RF Sectional Analysis of CSHB 18 (Finance), "An Act relating to the practice of marital and family therapy."

Following is a sectional analysis of CSHB 18 (Finance):

Sec. 1. Article 1 establishes the Board of Marital and Family Therapy and sets out its powers and duties.

Article 2 describes the various types of licenses that can be issued by the board and sets out the requirements that must be met for each type of license.

Article 3 contains general provisions relating to fees, confidentiality of communications, and imposition of disciplinary sanctions. It also contains the basic provision in Sec. 08.63.240 that, unless a person is licensed by the board, the person may not hold himself or herself out to be a licensed marital and family therapist. The bill does not require a person to be licensed in order to practice in the profession.

Sec. 2. Adds the new board to the list of boards in AS 08.01.010, which controls the applicability of the central licensing chapter.

Sec. 3. Adds licensed marital and family therapists to the listing in AS 8.02.010, which provides for professional designation requirements.

Sec. 4. Adds the new board to the list of boards in AS 08.03.010, sunsetting it in 1994.

Sec. 5. Adds the new board to the list of agencies governed by the Administrative Procedure Act.

Sec. 6. Adds licensed marital and family therapists to the list of persons required to report suspected child abuse.

Sec. 7. Adds communications between a patient and a marital and family therapist to the privileged communications excluded under Evidence rule 504(a)(3).

Sec. 8. Provides for initial appointees to the board.

Sec. 9. "Grandfather" provision.

HB 14: Proposed Amendment to AS 08.06.040


This amendment eliminates the requirement for an acupuncturist to maintain certification as a diplomate of the National Council for the Certification of Acupuncturists before renewal of their license.

Several licensees have stated difficulty in communicating with this organization. Also, they feel that they should have freedom of choice as to which trade association they join. Licensees feel it would be better for the department to develop criteria for continuing education, if it is deemed necessary.

With the short time remaining before renewal (September 30, 1992), it is doubtful the requirements can be met. This would place an undue burden on licensees who have invested time and money into establishing a practice, received initial licensure, but would not be allowed to continue practicing.

The department has also experienced difficulty in having the National Council clarify its requirements.

The department supports this amendment.

SPONSOR STATEMENT

House Resolution No. 10

"Dedicating Gallery A of the Chambers of the Alaska House of Representatives to Representative Warren Arthur Taylor."

Warren Arthur Taylor was born in Washington in April 2, 1891, and moved to Cordova in 1907. He worked construction, before hiking north to the Kennicott copper mines, where he cut white spruce railroad trestles for the Copper River and Northwestern Railway. In the spring of 1910, Taylor left his 35 cents-an-hour Chitina job and hiked to Fairbanks -- 300 miles away -- on the rumor of construction jobs paying 50 cents an hour. When he reached his destination, the jobs were taken, so he hiked back to Chitina.

Taylor worked as an oiler/fireman on a steam locomotive, operating the huge rotary snowplow in the winter. He prospected with Anthony Dimond, later U.S. District Judge and legislator, and with Dr. Ernest Patty, the eventual third president of the University of Alaska, whom Taylor rescued after Patty slipped into a glacial crevasse. Taylor saw World War I action with the Army in France.

After the war, Taylor returned to Cordova and married Josephine Bona; son Warren W. Taylor and daughter Elizabeth K. Larson were born. Taylor studied law books borrowed from Judge Edward Medley and studied while working aboard trains. Then-Congressional delegate Anthony Dimond filed a court motion to let Taylor take the bar exam; he was admitted March 25, 1927. Taylor practiced law in Cordova and Kodiak, assisted the U.S. attorney, was a deputy marshal for two years, and district attorney in the third district.

In 1934, Taylor was elected to the territorial house as a Democrat; he served in the 11th, 17th, 19th, 22nd and 23rd Territorial Legislatures. He served in each of the first four Alaska State Legislatures, and was chosen by his colleagues to lead as speaker for the first two. Governor Ernest Gruening appointed him to a committee to advocate statehood; he served ten years. Taylor was a delegate to the Constitutional Convention, which he regarded as his most important public service, especially his role in constructing Section One of Article VII, establishing our public school system. Taylor died August 5, 1980, in Fairbanks.

Recognizing the important and lasting contributions of Warren Arthur Taylor to the State of Alaska, I propose the Seventeenth Alaska Legislature dedicate Gallery A of the House Chambers to Representative Warren Arthur Taylor, and place a bronze plaque on the door to read: "TAYLOR GALLERY, dedicated to the memory of

Warren Arthur Taylor of Fairbanks, who served with honor and distinction for nine terms as a member of the House of Representatives, having been elected as a member of five sessions of the Alaska Territorial Legislature representing at various times the Third and Fourth Divisions, and as a member of each of the first four state Legislatures representing Fairbanks; whose colleagues elected him Speaker of the House of Representatives during the First and Second Alaska Legislatures; and who, as a delegate to the Constitutional Convention, guided the formation of the state judiciary and framed the section establishing the state's public school system."

## NAMING GALLERY B "THE PERATROVICH GALLERY"

House Resolution 10 proposes to name House Gallery B in honor of the late Elizabeth Peratrovich, a President of the Alaska Native Sisterhood, and a tireless advocate for Native civil rights. Although Elizabeth Peratrovich was never elected to state office, she had a vital impact on legislation affecting minorities and represents the finest example of the public's role in the legislative process.

When the Territorial Senate considered a bill in 1945 prohibiting racial discrimination in Alaska, the bill was assailed as a "lawyer's dream" which would create hard feelings between Natives and whites. Many Senators expressed the opinion that the legislation was unnecessary; a few said the real answer would be found in the separation of the races.

According to the legislative custom of that time, an opportunity was offered to anyone present who wished to speak on the bill. Elizabeth Peratrovich rose in the Gallery and said she would like to be heard. "I would not have expected," she said, "that I, who am barely out of savagery, would have to remind gentlemen with five thousand years of recorded civilization behind them of our Bill of Rights." She described to the Senate what it means to be unable to buy a house in a decent neighborhood because Natives aren't allowed to live there, and how children feel when they are refused entrance into movie theaters. She made plain the suffering and injustice of such cruelty. Following her speech, the Senate passed the civil rights bill 11-5.

Elizabeth Peratrovich was a beautiful and intelligent woman who was loved and respected by her many white and Native friends in Juneau. It is appropriate to name Gallery B after a person who symbolizes the role the gallery plays in the legislature. Although we have had too few women and too few Natives holding office in the legislature, a single person, speaking from the heart, can affect the future of all Alaskans as Elizabeth Peratrovich did that day in 1945.

The parties to this contract, made and entered into this \_\_\_\_\_ day of \_\_\_\_\_, 1992, are the House Rules Committee, whose address is State Capitol, Juneau, Alaska 99801-1182, (hereinafter referred to as the "Agency"), and Trudy M. Cain, dba Cain Public Relations, whose address is P.O. Box 874594, Wasilla, Alaska 99687, (hereinafter referred to as the "Consultant").

THE PURPOSE OF THIS CONTRACT IS TO PROVIDE research and constituent services for Representative Pat Carney.

IT IS THEREFORE MUTUALLY AGREED THAT:

**CLAUSE I - STATEMENT OF WORK**

The Consultant shall provide for research and constituent services for Representative Carney as directed by the Project Director.

**CLAUSE II - PERIOD AND DATES OF PERFORMANCE AND TERMINATION**

- (A) The work under this contract shall begin January 13, 1992 and terminate May 15, 1992.

- (B) This contract may be terminated by the Agency upon delivery of written notice to the Consultant. If this contract is so terminated and the termination is not based on a breach by the Consultant, the Consultant shall be compensated for services provided under the terms of this contract to the date of termination if the Consultant provides the Agency with a written report containing a description of the services performed, a statement of the results or conclusions formed based upon the services performed, and a copy of the written material produced during the contract.

### **CLAUSE III - COMPENSATION AND METHOD OF PAYMENT**

- (A) For the work specified in this contract the Consultant shall be compensated Fifteen Thousand Five Hundred Dollars and No/100 (\$15,500).
- (B) Payment shall be based on proper billing provided by the Consultant.
- (C) The Project Director must approve a billing before it may be paid.
- (D) If a payment is not made within 90 days after the Agency has received a proper billing, the Agency shall pay interest on the unpaid balance of the billing at the rate of 1.5 percent per month from, and including, the 91st day through the date payment is made. A payment is considered made on the date it is mailed or personally delivered to the Consultant.
- (E) Total payments under this contract, excluding reimbursement for expenses, may not exceed \$15,500.

### **CLAUSE IV - PROJECT DIRECTOR**

The Project Director is Representative Pat Carney.

### **CLAUSE V - EXPENSES AND DUPLICATION**

- (A) Except as otherwise authorized by the Agency, the office space, equipment, and supplies, and other expenses authorized by the Procurement Officer that are necessary for the Consultant to carry out the Consultant's obligations under this contract shall be supplied and paid by the Agency at no cost to the Consultant.
