SUBJECT: Senate Bill 312 Sponsor Statement

A large, stylized handwritten signature in black ink, likely belonging to Senator Jack Coghill, written over the "TO" and "FROM" fields of the memorandum.

BILL SUMMARY: Senate Bill 312, "An Act relating to the income of the permanent fund; and providing for an effective date" is a piece of legislation which changes the percentage of the income of the permanent fund that will be deposited back into the fund for inflation proofing.

FISCAL IMPACT: As of today, February 28, 1990, we have not yet received a fiscal note from the Department of Revenue. However, we do not anticipate a fiscal impact.

ABOUT THE BILL: After the end of each fiscal year, an amount sufficient to offset the effect of inflation on principal of the Alaska permanent fund during that year, shall be transferred by the corporation from the net income of the Alaska permanent fund to the principal of the permanent fund for reinvestment. SB 312 would establish that the amount transferred may not exceed 25 percent of the net income computed for the preceding fiscal year, instead of using the formula of "21 percent of the net income of the corporation for the last five fiscal years."

Also, after the end of each fiscal year, 75 percent of the net income of the permanent fund computed for the preceding fiscal year shall be transferred by the corporation to the dividend fund.

Here is the sectional summary you requested of SB 312, relating to income of the permanent fund.

Sec. 1. Deletes "income averaging" and other provisions in existing law relating to the determination of the amount of income available for distribution.

Sec. 2. At the end of each fiscal year an amount to offset the effect of inflation is transferred by the Alaska Permanent Fund Corporation from the income of the permanent fund to the principal. The amount may not exceed 25 percent of the net income computed for the preceding fiscal year. Provisions relating to the earning reserve account are deleted. If this bill is enacted, an appropriation of the unencumbered balance in this account should be made.

Sec. 3. At the end of each fiscal year 75 percent of the net income is transferred to the dividend fund.

Sec. 4. A cross-reference is added to the new provision contained in Sec. 3 of the bill requiring the transfer of 75 percent of the income to the dividend account. Reference to the subsection requiring 50 percent of the income available for distribution to be transferred is deleted, as that provision is repealed.

Sec. 5. The current subsection dealing with transfers of income to the permanent fund is repealed.

Sec. 6. The Act has an effective date of July 1, 1989. This date will need to be adjusted.

Analysis of Financial Implications on the Retirement Systems

Analysis: Senate Bill 314 would eliminate dual health insurance coverage under the Public Employees' and Teachers' Retirement Systems. Since current active or retired members of the systems would not be affected, only new hires, no immediate savings would be recognized. Though this provision could save the systems \$75,000 annually, the amount is insufficient to impact the funding of the systems; therefore, this bill would have no measurable impact on the contribution rate or the funding ratios of either the PERS or TRS.

This bill represents an effort to aid law enforcement agencies trying to locate missing children and reunite them with their families. The measures mandated by this bill are not costly and will generally assist public and private agencies looking for children that have been separated from their families.

SB 332 has been endorsed by two major national organizations working on the missing children problem, Child Find of America, Inc. and the National Center for Missing and Exploited Children.

I have included a copy of the bill, a sectional analysis and several letters of endorsement from the two national organizations as backup material.

Please do not hesitate to call on Mike Abbott of my staff if there is additional information that would be of assistance to you.

re: Explanation of Changes in Proposed CS for SB 332

In response to recommendations from the Departments of Public Safety and Health and Social Services I drafted a proposed Committee Substitute for SB 332, an act relating to records of missing children and to records of certain children transferred as students.

I believe the changes made in the proposed CS are positive and add to the effectiveness of this legislation. The changes are :

Section 1. 14.30.710. I have asked that subsection (a) be deleted. I think this tightens up the bill and will prevent unproductive paper shuffling between the Dept of Public Safety, the Bureau of Vital Statistics and Alaska schools. It also eliminates the provision that would lead to DPS investigations of parents who, for whatever reason, do not submit the appropriate records for their child when the child enters a new school.

The last of sentence of the original bill was deleted in lieu of the sentences added in the proposed CS. This addition will make it possible for schools to send flagged records if this will assist a law enforcement agency's investigation.

Section 2. 18.50.315. I have added language to the second line of this section making it possible for law enforcement agencies other than the DPS to request that records at the Bureau of Vital Statistics be flagged.

In subsection (c) of this section I have modified the list of information to be requested of people attempting to gain copies of birth certificates of children with flagged records. The modified list includes the information normally requested by the Bureau of Vital Statistics.

Section 3. 47.10.141. In the first sentence of this section I have added language that allows the Department to determine that record flagging at schools and the Bureau of Vital Statistics will be in the best interests of the investigation of a missing child. If the Department determines that the procedures set out in Sections 1 and 2 would not be of use to their investigation then the Department would not be obliged to carry them out.

Further in 47.10.141 the description of the child required to be sent to the Bureau of Vital Statistics has been modified to include the specific information necessary for the Bureau to accurately flag the correct records.

INSTRUCTIONS FOR ESTABLISHING RELIGIOUS AND PRIVATE SCHOOLS

Exempt religious and other private schools, AS 14.45.100-200, are exempt from most requirements of laws and regulations relating to education. However, exempt religious and other private schools must comply with the following:

1. **Enrollment Reporting Form:**
Parents must submit a notice of private school enrollment with the local public school superintendent. The superintendent must also be notified if the child is no longer enrolled in or attending private school.
2. **Attendance Records:**
Monthly attendance records for each student enrolled in the school must be maintained.
3. **Standardized Testing:**
A nationally standardized test must be administered to all students enrolled in grades 4, 6, and 8 at least once each year. The test must measure achievement in English grammar, reading, spelling and mathematics. Records of the results must be maintained and made available to parents or guardians of each student. They must also be available annually to an authorized representative of the Department of Education.
4. **Affidavit of Compliance:**
A notarized affidavit signed by the Chief Administrative Officer, certifying that the permanent student records reflecting immunization, physical examinations, standardized testing, academic achievement, and courses taken at the school are being maintained.
5. **Fire and Safety Inspection:**
The school must undergo inspections for fire and environmental health and safety by the appropriate agencies. The Department of Education must receive certification of the inspections from either the school or the agency conducting the inspection. (4 AAC 60.140)
6. **Corporal Punishment Policy**
A written policy governing the use of corporal punishment as defined in 4 AAC 42.200 shall be filed with the Department of Education by October 15. A copy of the regulation is included in this packet.
7. **Registration of Immunization Assessment:**
Registration of Immunization Assessment must be submitted to the Department of Health and Social Services on an annual basis and is due in their office by November 15 of each year.
8. **Asbestos Inspection:**
Asbestos Hazard Emergency Response Act-Final Rule. Please refer to the attached memo from Sue Miller for specific information regarding this ruling.

9. School Calendar:

The school must operate at least 180 days of the year and the school calendar must be submitted to the Department of Education by October 15 of each year.

10. Annual Enrollment Report:

An annual report of the number of students enrolled in each grade must be submitted to the Department of Education by October 15 of each school year.

(1) describe the role of the person or persons authorized to administer corporal punishment;

(2) describe the circumstances under which corporal punishment may be used;

(3) describe the type and amount of corporal punishment permitted, including any instruments that may be used;

(4) describe any requirements governing privacy or the presence of witnesses; and

(5) require that parental consent be obtained before corporal punishment is used; consent may be given before each use of corporal punishment, or may be a general consent for a period of time.

(b) The requirements of (a) of this section do not apply to a school in which only the children of a single family are enrolled and the schooling is provided by the parent or legal guardian of the children.

(c) Each school required to have a policy under (a) and (b) of this section shall distribute its current policy to the parents of each student and shall have its current policy on file with the Alaska Department of Education, P.O. Box F, Juneau, Alaska, 99811. Corporal punishment may be administered only in accordance with the policy on file with the Department.

4 AAC 07.900 DEFINITION:

As used in this chapter, "corporal punishment" means the application of physical force to the body of a student for disciplinary purposes. It does not include the use of reasonable and necessary physical restraint of a student to protect the student, or others, from physical injury, to obtain possession of a weapon or other dangerous object from a student, to maintain reasonable order in the classroom or on school grounds, or to protect property from serious damage or destruction.

SUBJECT: Asbestos Hazard Emergency Response Act - Final Rule

On October 30, 1987, the final rule for the Asbestos Hazard Emergency Response Act (AHERA) was published. The Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) distributed copies of this rule to all public and private schools nationwide.

AHERA requires that Local Education Agencies (LEA) shall inspect each school building that they lease, own or otherwise use as a school building, to identify all friable and non-friable asbestos-containing building material. This includes any other facility used for the instruction or housing of students; or for the administration of educational research programs; any maintenance, storage or utility facility; any portion of covered exterior hallway or walkway; and any exterior portion of a mechanical system used to condition interior space. This inspection must be performed by an accredited inspector. LEA's must have an accredited management planner develop a management plan for each building under their authority. This management plan must be submitted to the Department of Education prior to its use as a school.

LEA's must also ensure that all members of their maintenance/custodial staff who may work in a building that contains Asbestos Containing Building Material (ACBM) receive at least two (2) hours of awareness training. They must also ensure that members of their maintenance/custodial staff who might, during the course of their jobs, disturb the ACBM, receive an additional 14 hours of training. The act also outlines recordkeeping, sampling, and testing requirements. Penalties for non-compliance can include fines of not more than \$5,000 per day per building.

Please be aware that these are NEW requirements. If an LEA had its buildings inspected under the 1982 Asbestos in School Rule, it must be reinspected under AHERA.

1. Requested by DPS: Relates to removal of the word missing in several sentences on Page 3 of the CS per request from DPS. They want to ensure that it is clear that the reference is to INVOLUNTARILY MISSING CHILDREN, not just missing children who may be "run-aways". Amendment drafted by Legal, originally DPS had just requested removal of one "missing" but legal stated that did not complete the job.

2. YOUR AMENDMENT: Based on my review of this bill, it became clear that if the intent of this bill is to locate involuntarily missing children, we would be remiss in not bringing EXEMPT PRIVATE AND RELIGIOUS SCHOOLS into compliance with the requirements placed on non-exempt schools. Current law basically allows anyone to declare themselves a "private school" if they comply with the 11 items listed in your packet under INSTRUCTIONS FOR ESTABLISHING RELIGIOUS AND PRIVATE SCHOOLS. Wording for this amendment was drafted by legal, Mike Ford. I have given a copy of the CS and the amendment to D.O.E. and asked them to testify on the amendment. (I gave amendments to Mike Abbott on Friday, his comment was he hoped this wouldn't bog down the bill. Rick wants the bill passed out today.)

HSS; supports CS, original bill required too much involvement and required gathering more information than normally requested of Bureau of Vital Stats.

On Monday, March 12 at 1:30 p.m. in the Beltz Room the Senate State Affairs Committee will hear the following bills:
TELECONFERENCE; 1:30-2:30 p.m. Anchorage LIO

HB 13. An Act declaring that telecommunications service utilities affect the public interest; and directing that regulation of telecommunications service utilities maintain and further universal basic telecommunications service. This bill relates to setting a state policy that directs that regulation seek to maintain and further the efficiency, availability and affordability of basic telephone service in Alaska.

Proposed CS for SB 332. An Act relating to records of missing children; and to records of certain children transferred as students. This bill will require the Department of Public Safety (DPS) to notify schools and the Bureau of Vital Statistics (BVS), of missing children and requires the schools and the BVS to then flag the school records and/or the birth certificate. Any request for flagged records will be reported back to DPS. It establishes certain requirements for schools to request certified records for transfer students, clarifies that this bill relates to children involuntarily absent and specifies that when a child is located, flagging on records/birth certificates will be removed. Packet contains two proposed amendments: one specifies technical changes in relation to the word "missing" on page 3 as requested by DPS and the second would bring the exempt religious and other private schools into the missing children flagging process by requiring compliance with the missing children provisions.

HCR 41. Relating to Earth Day. This resolution encourages private and public observation of the 20th anniversary of Earth Day, April 22nd, 1990.

CS HJR 63. Relating to persons immigrating to and requesting asylum in the United States. Senate State Affairs Committee passed out a CS for the Senate companion resolution SJR 61. Your packet contains a proposed CS for the House Bill that incorporates the changes our committee made to SJR 61 and adds two additional changes: replacing the word "sanctuary" with "refuge" and adding "and certain other countries" to follow Romania on Page 1, Line 10.

AN ACT RELATING TO RECORDS OF MISSING CHILDREN; AND TO RECORDS OF CERTAIN CHILDREN ENROLLED OR TRANSFERRED AS STUDENTS

Sectional Analysis

Section 14.30.700. RECORDS OF MISSING CHILDREN.

When a child is declared missing, the Department of Public Safety will notify the school in which the child is currently or was previously enrolled to alert them of the child's disappearance. The school will then flag the child's record. If anyone requests a copy or information concerning the flagged record, the school will immediately report it to the Department of Public Safety. When a missing child has been found, the Department of Public Safety will notify the school(s) and the flag will be removed from the child's record.

Section 14.30.710. REQUIRED RECORDS UPON ENROLLMENT OR TRANSFER.

(a) When a child is enrolled for the first time in an elementary or secondary school in the state, the school will require a certified copy of the child's birth certificate as proof of identity which must be submitted to the school within 30 days after the child is enrolled. If the person enrolling a child fails to submit this documentation within the 30-day period, the school will notify the Department of Public Safety.

(b) When a child transfers to an elementary or secondary school the school will request directly from the child's previous school a certified copy of the child's record. The school shall request this documentation within 14 days after enrolling the child as a transfer student. An elementary or secondary school in this state requested to forward a copy of a transferring child's record to another school shall comply with the request within 10 days unless the child's record has been flagged under AS 14.30.700. A school may not forward a copy of a flagged record and shall notify the Dept. of Public Safety of the request.

Section 14.30.720. DEFINITION.

A child is defined as a person under 18 years of age.

Section 18.50.315. RECORDS OF MISSING CHILDREN.

(a) When a child born in the state is declared missing, the Department of Public Safety will notify the Bureau of Vital Statistics. Vital Statistics will then flag the birth certificate record of the missing child. When a missing child has been found, the Department of Public Safety will notify Vital Statistics and the flag will be removed from the birth certificate record.

(b) Vital Statistics may not provide a copy of a flagged birth certificate or information regarding a flagged birth certificate, except as provided in this section.

(c) When a copy of a flagged birth certificate is requested, the Bureau of Vital Statistics shall immediately notify Public Safety. If the request for information is made in person, the bureau will record the person's names, address, telephone number, and social security number, and will photocopy that person's driver's license.

(d) For purposes of this section, a child is defined as a person under 18 years of age.

Sec. 3. Adds a new subsection (d) to AS 47.10.141.

(d) Requires the Department of Public Safety to notify the Bureau of Vital Statistics of the disappearance and provide a description of a missing child born in Alaska. If the Department of Public Safety has reason to believe that a missing child (whether born in Alaska or not) has been enrolled in a specific Alaskan school, the department will also notify the last known school attended by the missing child of the disappearance. When a missing child is found the Department of Public Safety will notify Vital Statistics and any school which was previously informed of the child's disappearance.
