Dear Representative Moses,

We read with interest your House Joint Resolution 25 regarding the proposed Coast Guard regulation for fish tender vessels engaged in the Aleutian trade. As a fish tender operator, we at Western Pioneer share your concern about the impact such regulations will have on the level of service and the freight rates to Aleutian and Alaska Peninsula communities.

The series of proposed regulations from the U.S. Coast Guard will require major structural changes to all Western Pioneer, Coastal and Sunmar vessels. These proposed new regulations were required under the Aleutian Trade Act of 1990, which specifically concluded that no expensive retrofitting of vessels be required. Unfortunately, the Coast Guard did not receive the message and the proposed regulations would effectively put 75% of the existing "mosquito fleet" out of service.

All of the Western Alaska seafood companies and coastal communities would be effected by this change in regulation. By a reduced shipping capacity during the refit and increased rates to pay for the modifications. Shipping option would be severely limited as a result of these proposed regulations.


Most of these new regulations are done in the name of "safety," an sensitive area in our industry about which we are all concerned. We are all for enhanced safety, and our track record in this particular area is extremely positive. The proposed Coast Guard regulations, for the most part, have little to do with safety. Instead the proposed regulations call for vessel modifications well in excess of those in the industry for existing fishing vessels.

The public comment period for these proposed regulations is over February 28th. Thus far, only a handful of comments regarding these proposed regulations have been received by the Coast Guard from the fishing industry and the coastal Alaska communities. This is probably because people are not aware of the issues at stake, but given the tremendous effect the new regulations will have on the fishing and seafood industries, along with the coastal communities, your resolution is of critical importance.

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**PROPOSED COAST GUARD REGULATIONS WOULD DRAMATICALLY
DECREASE EXISTING FREIGHT SERVICE TO THE ALEUTIAN
ISLANDS WHILE SUBSTANTIALLY INCREASING ITS COST**

The Coast Guard recently proposed regulations (CGD 88-079a) to implement the Aleutian Trade Act of 1990 (P.L. 101-595) (the "ATA") which, if adopted, would require the fish tender fleet of Coastal Transportation, Sunmar Shipping and Western Pioneer, Inc. (the "Aleutian Trade Vessels") to substantially retrofit their existing vessels - notwithstanding an explicit Congressional directive prohibiting such vessel alterations - in a manner so costly that the Coast Guard itself predicts that 75% of the current fleet will be forced out of service. The additional costs due to retrofitting of the remaining vessels, as well as the increased costs inherent in the reduction of competition among carriers, would be passed directly to the fishing industry and communities of the Aleutian Chain.

1. Congress Has Historically Recognized the Unique Transportation Needs of the Fishing Industry and the Aleutian Islands.

For decades fish tender vessels have filled a unique transportation void by producing freight service to the fishing industry and to remote communities dependent on that industry throughout Alaska. Since the late 1960s Congress has expressly recognized these unique needs in a series of enactments authorizing uninspected fish tender vessels to carry fisheries and other cargoes in service to these communities. The Aleutian Trade Vessels have filled these needs with consistent, economical, reliable and safe service to Western Alaska. The large common carriers that have more recently begun service to Dutch Harbor are not prepared to provide, and have not provided, local service directly to the more remote communities and fishing operations now served by the Aleutian Trade Vessels.

2. The Aleutian Trade Act Balanced the Competing Objectives of Continuing Service to Remote Areas in Alaska and Enhancing Vessel Safety Standards.

In 1989, these large common carriers opposed the continuation of the special authority permitting Aleutian Trade Vessels to serve these communities. In an effort to eliminate their competition, these large carriers argued for retrofits of the existing Aleutian Trade Vessels of such magnitude and cost that many vessels would necessarily

be put out of service. Recognizing that these vessels were the lifeline of many Alaskan communities, Congress fashioned a compromise with the enactment of the ATA that (1) continued without interruption the general cargo/fisheries supply service available only from the Aleutian Trade Vessels while at the same time (2) upgrading the safety and manning requirements for these vessels. In the words of Congressman Don Young (R-AK):

This legislation has been agreed to by all participants in the Aleutian trade...[it] represents a compromise necessary to provide greater safety to vessels in the trade, while ensuring that remote communities in Alaska do not lose their cargo service. (emphasis added)

136 Cong. Rec. H13364 (daily ed. Oct. 27, 1990).

Throughout the negotiations leading up to enactment of the ATA, there was a clear recognition that the retrofitting necessary to achieve the new vessel safety standards could not be so substantial as to render the modifications uneconomic because that would frustrate the ATA's parallel objective of continuing the existing Aleutian service. As finally enacted, the statutory authority for the new requirements contains an express prohibition against the adoption of regulations that require alterations to vessels constructed before the effective date of those regulations. 46 U.S.C. § 4502(e)(2). Participants in the Aleutian Trade would not have agreed to this legislation without this safeguard; otherwise 3 out of 4 vessels would be forced out, resulting in the loss of service to remote areas.

3. The Coast Guard Rule Making Ignores this Congressional Balance by Proposing Cost Prohibitive Retrofitting Which Would Estimate 75% of the Existing Aleutian Trade Vessels While Increasing the Cost of Service of the Remaining Vessels.

While acknowledging the existence of the express Congressional directive against requiring vessel alterations, the Coast Guard nonetheless has proposed an interpretation strongly advocated by the large carriers that would require the existing Aleutian Trade Vessels to comply with regulations designed to apply to new construction and vessels undergoing major conversions. The companies involved in the Aleutian Trade strongly dispute this interpretation.

By the Coast Guard's own admission, these requirements are so stringent that "only five [of the 20 existing fish tender vessels] are expected to remain in the Aleutian Trade." U.S. Coast Guard Draft Regulatory Evaluation (CGD 88-079a) at page 17. The proposed application of these new construction and equipment regulations to the existing vessels would in some cases exceed those required for fully inspected large carriers. For

example, the proposed regulations would require significant and unnecessary alterations such as removal and replacement of all fuel oil service and transfer piping with seamless pipe (proposed rule 46 C.F.R. § 28.335). The use of seamless pipe can be readily accommodated in building a new vessel, but it is unreasonable and exceedingly costly to require perfectly good piping to be ripped out of an existing vessel for the sole purpose of replacing it with the seamless pipe.

Even for those few remaining Aleutian Trade Vessels, the new equipment and construction requirements will cause them to be taken out of service for months while alterations are made. The retrofitting costs will necessarily be passed on to consumers. As competition is reduced, rates are likely to increase particularly with the domination of the Dutch Harbor trade by a single large carrier.

The Aleutian Trade Vessels have provided efficient and reliable service to Western Alaska and have done so with an excellent safety record. The Coast Guard acknowledges there is no evidence "concerning casualties or fatalities on...fish tender vessels operating in the Aleutian Trade." Draft Regulatory Evaluation at page 38. The vessels' owners have already met new manning and safety requirements mandated by the ATA. They are fully prepared to meet additional safety requirements provided only that they are not required to undertake cost prohibitive retrofitting that will frustrate the Congressional purpose of continuing uninterrupted service to the Aleutian Islands.

CONTACT THE COAST GUARD NOW

If you are concerned about increased costs for transportation services to Western Alaska, the reduction of competition, undue reliance on a single large carrier and the complete loss of service to locations other than Dutch Harbor, you should contact the Coast Guard immediately.

The Coast Guard should be told of the importance of the existing service to your business and community and the impact if such service were lost or became significantly more expensive. The Coast Guard should also be urged to follow the Congressional directive in 46 U.S.C. § 4501(e)(2) against requiring vessel alterations to existing fish tender vessels constructed before the effective date of the regulations.

ANALYSIS CONTINUATION:

HJR 40 would place a ballot proposition before the voters at the next general election to amend Article I, Section 19 of Alaska's Constitution, regarding the right to bear arms.

The proposed amendment changes the title of the section to state "Right to Keep and Bear Arms." and not simply "Right to Bear Arms," as is presently the case. The proposed amendment would further add new language to Section 19 that states: "The individual right to keep and bear arms shall not be denied or infringed by the State or a political subdivision of the State."

Because the purpose of this joint resolution is to place a constitutional amendment proposal before the voters, adoption of the resolution by itself will not have a fiscal impact on the Department of Law.



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SPONSOR STATEMENT

HJR 40

Rep. Jerry Sanders

HJR 40, proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Alaska relating to the individual right to keep and bear arms will clarify and reiterate the intention of the Constitution of the State of Alaska to protect and preserve the basic individual right to keep and bear arms. This clarification of Article I, Section 19 of the Constitution of the State of Alaska, is prompted by recent nationwide attempts to subvert the true meaning of Article II of the Amendments to the US Constitution, by removing the individuals' rights.

This Resolution adds the words KEEP AND to the title of Section 19. It also adds the following sentence: The individual right to keep and bear arms shall not be denied or infringed by the State or a political subdivision of the State.

Passage of this resolution will result in the proposed amendment appearing on the ballot to be placed before the voters of the state at the next general election in conformity with art. XIII, sec. 1, Constitution of the State of Alaska, and the election laws of the state.



This proposed amendment to section 19 of article I of the state constitution would revise and expand the existing right to keep and bear arms.

Section 1: The existing state constitutional right--drawn directly from the language of the Second Amendment to the Constitution of the United States--recognizes a collective "right of the people to keep and bear arms" and directs that that right "shall not be infringed." The amendment, the proposed second sentence of the article and section, would amend the definition of the right from one that is collective to one that is individual ("the individual right to keep and bear arms . . .") and would specify the political entities that may not infringe this right (. . . by the State or a political subdivision of the State.)

Section 2: This is a "boilerplate" provision that directs submission of the proposed constitutional amendment within this resolution to the voters at the November, 1994, general election for their consideration and possible adoption.

The right to keep and bear arms is provided by the Second Amendment to the United States Constitution and by Art. I, § 19 of the Alaska Constitution. The provisions are identical and state:

A well-regulated militia being necessary for the security of a free state, the right of the people to keep and bear arms shall not be infringed.

The Second Amendment to the United States Constitution applies only to ensure that this right is not infringed by Congress and has no application to the states through the 14th Amendment. Presser v. Illinois, 116 U.S. 252, 6 S.Ct. 580, 29 L.Ed. 615 (1886); Quilici v. Morton Grove, 695 F.2d 261 (7th Cir. 1982), cert. denied, 464 U.S. 863. The Second Amendment, though, does not bar all infringements of this right by the federal government. While, strictly speaking, the federal government has no police powers (those powers being reserved to the states), the federal courts have affirmed the federal government's authority to enact police regulations in any area of constitutionally granted sovereignty. Laws regulating the possession and use of weapons on a federal level have been upheld on a number of grounds including the commerce clause, the taxing power, the limitation of potential threats to the president, limitation of impediments to the exercise of free speech and other rights guaranteed by the Bill of Rights, and pursuant to the federal government's power to define and proscribe federal felonies.

What weapons or arms does the Second Amendment protect and who may possess them? The United States Supreme Court has interpreted the Second Amendment to provide only a collective right to possess arms for the common defense; no individual right to possess arms has ever been articulated. It applies only to the

possession of those arms which are necessary to maintain a well-regulated militia, or, in other words, does the possession of the arm or weapon bear some reasonable relationship to the preservation or efficiency of a well-regulated militia. United States v. Miller, 307 U.S. 174, 59 S. Ct. 816, 83 L.Ed. 1206 (1939); Quilici, supra; Cody v. United States, 460 F.2d 34 (8th Cir. 1972), cert. denied, 409 U.S. 1010. Miller involved a prosecution for the possession of an illegal sawed-off shotgun. The defendant claimed that his right to possess the shotgun was protected by the Second Amendment. The court looked to the early colonial requirements imposed upon the able-bodied men of the colonies and found that all the members of the militia (composed of all men of certain specified ages) were required to keep at the ready a musket or long rifle and adequate ammunition to defend the state. Other weapons, other than a bayonet to affix to the musket, were not required. The Court then found the possession of the shotgun to not be protected as its possession was not necessary for the maintenance of a well-regulated militia. Similarly, the possession of handguns and other weapons, and the possession of weapons by certain classes of people, have been found to not be protected. Quilici, supra; United States v. Oakes, 564 F.2d 384 (6th Cir. 1977), cert. denied, 435 U.S. 926 (1978); United States v. Houston, 547 F.2d 104 (9th Cir. 1976).

Since art. 1, § 19 of the Alaska Constitution is identical to its federal counterpart the interpretation given the Second Amendment by the federal courts is, at least, instructive as to the interpretation given the Alaska provision. The Alaska Court of Appeals has said regarding the interpretation of an Alaska constitutional provision similar to a federal provision:

We recognize that the state constitutional provision, while using different language, is essentially the same as its federal counterpart and was intended by the constitutional convention to be so. [Citation omitted.] Thus we find persuasive the line of cases interpreting the federal provision and utilize the same analysis in interpreting our own constitution.

State v. Dankworth, 672 P.2d 148, 151 (Alaska App. 1983).

From this reasoning it would appear that art. 1, § 19 grants only a collective right to the citizens of Alaska to bear arms which are necessary for the common defense of the state. This right may not be eliminated but is subject to the state's authority to enact reasonable restrictions pursuant to its police power. See e.g., Matthews v. Quinton, 362 P.2d 932 (Alaska 1961), cert. denied, 368 U.S. 517. Therefore, statutes regulating the possession and use of certain weapons appear to be permissible.

Nor would the privacy provision of our constitution (art. 1, § 22) appear to inhibit regulation in this area. In State v. Weaver, 736 P.2d 781 (Alaska App. 1987) the Alaska Court of Appeals found that a prosecution pursuant to AS 11.61.200 for

possession of an illegal weapon, a gravity knife, in one's home not to be violative of art. 1, § 22 of the Alaska Constitution. The court said:

The legislature may properly prohibit the possession of an object which 'interferes in a serious manner with the health, safety, rights and privileges of others or with the public welfare.' State v. Erickson, 574 P.2d 1, 21 (Alaska 1978). 'No one has an absolute right to do things in the privacy of his own home which will affect himself or others adversely.' Ravin v. State, 537 P.2d 494, 504 (Alaska 1975). The legislative commentary to AS 11.61.200, discussing the definition of 'prohibited weapon,' states: 'Such weapons have little or no legitimate function, are unnecessary for protection and are not commonly used for commercial or recreational purposes. Substantial risk of harm to others and the furtherance of crime result from private possession of such weapons.' Commentary on the Alaska Revised Criminal Code, Senate Journal Supp. No. 47 at 101, 1978 Senate Journal 1399. The legislature could reasonably conclude that gravity knives have no legitimate purpose and are too dangerous to be casually possessed.

Weaver, supra, at 783.

While no individual federal right to bear arms has been recognized (and no individual state right in Alaska would be recognized as explained earlier) other states have found an individual right to bear arms based upon their own unique constitutional provisions. As pointed out in City of Princeton v. Buckner, 377 S.E.2d 139 (W.Va. 1988) at least 14 states have a constitutional provision that protects an individual's right to bear arms for self-defense, and in some cases defense of home and property, in addition to common defense of the state. These states, though, have been nearly uniform in finding that this individual right is not absolute and is subject to reasonable regulation by the state pursuant to its police power. Buckner, supra.

The Oregon courts have been especially active in finding broad statutory regulation of defensive arms unconstitutional. State v. Blocker, 291 Or. 255, 630 P.2d 824 (1981) (possession of billy club outside of home constitutionally protected); State v. Kessler, 289 Or. 359, 614 P.2d 94 (1980) (possession of billy club in home constitutionally protected). In State v. Delgado, 298 Or. 395, 692 P.2d 610 (1984) the Oregon Supreme Court found a statute which prohibited the mere possession of a switchblade to be unconstitutional. The court found such an absolute ban violative of art. 1, § 27 of the Oregon Constitution which provides: "The people shall have the right to bear arms for the defence of themselves, and the State. ..." The court noted that the legislature may regulate the possession of weapons but may not absolutely ban defensive weapons.

That decision and the decision of the Alaska Court of Appeals in State v. Weaver, while both dealing with switchblades, are not inconsistent. The Oregon decision is based upon the particular language of that state's constitution concerning the right to bear arms for individual defense. While the court in Weaver did not specifically address whether the possession of a switchblade was protected by art. 1, § 19 of the Alaska Constitution, as noted herein that provision completely lacks any individual self-defense language, thereby removing any possible inconsistency in reasoning with the Oregon courts or with the decisions of those other states that have found an individual constitutional right to bear arms for self-defense based upon their own constitutions.

You have also asked if there has been a recent U.S. Supreme Court decision in this area. My research did not discover any U.S. Supreme Court cases that have interpreted the 2nd Amendment since the Miller case cited earlier herein.

due to time constraints I didn't get to testify orally; so here is my written testimony

In reference to teleconference on SJR 39 of Jan. 21, '94:

I'm in favor of SJR 39 because it clarifies the individual right to keep and bear arms. Constitutional scholarship and history has supported the individual right; however this right is currently under attack in various state and municipal governments and by revised judicial interpretations. SJR 39 will serve to protect an individual's right as currently understood and original intended by the framers of the constitution. "The right of the individual to keep and bear arms extends to all lawful purposes, including subsistence, personal-protection from all enemies (foreign or domestic) and sport.

Especially good in SJR 39 are the last words in the proposed amendment that prohibit political subdivisions of the state from circumventing the intent of the Constitution by passing municipal law. Effektivelaws need to be understandable and uniform in the area of jurisdiction without complicated local ordinam

I strongly favor SJR 39 over SJR 1 because language in Section 2 of SJR 1 would have the effect of "grandfathering in" any legislation currently on the books or any laws passed between now and the date of ratification, no matter how misguided such laws may be.

Regarding laws of the state or municipalities that punish or seek to control crime, I say - punish the crime or misuse of a weapon, not the mere possession of a weapon on the person.

Responding to a statement made by the Chief-of-Police who was the first to testify at this teleconference: - the chief stated his support for SJR 1 over SJR 39 with the additional statement that if Section 2 of SJR 1 needed to be changed or dropped that he would support that. My point is that SJR 1 with Section 2 deleted is identical to SJR 39.

A couple of speakers, in positions of political or police power ~~of~~ were concerned that they may lose some of their power to control arms ownership and possession should SJR 39 be ratified. I wish to remind these persons that they are servants of the public, not our masters.

Gentlemen

The above Resolutions are entitled: "RIGHT TO KEEP AND BEAR ARMS" and I must object to the Resolutions on the following grounds:

The Amending of the Constitution of Alaska must not be taken lightly and any Amendment to the Constitution must contain correct language to be of any effect in a Court of Law. It is the issue of Law that I would like to address.

There appears to be confusion about the term: "MILITIA" as that term is used in the Resolutions. A presumption can be made that the term: "MILITIA" in the Resolutions was derived from the Second Amendment to the United States Constitution and the prompting to Amend the Alaska Constitution is from the rumblings in the Congress of the United States to regulate the ownership of firearms.

I would like to point out that the present day "Militia" of a free compact State of the united States of America is the "National Guard." It was understood in the early days of our Nation

that the States had an obligation to raise a Militia for the protection of its People and the Militia of a State was to be made available to the President of the United States when called into actual service of the United States (U.S. Const. II:2:1; Articles of Confederation, Article VI). The Rights of the States to raise a Militia was reconfirmed and preserved in the Second Amendment to the Constitution of the United States.

Let us look at the following wording of the Resolutions that may be found in the Second Amendment to the Constitution of the United States:

"A well-regulated militia being necessary to the security of a free State, the right of the people to keep and bear arms shall not be infringed. [*The individual right to keep and bear arms shall not be denied or infringed by the State or a political subdivision of the State*]."

Note:

The bracketed text are the parts of the Resolutions that are in addition to the Second Amendment to the Constitution of the United States.

The wording of the Second Amendment to the Constitution of the United States is correct and proper; the wording of the Resolutions is not. The Amendment to the Constitution of the United States only address the establishment of a State Militia; not the Rights of an individual to bear arms. It is the Militia that is to provide for the security of the State, NOT THE PEOPLE IN THEIR INDIVIDUAL CAPACITIES. You must ask yourselves: ARE THE PEOPLE "WELL REGULATED" AS MANDATED BY THE AMENDMENT??

The "Articles of Confederation of 1774" is as much a part of the Supreme Law of the land as is the Constitution of the United States itself (with the exception of those parts that have been modified by the U.S. Constitution) [Report Of Proceedings In Congress, Wed., Feby. 21, 1787 {Journals of the Continental Congress, Vol. 38, Library of Congress}; Texas v. White, 7 Wall. 700]. Alaska, as a free compact State of the united States of America, is obligated to provide a Militia in

accordance to the mandates of Article VI of the Articles of Confederation:

"... every State shall always keep up a *well regulated and disciplined Militia*, sufficiently armed and accoutered, and shall provide and constantly have ready for use, *in public stores*, a due number of field pieces and tents, and a proper quantity of arms, ammunition and camp equipage." [Emphasis added]

The term: "Public Stores" would lead us to believe that every able body Male Adult of the State was to be a Member of the State Militia (National Guard [Reserve or Active]) and the State was responsible to Arm and Cloth the Members of the Militia. Article IX of the Articles of Confederation places additional responsibilities upon the States to provide a Militia.

As we can see, **IT'S NOT** the Second Amendment to the U.S. Constitution that guarantees an individual the Right to bear arms; but we find that it is a part of the inalienable Rights of the "Declaration of Independence" as those Rights are reserved in the IXth and Xth Amendments to the U.S. Constitution:

"The enumeration in the Constitution of certain rights, shall not be construed to deny or disparage others **RETAINED BY THE PEOPLE**" [Emphasis added]

Amend IX, U.S. Const.

"The powers not delegated to the United States by the Constitution, nor prohibited by it to the States, are reserved to the States respectively, **OR TO THE PEOPLE.**" [Emphasis added]

Amend X, U.S. Const.

These [inalienable] Rights are not recognized nor provided for in the Alaska Constitution as all Rights exist as being **UNDER THE LAW**, Civil, or Political in nature. But all is not lost.

The State of Alaska has entered into a compact with the "OTHER" States of Union upon Statehood and has agreed to recognize and honor the principles of the "Declaration of Independence" which includes the unalienable Rights of Life, Liberty and the pursuit of happiness [Alaska Statehood Act, Section One]. Along with these Rights is also the inalienable Rights to

protect life and property which is understood to include the Right to bear arms. AS THESE UNALIENABLE RIGHTS ARE THE PRINCIPLES OF THE DECLARATION OF INDEPENDENCE WHICH THE STATE OF ALASKA IS OBLIGATED TO OBSERVE UNDER THE ALASKA STATEHOOD ACT; THE RIGHT OF AN INDIVIDUAL TO BEAR ARMS CANNOT BE REGULATED BY THE STATE. But are these unalienable Rights the Rights of a citizen of the United States???

WHAT IS YOUR STATUS?

The Constitution of the United States speaks of several status of citizenships. You can be a citizen of a free compact state of the united States of America [U.S. Const., IV:2:1]. You can be an Inhabitant of a free compact State of the united States of America [U.S. Const., I:2:2; I:3:3]. You can be a Natural Born Citizen who is not a Citizen of the United States [U.S. Const., II:1:5]. You can be a Citizen {upper case "C"} of the United States [As used throughout the main body of the U.S. Constitution]. You can be a citizen {lower case "c"} of the United States [As used throughout the Amendments to the U.S. Constitution]. Or you may be an American Citizen [As used in the United States Code]. WHICH ONE ARE YOU???

All the status of citizenships have inalienable Rights except one. It is the lower case "c" citizen of the United States as that term: "citizen" is used in the Amendments to the Constitution of the United States. The 14th Amendment created a new status of citizenship that was only known in Europe and that citizen is a "subject" of the United States.

Here is a secrete that very few People are aware of. The 14th Amendment is written as a "Constructive Trust" with the lower case "c" citizen being the "Res" of the Trust. Under Section 5 of the 14th Amendment; the Congress is made the "Trustee" and with the "and subject to the jurisdiction thereof" Clause of Section One; the United States is made the "Beneficiary" of the Trust. As the "citizen" is the "Res" of the Trust; the citizen becomes the "Property" of the Trust and thus all

Property of the citizen is also the Property of the Trust. As Congress has been made the "Trustee" of the Trust; the Congress is authorized to "make all needful rules and regulations respecting OTHER PROPERTY belonging to the United States" [U.S. Const., IV:4:1]. IF YOUR STATUS IS THAT OF A 14TH AMENDMENT CITIZEN; CONGRESS CAN DENY YOU THE "PRIVILEGE" TO BEAR ARMS OR OWN ANY OTHER PROPERTY.

The Constitution of Alaska needs to be Amended, but not for the reasons stated in the Resolutions. Please note that under the guidance of Congress; the Alaska Constitutional Convention made those who are to be eligible to hold a Public Office of Trust or to be granted the Right of Suffrage shall be a 14th Amendment lower case "c" citizen. The "natural born citizen" of Alaska or a "natural born citizen" of any other free compact State of the united States of America, who is not a citizen of the United States, cannot vote nor hold a Public Office of Trust in Alaska. The natural born Citizens of Alaska are made subject to taxation without representation in violation of the principles of the Declaration of Independence and as they are being governed by "citizens of the United States;" they are being governed by "Aliens" as every State of the Union is a "country" (e.g. P.L. 100-702, {102 Stat. 4672-4673}, Sec. 1022; 28 USC 297(b)) that is a "foreign corporation" to the United States (20 C.J.S. 1786; In re Merriam, 36 N.E. 505, 141 N.Y. 479, affirmed 16 S.Ct. 1073, 163 U.S. 625, 41 L.Ed. 287).

The phrase: "citizen of the United States" needs to be replaced with the phrase: "citizen of Alaska" and the term: "citizen of Alaska" needs to be defined by law. At the present time; I, Gordon W. Epperly, (a caucasian male who was born in Whittier, California), who has lived in Juneau, Alaska since 1964 is unable to register to vote in any election of Alaska or hold any Public Office of Trust for want of being a lower case "c" citizen of the United States (a position that has been sustained by the Alaska Department of Elections and the Department of Elections for the City and Borough of Juneau). I'm not an exception to the rule.

There are many other problems that needs to be discussed that effect the relationship of Alaska to the United States, but these issues are not germane to the Resolutions.

Each of five pending measures—2d SSHJR 26, HJR 40, SJR 1, SJR 34, and SJR 39--proposes, in one way or another, to amend article I, section 19 of the state constitution to expand the explicit right guaranteed by that provision. Article I, section 19 currently provides:

RIGHT TO BEAR ARMS. A well-regulated militia being necessary to the security of a free state, the right of the people to keep and bear arms shall not be infringed. ^{1/}

Each of the measures identified proposes to rewrite the provision by expanding the section's caption and by adding a second sentence to its text. If the language, as submitted, is presented to the voters and approved, the amended provision would thereafter read:

RIGHT TO KEEP AND BEAR ARMS. A well-regulated militia being necessary to the security of a free state, the right of the

^{1/} The provision is virtually verbatim of the text of the Second Amendment of the Constitution of the United States, which states:

RIGHT TO KEEP AND BEAR ARMS. A well-regulated militia, being necessary to the security of a free state, the right of the people to keep and bear arms, shall not be infringed.

people to keep and bear arms shall not be infringed. The individual right to keep and bear arms shall not be denied or infringed by the State or a political subdivision of the State.

You have received from Gordon Epperly, a Juneau resident, a letter objecting to the proposed "expansion" of the content of the constitutional provision, and have asked me to respond to it. This memo is offered for that purpose. It is necessarily limited to the elements of Mr. Epperly's letter that directly relate to the five proposals that would expand upon the right to keep and bear arms within article I, section 19.^{2/}

If I may summarize and paraphrase the principal relevant points of his letter --

I

Mr. Epperly stresses that the language of any constitutional amendment must be "correct," then makes the observation that

. . . [t]he wording of the Second Amendment to the Constitution of the United States is correct and proper; the wording of the [proposed] resolutions is not. The [Second] Amendment to the Constitution of the United States only addresses the establishment of a State Militia, not the rights of an individual to bear arms. It is the Militia that is to provide for the security of the State.

The Second Amendment, enacted in 1791 as part of the Bill of Rights, is in fact a limitation on the federal government. Unlike the majority of the provisions of the Bill of Rights, the Second Amendment has never been construed as a limitation on the state governments as incorporated by the Fourteenth Amendment. Presser v. Illinois, 116 U.S. 252, 6 S.Ct. 580, 29 L.Ed. 615 (1886).^{3/} Moreover, the Second Amendment of the United States Constitution has never been found to provide any individual to possess or bear arms but only a collective right to bear arms for a "well regulated militia" which has been recognized by at least some courts to be "the active,

^{2/} Necessarily, then, I do not treat with those portions of Mr. Epperly's letter that consider the effect, if any, of obligations imposed on and accepted by the first 13 states united under the Articles of Confederation, that analyze the principles of the Declaration of Independence, and that discuss the various facets of citizenship, federal and state.

^{3/} Specifically, the Second Amendment has not been found to operate as a restriction on the power of the states to regulate weapons but has merely been found to be limitation on the power of the federal government to interfere in the formation of militias by the states.

organized militia of each state." United States v. Miller, 307 U.S. 174, 59 S.Ct. 816, 83 L.Ed. 1206 (1939); Presser v. Illinois, *op. cit.*; Quilici v. Village of Morton Grove, 695 F.2d 261 (7th Cir. 1982), *cert. den.*, 464 U.S. 863, 78 L.Ed.2d 170, 104 S.Ct. 194 (1983); Burton v. Sills, 243 A.2d 521 (N.J. 1968).

Thus, in contrast to those provisions of the Bill of Rights that have been "incorporated" through the due process clauses of the Fourteenth Amendment and are made applicable as limitations upon the states, a state constitutional provision that addresses the same subject as the Second Amendment but addresses state action has an independent vitality. Just as, for example, with Alaska's constitutional right of privacy defined in article I, section 22 of this state's constitution ^{4/}, Alaska may choose to redefine the right to keep and bear arms. That is what is at the heart of these five resolutions.

II

Mr. Epperly speaks to some apparent misunderstanding of the term "militia" as it is used in the current language of article I, section 19. His reference to "militia" is interesting in this context.

It is probably true that, under current constitutional interpretation, article I, section 19 of the Alaska Constitution does not provide to individuals a right to keep and bear arms.

In City of Salina v. Blaksley, 83 P. 619 (Kansas 1905), the Kansas Supreme Court was called upon to interpret that state's constitutional "bear arms" provision. ^{5/} The

^{4/} As a matter of federal constitutional law, "privacy" arises out of the United States Supreme Court's reading, interpretation, and application of the guarantees of several provisions of the Bill of Rights. It is a court-made doctrine, principally derived from the court's decision in Griswold v. Connecticut, 381 U.S. 470, 14 L.Ed.2d 510, 85 S.Ct. 1678 (1965), and is dependent entirely upon the court's reading and application of the Bill of Rights as against the federal government and, under the "incorporation document," against the states. By contrast, Alaska's recognition of an explicit right of privacy by its adoption, in 1972, of the provision that is set out as article I, section 22, bases definition of the guarantee of privacy on legislative action coupled with modification of the definition of the right by the judiciary by decision.

^{5/} The provision in Section 4 of the Kansas Bill of Rights provided "that the people have the right to bear arms for their defense and security." The language of the Kansas provision seems somewhat broader than article I, section 19 of the Alaska Constitution. Nevertheless, the phrasing of the language infers a collective right and not one grounded on the individual.

court examined whether the existence of a general people's army ^{6/} consisting of all "able-bodied male citizens between the ages of twenty-one and forty-five years" somehow provided an individual right to bear arms. The court said it did not. It held that an individual had no right to take on the defense of the state. Rather, the defense of the state, the court related, was the duty of the organized militia. ^{7/}

In Alaska the "people's army" only exists when they are called into active service by the governor. Following the logic of the Kansas decision--for there are no relevant Alaska cases that suggest a different interpretation--an individual member of that "army" has no special right to keep and bear arms except as may be required during that service. That service may involve situations other than military actions--assistance during periods of public calamity or during declared natural disasters, for example--and members of the unorganized militia have not been directed by law to keep any weapons at the ready. Consequently, the fact that someone is a member

^{6/} The Kansas statute uses the reference to "people's army" in a way that is roughly comparable to references in the statutory law of this state to the "unorganized militia." See, in this regard, AS 26.05.110:

In the event of imminent invasion by a foreign power and for the same reasons set forth in AS 26.05.070, if the governor has ordered into active service all of the available organized militia or if the organized militia is in active federal service, the governor may order the unorganized militia or any portion of it considered necessary into active service, and have them perform military duty for the state subject to this chapter, as the circumstances require.

AS 26.23.900(7) defines the "unorganized militia" as:

. . . all persons comprising that component of the militia of the state, as described in AS 26.05.010.

The state militia, the statute says,

. . . consists of all able-bodied citizens of the United States and all other able-bodied persons who have declared their intention to become citizens of the United States, who reside in the state, who are at least 17 years of age, and who are eligible for military service under the laws of the United States or this state.

AS 26.05.010(a). And, under AS 26.05.010(b)(2), the unorganized militia is defined as

. . . consist[ing] of all qualified persons available for service but not serving in the organized militia.

^{7/} Commonwealth v. Murphy, 44 N.E. 138 (1896), a decision by the Supreme Judicial Court of Massachusetts, offers a similar view.

of the unorganized militia cannot be said to provide any constitutional protection to an individual right to bear arms.

Moreover, states that have recognized an individual right to bear arms for self-defense or other purposes have not done so on the basis of a member of a militia argument (as members of the militia, or national guard only have the authority to bear arms as required by their commanding officers and their arms are supplied by the state) but upon particular clauses of their state constitutions that provide an individual right to bear arms for certain purposes. So, for example, article 1, section 27 of the Oregon Constitution ("The people shall have the right to bear arms for the defence [sic] of themselves, and the State . . .") has been recognized as providing an individual right, and in City of Princeton v. Buckner, 377 S.E.2d 139 (W.Va. 1988), the West Virginia Supreme Court of Appeals pointed out that at least 14 states have constitutional provisions that protect an individual's right to possess arms for self-defense and, in some cases, for the defense of home and property, in addition to common defense of the state.^{8/}

^{8/} The Buckner decision cites:

Alabama: "That every citizen has a right to bear arms in defense of himself and the state." Alabama Constitution, art. I, § 26;

Arizona: "The right of the individual citizen to bear arms in defense of himself or the State shall not be impaired, but nothing in this section shall be construed as authorizing individuals or corporations to organize, maintain, or employ an armed body of men." Arizona Constitution, art. II, § 26;

Connecticut: "Every citizen has a right to bear arms in defense of himself and the state." Connecticut Constitution, art. I, § 15;

Delaware: "A person has the right to keep and bear arms for the defense of self, family, home and State, and for hunting and recreational use." Delaware Constitution, art. I, § 20;

Indiana: "The people shall have a right to bear arms, for the defense of themselves and the State." Indiana Constitution, art. I, § 32;

Michigan: "Every person has a right to keep and bear arms for the defense of himself and the State." Michigan Constitution, art. I, § 6;

New Hampshire: "All persons have the right to keep and bear arms in defense of themselves, their families, their property, and the state." New Hampshire Constitution, part 1, article 2-a;

Oregon: "The people shall have the right to bear arms for the defence [sic] of themselves, and the State, but the Military shall be kept in strict subordination to the civil (continued...)"

All of these resolutions seek to join Alaska to that short list of states.

In summary: Under article I, section 19 of the Alaska Constitution, recognition is made of the concept or notion of a state militia. Borrowing from the interpretations of comparable provisions of other state constitutions reached in other jurisdictions, I believe that the existence of a militia in this state would not be taken as the basis by which to expand the collective right to bear arms defined by article I, section 19 into some individual right to bear arms. If, then, the legislature and the people want to vouchsafe that individual right to bear arms by explicit constitutional language, they

Washington Constitution, article I, § 24; and

Wyoming: "The right of citizens to bear arms in defense of themselves and of the state shall not be denied." Wyoming Constitution, article I, § 24.

To this list of 14 jurisdictions may be added the provision of the West Virginia constitution that was the subject of the court's analysis, article III, § 22, which read: "A person has the right to keep and bear arms for the defense of self, family, home and State, and for lawful hunting and recreational use."

If Mr. Epperly's contention that wording in a state constitution that is inconsistent with the language of the Second Amendment of the Constitution of the United States may not "be of any effect in a Court of Law," the constitutional provisions applicable to the right to keep and bear arms in at least these 15 jurisdictions are in serious jeopardy.


I support a constitutional amendment stating explicitly that the right to keep and bear arms is an individual right.

To argue that the right to keep and bear arms must be construed as a collective right is absurd. The words "the people" in the entire Bill of Rights ^{have} ~~has~~ always been interpreted as meaning "every individual." Why should the same words in the Second Amendment mean something different?

Does "the people" in the First Amendment mean "the media," or "Congress," or "the majority party"? Certainly not. "The people" in the Second Amendment is the same "the people" in all the others.

I am aware that a tiny minority of politically appointed (not rank and file--rank and file police officers throughout the country are staunchly pro-gun) police chiefs have manifested various degrees of opposition to changing the Alaska constitution to stress that the Right to Keep and Bear Arms ^{IS AN INDIVIDUAL RIGHT}. Their rationale is that such an amendment would make it hard to enforce gun-control ordinances and laws. That is simply not correct. Other states have adopted similar ordinances, I believe, but none of the problems mentioned have occurred. Furthermore, I find it unwise to defer to the opinion of the same law-enforcement organizations ^{which} ~~was~~ have often expressed their opposition to the Miranda rules, and to many U.S. Supreme Court decisions meant to protect the individual rights of citizens, when it comes to matters of individual freedoms.

I do believe that the right to keep and bear arms--like all rights--should be accompanied also by individual responsibilities. Those who have been convicted of serious crimes should not be allowed to exercise the right to keep and bear arms anymore. Nothing in the amendment that has been proposed prevents this. Let law-abiding citizens feel confident that their rights will be upheld by allowing this resolution to be voted on by the citizens of Alaska who are the ultimate depository of the powers of which you are stewards.

In reference to teleconference on SJR 39 of Jan. 21, '94:

I'm in favor of SJR 39 because it clarifies the individual right to keep and bear arms. Constitutional scholarship and history has supported the individual right, however this right is currently under attack in various state and municipal governments and by revised judicial interpretations. SJR 39 will serve to protect an individual's right as currently understood and original intended by the framers of the constitution. "The right of the individual to keep and bear arms extends to all lawful purposes, including subsistence, personal-protection from all enemies (foreign or domestic) and sport.

Especially good in SJR 39 are the last words in the proposed amendment that prohibit political subdivisions of the state from circumventing the intent of the Constitution by passing municipal law. Eff. laws need to be understandable and uniform in the area of jurisdiction without complicated local ordinances.

I strongly favor SJR 39 over SJR 1 because language in Section 2 of SJR 1 would have the effect of "grandfathering in" any legislation currently on the books or any laws passed between now and the date of ratification, no matter how misguided such laws may be.

Regarding laws of the state or municipalities that punish or seek to control crime, I say - punish the crime or misuse of a weapon, not the mere possession of a weapon on the person.

Responding to a statement made by the Chief of Police who was the first to testify at this teleconference: - the chief stated his support for SJR 1 over SJR 39 with the additional statement that if Section 2 of SJR 1 needed to be changed or dropped that he would support that. My point is that SJR 1 with Section 2 deleted is identical to SJR 39.

A couple of speakers, in positions of political or police power were concerned that they may lose some of their power to control arms ownership and possession should SJR 39 be ratified. I wish to remind these persons that they are servants of the public, not our masters.

As Superintendent of Schools for the Fairbanks North Star Borough School District, I am writing to register my concern about the potential impact of SJR39/HJR40, "The Right To Bear Arms," on a school district's ability to maintain a safe school environment.

We must be able to ensure the safety of children at school. This means being able to prohibit the use and possession of weapons on school grounds by anyone, child or adult. Since the Alaska Constitution takes precedence over state and local law, the proposed amendment appears to negate local control over the use and possession of firearms on school property. I have asked several legislators informally if this is the case but have not received a definitive answer. I believe we must know the answer to this question before acting on such a far-reaching change to the Constitution.

Enclosed please find copies of our School Board policies governing firearms. As you can see, we do make an exception for activities such as rifle clubs and school sponsored gun shows, provided they meet certain safety requirements. Otherwise, our school district requires and consistently enforces a ban on firearms and other weapons on school grounds. To do otherwise would mean we are willing to risk the dire consequences that would occur sooner or later if firearms are allowed on school premises--and this we are not willing to do.

Please consider adding language to the amendment that clearly allows local authorities to maintain a safe school environment. This critical issue must be resolved before our ability to maintain a weapons-free environment for our children is curtailed.

The Alaska Municipal League opposes **HJR 40** and other proposed amendments to the Alaska Constitution that would limit the ability of municipalities to reasonably control the use of firearms within their boundaries.

The *1994 Policy Statement* of the League, adopted by AML members in November 1993, contains the following statement on this issue:

The League and its members support individual rights to keep and bear arms; however, they are opposed to any legislation that would limit or preempt the authority of municipalities to pass reasonable laws or regulations concerning the use of firearms.

Amendments to the Alaska Constitution that would address the rights of individuals to keep and bear arms have been introduced several times by legislators. The League does not feel that such amendments are appropriate or desirable because they would limit the ability of municipalities to regulate the use of firearms in a reasonable manner. Municipalities must be allowed to retain their authority to pass laws that concern public safety within their boundaries. Alaskan municipalities have not abused the rights of gun owners, nor are they expected to, because of Alaskans' historical tradition of possessing and using firearms.

Dear State Affairs Committee member:

I attended the teleconference held Feb.12 regarding HB 351 and HJR 40. Due to the large number of people signed up to testify I was unable to so I am faxing my comments to those of you on the committee. I am a retired federal narcotics agent having spent my career as a special agent for the Drug Enforcement Administration in California, Mexico and Alaska. During my career I participated in over 500 felony arrests, a large percentage of which involved suspects who were carrying concealed weapons while engaged in criminal activity. In my experience this % of armed suspects was higher in Alaska than in either California or Mexico.

I support both HB 351 and HJR 40. The increase in the number of law abiding, qualified citizens who can carry concealed weapons will serve as an effective deterrent to those who seek to commit violent crimes against persons and property. My son is currently attending college at Kings Pt. NY, just outside of New York city. He frequently rides the Long island railroad, getting on and off at the very station nearest to where the recent shooting massacre occurred. I worry about him being in a strict gun-control area like New York where such a shooting spree could take place without any hope of intervention by a legally armed private citizen.

A police officer in Ketchikan testified Saturday that her job would be made harder and more dangerous by not knowing whether every time she made a contact the person she was contacting might be armed. In my experience law enforcement officers face their greatest peril when they assume that those who they come in contact are not armed. Those who are engaged in crime are likely already carrying a concealed weapon in violation of the law.

HJR 40 is a positive step towards reaffirming the constitutional right of the individual to keep and bear arms. I am also faxing to you a document detailing comments of the founding fathers on this very issue. I urge your support for HB351 and HJR 40 and applaud the efforts of those of you who are working towards their passage.

FOUNDING FATHERS COMMENTS ON THE 2nd AMENDMENT

FEB 14 1994

During the current debate on gun control we frequently hear anti-gun advocates state that the second amendment really wasn't directed towards protecting private ownership of firearms. Let's examine what some of the founding fathers had to say on this very issue:

NOAH WEBSTER: "the supreme power in America cannot enforce unjust laws by the sword, because the whole body of the people are armed, and constitute a force superior to any band of regular troops..." (1787)

PATRICK HENRY: "Guard with jealous attention the public liberty. Suspect everyone who approaches that jewel. Unfortunately, nothing will preserve it but downright force. Whenever you give up that force, you are ruined." (1788)

BENJAMIN FRANKLIN: "They that give up essential liberty to obtain a little temporary safety deserve neither liberty nor safety." (1759)

THOMAS JEFFERSON: "No free man shall ever be debarred the use of arms." (1776)

"Laws that forbid the carrying of arms... disarm only those who are neither inclined nor determined to commit crimes... Such laws make things worse for the assaulted and better for the assailants: they serve rather to encourage than to prevent homicides, for an unarmed man may be attacked with greater confidence than an armed man." (1764)

JOHN ADAMS: "Arms in the hands of individual citizens may be used at individual discretion... in private self defense." (1787)

JAMES MADISON: "The constitution preserves the advantage of being armed which Americans possess over the people of almost every other nation... (where) the governments are afraid to trust the people with arms."

THOMAS PAINE: "...arms discourage and keep the invader and plunderer in awe, and preserve order in the world as well as property...HORRID mischief would ensue were the law abiding deprived of the use of them." (1775)

RICHARD HENRY LEE: "A militia when properly formed are in fact the people themselves... and include all men capable of bearing arms... To preserve liberty essential that the whole body of people always possess arms." (1788)

SAMUEL ADAMS: "The constitution shall never be construed to prevent the people of the United States who are peaceable citizens from keeping their own arms." (1788)

GEORGE MASON: "I ask, sir, what is the militia? It is the whole people... To disarm the people is the best and most effectual way to enslave them." (1788)
