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MISSION I

Improve climate for understanding and doing business with the State, encouraging and supporting economic development, commerce and international trade.

- A. *Develop the "case" for doing business in and with Alaska.*
 - 1. *Conduct* an aggressive, targeted public relations and promotional campaign touting Alaska's size, resources, vibrant and growing economy, and location at the center of the northern hemisphere.
 - 2. *Generically market* Alaska's natural resources, forest products, seafood and tourism sectors, focusing on developing markets and value-added products.
- B. *Develop and implement a State of Alaska "strategic plan" for economic development.*
- C. *Reduce barriers and bureaucracy.*
 - 1. *Simplify* regulatory boards and commissions.
 - 2. *Establish* an interagency task force with the authority to identify *and* reduce or eliminate barriers and government regulations.
 - 3. *Agressively implement* the economic development recommendations of state commissions and boards.
- D. *Enhance support services.*
 - 1. *Streamline and integrate* government support services for urban and rural economic development, research, finance, and investment marketing.
 - 2. *Promote* the purchase of Alaska manufactured and crafted products and services through the "Made in Alaska" and "Silver Hand" Programs.
 - 3. *Establish* an entity that provides economic data and analysis for Alaska businesses and potential investors.
- E. *Strengthen Alaska's presence in Washington D.C. and abroad.*
 - 1. *Establish* an "Alaska House" Information Center in Washington D.C.
 - 2. *Develop* a nonprofit "Alaska Foundation" to promote Alaska with appropriate educational support, flexibility and innovation not provided by conventional governmental support.
 - 3. *Develop and utilize* more comprehensively the Alaska Washington D.C. office.
- F. *Create a regulatory and tax environment and other incentives that are conducive to resource development on a local, state, national and international level.*
 - 1. *Repeal* the Unitary Tax and exempt in place tax on resources.
 - 2. *Develop* a product viability/business concept equity seed capital investment fund.
 - 3. *Establish* a loan guarantee program with the banking community.

4. *Establish* business tax credits for those investing in private or quasi-public institutions.
 5. *Provide* Fisheries Business Tax Credits for shore based processing of underdeveloped species.
 6. *Promote* the establishment of fees in federal fisheries to pay for management and enforcement and to reduce inequities between onshore and offshore processors.
- G. *Promote* competition in transportation, banking, communications and energy sectors to reduce the cost of basic and value added resource production.

MISSION II

Discover, encourage, and enhance new economic opportunities.

- A. *Establish* and staff a Governor's Council of Economic Advisors to propose and promote new economic opportunities in Alaska.
- B. *Involve* allied state, federal, and international agencies in facilitating economic opportunity.
1. *Identify* and *catalogue* regional and state resource and cooperative program inventories for a development database.
 2. *Expand* the department's Interagency Economic Development Funding Forum to coordinate grant programs.
 3. *Develop* an efficient inter-agency approach to assisting businesses in resource development efforts.
 4. *Assist* communities in achieving economic self sufficiency in remote areas of the State where economic development is difficult.
 5. *Provide* the best available information to industry on product development and market trends in Alaskan industrial sectors.
 6. *Respond* to business inquiries and *conduct* trade missions.
- C. *Enlist* the university system.
1. *Perform* research and development.
 2. *Provide* information on value added production.
 3. *Train* Alaskans for infrastructure operation skills.
 4. *Teach* and *translate* languages and knowledge of market partners.
 5. *Expand* new frontiers in space, sea, shelter, food, sanitation, and resource development

- D. *Work with Alaska Science and Technology Foundation (ASTF), as a principal source of applied research in areas of unmet and urgent state needs. Assist ASTF in establishing research priorities, reviewing grant proposals, and coordinating its innovative and integrative function with the development of the state.*
- E. *Enlist and collaborate with the Arctic Commission in research of essential geographic and resource information and collaboration.*
- F. *Involve private sector organizations.*
 - 1. *Identify* areas of partnership and promise; and
 - 2. *Provide* entrepreneurial role models to encourage youth and others to "add value" to their "raw materials," including themselves.
- G. *Assist the development of new business and the retention of existing business.*
- H. *Promote the development of Alaskan resources in an environmentally responsible manner and in a manner in which negative impacts on other industries do not result in a net economic loss to the State of Alaska.*
 - 1. *Develop* large scale projects including: the gas pipeline, ANWR, Pt. Lay coal fields, interior forests, Juneau gold belt and mining, and others such as fishing, agriculture, and tourism.
 - 2. *Enhance* the natural production of fish and timber resources through hatcheries and reforestation.
 - 3. *Propose* economically positive methods for resolution of resource development conflicts; including marine disposal of mine tailings in coastal Alaska.
 - 4. *Develop and promote* attractions throughout the state that appeal to special interest travelers.
- I. *Promote maximum value-added utilization and processing of Alaska resources within Alaska.*
 - 1. **Fisheries**
 - a. *Propose* a Small Seafood Processors Association to provide technical and marketing assistance.
 - b. *Develop* value added seafood products in conjunction with the private sector. *Investigate and promote* cold storage/value added business incubators, salmon fillet products, surimi based artificial crab, etc.
 - 2. **Minerals**
 - a. *Foster* coal gasification, liquefaction and power generation, industrial minerals fabrication (e.g. limestone to cement, gypsum to sheet rock), and minerals processing.
 - b. *Showcase* the processes in which "Red Dog" or "Greens Creek" mines were initiated and developed to assist and encourage similar efforts.
 - 3. **Timber**
 - a. *Dedicate* a forest land base and *increase* the volume of economically viable timber sales to assure adequate supplies of wood to attract capital investment in value added processes.
 - b. *Provide* information on technological advancement to aid the industry in realizing the full value added potential of Alaska's forest lands.

4. Tourism

- a. *Foster* production of gift/curio consumables through promotion and technical assistance.
- b. *Construct* year round resort and recreational facilities for value added use of public lands.
- c. *Acquire* and *exhibit* artifacts, collections, and properties of historic and cultural significance for value added benefit from Alaska's heritage.

MISSION III

Facilitate infrastructures that are essential to the growing of quality public/private partnerships.

- A. *Establish* a more comprehensive investment fund and program.
- B. *Improve* present partnerships, public and private, with the Chambers of Commerce; Alaska Federation of Natives; service, trade, and professional organizations.
- C. *Create* incentives for the retention and establishment of Alaska stops and services for international carriers
- D. *Secure* modification of the Jones Act to enhance trade; *utilize* the Yukon River exemption.
- E. *Utilize* the new immigration policy by importing essential intellectual and practical skills and leadership (Soviet Jews/Eastern Europe/Hong Kong).
- H. *Develop* necessary infrastructure.
 1. *Establish* industrial parks in major population centers with public/private compacts and resources.
 2. *Promote* infrastructures for value-added possibilities with cheap power, proximity to tidewater, skilled local work force and industrial zoning.
 3. *Establish* ports and harbors to provide support services for the offshore fishing fleet.
 4. *Build* public/private cold storages and value-added business incubators in regional service centers.
 5. *Improve* port development with modular interface of railroad/water, ship building, fishing fleet development, and repair; utilize existing facilities where feasible.

- I. *Arrest* the out-migration of Alaska dollars invested in the various funds outside; *reinvest* to benefit Alaskans.
- J. *Foster* Alaska hire; *bring* jobs and opportunity home to Alaska.

MISSION IV

Create new, practical, effective models for interpreting and selling Alaska's unique role, resources, and services to/for the world.

- A. *Market* existing and *develop* new integrative models for regional and rural development in collaboration with other state agencies including: Alaska Regional Development Organization (ARDOR), Economic Development Matching Grant Program, and Rural Entrepreneurship Establishment Program
- B. *Participate* in State of Alaska/Local Government Model Community Program Integrative model to develop and implement long-term improvements to the socio-economic structure of selected communities.
- C. *Develop* a recreation/wilderness/tourism/education integrative model incorporating new concepts and settings for a unique "Alaska experience" including exploring Alaska's diverse untapped frontiers, cultures, ecosystems, and wilderness.
- D. *Establish* through a public/private effort an "Institute of the North" that celebrates the attributes of the northern high latitudes through exhibition, publications, and education.
 1. *Interpret* the unique wedding of Alaskan Native heritage and contemporary life.
 2. *Describe* Alaska's distinctive role in integrating east/west and north/south dialogue.
 3. *Highlight* the integration of rural/urban educational systems, and public/private models of cooperation and support
- E. *Assist* in the establishment of an Alaska Native Heritage park.
- F. *Promote* innovation in 21st century technology:
 1. *Energy* — *Provide* national leadership toward energy independence focusing on both conventional and alternatives energy sources.
 - a. *Accelerate* sophisticated fossil fuel discovery, processing, and marketing, similar to the Healy clean coal co-generation project.

- b. *Develop* methods of generating efficient and economic rural energy.
 - c. *Research* and develop alternative energy such as solar, hydro, tidal, geothermal, biomass, and wind.
 - d. *Utilize* satellite energy delivery systems as laser technology develops.
2. **Space** — *Market* Alaska's unique air space and polar location for satellite launching, communications surveillance, and environmental monitoring of the earth.
 - a. *Utilize* Poker Flats for NASA and commercial/research satellite launching; establishing "polar fleets."
 - b. *Promote* the testing of experimental aircraft utilizing total environment control; and
 3. **Seas** — *Promote* Alaska's unique marine and water resources potential for aquaculture and augmented fisheries yield; and marine exploration and research and development;
 4. **Agriculture** — *Develop* Alaska's agricultural potential:
 - a. *Promote* the agricultural utilization of geothermal/hot springs resources and extended daylight
 - b. *Develop* high yield, disease resistant birch and aspen seedlings for international export;
 - c. *Promote* experimentation of growing season rhythms and new species.
 5. **Housing** — *Promote* new housing design and use of Alaska materials.
 - a. *Design* an economic "Alaskan House" utilizing new housing materials, modular construction, energy efficiency, and waste and water cycling.
 - b. *Utilize* Alaska materials to construct modular housing for Alaskans.
 - c. *Promote* the building of indigenous, internally integrated village systems offering communal services.
 6. **Transportation**—*Promote* access to resources by experimenting with new forms of transport including economic, efficient, environmentally sound combustion engines; vacuum design with MIT; cargo and passenger ice-mobiles and hydro foils for the arctic; and movement of new forms of slurry.
 7. **Communications** — *Utilize* technological advances in communication.
 - a. *Promote* the development of low orbit satellite communication systems for global delivery.
 - b. *Refine* software data base and for delivery of uniquely Alaskan information on such varied topics as the Arctic, polar linkage of Europe/America/Asia, and models for Third World.
 8. **Trade and Commerce**—*Open* new frontiers in trade and finance:
 - a. *Initiate* cross cultural and cross continent collaboration with USSR.
 - b. *Explore* new forms of "financial" institutions and capital exchange.
 - c. *Develop* new forms of private/public partnership—"owner state" and private enterprise.
 9. **Waste** — *Utilize* new technologies of waste use, recycling, transformation, disposal.
 - a. *Promote* new industries for transforming and utilization of U.S./U.S.S.R. weaponry disarmament agreements and disposal especially where we meet - Siberia/Alaska; and
 - b. *Utilize* the arctic environment for new, environmentally safe waste disposal industries.

MISSION V

Foster economic development through the growth of trade between Alaska, the other states and foreign countries.

A. Develop a high return list and prioritize opportunities.

1. By region: Pacific Rim, European Economic Community (EEC), Canada, China, USSR, North Pacific.
2. By resource or industry: LNG, coal, oil-gas products, fish-value added, timber value added, tourism, products and mfr. goods, technology, engineering and know-how, transportation, communication.
3. By individual project, e.g., Wishbone Hill Coal Mine, LNG exports, international tourism and Alaska Tourism Marketing Council.

B. Operationalize the opportunities.

1. *Develop* the Alaska State Chamber of Commerce Export Model.
2. *Seek* direct foreign investment in Alaska.
3. *Promote* Alaska as an exportable model for responsible economic development.
4. *Advocate* Alaska's role in the new global world order, now and in the future.

C. Cultivate future possibilities.

1. *Identify* new frontiers and trade possibilities.
2. *Shift* staff to include Alaskans in overseas offices to blend Alaskans with nationals.
3. *Locate* overseas offices in the Pacific capital markets and consumer market centers for Alaskan products.
4. *Develop* a new strategy for dealing with Japan, Alaska's oldest and largest trading partner. Areas of potential: LNG, coal, food customized for consumers, lumber rather than timber.
5. *Strengthen* trade with Korea.
6. *Evaluate* the China connection: Taiwan/mainland
7. *Develop* the USSR relationship with state government by *strengthening* and *expanding* communication and transportation links, *promoting* the northern trade route, and *establishing* a consulate in Alaska.
8. *Promote* free trade and cooperation between the Yukon Territory, British Columbia and Alaska; *establish* an air link between Vancouver, Canada and Alaska.
9. *Participate* and *support* the Alaska/Japan Fisheries Cooperation Committee.
10. *Establish* an action agenda for Alaska and EEC. Areas of potential: tourism, capital, food products, technical services (e.g. environmental, engineering).
11. *Participate* in Expo 92 in Spain in the same manner (joint effort with the State Chamber of Commerce) as during Expo 88 in Brisbane, Australia.
12. *Promote* Alaska's mineral resources by contracting with minerals industry traders or brokers in foreign capitals to act as Alaska "agents" on commission.
13. *Build* on the present sports programs in Alaska - (summer baseball league) Nordic sports, amateur sports as an authentic extension of the state's public image.
14. *Establish* fees for Office of International Trade services, however nominal; *foster* mutual involvement and commitment in business effort.

Fifty years ago, Alfred North Whitehead described the uniqueness of contemporary technological civilization very succinctly:

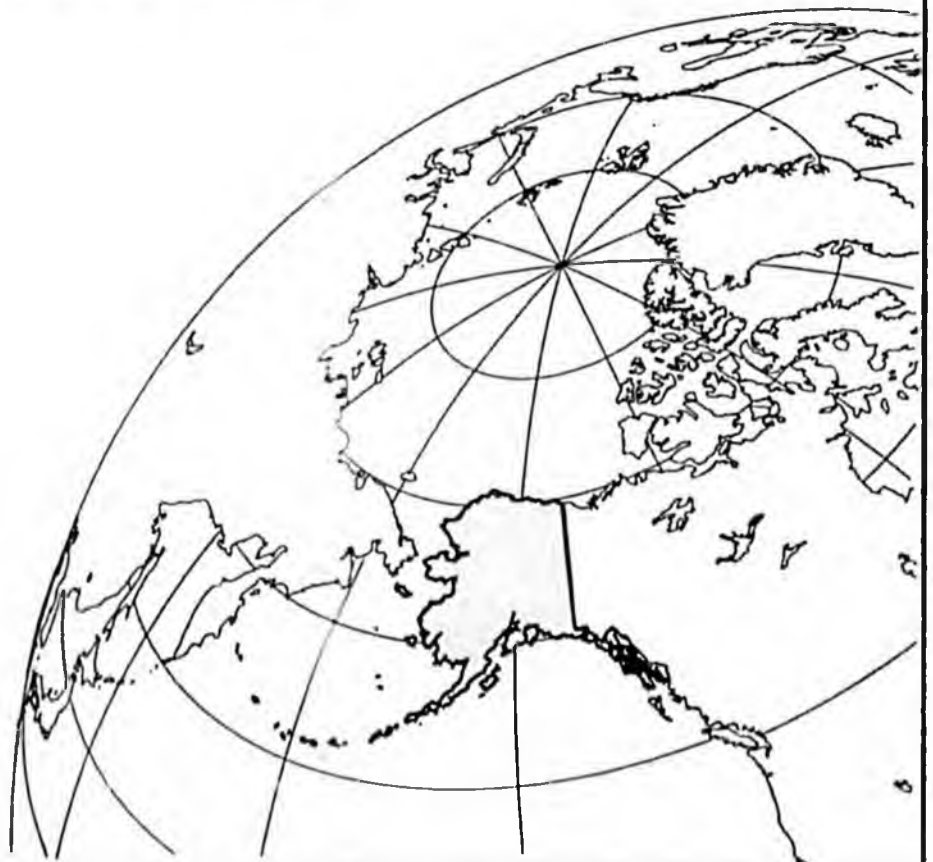

Thank you for making yourself available for the House Labor and Commerce Committee's confirmation hearing on March 26. In order to help you prepare, I have written a few questions about subjects of concern to the committee. We probably will not have time to cover all of these subjects during the meeting.

Priorities: How do you prioritize the Department's various responsibilities: data gathering and analysis, worker protection, enforcement, education and employment assistance? What are your goals for the Department? Do you plan any significant changes in the Department's operation?

Division of Workers' Compensation: How do you plan to correct the problems with the Division? How are the allegations concerning the director being investigated, and when will the results of the investigation be made public? What will the Division's policy be on public access to claim records? What is the Department's policy on ex parte communications between the Director of the Division of Workers' Compensation, and Board members and hearing officers? Is the Division gathering data from insurers on an individual claim basis, and will the Division be able to produce a report containing that information this session?

Local Hire: What is the Department doing to encourage local hire and to enforce Alaska's resident hire laws? Will the Department produce the statutorily mandated local hire report for FY 92? Do you plan to restructure the Department's budget to provide for a local hire investigator?

Division of Labor Standards and Safety: Why are the Department's proposed cuts concentrated in the Division of Labor Standards and Safety? How will enforcement be effected? Have you considered reorganizing the Division to maximize the number of field staff and minimize administrative costs and supervisory personnel? What is the status of the electrical worker safety regulations?


Equal Employment Opportunity: What is the Department doing to encourage the employment of minorities, veterans, women, and other classes of people who may be under-represented in certain occupations or in the labor market as a whole? Do you support equal pay for work of comparable worth?

Whistle Blowers: In light of what has happened recently in your department, can we depend on you to support employees who "blow the whistle" on abusive or illegal practices by their employers? Do you support efforts to strengthen legal protections for whistle blowers?

The committee members have been given copies of your resume. If there is any other information you would like the members to have, please let me know.


