Products included a plan to reorganize the State Offices of Alcoholism and Drug Abuse and the Division of Mental Health into a single administrative organizational unit under an umbrella

Division in order to provide more responsive, effective and efficient services by these programs. A plan for deinstitutionalizing the Department's institutions into community based facilities was developed. A plan was formulated to provide Native Alaskans with increased participation in state planning for rural natives in Alcohol, Drug Abuse and Mental Health programs.

Private practice with the Valley Medical Clinic in Juneau, Alaska as a psychotherapist. The focus of my practice was on individual, marriage, family and sex therapy.

1972-1974 - Executive Director, North Idaho and Panhandle Child Development Center, and Family Life Enrichment Associates, in Coeur d'Alene, Idaho. Initially, the position was within State of Idaho Government. When some of the services were spun off to a private non-profit agency, I chose to direct the private agency's development of its new programs as the Executive Director.

As director, my responsibilities included the overall planning and management of programs served by the child development programs. These programs responded to a five county area of North Idaho that was staffed by 17 teachers, 18 aids, 5 speech therapists, 3 social workers, 4 psychologists, 6 project directors, and 6 support staff with a total budget exceeding \$850,000.

Programs included preschool screening and classroom experiences for handicapped children in nine classrooms. Parent skills and infant stimulation training of parents with high risk children. Family counseling of families and marriages through a branch agency titled Family Enrichment Associates. Speech and language dysfunctions. A life skill acquisition program for youth age 13-21 with emotional and/or developmental disabilities in classroom situation in four communities.

In addition to my work directing these programs, I shared a weekly column titled Family Fireside with a psychologist on the staff. Column spoke to issues related to family living, which was printed by the local newspaper, the Coeur d'Alene Press.

1967-1972 - Director, Lutheran Youth Center, and Program Director, Alaska Children's Services. Alaska Children Services developed when two other directors of private agencies and myself presented a plan to our boards and national missions to merge the three agencies under a single agency in order to better serve children and their families in Alaska. The programs were located in the Anchorage area, in Unalaska and Wasilla.

I was responsible for the planning and managing of the treatment services of the agency. These services included residential treatment for 55 disturbed children, emergency shelter for 10 children, group home services for 18 children, family therapy provided by 3 family therapists, day care for 40 children, foster

care for a limited number of children from residential treatment, a halfway house for drug abusers and a community action program to develop a health center in the native community of Unalaska.

The budget for these programs exceeded one million dollars and employed over 50 professional and paraprofessional staff.

1967-1972 - Instructor, University of Alaska, community colleges located in Anchorage and Palmer, Alaska. Classes included introductory courses in Sociology and Social Welfare, Social Problems, Sociology of Deviant Behavior and the Family.



AHCA National Public Affairs Committee Chairman Mark E. Rosenberg, who directed the seminar, reported that there was not one wasted minute during the two days of "how-to" sessions. Evaluation forms submitted by participants after the seminar bore this out. Attendees gave the meeting a 95 percent "very good" overall rating, with the other 5 percent saying it was "good." Praise came from all quarters for the useable materials distributed to all attending, for the highly motivational address by Dr. Heartsill Wilson on "How to Achieve Excellence," for the media panel composed of three members of the western states press, and for the AHCA staff's organization
