





1977 -present. I am a trapper with my husband. We successfully have trapped wolves, marten, beaver, muskrat, mink, wolverine and fox. I've worked with a known experienced wolf trapper to learn more about the methods of taking wolves. We live near Mentasta Village and have learned many interior Athabaskan ways. I trapped muskrats and hunted with my native friends. I've helped with native potlaches. I've made skin garments for the people of Mentasta, a wedding dress for one and many skin dresses for native dancers and contestants in competition. I've lived without electricity since 1976 gaining an appreciation for a unique Alaskan lifestyle. Utilizing game for food and living away from people has shown me what a huge dependence we have upon natural resources. For the benefit of all, I care deeply that we use the best stewardship for our resources, now and in the future.

1973 to present. I've hunted and traveled throughout Alaska, including the North Slope, Brooks Range, Alaska Peninsula, Southeast, Western Alaska and the Interior. I've been successful in taking Dall sheep, moose, caribou, goats, Sitka black-tailed deer, grizzly, black bear musk-ox and small game. My family and I hunt for food and the outdoor experience. My respect for wildlife is genuine. We share game meat with our native friends when we have extra. From my farm experience in PA, I've learned to utilize every edible game part including head meat, innerds, and bones for soup broth. Our family eats grizzly and black bears. I render the fat to use in frying, breads, cakes, and cookies. We have a large garden which we put up about all of our own vegetables. All winter, we are out running our traplines. My husband and I spend approximately three months a year afield. Frank, my husband, has studied wildlife in Alaska since 1962 for his taxidermy work and more recently for his bronze sculptures. I feel fortunate to have learned the wilds from a veteran. We taught our two sons this lifestyle.

1961-'73 I learned to hunt in Pennsylvania for small game, water fowl, and deer. My father started me hunting at age ten. He taught me respect of wildlife and utilization to it's fullest.

1961-'70 Junior member of NRA Rifle Club, Newport, Pa. I recieved my hunter safety training, competed in small bore still target shooting, and competed with larger caliber rifles at running deer shoots. I earned awards for best shot in the club twice, was rated Sharpshooter (7 awards), and took all female competitive running deer shoots.

1951-73 Born and raised on a dairy farm where my parents taught me how to hunt and how to utilize every edible part of animals. We used pig casings to stuff sausage, pig stomach to roast and all bones including deer were boiled off for soup stock.

Chairman Jones and Members:

We strongly request that your committee NOT confirm the nomination of Mr. Edfelt to the Board of Fisheries for the following reasons:

1.) Prejudice against Subsistence -

Mr. Edfelt is on the Board of Fisheries public record during the Juneau March 1992 meeting commenting that SPORT fishing in Nome subdistrict should be left open while the Subsistence Fisheries were shut down. By this comment he implied, that in his opinion (as a biologist!), catch and release sport fishing is an acceptable harassment of depressed brood stocks - even in light of the Subsistence Priority Law, which mandates curtailing all non-subsistence harvests prior to any subsistence restrictions. His comment, as a biologist; also implies that sport fishermen are not bound by the laws designed to protect depressed Brood stocks, and to comply with the sustained yield policy which is the very backbone of annually renewable natural resource management.

2.) Credibility as a biologist with integrity -

A.) Mr. Edfelt has consistently voted in favor of continuing mixed stock fisheries, even when those same mixed stock interceptions have been shown to be the only logical reason why some of the smaller stocks are being dangerously depleted by the mixed stock interceptions. Examples;

I.) Area M - False Pass interception of AYK Chum Salmon stocks - Area Z Subdistrict 3, SD.1.

II.) Dutch Harbor Food & Bait Fishery - Four different studies point to this mixed stock interception for depletions of Nelson Island herring.

2.) B.) As a biologist formerly with the ADF&G, he has shown an appalling lack of respect for the conclusions of former colleagues who state, for the Public Record, that there are no in-stream, environmental, or any user related reasons to account for depressed brood stocks- see testimony of Mr. Charles Lean - Biologist ADF&G - Nome, - Bethel Board of Fisheries - February 1992.

3.) Requirements of Proof -

Mr. Edfelt would rather side with very tenuous assumptions built on extrapolations to account for 86.7% of unknown, poorly publicized, unreported tags, rather than with the empirical proof provided by the 13.3% actual reported tags to justify his maintenance of the status quo of the chum cap. He uses ~~these~~ these guesstimates to justify his increasing the chum cap to 700,000 - in light of testimony which proves significant biological linkage to the depressed and endangered (as evidenced by the drastic management regime proposed for Subdistricts #1 & #3 - Area 2 for 1992) brood stocks of Northern Norton Sound.

4. Sharing the Culpability for damage to depressed stocks - If you, as a resource committee, confirm Mr. Edfelt to serve on the Board of Fisheries, then you, as Legislators, are buying into the lack of credibility which plagues the Alaska Department of Fish & Game as a result of their recent lack of managerial integrity in actively protecting dangerously depressed brood stocks.

We have been informed that the Senate Resources Committee will be taking up consideration of Mr. Larry Edfeldt's confirmation to the State Board of Fisheries at it's meeting this afternoon. We strongly urge that you and your fellow committee members do all in your power to prevent Mr. Edfeldt's confirmation to this Board.

We have had the (un)fortunate priveledge of observing Mr. Edfeldt in action on this Board over the past several months and it has become readily apparent that he is unsuitable for the position. His use of mathematical acrobatics and selective reasoning in the decision making process to the benefit of special/singular interests in the face of weakly supported biological evidence is in itself enough to warrant this action. More to the heart of the matter however, we find that these actions circumvent sound biological management principles regarding conservative action in the face of conservation/sustained yield and subsistence concerns as noted by the following:

- Mr. Edfeldt has consistently voted to sustain mixed stock fisheries even when weak stocks they affected were in peril. His justification standards and biological positions in judging information continues to be highly questionable. In the Dutch Harbor herring food and bait fishery there were four different studies pointing to potential relationship between Dutch Harbor mixed stock fisheries and declining Nelson Island stocks. Edfeldt said there was not enough conclusive information for him to restrict or close this fishery.

- In the South Peninsula June fishery that takes chums as bycatch at False Pass, Edfeldt disregarded four previous studies (Bureau of Biological Survey - 1925; Intl North Pacific Fisheries Council - 1956-62; U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service 1959-62; Ak. Dept. of Fish & Game, Conrad Scale Pattern Analyses - 1983) which all showed factual and imperical relationship between June chums in the South Peninsula and Western Alaska. Instead Edfeldt advocated the highly questioned and controversial ONE YEAR (1987) tag study as being conclusive and purported a no direct harm relationship.


- On the North side of the Alaska Peninsula four studies by ADF&G since 1986 indicate that as much as 70+ percent of the Sockeye taken by the Area M driftnet fleet in this area were of Bristol Bay origin. Mr. Edfeldt said this information was inconclusive.
- During Board deliberation in February Mr. Edfeldt commented that sports fishing in the Nome subdistrict should be left open even though subsistence fisheries were closed down due to anticipated failed escapements.
- On an allocation issue affecting his own interests, (sports charter versus troll fisheries) Mr. Edfeldt argued that the number of sportsmen and economics alone should predictably remove the harvest advantage by an existing fleet. Given the nature of this expanding fishery, the statement constitutes a biologically irresponsible position.

It is painfully obvious that Mr. Edfeldt believes that unless there is overwhelming information to warrant negative action on an existing fishery, he should vote for the status-quo. Given the declining amount of money available to the state for research, the escalating difficulties with depressed stocks, and the many uncertainties associated with fisheries management, funding may never be available to irrefutably prove the full impacts of these cause and effect relationships.

Our fisheries across the state and the people who rely upon them cannot afford to have someone on a Board such as this who does not see the conservative approach to management as an option, and instead compounds the problems by advocating for management actions which end up placing many of these fisheries in a crisis response mode. It is in everyone's best interest that Mr. Edfeldt's confirmation be denied.

## NOTICE OF PROPOSED CHANGES IN THE REGULATIONS OF THE ALASKA DEPARTMENT OF ENVIRONMENTAL CONSERVATION

Notice is given that the Alaska Department of Environmental Conservation, under authority vested by AS 03.05.011, 03.05.020, AS 17.20.050, 17.20.060, 17.20.180, AS 44.46.020, 44.46.025, AS 46.03.020, 46.03.050, 46.03.080, 46.03.090, 46.03.100, 46.03.140, 46.03.150, 46.03.160, 46.03.170, 46.03.190, 46.03.299, 46.03.302, 46.03.710, 46.03.720, AS 46.04.030, 46.04.050, and 46.04.070, proposes to amend regulations in Title 18, Chapters 15, 30, 31, 34, 36, 50, 52, 62, 72, 75, and 80 of the Alaska Administrative Code, dealing with user fees for various department programs, to implement AS 44.46.025 as follows:

In response to a statement of legislative intent made by the 1991 Legislature, that a portion of the department's operating budget be funded through the imposition of "user fees," for the purpose of putting state government on a more self-supporting basis, the department is proposing to impose permit, approval, and inspection fees for various department programs, including: **18 AAC 15, Administrative Procedures for Permit Approvals** (for public notices of permit applications); **18 AAC 30, Environmental Sanitation** (food stores and markets, food processing establishments and storage facilities); **18 AAC 31, Food Service** (restaurants, bars, and mobile food service establishments); **18 AAC 34, Fish Inspection** (harvesters, shellfish shippers, repackers, shellfish packers, vessels, landbased operations, canneries, shellfish certification); **18 AAC 36, Animal Health** (EIA testing); **18 AAC 50, Air Quality Control** (plan review and permit fees, open burning, incinerators, asphalt plants, soil remediation units, electric utilities, and other facilities subject to 18 AAC 50); **18 AAC 52, Emissions Inspection and Maintenance Requirements for Motor Vehicles**; **18 AAC 62, Hazardous Waste** (for burners and marketers of used oil, generators, and hazardous waste treatment, storage, or disposal facilities); **18 AAC 72, Wastewater Disposal** (permits and renewals, plan reviews and certifications, and EIS reviews, but excluding subdivision plan reviews); **18 AAC 75, Oil and Hazardous Substances Pollution Control** (proof of financial responsibility, and plan approvals for oil terminal facilities and for oil tank vessels and barges); and **18 AAC 80, Drinking Water** (plan approvals for Class A, Class B, and Class C public water systems).

## PROPOSED "USER FEE" REGULATIONS

### SUMMARY OF MAJOR CHANGES MADE TO 1/30/92 DRAFT REGULATIONS

**ALL PROGRAMS** (except some air quality permits subject to 1990 Clean Air Act amendments): nonprofits will be exempt from fee requirement; local, state, and federal agencies will be eligible for a fee waiver, in the department's discretion. This will be added to each regulation before adoption, but does not appear in the current draft.

**18 AAC 15 - PERMIT PROCEDURES:** The requirement for a public hearing on a permit application has been changed to a showing of good cause, rather than requiring 50 people in the affected area to sign the hearing request.

**18 AAC 30 - SANITATION:** Will carry over annual inspection fee if ADEC fails to inspect;

**18 AAC 31 - FOOD SERVICE:** Will carry over annual inspection fee if ADEC fails to inspect; bar inspection fee reduced if in same facility with restaurant; plan review fee withdrawn;

**18 AAC 34 - FISH INSPECTION:** Clarifying that fees apply to processing vessels and operations, not to commercial fishermen who are not processors.

**18 AAC 50 - AIR QUALITY:** Reduced fee (\$1,500 rather than \$3,000) for asphalt plants processing less than 10,000 tons per year; clarification that equipment associated with incinerators is not subject to a separate fee; clarification that "allowable emissions" is for all air contaminants, not for each air contaminant.

**18 AAC 52 - AUTO EMISSIONS INSPECTION:** Changed vehicle registration limits to 30,000 vehicles in an area where an inspection program is implemented and where the department is responsible for the inspections.

**18 AAC 72 - WASTEWATER DISPOSAL:** Clarified that fee does not apply to discharges of less than 500 gallons per day if the discharge meets minimum treatment requirements; established categories of fees for domestic wastewater permits, based upon amount of discharge; clarified meaning of nondomestic wastewater categories in former "Table H" to show that the proposed fees were sliding fees, and setting out a system to determine each applicant's fee based on factors such as type and amount of discharge, sensitivity of receiving environment, magnitude of public concern, EPA designations, etc.; clarifying that -- for placer miners -- only NPDES certifications are subject to a fee; provided for reduced renewal fee under certain circumstances.

**18 AAC 75 - OIL AND HAZARDOUS SUBSTANCE POLLUTION CONTROL:** The proposed fee for C-plan reviews has been dropped because AS 43.55.220 provides that the per-barrel surcharge paid by oil producers may be appropriated by the legislature to the oil and hazardous substance release response fund (470 Fund) -- and because AS 46.08.040 provides that the 470 Fund may be used to cover the cost of reviewing contingency plans. The fee for financial responsibility applications and certificates and the responsibility for publishing public notice remain in the proposal.

**18 AAC 80 - DRINKING WATER:** Established categories of fees based upon number of persons served by each public water system; added fees for surface water sources, separation distance waivers, modifications, repair, replacements, or extensions.

**ANSWERS TO MOST FREQUENTLY-ASKED QUESTIONS**

**1. IF I DON'T NEED A DEC PERMIT, APPROVAL, OR INSPECTION NOW, DO I STILL PAY A FEE FOR ONE OF THE CATEGORIES IN THE PROPOSAL?**

Only those persons who now have (or if they opened a new business would be required to obtain) a DEC permit or approval, and only those businesses that are now inspected, are covered by the proposed user fee regulations. If you are not sure whether the business or activity you are engaged in -- or planning to engage in -- requires a permit, approval, or inspection, please call your local DEC office.

**2. ARE COMMERCIAL FISHERMEN SUBJECT TO A FEE?**

Only processing vessels and operations or shellfish harvesters or processors are subject to these requirements.

**3. DO I HAVE TO PAY A FEE FOR MY POWER GENERATOR AT MY CABIN OR LODGE?**

No. A "hazardous waste generator" is not a piece of equipment, but is a person or business who must notify EPA of a hazardous waste activity and obtain an active EPA identification number.

**4. WILL NONPROFIT ORGANIZATIONS BE ELIGIBLE FOR A FEE WAIVER?**

Yes.

**5. WILL LOCAL, STATE, AND FEDERAL OPERATIONS BE ELIGIBLE FOR A FEE WAIVER?**

Yes, in the department's discretion, although such a waiver may not be possible for some air quality control permits because of the 1990 amendments to the Clean Air Act. Appropriate language will be added to each applicable chapter in the final draft.

**6. MY BUSINESS MAY BE SUBJECT TO MORE THAN ONE FEE CATEGORY. WILL YOU BE CONSIDERING AN "UMBRELLA" FEE IN CERTAIN CASES?**

In some, related programs, where one business might fit several categories (for example, a business that harvests, packs, re-packs, and ships shellfish), we will require only one fee--the highest of the applicable categories. For other program fees which are unrelated to each other, such as a business that needs a wastewater disposal permit and an air quality control permit, we are considering an "umbrella" fee that would continue to support each of those separate program categories, while taking into account the economic impact of separate fees for one business.

**7. ALL DOMESTIC WASTEWATER FEES ARE SET AT \$200, YET ALL REVIEWS ARE NOT IDENTICAL.**

We have now created a graduated structure, with fees ranging from \$100 to \$3,200.
