b), substitutes "three hundred dollars" for "\$500".

Dear Senator Faiks:

Under the authority of art. III, sec. 18, of the Alaska Constitution, I am transmitting a bill relating to the state's retirement systems. The bill makes miscellaneous amendments to statutes providing for the teachers' (TRS), public employees' (PERS), judicial (JRS), and elected public officers' (EPORS) Retirement Systems. A section-by-section description of the bill follows.

Section 1 of the bill amends AS 14.25.160(b). Currently, that section provides for a death benefit of \$500 payable to a deceased TRS member's designated beneficiary if the member is survived by dependent children. Clearly, this provision was meant to benefit the dependent children, at least indirectly. However, under a literal interpretation of this section, the \$500 benefit is payable to the designated beneficiary even if the designated beneficiary is not the person responsible for the member's surviving dependent children. In accordance with the obvious intent of the legislature in providing this benefit, the amendment clarifies that the \$500 benefit is payable only if the designated beneficiary is the surviving dependent child or is the parent or guardian responsible for the surviving dependent child.

Section 2 of the bill amends AS 14.25.162(b). Under AS 14.25.162(b)(2), a survivor's allowance of 35 percent of a deceased TRS member's base salary is paid to the member's surviving spouse if there are dependent children. This provision is also clearly meant to benefit the dependent children, at least indirectly, and to alleviate financial burden incurred by a person who is responsible for a deceased member's dependent children. However, the surviving spouse of a deceased member is not necessarily the parent of or even the person responsible for the surviving dependent children.

The amendment clarifies that the 35 percent survivor's allowance is payable to the surviving spouse if the surviving spouse is legally responsible for a surviving dependent child.

If there is no surviving spouse, 10 percent of a deceased member's base salary is paid to each court-appointed guardian of a surviving dependent child. Under the division's longstanding interpretation of this provision, if all of the deceased member's surviving dependent children have the same guardian, 10 percent is paid to the guardian. If the dependent children have separate court-appointed guardians, each guardian is paid 10 percent. However, if the court appoints more than one person (for example, an aunt and uncle) to serve jointly as guardian of one or more dependent children, 10 percent is paid to the guardians jointly. The amendment codifies this longstanding interpretation by the division.

A reference in AS 14.25.162(b)(3) to AS 14.25.160(a) is changed to AS 14.25.166, to correctly indicate the location of the description of "beneficiaries," which was relocated in 1982.

Section 3 of the bill amends AS 14.25.164(b). A reference to AS 14.25.160(a) is changed to AS 14.25.166, to correctly indicate the location of the description of "beneficiaries," which was relocated in 1982.

Section 4 of the bill amends AS 22.25.030 by adding a new subsection that provides for the manner of payment of the contributions made to JRS by a judge if there are no survivors entitled to benefits or if less than the amount contributed by the judge has been paid after payment of all survivor's benefits. This amendment is consistent with provisions in PERS and TRS and with an amendment to EPORS in sec. 8 of this bill.

Section 5 of the bill adds a new section to AS 22.25. The new section requires persons who claim entitlement to death benefits under JRS to provide evidence of that entitlement. It also provides that a person who claims entitlement to death benefits under JRS is not entitled to receive from the system any benefits already paid by the commissioner if the commissioner does not receive notification of a claim before 10 days after the judge's death. This section is consistent with provisions added last year by ch. 117, SLA 1986 to PERS, TRS, and the National Guard and Naval Militia Retirement System. Failure to include the provision in amendments to JRS statutes was an oversight.

SCS CSHB 252(Fin), which became ch. 82, SLA 1986, and SCS CSHB 237(Jud), which became ch. 117, SLA 1986, passed the legislature on May 11 and 12, 1986, respectively. Both bills contained amendments to JRS. Section 8 of SCS CSHB 252(Fin) amended AS 22.25.030(b) to remove the provision that the right of a surviving spouse to survivor's benefits under JRS ends upon remarriage of the surviving spouse. Section 22 of SCS CSHB 237(Jud), which passed the legislature one day later, added new AS 22.25.035. Through apparent oversight, the new section contained the same provision that was deleted in the other bill. Section 6 of the attached bill amends AS 22.25.035 to remove that provision, making it consistent with AS 22.25.030(b).

Section 7 of the bill amends AS 39.35.330(b). Under the division's longstanding interpretation of this subsection, which was first adopted as a regulation in 1966, periods of leave without pay are totaled in a calendar year to determine whether more than 10 days have been taken during the year for purposes of determining creditable service. The amendment clarifies AS 39.35.330(b), in accordance with the longstanding administrative interpretation.

Section 8 of the bill provides that the right of a surviving spouse to receive survivor's benefits under EPORS continues upon remarriage of the surviving spouse. This is consistent with similar changes to JRS enacted last year (see sec. 6).

This section also provides for the manner of payment of the contributions made to EPORS by a member if there are no survivors entitled to benefits or if less than the amount contributed by the member has been paid after payment of all survivor's benefits. This amendment is consistent with provisions in PERS and TRS and with the amendment to JRS in sec. 4 of this bill.

Section 9 corrects an error in sec. 57, ch. 82, SLA 1986. Under that section, sec. 43, ch. 82, SLA 1986, which provided for payment of interest on underpayments and overpayments by and to the system was made applicable only to PERS-covered employees hired after the effective date of the Act. Sec. 43, like sec. 2, ch. 82, SLA 1986, which includes the same provision for TRS and which was not limited in its application, was meant to apply to all PERS-covered employees, regardless of date of hire.



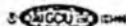

Thank you for the opportunity to testify regarding Senate Bill 238, "An act relating to the use of a political party name by a candidate". SB 288 addresses a serious difficulty endemic only to legislative and gubernatorial elections in our state. The presidential portion of the statute is clear as to a process by which a candidate and a party are identified. As we found, to our chagrin, in 1986, no such clarity exists in statute regarding the identification of a candidate with our party or another party should the candidate choose to avoid a primary and yet utilize our party label by attaching some qualifier to it.

Thousands of Alaskans have worked to build political parties with stated philosophies in our platforms and resolutions, with incumbents of whom we are proud as they espouse our political philosophies and with candidates who are the embodiment of our public leadership. A basic foundation of party activists is the identity of the Party through our names and symbols. The elephant is clearly a Republican and the donkey is clearly a Democrat. That clarity in the public's mind, however, is subject to confusion when qualifiers are added to the name and primaries are avoided.

Whether an "independent Republican" runs, a "moderate Democrat" runs or any other of the tremendous number of qualifiers that could be used to condition Republicans or Democrats as they run, the qualifiers merely add confusion to the system and, frankly, allow gamesmanship at the public's expense. Simply put, if a candidate chooses to run as a Republican, Democrat, Libertarian or any other party and there is competition, we have a tried and true system of competition called the primary to determine the standard bearer for that party. If a candidate chooses to identify with a party by use of the name that candidate should do so honorably by competing in the established process.

Even though there are points which may need clarification between the parties, the public has come to expect and indeed demands to examine the records, platforms and differences between incumbents of the parties, and indeed the parties themselves. Although 1986 provided only one candidate who used what he described as a "neat trick" to avoid the primary, I could anticipate more such gamesmanship in 1988 if the statute is not clarified. Therefore, I advocate on behalf of the Republican Party passage of Senate Bill 288.



It is the intent that the Commissioner of the Department of Community and Regional Affairs consult with the Alaska Craftsman Home Program Board of Directors before distributing monies appropriated to the Alaska Energy Efficient Home Grant Fund. Guidelines and procedures for the allocation of monies from this fund shall take into account the financial need of the applicant as well as the educational value of the request.

The commissioner may allocate funds from the Alaska Energy Efficient Home Grant Fund to a homeowner to retrofit an existing home for the purpose of mitigating indoor radon health hazards under Sec 44.47.378(b) of this bill. To qualify, however, the homeowner must have applied for a loan to mitigate the effects of radon from a state chartered or federally chartered lending institution, and must have been rejected.



SECTION 1

-This section states the findings that support implementation of ENERGY EFFICIENT HOUSING policy including: improved health and safety of occupants, stimulating economic recovery, and improved efficiency of State funds currently spent on energy related subsidies.

SECTION 2

-This section of the legislation gives the Department of Community and Regional Affairs the authority to spend money on ENERGY EFFICIENT DESIGN FEATURES in HUD homes out of the existing SUPPLEMENTAL HOUSING DEVELOPMENT GRANT FUND. This fund is currently used to pay for other improvements to HUD housing so passage of this bill will allow the State to use grant money to save future State dollars on energy costs.

SECTION 3

-This section creates the ALASKA ENERGY EFFICIENT HOME GRANT FUND. New home construction has virtually disappeared but with this fund in place, an appropriation can be disbursed by C&RA to agencies, individuals or businesses to retrofit existing homes or build new ones to Alaska Craftsman Home Program Standards. A grant would encourage a builder to learn techniques and build to the higher standards with the end product of a higher quality home. In the current market the one time grant could be used to supplement funds to retrofit an existing substandard home.


Under the authority of art. III, sec. 18, of the Alaska Constitution, I am transmitting a bill pertaining to contracting procedures for the sale and delivery of in-bond merchandise sold at Alaska's international airports. These transactions take place in the "duty free" shops.

This bill amends existing AS 02.15.091(d) to allow the Department of Transportation and Public Facilities (DOT/PF) to award duty free contracts through the competitive proposal mechanism. Presently, the department must offer the duty free contracts only by competitive bid and then make the contract award after considering the generation of maximum revenue for the International Airports Revenue Fund (AS 37.15.430).

While generation of revenue is a critical component of any contract involving operation of the duty free shops, giving the department flexibility to use competitive proposal procedures will possibly increase revenue and assist the state to meet other valid goals. DOT/PF would like to be able to consider such factors as space layout, kind of merchandise, level of service, minority participation plans, and demonstrated experience. DOT/PF regulations in 17 AAC 40 govern that department's competitive proposal procedures.

I believe that this measure warrants your critical scrutiny. My Administration looks forward to working with legislative committees to explain this bill in greater detail. This bill has the support of the Department of Transportation and Public Facilities. Please call on Commissioner Mark Hickey if you have additional questions about this bill.

SUBJECT: SB 347 am "An act relating to the regulation of motorboat motor repairs".

I would like to ask that you schedule SB 347 am at your earliest convenience. SB 347 am amends the definition section of the current law relating to the Regulation of Motor Vehicle Repairs to include motorboat motors and defines motorboats and motorboat motors.

Currently under AS 45.45, motor vehicle repair, when a customer takes his motor vehicle to a shop for repair the customer may request a written estimate prior to the commencement of any repairs. Nothing in this section requires a shop to provide a price estimate if the shop does not agree to perform the requested repairs. If the shop has given the customer an estimate and the price for the authorized repairs exceeds the estimate, the shop must call the customer before continuing with the repairs and at that time the shop has the opportunity to give the customer a new estimate. Also if the customer requests, at the time the repair order is taken, the customer may elect to receive the parts of their motor vehicle that are replaced.

Essentially 45.45 Regulation of Motor Vehicle Repairs is a consumer protection law. SB 347 am will provide the same protection for boat owners as for motor vehicle owners under AS 45.45.

My office was contacted by an individual who needed to have his boat engine repaired. A verbal estimate by the boat dealership indicated the repairs would cost \$4,500.00. When the dealership was finished repairing the engine the total bill was over \$7,000.00 There was no indication to the owner at any time prior to the billing that the amount due would be over the original estimate.

With the large number of boat owners in our state and the fact that for many their boat is an important means of transportation, I believe this bill will extend the necessary protection for boat owners that currently exists for car owners.


I would like to suggest for your consideration, the inclusion of motorboats (that is motorboat engines) in the vehicle statute section that requires an estimate in writing be given to the customer before work proceeds.

My own experience this year with a mechanic shop specializing in boat engine repairs has brought this idea to light. The shop that repaired my boat engine this summer had given me an oral estimate of \$4,500.00 for engine repairs required. By the time they finished with the boat the bill was over \$7,000.00 with no indications to me at any time prior to billing that it would be over the original estimate. After the original estimate, nothing was said to me about the bill being larger than the original estimate. There was no authorization by me to do more work. When I questioned the mechanic about this; his reply was these had to be done. I asked him about the original estimate and was told that the statutes covering estimates did not cover motorboats. I did subsequently discuss this with the Attorney General's office, and was told that this was the case.

Needless to say, I was quite upset. After discussion with several people about this the best I could come up with is the above suggestion.

CONTINUATION OF FISCAL NOTE FOR PROPOSED COMMITTEE
SUBSTITUTE TO SB 384

This analysis assumes SB 384 will be amended to include identical provisions as those of CS HB 420 (State Affairs), a copy of which is attached.

Section 1 of this bill amends AS 44.62.040(b) to include the Governor's signature on regulations. "The signature of the governor approving adoption of the regulation as required by AS 44.62.065 must accompany the regulation."

The addition of the signing of regulations to the Governor's duties could result in some delays in the approval process due to scheduling conflicts.

Section 2 of this bill adds a new section to AS 44.62, "Sec. 44.62.065. GOVERNOR'S SIGNATURE. A regulation or order of repeal is not valid unless the governor has approved its adoption in writing."

The Office of the Governor will need to establish a regulatory review process, which will create the need for an additional Special Staff Assistant who will be charged with research and preparation of a policy review of each regulation referred to the Governor for approval.

I am taking this opportunity to write to clarify some misconceptions that have arisen from Senate Bill 395, an act relating to the school term. A copy of the bill is on the reverse side of this letter.

Certain children throughout the State of Alaska receive less than the standard 180 days of instruction that is mandated by law. Some of these absences are attributed to the subsistence lifestyles of parents requiring hunting and fishing time, as well as commercial fishing. The current law does not make allowances for these absences, and schools just show the children absent. The children lose valuable educational opportunities that are often not addressed.

SB 395 simply gives the local school board the discretion to adjust the school day to accommodate the different lifestyle needs of students. Current law allows adjustments for correcting asbestos problems. Conditions such as frozen pipes, flooding and lack of heat would also apply under this change. Changes must be approved by the Commissioner of Education to insure the changes remain within the guidelines of state law.
