Dear Mr. President:

Under the authority of art. III, sec. 18, of the Alaska Constitution, I am transmitting a bill that would allow peace officers to make warrantless arrests when they have reasonable cause to believe that a defendant is violating the conditions of release imposed by a court in certain types of cases, including stalking, assault, sexual assault, and domestic violence cases. The bill would allow peace officers to take immediate action to protect the public, rather than requiring that they contact a prosecutor and a judge before arresting the defendant.


For example, if a person accused of stalking, domestic violence, assault, or sexual assault confronts the victim while the person is released on bail, or violates another condition of release, peace officers are rarely able to protect the victim or the public in general by making an immediate arrest. Typically, the peace officer must first meet with a prosecutor, go into court to file a motion, and obtain a court order before they can act to put the defendant back in jail. Since a large percentage of these incidents occur late at night and often involve alcohol or drug use by the defendant, these situations are particularly dangerous for victims -- and challenging for peace officers, prosecutors, and judges.

The bill authorizes the warrantless arrest of defendants who have violated conditions of release imposed by the court for certain offenses to the same extent that warrantless arrests are already authorized under existing law for the initial commission of these same offenses. The bill would permit peace officers to promptly arrest accused stalkers and other offenders who confront their victims, or otherwise violate conditions of release, while on bail.

ANALYSIS CONTINUATION:

This bill amends AS 12.30 to allow police officers to act quickly to arrest, without warrant or order, defendants who are released on bail, when those peace officers have reasonable cause to believe that the defendant has confronted the victim or has otherwise violated conditions of release. Currently, if a person accused of stalking, domestic violence, assault, or sexual assault confronts the victim while the person is released on bail, or violates another condition of release, peace officers are limited in their ability to protect the victim or the public in general because they cannot make an immediate arrest. Generally, the peace officer must first meet with a prosecutor, go into court to make a motion to remand, and obtain a court order before they can act to put the defendant back in jail. Because a substantial number of these incidents involve repeat offenders who often are impaired by alcohol or drugs, this lengthy procedure is particularly dangerous for the public, especially those already victimized by the defendant. The Department of Law does not anticipate a fiscal impact because, in most cases, the bill will speed up the process of arrest, and it will not increase the number of arrests.

The bill would authorize warrantless arrests of certain defendants who violated conditions of bail in certain assault, sexual assault, stalking, and domestic violence cases. According to the District Attorney's office and information from the Anchorage Police Department, getting warrants under current law generally involves a one-day delay.

Assumptions

1. The Anchorage District Attorney's office estimates 100 cases per year, statewide, and estimates that each case will result in one additional day of incarceration.
2. The average cost of incarceration, statewide, in a state correctional center is approximately \$113 per day.
3. It is not possible to estimate any current year (FY94) costs until the department knows when the bill will actually go into effect.
4. Because the bill will impact all correctional institutions, and the average daily cost of incarceration reflects a combination of costs including overhead, the estimated expenses are shown under "miscellaneous."
5. An inflation factor of 3% is assumed after FY95.

Dear Mr. President:

Under the authority of art. III, sec. 18, of the Alaska Constitution, I am transmitting a bill that amends Alaska Rule of Evidence 404 in several respects to help protect the victims of crimes in this state.

In far too many cases of sexual assault, domestic violence, and child sexual abuse, Alaska's victims are often themselves "put on trial" in the course of criminal proceedings. The emotional trauma that such crime victims routinely suffer in the criminal justice system can in some cases be nearly as traumatic as the crime itself.

Therefore, in order to address these problems and to better protect Alaska's citizenry, especially women and children who are frequently the victims of these crimes, we have proposed three changes to Rule of Evidence 404 which are intended to accomplish the following three goals.

The first goal is to reduce the number of times a sexual assault victim is "put on trial" by authorizing the admission into evidence of other sexual assaults or attempted sexual assaults by the defendant if the defendant claims that the victim voluntarily "consented" to the sexual activity. When a defendant argues that the victim consented, the prosecution should be permitted to stand up for the victim and rebut this claim by introducing evidence to the jury that the defendant has sexually assaulted or attempted to sexually assault other victims in the past.

The second goal is to similarly protect Alaska's sexually abused children. Rule of Evidence 404(b) was intended to prevent sexual predators and other child abusers from manipulating juries by hiding their past crimes of this type. Unfortunately, a confusing and unnecessary phrase -- "to show a common scheme or plan" -- has


been misinterpreted by several Alaska courts to exclude evidence meant to be allowed under the rule. This bill would fix that problem by simply eliminating this confusing phrase. Evidence of other sexual assaults or sexual abuse by the defendant toward the same or another child should be admissible if those acts are similar to the offense charged, whether or not the evidence demonstrates a "common scheme or plan." This bill also specifies a 10-year time period as being not too remote for the admissibility of evidence of prior similar sexual assaults or sexual abuse offenses committed by the defendant against children.

The third goal relates to evidence of past violence on the part of the defendant. In cases of domestic violence and other violent crimes, the defendant often claims that the victim was the initial aggressor. The defendant claims, in essence, that "the victim hit me first" and that therefore the victim "had it coming." Under the existing rule of evidence, the defendant is then permitted to introduce all sorts of evidence about the victim's past reputation for violence -- and hide the fact that the defendant's own past contains an even more violent record. This bill would fix the rule by permitting the prosecution to stand up for the victim, and to rebut these claims by introducing evidence of the defendant's own past violence.

A defendant who claims that the victim was the aggressor should not be able to hide behind Rule 404 to keep a jury from learning that the defendant has an even greater reputation for violence in the community. The most common "relevant character trait of the accused" contemplated in this proposed amendment to Rule of Evidence 404(a) is the accused's reputation for violence or aggression.

The changes proposed in this bill will help level the playing field for the state in its efforts to combat crime. I urge your favorable action on this bill.

FOR AN ACT ENTITLED

1 "An Act amending Alaska Rule of Evidence 404, relating to the admissibility of
2 certain character evidence in court proceedings."

3 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF ALASKA:

4 "Section 1. FINDINGS AND PURPOSE. The legislature finds that, in far too many cases
5 of sexual assault, attempted sexual assault, domestic violence, and child sexual abuse, Alaska's
6 victims are often themselves "put on trial" in the course of criminal proceedings. The
7 legislature further finds that the emotional trauma that such crime victims can suffer in the
8 criminal justice system can in some cases be nearly as traumatic as the crime itself. In an
9 effort to address these problems, the legislature finds that the amendments to Alaska Rule of
10 Evidence 404 made by this Act are necessary. First, the legislature finds that in cases of
11 domestic violence and other violent crimes in which the defendant claims that the victim was
12 the initial aggressor, an amendment is necessary to permit the prosecutor to rebut this claim
13 by introducing evidence of the defendant's own past violence. Second, in cases of child abuse
14 or child sexual abuse, a further amendment is essential to remove the confusion in some

1 Alaska courts caused by the unnecessary inclusion in Alaska Rule of Evidence 404(b)(2) of
2 the phrase "to show a common scheme or plan." Finally, in sexual assault and attempted
3 sexual assault cases in which the defendant claims that the victim voluntarily "consented" to
4 the sexual activity, further amendment is necessary to permit the prosecution to rebut this
5 claim by introducing evidence of other sexual assaults or attempted sexual assaults by the
6 defendant.

7 * Sec. 2. Alaska Rule of Evidence 404 is amended to read:

8 Rule 404. CHARACTER EVIDENCE NOT ADMISSIBLE TO PROVE
9 CONDUCT -- EXCEPTIONS -- OTHER CRIMES. (a) CHARACTER EVIDENCE
10 GENERALLY. Evidence of a person's character or a trait of his character is not
11 admissible for the purpose of proving that he acted in conformity therewith on a
12 particular occasion, except:

13 (1) Character of Accused. Evidence of a relevant trait of his character
14 offered by an accused, or by the prosecution to rebut the same;

15 (2) Character of Victim. Evidence of a relevant trait of character of
16 a victim of crime offered by an accused, or by the prosecution to rebut the same, or
17 evidence of a relevant character trait of an accused or of a character trait for
18 peacefulness of the victim offered by the prosecution in a [HOMICIDE] case to rebut
19 evidence that the victim was the first aggressor, subject to the following procedure:

20 (i) When a party seeks to admit the evidence for any purpose,

20 (ii) are similar to the offense charged; and

24 **attempt to commit sexual assault in any degree, evidence of other sexual assaults**
25 **or attempted sexual assaults by the defendant against the same or another person**
26 **is admissible if the defendant relies on a defense of consent.**

27 * Sec. 3. The provisions of secs. 1 and 2 of this Act take effect only if they receive the
28 two-thirds majority vote of each house required by art. IV, sec. 15, Constitution of the State
29 of Alaska.

ANALYSIS CONTINUATION:

This bill amends Alaska Rule of Evidence 404 in several important respects. First, the bill would help reduce the number of times a rape victim is "put on trial" by authorizing the admission into evidence of other sexual assaults by the defendant against the same or another person when the defendant relies on the defense of consent. A defendant who argues that the victim consented should not be able to hide behind Rule of Evidence 404(b) to keep the jury from learning that the defendant has assaulted other victims.

Second, with respect to sexual abuses or assaults against a minor, this bill removes from Rule of Evidence 404(b) confusing language -- "to show a common scheme or plan" -- that has been misinterpreted by several courts to exclude evidence meant to be allowed under the rule. The bill also specifies a 10-year time period as being not too remote for the admissibility of evidence of prior similar assaults or sexual abuse offenses committed by the defendant against minors.

Finally, this bill amends Rule of Evidence 404(a) to allow evidence of a defendant's reputation for aggression or violence when the defendant places the victim's character for violence in issue by claiming self-defense. A defendant who claims that the victim was the aggressor should not be able to hide behind Rule 404 to keep a jury from learning that the defendant has an even greater reputation for violence in the community.

Because the bill modifies the rules of evidence in a manner that will help level the playing field for state prosecutors, and does not add to or otherwise increase our workload, there will not be a fiscal impact.

Rape report

Statistics, attitudes need examination

Rape. It's an ugly word about an ugly subject. It's a crime that too many victims would rather not talk about. And it's a crime that's under-reported.

So says a survey by the National Victim Center in a rape report released Thursday.

The report's statistics are stark and unsettling:

One out of every eight American women has been raped.

84 percent of victims don't file a police report.

61 percent said they were age 17 or younger when they were raped.

Moreover, says the study, 4 out of 5 victims knew their attackers. And 3 out of 4 are fearful of being blamed by others for causing the rape.

The study, though, focuses solely on women as victims. Mary Western, director of education at Standing Together Against Rape, says she would rather see a "society against rapists" attitude instead of the usual "male pitted against female" precisely because men can be victims, too.

Clearly, society needs to change its attitudes toward rape victims.

In the case of marital rape, for example, husbands oftentimes see their wives as property. "How can I rape her, she's my wife?" is their argument. Attitudes are slowly changing, but a recent case involving a South Carolina couple may set back the clock for some.

That state's marital rape law allows testimony about the accuser's past sexual conduct, but not the defendant's. In the first test case, a jury acquitted a husband — who tied up his wife and taped her eyes and mouth — of marital rape.

It is such cases and such manipulation of law by mostly male legislators that give women (who make up the majority of accusers) pause.

When we examine our unspoken words and our unconscious attitudes about what constitutes rape and who is a victim, then we will have made progress that victims can build on. From there, they can grit their teeth and file that police report. If the accused is found and arrested, a case can be constructed. And if he or she is convicted, there's one less rapist looking for victims. And one less victim who feels powerless.

Dear Mr. President:

Under the authority of art. III, sec. 18, of the Alaska Constitution, I am transmitting a bill that generally makes confidential the addresses and telephone numbers of persons identified in registration records, titles, and documents maintained by the division of motor vehicles (DMV), Department of Public Safety. This information has been used by criminals to learn the residence address of a victim. Making this information generally confidential will help protect the public.

California passed nearly identical legislation after vehicle registration information was used in the notorious stalking murder of actress Rebecca Schaeffer in Los Angeles. Here in Alaska, a convicted murderer used DMV license plate information last year to identify the addresses of senior employees of a business before robbing them at gunpoint.

As it stands now, if the public, including a person planning a crime, knows the license plate of a particular car, DMV must release the name, address and telephone number of the car owner as a public record. In order to protect the public -- and in keeping with Alaska's tradition of protecting the privacy of its citizens -- the attached bill amends AS 28.05.061 to make the addresses and telephone numbers contained in DMV records confidential unless the requestor has a legitimate interest in the information, as determined under regulations adopted by the Department of Public Safety.

I urge your favorable action on this bill.

Gentlemen,

Good Morning. My name is Bill Quinn, and I am the Secretary of the Alaska Investigators Association. We represent some eighty (80) plus professionals state wide who regularly conduct or are party to investigatory matters. Many of our members are small business men and women. These individuals regularly utilize public records kept by the Department of Public Safety, Division of Motor Vehicles and other departments to locate individuals, serve subpoenas and summons, discover assets, and carry out other necessary, lawful actions and activities. I am here today to voice our opposition to Senate Bill 352.

The Alaska Investigators Association is opposed to this bill for a variety of reasons. If access to public records is restricted, some of our members expect reductions in their business income, as access to previously public information is restricted or even curtailed altogether. Members anticipate increased costs to comply with new regulations and processes created by DMV. Members expect new paperwork, delays, and heightened scrutiny to precede information retrieval. There is anticipation that if this bill passes, no matter how lenient any new regulations may be, practical access will be restricted and delayed solely because the likely hood of new state positions to service new processes and regulations is small, leaving DMV, already short staffed, with new chores, and no one to complete them.

Our members are legitimate business men and women. They pay state taxes, provide services to other businesses in Alaska, and in some cases, create jobs for fellow Alaskans. Our members have not misused or abused information they have procured from or by their access to State of Alaska public records. Our members have not knowingly participated in, assisted or enabled the information they have procured to be used illegally or for harm. There is no reason to prohibit or restrict the access of our members. There are other reasons AIA opposes this legislation, but these are better addressed by fellow officers and members who will testify today or contact you shortly. I thank you for your indulgence, and this opportunity to testify before your committee.

Gentlemen,

Good Morning, and I hope this finds you well.

As a private citizen of this great State of Alaska, I ask that you not support SB 352. This bill proposes to remedy social disfunction by limiting the rights and access of those who are not socially dysfunctional.

The provisions of this bill would reduce and possibly extinguish the access to public records by law abiding citizens. Why are we proposing to reduce lawful public access by law abiding citizens? If we are to inhibit the access of individuals who would stalk our fellow citizens, wouldn't it make sense to reduce the *access available to the supposed or alleged stalkers*? It is neither reasonable to place restrictions *on law abiding citizens and expect a reduction in criminal action*.

If this same logic had been applied when this state moved to reduce drunken driving, the driving public at large would have been denied drivers licenses after authorities discovered but a few citizens who had chosen to drive drunk. This logic is similar to determining which make of car drunk drivers prefer to drive when they are drunk, and then banning the sale and manufacture, and thus the access, to that particular make of automobile by all citizens in order to *reduce drunk driving*.

I suggest this. Our legal system allows possible and potential victims of domestic violence, stalking or other personal crimes to approach the courts and through ex parte motion, receive domestic violence orders (DVO). I suggest we use this process as an opportunity to reduce the alleged aggressors ability to utilize public information harmfully. Upon DVO issuance, the Court can concurrently notify DMV that the named individual can no longer access DMV's publicly held records. This restriction could be incorporated as a standard condition on all DVO's and other instruments of legal restraint.

We know this individual could attempt to coerce another to procure the restricted or forbidden information. If such information is so procured and used to harm or harass, it is my understanding this

body's recent passage of the conspiracy law will hold both the party procuring the information and the party using the information legally responsible for any resultant harm.

I ask that you increase or standardize the penalties for the misuse or *criminal use of public information*, not penalize law abiding, tax paying citizens by *reducing or restricting their access*. Legislation that restricts or reduces access to public information, **only penalizes law abiding citizens**. I am a law abiding citizen and I am weary of seeing my rights restricted or reduced in response to the actions of criminals. I am weary of seeing state spending, taxes and regulations increase as a solution to criminal activity. I am weary of seeing the openness of our society eroded one law at a time, because of the action of a few citizens, who neither appreciate or understand the benefits, strengths or joys of an accessible, free society. *Money will not cure crime. Laws cannot protect us from harm.*

I ask that you oppose this bill, and if necessary, propose legislation that *penalizes criminal access* and use of public information only.

This letter is to register my opposition to Senate Bill 352. This bill calls for making addresses confidential in the motor vehicle file. The bill also mentions making the phone number confidential, but DMV does not even have a space on the registration form for phone number. There is no phone number in the file to be made confidential.

For six years we have purchased the motor vehicle file and made it available on our Public Information Access System. Hundreds of companies and government agencies access the file daily. A common use of the motor vehicle file is to find addresses.

Attorneys need to find witnesses that have moved; title companys are required to search public files for the last known address of interested parties before foreclosing; towing companies need to notify owners/lienholders before auctioning impounded vehicles; larger companies want to make sure the car left overnight in their parking lot doesn't belong to the boss before they have it towed; community patrols send letters to owners of vehicles that stop at suspected drug houses; companies/government agencies use it to locate people that have bounced checks or not paid bills. These are some of the exceptions that DMV will have to allow for. DMV does not have the staff or the inclination to help people. The ten dollar fee to register a car in person was designed to keep people out of their office.

SENATE BILL 352 SHOULD BE REJECTED FOR THE FOLLOWING REASONS:

1. IT WILL NOT DISCOURAGE CRIMINAL ACTIVITY

This bill would make it harder for attorneys, process servers, investigators, banks, title companies and government agencies to perform their jobs. Criminal activity requires privacy. The way to discourage criminal activity is to increase the probability of them being caught.

A criminal at the DMV counter will not be instantly rehabilitated when he is denied the address. He can either choose another victim, or if he is stalking an acquaintance, locate the victim through a different method (friends, relatives, job site, phone directory).

2. PRIVACY WILL HINDER VICTIMS

This bill could prevent stalking victims from finding out in a timely manner who is following them.

3. COSTS WILL INCREASE TO DMV AND THE PUBLIC

If a criminal comes in with a plate number of someone he wants to victimize, he may lie to the clerk as to why he needs the information (some criminals are untruthful). Since there are so many valid reasons for needing the information, how would the requests be screened? Lie-Detectors? Stack of bibles?

DMV will need more clerks to screen information requests.

The civil process will become slower and more expensive.


4. THERE IS AN ALTERNATIVE

When a subscriber performs a lookup by plate number in our system, the transaction is logged and the subscriber is warned that the log file will be made available to any law enforcement agency that requests it.

It is my understanding that DMV makes no record of plate numbers that are requested. Checking identification and recording plate inquiries would discourage criminals. DMV could be doing this now.

Under the authority of art. III, sec. 18, of the Alaska Constitution, I am transmitting a bill relating to peremptory challenges of jurors in felony criminal proceedings. During jury selection for felony trials, such as for murder, sexual assault, domestic violence, or child abuse, peremptory challenges are used by both prosecutors and defense lawyers to remove potential jurors from the case in an effort to obtain a fair jury to hear the case. But current court rules allow criminal defendants to peremptorily challenge 10 jurors without stating a cause, while prosecutors are only permitted to challenge six on this basis. This difference in the court rules balances the scales unfairly, tilting jury selection in favor of criminal defendants.

This bill will amend Alaska Rule of Criminal Procedure 24(d) to give prosecutors and defendants the same number of peremptory challenges in jury trials in felony criminal cases. This bill will help level the playing field in criminal prosecutions when trying to pick a fair jury to hear a criminal case. Also, allowing both sides six peremptory challenges may reduce the cost of criminal trials by reducing the time needed for jury selection.

I urge your favorable action on this bill.

Under the authority of art. III, sec. 18, of the Alaska Constitution, I am transmitting a bill relating to certain study, publication, and reporting requirements by and to state agencies. The bill would eliminate certain reports and amend the frequency with which other reports are required to be made. The bill also relates to certain fees for reports by and to certain state agencies.

The bill would streamline the administration of state government by repealing the requirement for certain reports that study has revealed are unnecessary or duplicative. Additional efficiencies can be gained by changing the mandatory reporting period for certain other reports from annual to biennial in specified situations. All of these changes are primarily designed as cost-saving or efficiency measures. None of the changes would reduce the flow of information necessary to the effective execution of governmental responsibilities or the monitoring of executive branch activities by the legislature or the public.

Finally, some of the reports duplicate information already submitted as part of the state budget process. Savings will result through more efficient use of state personnel formerly assigned to the production of these reports.

This bill is good for efficient government, and I urge your consideration and support of it.

I want to correct and clarify information provided in today's Senate State Affairs Committee hearing on SB 357.

Regarding Section 11 amending AS 24.45.031(a) to require the APOC report of activities be done biennially instead of annually:

Contrary to my testimony, this report has not been published for several years due to lack of staff. Since staff reductions made it impossible to fulfill all statutory reporting requirements, the focus of the Commission has been to maintain the more critical reports to the public including the quarterly Summary of Lobbying Activity report and the Directory of Lobbyists, which is published early each session with updates throughout the session as needed. General activities of the Commission are reported to the Legislature during the operating budget deliberations.

The Commission is hopeful that it could meet a biennial requirement even with reduced staffing levels.

Regarding the repeal of AS 39.50.050(d) which requires APOC to publish all conflict of interest reports filed to assist those who must file under this chapter in preparation of their reports:


The intent of this section was apparently to assist lobbyists in preparing their reports. Although available to anyone, this report was not intended for public use. The Commission has not been able to comply with this requirement for many years and it has not appeared to have been missed.

Bill Analysis

This bill is the result of a study in which all agencies were requested to review reporting requirements with intent toward streamlining administration of state government.

All of the changes proposed in this bill are primarily designed as cost-savings measures. Several sections of the legislation pertain specifically to Department of Revenue.

AS 43.20.014(c) is amended to eliminate the Department's annual reporting requirements to the Legislative Budget and Audit Committee (LB&A) on education credits claimed by corporation net income taxpayers. This information will be available in annual operations reports issued by Income and Excise Audit Division.

AS 43.65.018(c) is amended to eliminate annual reporting requirements by the Department to LB&A on education credits claimed by mining license taxpayers. This information will be available in annual operations reports issued by Income and Excise Audit Division.

AS 43.75.018(c) is amended to eliminate annual reporting requirements by the Department to LB&A on education credits claimed by fisheries business taxpayers. This information will be available in annual operations reports issued by Income and Excise Audit Division.

AS 43.05.010(5) repealed to eliminate annual reporting requirements to governor and legislature concerning the condition, operation and functioning of the department. This information is available in the Department's budget documents submitted to the legislature.

AS 43.55.019(c) is amended to eliminate annual reporting requirements by the Department to LB&A on education credits claimed by oil & gas production taxpayers. This information will be available in annual operations reports issued by Income & Excise Audit Division.

AS 43.50.360 is repealed to eliminate reporting requirements to the governor and the legislature by the Department concerning cigarette and tobacco taxes collected. This information is available in annual operations reports issued by Income & Excise Audit Division and in the Department's *Revenue Sources* publication.

Operating Costs

Savings as a result of eliminating annual reporting requirements will be redirected toward other projects. Savings will result through more efficient use of personnel formerly assigned to production of these reports.

Section 29. of the proposed legislation, impacts AIDEA, under AS 44.88.210, REPORTS AND PUBLICATIONS. The amendments under Sec.29 of the proposed legislation should not be included in a bill going to the Legislature for introduction. As the Alaska Industrial Development and Export Authority is a public corporation of the State of Alaska having outstanding and ongoing fiduciary responsibilities, the reporting requirements under AS 44.88.210, should remain as currently established. Specifically, because AIDEA is required under certain legal and financial contractual agreements such as bond covenants, and to other outside entities, such as bond rating agencies, to annually publish an audited financial statement, the Authority's statement of investments and other pertinent financial information, the proposed amendments to AS 44.88.210 are not recommended. Continuing to report on an annual basis would not provide for a fiscal impact.

Only Section 1 of the bill amending AS 05.05.030(a) affects the State Athletic Commission by amending the reporting requirement of studying semi-professional and professional athletic programs of the State from annually to biennially in even-numbered years. 

Fiscal impact for FY95 is 0. If enacted, this legislation would eliminate certain reports and amend the frequency with which other reports are required to be made.

Sections 24, 25 and 35 specifically affect the Division of Information Services. In 1988, the division combined the various statutorily required, telecommunications-related reports under one cover. In 1990, SLA 1990, Chapter 134 reduced reporting requirements from an annual to a biennial basis. Subsequently, the Division combined all statutorily required reports under the Division's agency information management plan required under AS44.19.504 (a) (2). Since no change is proposed for AS 44.19.504 (a) (2) the agency information management plan is still required.

Section 35 also eliminates AS 44.19.504 (a) (4), which is the requirement for an annual report for the Telecommunications Information Council (TIC). The Division of Information Services prepared the 1993 annual report on behalf of the TIC at a nominal cost.


