Comparison of the Differences between SB-76 and CSSB-76

Senate Bill 76 contains two basic concepts. The first half of the bill excludes felons from several activities in charitable gaming. The second half of the bill prohibits direct contributions of net proceeds of some types of charitable gaming to political candidates.

Committee Substitute for Senate Bill 76 also strives to achieve the same ends. The first half of the CS combines all of the felony exclusions contained in SB-76 into a single section, AS 05.15.105. These exclusions are currently scattered throughout Title 5. The CS deletes these scattered sections and then combines their intent into one. This was done for the sake of clarity. The second part of CSSB-76 limits direct political contributions from net proceeds to activities other than bingo and pull-tab activities.

The details of the Committee Substitute include a prohibition from participation for life against any individual, who is acting in a managerial or supervisory capacity, if they have a felony record. If the individual was involved in a crime of lesser severity such as dishonesty, theft, or a violation of gaming laws they may petition the Department of Revenue after ten years have elapsed since the person's conviction. The Department shall allow the individual to participate if:

- 1) the crime was a misdemeanor.
- 2) the Department determines the person is of good character, honesty and integrity.
- 3) the person's involvement in charitable gaming is not against the public interest.

The bill allows the Department to consider violations that occurred outside of Alaska's jurisdiction.

The second half of the Committee Substitute allow some gaming activities to be used to generate net proceeds used for direct political donations to candidates. The net proceeds gained from bingo and pull-tab activities are not allowed to be used. Activities such as raffles would be allowed. In comparison, SB-76 excluded proceeds from raffle and contest activities.

Dear State Representative or State Senator:

This letter is to express our strong opposition to HB 168 and SB 76 which have currently been introduced to the House and Senate. As a permit holder, we urge you to please not rush these bills through, and allow time for more public testimony.

We would also like the opportunity to testify on these bills and ask for interim hearings on HB 168 and SB 76.

HB 168 sets minimum return percentages so high it would effectively shut down charitable gaming in the state. SB 76 also contains similar high percentages that will kill charities. Additionally, these bills redefine "qualified" charities in a way that cuts out most organizations that are now holding permits.

In your haste to pass legislation, please don't close your ears to the need for further testimony on the impact of these bills.

We are the Anchorage Sports Association, Inc. and, a non-profit organization that has held a gaming permit for ten (10) years.

Of interest is the "Political Parties." It should be noted that donations are legal, but political parties are not allowed licenses except in Alaska.

DEFINITIONS:

Gross Income: The gross wages taken in annually by charitable gaming.

Felons: Those individuals with felony criminal records.

Gambling Convictions: Those individuals with criminal records pertaining to gambling.

Political Parties: An organization working together to promote political ideas.

Summary of Major Policy Changes to Current Law CS Senate Bill 76 (Jud)

April 6, 1993

1. Allows pulltabs to be sold by machine in retail stores, restaurants and bars. Only requires 50 percent of proceeds to be returned to the charity holding the permit.

This is a major expansion of gaming in Alaska. The potential for pulltab vending machines in gas stations, movie theaters, convenience stores, video rental stores, grocery stores, and bars is enormous, as is the economic incentive for merchants to install such machines. The reality is that little or no supervision of such machines will take place; kids love them and kids will buy from them.

2. Deletes candidates as permissible recipients of gaming receipts, replaces them with political parties.

While the proponents of this change misleadingly argue that it will separate government and gambling, in reality it merely inserts another step, further institutionalizes gaming receipts as a source of revenue for political parties, and effectively denies that source of revenue to independent candidates. This section is the centerpiece of the bill and serves to limit competition among candidates, giving politicians currently in power the advantage.

3. Prohibits use of proceeds from any gaming activity to support lobbying.

This assumes that lobbying is a bad thing. Given the cynical and misleading nature of the information presented by the proponents of this legislation, it would seem that those who speak for religious, charitable, fraternal, labor, political, or educational organizations are much needed to protect Alaskans from those who would increase gaming in this state under the guise of reform.

4. Increases to 30 percent the amount of proceeds to be paid to charities or other organizations holding permits for pulltabs, and 10 percent for other gaming activities.

This is a positive change. It should be noted, however, that during a hearing on this bill, when given the opportunity to allow the Department of Commerce to adjust these percentages upward through regulation, the sponsor's comment was that charities will just have to be content with 30 percent. That is hardly a consistent position from one purporting gaming reform.

5. Creates multiple-beneficiary permits. Permit holders may combine from two to six permits.

The effect of multiple-beneficiary permits will allow those holding a multiple-beneficiary permit to become operators. This has the potential to put Alaska's municipalities in the bingo and pull-tab business. In small communities, the local government, local charities, and local non-profits could combine their permits and municipal employees could run bingo games.

6. Allows public and non-profit radio and television pull-tab sponsored sales statewide.

This bill effectively creates a statewide lottery. As was explained in committee hearings on the bill, pull-tabs will be sold across the state. The purchase of that pull-tab enables the buyer to not only get a chance at a pull-tab prize but also to enter a lotto with even larger prizes. As has been amply demonstrated, it is those people who can least afford to buy pull-tabs and lotto tickets that spend the most on them, particularly as the stakes increase. This section has added negative effect of allowing this activity to take place through university radio stations.

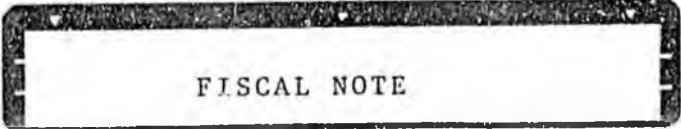

You have requested a sectional summary of the above-described bill. As a preliminary matter, note that a sectional summary of a bill should not be considered an authoritative interpretation of the bill - the bill itself is the best statement of its contents.

Section 1 of the bill amends AS 05.15 by adding a new section AS 05.15.105.

Subsection (a) of that section provides that a person who has been convicted of a violation of a law or ordinance of this or another jurisdiction that is a felony, a crime involving theft or dishonesty, or violation of gambling laws may not participate in charitable gaming in certain specified instances. Those specified instances are only those existing under current law or regulation. This subsection combines all of the existing prohibitions that are currently scattered through AS 05.15 into one section for clarity. As a result all of the previous scattered prohibitions are being repealed in section 6 of the draft CS. This subsection changes existing law by removing a five year limitation on the use of a felony conviction to prevent someone from engaging in charitable gaming as a licensee or permittee, person responsible for a charitable gaming activity for a permittee, or as a managerial or supervisory employee of a licensee. The removal of the limitation means that if someone has been convicted of a felony offense they can never engage in those specified activities. They can continue to engage in charitable gaming as an employee though. The addition of the language "violation of a law or ordinance of this or another jurisdiction" clarifies that the department may look to a person's criminal convictions in another state, locality, or by the federal government in making the decision as to who is disabled from participating. This change

reflects the current practice of the department, although, the existing authorization was less than clear.

Subsection (b) provides an exception from the prohibitions in (a) for a person who has been convicted of a misdemeanor offense involving theft or dishonesty or a misdemeanor violation of gambling laws provided that 10 years have elapsed since the conviction and the department finds that the person is of good character, honesty, and integrity and the person's participation in charitable gaming is not against the public interest. This exception is a change from existing law.

Section 2 of the bill requires a permittee to report to the department the name and address of each person responsible for the operation of a charitable gaming activity under the permit who has been convicted of a felony, a crime involving theft or dishonesty, or a violation of a municipal, state, or federal gambling law. This section removes a five year limitation on the reporting of felony convictions.

Section 3 of the bill amends AS 05.15.150(a) by clarifying what is a political use for charitable gaming purposes (aiding a political organization), and what is not a political use (direct contribution of proceeds of bingo or pull-tab games to a candidate for public office or a candidate's campaign organization).

Section 4 of the bill amends the definition of "political organization" in AS 05.15.-210(27) to include a political party as defined in AS 15.60.010.

Section 5 of the bill provides a definition of "managerial or supervisory capacity."

Section 6 of the bill repeals the scattered prohibitions on a person's participation in charitable gaming because of certain convictions the person may have, which are made redundant by the gathering of all these provisions together in section 1 of the bill.

Sectional Analysis
CS Senate Bill 76 (Jud)
06 April 1993

Sec. 1 Adds authorization for Department of Commerce to adopt regulations governing vendor registration, pull tab ticket dispensing machines (see Sec. 24, 05.15.188) and sets out the number of activities allowed by multiple beneficiary permit holders, and the disposition of proceeds at the time of a revocation, etc., of a vendor registration.

Sec. 2 New requirement that regulations be consistent with standards on pull tabs of the North American Gaming Regulators Association. (Note this is a higher standard than currently required)

Sec. 3 Adds authority to department to examine records of a registered vendor.

Sec. 4 New authorization for issuance of multiple beneficiary permits.

Sec. 5 New section prohibits the department from issuing a license to a person convicted, here or in another state, of a felony or a crime involving theft or dishonesty or is a violation of gaming laws. Prohibits the department from issuing permits if such a person is employed by a licensee or a vendor. Prohibits that person from participating in charitable gaming as a permittee, licensee, or vendor.

New section authorizes department to allow some convicted persons to participate after 10 years if the department determines the person is of good character, etc.

Note: current law has 5 year limitation. See Repealers.

Sec. 6 Adds requirement that multiple beneficiary permit holders must designate one member in charge.

Sec. 7 Sets out who may be member in charge of multiple beneficiary permits.

Sec. 8 Adds authority for multiple beneficiary permit holders to designate alternate members in charge.

Sec. 9 New requirement that contracts and any amendments to contract between permittee and operator must be approved by the

department. Requires the department to provide reasons for disapproval in writing. Disallows activities under permit before approval.

Sec. 10 Adds that municipalities may prohibit vendors as well as operators from conducting activities within municipality.

Sec. 11 (1) changes reporting of adjusted gross income to quarterly from two consecutive quarters

(2) change requiring at least 30 percent of adjusted gross income from pull tabs to be paid to permittees and at least 10 percent from other than pull tabs.

Sec 12 Changes language in the required to disclose section to conform to that in Sec. 5 as to who may not participate in gaming due to criminal convictions.

Sec. 13 New section authorizes multiple beneficiary permits, limits combining of permits to two to six permittees, and sets out how a permittee may withdraw from such a permit and requires jointly filed reports.

Sec. 14 Deletes candidates or groups that support candidates as permissible recipients of gaming receipts and adds political organizations to the list of permissible recipients (see Sec. 27 for definition), adds prohibition against use of proceeds from bingo or pull-tabs for candidates for office, adds prohibition against use of proceeds from any gaming activity to support lobbying.

Sec. 15 New section limits to 70 percent of adjusted gross income the total amount of expenses of operators from pull tab activities, and 90 percent of non-pull tab activities.

Sec. 16 Sets out under what circumstances the department may suspend or revoke a permit, license, or registration and allows the department to prohibit a holder of a revoked license or vendor registration from reapplying for five years or a permit for one year.

Sec. 17 Adds multiple beneficiary permits to limitation on total value of door prizes (i.e. \$20,00 per month, or \$240,000 per month).

Sec. 18 Deletes limitation on permittees in conjunction with other permittees to award door prizes in excess of limitation. (conforms section to agree w/sec.17)

Sec. 19 Allows holders of multiple beneficiary permits to award a maximum in prizes of \$1,000,000 per year times the number of holders of the permit.

Sec. 20 Adds prohibition on sale or distribution of pull tabs manufactured outside the state by unlicensed manufacturers to requirement that in state manufacturers be licensed.

Sec. 21 New prohibition on distributors of pull tabs from dealing directly with vendors (rather than through permittees).

Sec. 22 Adds holders of multiple beneficiary permits to the definition of permittees for this section which governs pull-tab recordkeeping.

Sec. 23 New language prohibits purchase of a pull tab by employees, owners, or managers if pull tab is manufactured, distributed or sold by a permittee, licensee, or vendor by whom that employee is employed.

New language requires a receipt for prizes of over \$50 and allows the pull tab itself to be the receipt.

New language allows non commercial broadcasting stations to sell pull tabs at multiple locations on the same day. Defines "non commercial broadcasting station" as radio or television licensed by the FCC to a governmental entity or a non profit 501(3)(c). (i.e., Public Radio or television, student radio stations through the University).

Sec. 24 New section allows for vendors (a new category) to sell pull tabs for permittees and sets out under what circumstances vendors may sell pull tabs, requires vendors to provide no less than 50 percent of the ideal net proceeds, prohibits operators from contracting with vendors to sell pull tabs, requires all pull tabs sold by vendors to be sold from pull tab ticket dispensing machines.

Sec. 25 New section sets out how the department may issue orders prohibiting violations of gaming statutes or regulations, allows for an emergency order prohibiting the practice, allows for a hearing, and provides for appeal to the Superior Court.

Sec. 26 Adds license or vendor registration applicants to those guilty of unsworn falsification if making a false statement with the intent to mislead.

Sec. 27 Sets out definition of "political organization". See AS 15.60.010

Sec. 28 New definitions:

Fund-raiser or consultant: provides advice or technical assistance about gaming but is not an employee.

Ideal Net: total amount of face value of all pull tabs in a series, less prizes.

Managerial or supervisory capacity: responsible for gaming receipts, employee supervision, prepare financial reports, keeps accounts, conducts gaming activities, or is a fund-raiser or consultant.

Permittee: municipality or qualified organization that holds a valid permit.

Vendor: holds a business license and is a retail establishment, an eating establishment, or an establishment governed under the alcohol beverage control statutes.

Sec. 29 Repeals:

AS 05.15.122 (c) limitation on operators licenses issued to persons convicted of certain crimes (replaced by new 05.15.105, section 5 of bill)

AS 05.15.122 (d) prohibition against licensee hiring persons convicted of certain crimes (replaced by new 05.15.105, section 5 of bill)

AS 05.15.140(c) prohibits commissioner from issuing a permit for an activity operated by a person convicted of, in prison for, or on parole for a felony within the preceding five years or convicted of a crime involving theft or dishonesty or of a violation of a municipal, state, or federal gambling law. (Replaced by 05.15.105, section 5 of bill which allows the department to adopt regulations to issue a permit to those convicted of certain crimes after 10 years if the department determines the person is of good character, etc.)

You have requested a sectional summary of the above described bill. As a preliminary matter, note that a sectional summary of a bill should not be considered an authoritative interpretation of the bill - the bill itself is the best statement of its contents.

Section 1 of the bill amends AS 05.15.060 dealing with regulation of charitable gaming; requires the department of commerce and economic development to adopt regulations excluding anyone from participation in charitable gaming, as a permittee, licensee, or as a managerial or supervisory employee of a licensee or permittee, if the person has been convicted of a felony, a crime involving theft or dishonesty, or a violation of a municipal, state, or federal gambling law; removes the requirement that the felony conviction had to have occurred within the previous five years for it to work to exclude the person from participation in charitable gaming.

Sections 2 through 5 of the bill amend various provisions of AS 05.15 to remove a provision that limits the use of a felony to preclude a person from license or permit to conduct charitable gaming or working as a supervisory or managerial employee of a permittee or licensee to only those occasions when the felony conviction occurred in the last five years.

Section 6 of the bill amends AS 05.15.150(a) to allow aid to political organizations to continue as a proper political use of charitable gaming proceeds and prohibits charitable gaming proceeds from being directly contributed to the campaign organization of a candidate for public office of the state or a political subdivision of the state or to the candidate.

Section 7 of the bill amends AS 05.15.210(27) to clarify the definition of political organization.

Section 8 of the bill amends AS 05.15.210 to provide a definition of managerial or supervisory capacity.

SB 76: "An Act preventing persons with felony convictions from being involved in charitable gaming activities as a permittee, licensee, or employee in a managerial or supervisory capacity; and relating to 'political uses' and 'political organizations' as those terms are used in the charitable gaming statutes."

This bill currently has two provisions:

1. Prevents persons with any felony convictions from being involved in charitable gaming activities. Current law allows a person convicted of, in prison for, or on parole within the preceding five years to be involved in charitable gaming activities. The bill would prohibit a person convicted of a felony from ever being involved with charitable gaming activities in certain capacities.
2. Prohibits the use of "Net Proceeds" derived from gaming activities for direct contributions to a candidate for public office of the State or of a political subdivision of the State or to the candidate's campaign organization.

prohibits

The department supports these two provisions. It is appropriate to prohibit persons with felony backgrounds from conducting gaming activities. It is a fundamental in any regulated gaming jurisdiction.

The use of gaming proceeds for "direct" political campaigns is inappropriate.

Legislatures should enact proper laws regarding gambling in Alaska. According to the Alaska Public Offices Commission (APOC), over \$600,000 was put in campaign coffers from "charitable gaming."

The Legislature has been unable to pass vital reform measures that both gaming industry and the regulators have tried to enact. Even the appearance of such a conflict erodes the public trust and confidence.

With grant reductions and budget cuts, many charitable organizations have come to rely on this activity as a major source of funding. These monies could be going to charitable purposes as the original legislation intended; instead, they are competing with noncharitable permittees for the same proceeds.

Political parties being recognized as qualified organizations became effective August 12, 1976 after the Governor's veto was overridden. The Governor must have understood about these apparent conflicts.

The measures contained in this bill in conjunction with other reform measures that the administration would support will go a long way in providing a gaming program in Aalska that has integrity and the highest returns possible to "charities."

As requested, my staff is in the process of reviewing the statutes and regulations of licensing programs within the Division of Occupational Licensing which make reference to criminal convictions and/or moral character/turpitude concerns. It is taking longer than anticipated to review all the authorities within the programs under the division. Below are citations from several programs which make such reference. We will continue the review and provide you with additional citations as soon as possible. Consider this an interim reply.

Acupuncture Licensing

AS 08.06.030(a)(1) is of good moral character;

AS 08.06.070(4) has been convicted of a felony or other crime that affects the licensee's ability to continue to practice competently and safely;

AS 08.06.070(8) Engaged in lewd or immoral conduct in connection with the delivery of professional service to patients.

Architects, Engineers, and Land Surveyors

AS 08.48.171 . . . must be of good character and reputation

Athletic Commission

12 AAC 06.080 . . . will deny application if . . . engages in illegal bookmaking . . . illegal gambling . . . engages in any activity or practice which is detrimental to the best interests of boxing

Audiologists/Hearing Aid Dealers

AS 08.55.010(6)(A) has, during the five-year period immediately preceding the date of application been convicted of a felony, or had a final judgement entered against the applicant in a civil action, if the felony or civil action involved fraud, embezzlement, or misappropriation of property;

AS 08.55.130(4) has been convicted of a felony or other crime that affects the individual's ability to continue to practice competently and safely.

Chiropractor Licensing

AS 08.80.261(4) has been convicted of a felony or other crime that affects the licensee's ability to continue to practice competently and safely;

AS 08.80.261(8) engaged in lewd or immoral conduct in connection with the delivery of professional service to patients.

Public Accountancy

AS 08.04.450(5) conviction of a felony under the laws of any state or the United States;

12 AAC 04. 520(b)(2) is convicted of a felony under the laws of any state or the United States.



Groups must obtain a gaming permit from the Dept. of Commerce to hold raffles, bingo events, or to sell pull tabs. In 1989, 28 groups raised \$ 499,019 through gaming activities. For these groups, gaming provided 57% of their total revenues. Further, gaming revenues accounted for 20% of all the funds raised by groups in Alaska in 1989. This 20% breaks out into bingo 7.57%, raffles 10.45%, and pull tabs 1.98%. Many groups hired gaming operators to run their fundraising events. These operators, collectively, donated \$ 31,938 to incumbents in 1989.

Groups must obtain a gaming permit from the Department of Commerce to hold raffles, bingo events, or to sell pull tabs. In 1990 38 groups raised \$ 578,617 through gaming activities. For these groups, gaming provided 39 % of their total revenues. Further, gaming revenues accounted for 14.4% of all the funds raised by groups in Alaska in 1990. This 14.4 % breaks down to raffle 4.9 %, bingo 8.2 %, and pull tabs 1.3%.



Emergency Medical Technician

Naturopath

Nurse Aide

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Residential Contractors

A general contractor whose business and operation involve undertaking the construction or alteration of a privately-owned residential structure of one to four units that is used or intended to be used as a human dwelling, is required to obtain a license endorsement as a residential contractor.

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Security Guard

A guard license is required of those who work for an agency which contracts guard services to other businesses. Unless armed, guards working solely on their employers premises do not need a license. Those who apply for an armed guard license must have a firearms training certificate.

Training — At least eight hours of general pre-assignment training is required before a temporary guard permit can be issued. All guards must complete 40 hours of in-service training within 180 days after employment.

Social Worker

Exempted from licensing requirements are social workers who are employed by any local, state, federal, or nonprofit agency. It is unlawful for an unlicensed individual to practice clinical social work in Alaska, or to use the title Licensed Clinical Social Worker (L.C.S.W.) or any other title which implies that an individual is licensed.

Education/Training — A social worker must have a masters or doctoral degree in social work from a college accredited by the National Council on Social Work Education. Continuing education requirements include a minimum of 45 hours of education or training every two years; these 45 hours must include a minimum of six hours in substance abuse, and six hours in cross-cultural education emphasizing Alaska native cultures.

Experience — Required is the successful completion of a training program in postgraduate clinical social work which consists of either: 1) a minimum of two years of continuous, full-time employment, or 2) a minimum of 3,000 hours of less than full-time employment in a period of not less than two years. This training must have taken place within 10 years before application for licensure. Further, it must have been under the supervision of a licensed clinical social worker, licensed psychologist, licensed psychiatrist, or a clinical social worker who is exempted from the licensing requirements by the Alaska State Board of Clinical Social Worker Examiners. In any case, at least 100 hours of this supervision must have been conducted by a qualified person approved by the board.
