TWO AMENDMENTS WERE DISCUSSED IN STATE AFFAIRS:

AMENDMENT #1 PASSED:

1. Requested by DPS: Relates to removal of the word missing in several sentences on Page 3 of the CS per request from DPS. They want to ensure that it is clear that the reference is to INVOLUNTARILY MISSING CHILDREN, not just missing children who may be "run-aways". Amendment drafted by Legal, originally DPS had just requested removal of one "missing" but legal stated that did not complete the job.

AMENDMENT #2: Did NOT Pass

2. YOUR AMENDMENT: Based on review of this bill, it became clear that if the intent of this bill is to locate involuntarily missing children, we would be remiss in not bringing EXEMPT PRIVATE AND RELIGIOUS SCHOOLS into compliance with the requirements placed on non-exempt schools. Current law basically allows anyone to declare themselves a "private school" if they comply with 11 requirements including things like Completion of Enrollment Form, Attendance Records, Standardized Testing and Asbestos Inspection (listed in your packet under INSTRUCTIONS FOR ESTABLISHING RELIGIOUS AND PRIVATE SCHOOLS. Wording for this amendment was drafted by legal, Mike Ford.) What the amendment does is require exempt schools to flag school records upon notification by DPS that a child is involuntarily missing and to request, within 14 days after enrollment, the certified copy of a transfer student's record or if requested to provide certified copy of a student's record, the school will comply within 10 days UNLESS THE RECORD HAS BEEN FLAGGED. If flagged, the school is required to notify DPS and not forward the records.

3/21/90 I spoke with Steve Hole, DOE, this morning. He encourages the addition of Amendment #2 to SB 332, based on the bill drafter's certainty that non-exempt private schools are included in the other portions of the bill. He is pursuing getting exempt schools into the regs but would find it alot easier if it were in statute.

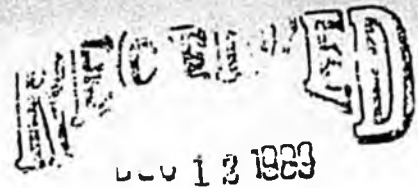

Dear Governor Cowper:

On the morning of October 17, 1989, the Bering Strait School District's High School in Stebbins, Alaska, was totally destroyed by fire. As a result, the only educational facility remaining in the community is a 14-year-old BIA elementary school originally constructed as a "temporary" facility. This "temporary" elementary school is in poor condition with many code deficiencies and is totally inadequate for even the current elementary school population, much less a combined elementary and secondary population. That "temporary" facility has been high on both the District's and Department of Education's CIP request for many years.

On behalf of the Bering Strait School District, I am therefore making this emergency request for (a) a \$5.3 million capital appropriation for the construction of a new K-12 school in Stebbins, Alaska and (b) an immediate appropriation of a \$500,000 planning grant to be credited against the \$5.3 million appropriation, so that the District can immediately begin the planning and design of the K-12 facility.

The District estimates the total cost of that new facility to be approximately \$8.8 million. The additional, anticipated \$3.5 million needed for construction is expected from the fire insurance proceeds payable to the District by its insurance carriers as a result of the total destruction by fire of the Stebbins High School.

By pooling the District's insurance settlement with emergency funding from the Legislature, instead of separate elementary and secondary schools being built, possibly years apart, one K-12 educational facility can be constructed in a cost effective and efficient manner, and designed to serve the educational population of Stebbins, Alaska for many, many years into the future.

On behalf of the District, professional engineers are in the process of preparing sound and solid historical and factual data to support the District's emergency request. You will have it within ten days. That data will clearly demonstrate among other things, (1) the absolute inadequacy of the old BIA "temporary" elementary school facility in Stebbins from the prospective of fire and safety code deficiencies and space inadequacies considering current elementary student population and Department of Education square footage guidelines; (2) the cost savings and efficiency that will accrue by constructing one large facility instead of two smaller facilities; and (3) the credibility of the \$8.8 million estimated cost of a K-12 facility.

Your prompt attention to the District's emergency request is urgently needed.

## Stebbins School Advance Funding

### Requirements

Advance funding is required to allow for the design of the K-12 facility and to install foundations. We expect the insurance companies to provide payment for the replacement cost of the previous high school by the end of February 1990. The total settlement will be approximately \$3.5 million, and the first payment \$2.8 million. The balance of payment will come when we have expended construction funds past the \$2.8 million level. I assume that this would be prorated between the two funding sources and that a 82% combined expenditure would be required before final release of funds. The insurance settlement will represent only about 30% of the total funds required to complete the programmed K-12 facility.

The request for advance funding from the Legislature is intended to cover the design and foundation cost for the 70% balance of the budget. The total funds requested from the State of Alaska are \$8.5 million. Design and foundation cost for that portion of the work are detailed below.

If the award of the remainder of the State funding is delayed past the first of May 1990, it may be necessary to request additional advance funding. Those funds would be required to pre purchase framing material that would have to make the May barge sailing. A \$2 million dollar request for advance funding could be easily justified.

In each of the first three disasters listed above, the state allocation from the Disaster Relief Fund totaled \$1,000,000, the maximum amount allowed by law without legislative authorization. Because of this, we believe it is necessary to specify the purpose of the funds in the appropriation section.

Attached to this memo is a draft of the suggested language. In keeping with the indications that the Governor plans to remove the funding of the Disaster Relief Fund from the DMVA budget, we have not specified that the appropriation would be made to DMVA in the draft language. This language would also provide that the unobligated balance of the Disaster Relief Fund on June 30, 1990 would not lapse into the general fund, but be continued in the DRF for future allocations to disasters.

The current unobligated balance of the Disaster Relief Fund is \$515,825.

Please pass the following information to Alison Elgee, OMB.

The Division of Emergency Services will require an additional \$6,187,098.00 in the Disaster Relief Fund (DRF) to fund projects through June 30, 1990. \$4,187,098.00 represents additional funding requirements for federal and State declared disasters. An additional \$2,000,000.00 contingency in the DRF is required for typical disaster incidents, January 1, 1990, through June 30, 1990.

Multiple events throughout the calendar year 1989, including the Statewide Cold declaration, 1989 Spring Floods along the Yukon and Kuskokwim Rivers, Exxon Valdez Oil Spill, Southcentral flooding in Anchorage and the Kenai Peninsula Borough, and most recently, Mt. Redoubt eruption have severely impacted both the DRF and the Division's operation funds. In addition, the DRF was reduced from an annual appropriation of \$6,000,000.00 to \$2,000,000.00 for fiscal year 1990 leaving insufficient funds available to meet the state's obligation of 25% match for approved federal public assistance projects and individual and family grants and the administration of two major disasters declared by the President. In agreeing to accept the federal disaster assistance provided by these declarations, the Governor obligated the State to provide it's share of the cost.

Also requiring additional State authorization is the Kenai Peninsula Borough Major Disaster declared by the President in 1986.

I also recommend that the funds available at June 30, 1990, be left in the DRF for contingency purposes rather than lapsed to the general fund.

A breakdown of funding requirements for each event is attached.

Dear Governor Cowper:

On the morning of October 17, 1989, the Bering Strait School District's High School in Stebbins, Alaska, was totally destroyed by fire. As a result, the only educational facility remaining in the community is a 14-year-old BIA elementary school originally constructed as a "temporary" facility. This "temporary" elementary school is in poor condition with many code deficiencies and is totally inadequate for even the current elementary school population, much less a combined elementary and secondary population. That "temporary" facility has been high on both the District's and Department of Education's CIP request for many years.

On behalf of the Bering Strait School District, I am therefore making this emergency request for (a) a \$5.3 million capital appropriation for the construction of a new K-12 school in Stebbins, Alaska and (b) an immediate appropriation of a \$500,000 planning grant to be credited against the \$5.3 million appropriation, so that the District can immediately begin the planning and design of the K-12 facility.

The District estimates the total cost of that new facility to be approximately \$8.8 million. The additional, anticipated \$3.5 million needed for construction is expected from the fire insurance proceeds payable to the District by its insurance carriers as a result of the total destruction by fire of the Stebbins High School.

By pooling the District's insurance settlement with emergency funding from the Legislature, instead of separate elementary and secondary schools being built, possibly years apart, one K-12 educational facility can be constructed in a cost effective and efficient manner, and designed to serve the educational population of Stebbins, Alaska for many, many years into the future.

On behalf of the District, professional engineers are in the process of preparing sound and solid historical and factual data to support the District's emergency request. You will have it within ten days. That data will clearly demonstrate among other things, (1) the absolute inadequacy of the old BIA "temporary" elementary school facility in Stebbins from the prospective of fire and safety code deficiencies and space inadequacies considering current elementary student population and Department of Education square footage guidelines; (2) the cost savings and efficiency that will accrue by constructing one large facility instead of two smaller facilities; and (3) the credibility of the \$8.8 million estimated cost of a K-12 facility.

Your prompt attention to the District's emergency request is urgently needed.

SB 342

Summary of Bill: This bill would allow DMVA employees to be eligible to receive the National Guard reenlistment bonus as long as their state position did not require that they belong to the National Guard.

History of Issue: In 1987, legislation passed (Ch 24, SLA 87) that restricted eligibility for the reenlistment bonus in order to reduce the cost of this program. The unchanged text of A.S. 26.05.265(c) is the language adopted at that time. In practice, subsection (c)(3) of the 1987 language has essentially discriminated against state employees of DMVA who are not required to be members of the National Guard. For example, a member of the National Guard who is an accounting technician or mail carrier in any other state agency would be eligible to receive the reenlistment bonus, but would not be eligible if they did the same work for DMVA. This legislation would remove the current inequity.

Impact of Bill on Department of Military and Veterans Affairs: There would be no administrative or fiscal impact on DMVA as a result of passage of this bill. There are currently no state employees in DMVA who would be directly affected by this legislation. In the future, National Guard members who are competing for a state position in DMVA would not be required to give up their reenlistment bonus eligibility by accepting the position. This is in the department's interest because it enables National Guard members to compete equally for state positions in DMVA instead of putting them at a disadvantage.

Senator Jim Duncan is proposing legislation that would change the ability of currently ineligible employees to participate in the early retirement incentive program. Through his proposals, employees would qualify if the cost of retirement would demonstrate cost savings over a period of five years instead of three as is currently required. Should employees still be unable to demonstrate cost savings using the longer payback period, employees would have the option of paying the difference to the state or of accepting a reduced benefit in order to retire.

The new legislation does not propose any changes to the window periods for eligibility determination. In order to be able to rapidly certify eligibility based upon the new criteria, you are requested to recalculate the replacement costs of all previously ineligible employees over a five year period by simply extending the previous calculations for an additional two years. This information should be retained by the Administrative Services division pending favorable consideration of the proposed legislation. At such time as the legislation becomes enacted, all employees will be certified eligible who otherwise qualify by length of service and age. While, all employees will be eligible some employees will need to make arrangements to reduce the excess cost to the state through payment or a reduction in benefit. Therefore, the information will need to be made immediately available to employees at such time as the legislation passes so that employees will be able to make decisions about their own participation prior to the close of the eligibility period, March 31, 1990.




WHEREAS, our district does not wish to lose our experienced employees, but has decided it would not be fair to deny them access to a Retirement Incentive Plan once it is passed into law;

I request your prompt scheduling of Senate Bill 343, which will make minor amendments to the existing Retirement Incentive Program. During the interim, I was contacted by a great many State employees with many years of service who did not qualify for the Retirement Incentive under the current statute and OMB guidelines. I believe the program is intended primarily for long term employees and therefore asked the Executive Branch how we could enable such employees to participate. Their suggestion was to allow the savings to be calculated over a five year term as was done in the 86-87 Retirement Incentive Program. Offsetting the cost to the State of the employee's participation in the program against the savings in personal services costs over a longer term will allow more employees to participate and increase the savings to the State.

I have requested statistical information from the Office of Management and Budget about the age and years of service of employees found eligible under the three year scenario versus those found ineligible. I expect to receive it very soon.

To summarize the proposed amendments to the program, it would;

1. increase the period within which savings must be shown from three to five years;
2. allow employees to pay part of the employer's share of the Retirement Incentive cost in order to show a savings; or
3. in lieu of payment, allow employees to elect a reduced benefit to reduce the employer's cost.

I feel it is very important to schedule this bill immediately because the application period for State employees closes on March 31, 1990.

Currently, OMB is not allowing employees to apply if a savings is not found under the three year calculation. OMB has requested all agencies to recalculate savings over a five year period for non-qualifying employees so applications can be processed expeditiously when SB 343 is enacted.

You have requested a sectional analysis of the above described bill.

As a preliminary matter, note that a sectional analysis or summary of a bill should not be considered an authoritative interpretation of the bill and the bill itself is the best statement of its contents.

Section 1 amends the retirement incentive program created in 1989 by allowing employers to offer the incentive to employees when the employer can demonstrate that the retirement of those employees would show a savings in personal services costs within five years. The current law requires a showing of savings within three years.

Secs. 2 and 4 make technical changes to conform other sections of the retirement incentive law to the changes enacted by section 3 of SB 343.

Sec. 3 permits an employee to pay a portion of the employer's costs of having the employee participate in the retirement incentive program. If the employee has not paid the entire amount that the employee agreed to pay by the time the employee retires, the employee's retirement benefits are reduced.

Sec. 5 sets an immediate effective date.
