**Commissioner Glenn G. Godfrey**

Governor Tony Knowles appointed Glenn G. Godfrey to the position of Commissioner of Public Safety on August 23, 2000. Godfrey, who had served as Director of the Division of Alaska State Troopers since January 1995, is the first Alaska Native to hold this position.

Godfrey was born and raised in Kodiak. He began his law enforcement career by attending the Public Safety Training Academy in Sitka. After completing the Academy in 1970, he served in posts in Anchorage from 1970-1972, followed by four years in Juneau and Northway. While assigned to the post in Northway, Godfrey was responsible for drug enforcement along the Canadian border and for patrols in neighboring villages.

In 1978, while he was assigned to Bethel post, he was promoted to First Sergeant, Lieutenant, and then Detachment Commander in 1981. In Bethel, his "beat" was all of western Alaska. It was during his time Bethel that he was instrumental in the development of the Village Public Safety Officer program, which often provides the first law enforcement response in rural Alaskan villages.

In 1983, Godfrey returned to Anchorage Headquarters, and while in Headquarters, he was put in charge of the VPSO program, search and rescue, and the Special Emergency Reaction Team. He served as chief of Rural Enforcement, Deputy Director, and finally Director of the Alaska State Troopers.

Commissioner Godfrey is a graduate of the Southern Police Institute in Louisville, Kentucky. He is a member of the Alaska Police Officers Association, the Alaska Association of Chiefs of Police, the Fraternal Order of Alaska State Troopers, the International Association of Chiefs of Police, Commonwealth North, and serves as chairman of the Koniag Corporation, the ANCSA Corporation of Kodiak. Last fall, the Alaska Federation of Natives named Godfrey as its "Citizen of the Year."


Honorable Senators and Representative:

Please find enclosed evidence that Mr. Glenn Godfrey, in his capacity as Chairman of the Board of Koniag, Inc., an Alaska Native Regional Corporation, committed perjury in the course of litigation brought by the Corporation against six (6) of its shareholders. This evidence was submitted to the Attorney General's Office by one of Koniag's directors previously and after review the Office of Special Prosecutions declined prosecution. I strongly feel that the decision was political as several private attorneys have reviewed the evidence and have found it conclusive. I have re-submitted the evidence attached to Attorney General Bruce Botelho in hopes that he will review it personally and act in the interest of justice.

It is my understanding that Mr. Godfrey, having been appointed as the Commissioner of Public Safety by Governor Knowles, will be subject to confirmation hearings in the Legislature. I respectfully request that Mr. Godfrey be placed under oath and be required to explain why what is so carefully documented here is, in fact, not perjury. The position to which Mr. Godfrey has been appointed is an office of the highest integrity and honor. I believe that neither you, the honorable Senators and Representatives of this State or the citizens of this State want a person occupying that office who has made repeated false and contradictory false statements under oath. That surely would be a disgrace.

Thank you in advance for your time and attention to this serious matter.

Dear Representative Coghill:

A business commitment prevents my full attendance at the confirmation hearing for the Commissioner of the Department of Administration scheduled for tomorrow morning at 8:00am, so I am writing you on an issue I would otherwise testify about. In particular, I would like to understand Mr. Duncan's views related to Alaska hire and contracting with Alaskan companies for State funded work related to North Slope gas development.

By way of introduction, I am a three decade resident of Alaska and past President of Arco Alaska. I served as Commissioner of Natural Resources in the Hickel Administration: so I have a good understanding of the broad public policy responsibilities of a Commissioner, as well as, the importance of the confirmation responsibility of the Legislature.

I am a self-employed consultant and in November of 2000 responded to a Request For Proposal (IRFP 2001-03) issued by the Alaska Oil & Gas Conservation Commission (the AOGCC is part of the Dept. of Administration). This was a modest (under \$20 k in 3 months) contract for scoping work related to changing the Prudhoe Bay Field rules to allow gas sales (an very important item for any of the gas projects). My proposal was the low bid, and despite being qualified and responsive, the work was awarded to a Californian in a split evaluation.

Governor Knowles in his speech of 11/17/2000 said "It is clear to me that a gas project must insure the maximum employment of Alaskans, use of Alaskan businesses, ....". In accomplishing a major policy objective like North Slope gas development it seems to me the State would want to demonstrate to the private sector positive, rather than negative, examples of its expectations on Alaska hire. The Department of Administration provides the leadership throughout State government on issues related to hiring and contracting.

Would you please give Mr. Duncan a chance on the record to express his views in these areas related to my contracting experience.

- Is hiring Alaskans and the use of Alaskan contractors an important element of the Knowles Administration's decision on North Slope gas development projects?
- Should the State set positive examples related to Alaska hire and use of Alaskan contractors in all State managed work related to gas development?
- Does the Department of Administration have any leadership role in Alaskanizing the State's gas development work?
  - + and if so, how would Mr. Duncan if confirmed as Commissioner provide that leadership?
  - + and if so, what policy direction would he provide within his own Department and to other portions of the Executive branch?

Thank you for the opportunity to express myself as part of the Legislative process.

## MEMORANDUM

**SUBJECT:** Ending dates for terms on various boards and commissions (Work Order No. 22-LS0553)

You have submitted a January 29, 2001, list of the governor's appointees to various boards and commissions that are subject to legislative confirmation by this legislature. The list specifies expiration dates for the terms involved. You have asked, in light of the general March 1 expiration date set under AS 39.05.053, whether there is statutory authority for any of the expiration dates to be anything other than March 1.

You correctly point out that the general rule on expiration of the terms of confirmable members of boards and commissions is found in AS 39.05.053, which reads:

**Sec. 39.05.053. Terms of office.** The term of office of a position or membership ends on March 1 of the year when the position's or membership's term expires *except as otherwise provided in a law relating to positions or memberships on a specific board or commission.* (Emphasis added.)

In addition, the transitional provisions of sec. 21, ch. 80, SLA 1996, provided that all terms of office existing at that time would be re-set to have March 1 expiration dates.

Therefore, unless a law relating to a specific board or commission provides a different result, the statutes provide that all terms of confirmable members of boards and commissions expire on March 1 of the year in which the term of office ends.

I have reviewed the Alaska Statutes and have found only the following statutory exceptions to the March 1 rule:

### **Board of Regents**

Non-student members: first Monday in February. See AS 14.40.140.  
Student member: June 1. See AS 14.40.150(b).

**Alaska Commission on Postsecondary Education**

Student member: June 1. See AS 14.42.015(3).

**Board of Fisheries**

All members: July 1. See AS 16.05.221(d).

As you can see, there are very few statutory exceptions to the March 1 rule. At this point in time, I see no statutory basis for terms expiring at any time other than March 1 unless the position is described in the above list.

Furthermore, I would note for your attention that the terms of office for the members of the Board of Education and Early Development are set as March 1 not only under the general rule in AS 39.05.053, but are set as March 1 under the board's own statute. See AS 14.07.095.

BIOGRAPHICAL SKETCH -

**Commissioner Glenn G. Godfrey**

Governor Tony Knowles appointed Glenn G. Godfrey to the position of Commissioner of Public Safety on August 23, 2000. Godfrey, who had served as Director of the Division of Alaska State Troopers since January 1995, is the first Alaska Native to hold this position.

Godfrey was born and raised in Kodiak. He began his law enforcement career by attending the Public Safety Training Academy in Sitka. After completing the Academy in 1970, he served in posts in Anchorage from 1970-1972, followed by four years in Juneau and Northway. While assigned to the post in Northway, Godfrey was responsible for drug enforcement along the Canadian border and for patrols in neighboring villages.

In 1978, while he was assigned to Bethel post, he was promoted to First Sergeant, Lieutenant, and then Detachment Commander in 1981. In Bethel, his "beat" was all of western Alaska. It was during his time Bethel that he was instrumental in the development of the Village Public Safety Officer program, which often provides the first law enforcement response in rural Alaskan villages.

In 1983, Godfrey returned to Anchorage Headquarters, and while in Headquarters, he was put in charge of the VPSO program, search and rescue, and the Special Emergency Reaction Team. He served as chief of Rural Enforcement, Deputy Director, and finally Director of the Alaska State Troopers.

Commissioner Godfrey is a graduate of the Southern Police Institute in Louisville, Kentucky. He is a member of the Alaska Police Officers Association, the Alaska Association of Chiefs of Police, the Fraternal Order of Alaska State Troopers, the International Association of Chiefs of Police, Commonwealth North, and serves as chairman of the Koniag Corporation, the ANCSA Corporation of Kodiak. Last fall, the Alaska Federation of Natives named Godfrey as its "Citizen of the Year."

It is my understanding that Jim Duncan must appear before Rep. Coghill's committee prior to his confirmation as Commissioner Department of Administration. In that role he is and will be responsible for fair and thorough examination of evidence before issuing a decision or determination on contracts and appeals.

You have submitted a January 29, 2001, list of the governor's appointees to various boards and commissions that are subject to legislative confirmation by this legislature. The list specifies expiration dates for the terms involved. You have asked, in light of the general March 1 expiration date set under AS 39.05.053, whether there is statutory authority for any of the expiration dates to be anything other than March 1.

You correctly point out that the general rule on expiration of the terms of confirmable members of boards and commissions is found in AS 39.05.053, which reads:

**Sec. 39.05.053. Terms of office.** The term of office of a position or membership ends on March 1 of the year when the position's or membership's term expires *except as otherwise provided in a law relating to positions or memberships on a specific board or commission.* (Emphasis added.)

In addition, the transitional provisions of sec. 21, ch. 80, SLA 1996, provided that all terms of office existing at that time would be re-set to have March 1 expiration dates.

Therefore, unless a law relating to a specific board or commission provides a different result, the statutes provide that all terms of confirmable members of boards and commissions expire on March 1 of the year in which the term of office ends.

I have reviewed the Alaska Statutes and have found only the following statutory exceptions to the March 1 rule:



**Sec. 14.07.095.** Term of office. The members of the board shall be appointed for overlapping five-year terms commencing on the March 1 following the date of the member's appointment. Except as provided in AS 39.05.080(4), a member appointed to fill a vacancy serves for the unexpired term of the member whose vacancy is filled. A vacancy occurring during a term of office is filled in the same manner as the original appointment.

**Sec. 14.40.140.** Term of office. Except for a student regent as specified in AS 14.40.150(b), the term of office of a regent is eight years. The term of office begins on the first Monday in February of the year in which the appointment is made. Each regent serves until a successor is appointed and qualifies.

**AS 14.40.150(b).** At least one member of the Board of Regents must be a student. The student shall be appointed from a list of nominees submitted to the governor. The governor shall make the appointment from the list within 60 days after it is submitted. The list shall consist of the names of two students from each campus of the University of Alaska after an election is held at each campus. Elections shall be conducted under rules established by the Office of the Governor. The term of office of the regent appointed from the general student body, University of Alaska, is for two years. The term of office begins June 1 of the year in which the appointment is made. An appointment made under AS 14.40.130(d) shall be for the unexpired term of the original appointee. The term "campus" used in this subsection means a portion of the University of Alaska designated as a "campus" by the Board of Regents.

**AS 14.42.015(e).** A full-time postsecondary student shall be appointed to the Alaska Commission on Postsecondary Education from a list of nominees submitted to the governor. The governor shall make the appointment from the list within 60 days after it is submitted. The list must consist of the names of two nominees from Alaska Pacific University, two nominees from Sheldon Jackson College, and two nominees from each campus of the University of Alaska. The nominees shall be selected by the students at Alaska Pacific University, Sheldon Jackson College, and each campus of the University of Alaska by an election held on each campus. Elections under this subsection shall be held concurrently with student regent elections required under AS 14.40.150(b) and conducted under rules established by the Office of the Governor. The term of office of the student member of the commission is two years and begins June 1 of the year in which the appointment is made. Membership on the commission is immediately forfeited by a student member who ceases to be a full-time student. Within 60 days after a vacancy occurs, the governor shall appoint a successor from those students appearing on the list of nominees to serve for the unexpired term of the original appointee. The term "campus" used in this subsection means a portion of the University of Alaska designated as a "campus" by the Board of Regents.

**AS 16.05.221(d).** Members of the Board of Fisheries serve staggered terms of three years. The terms of members of the board begin on July 1. Notwithstanding AS 39.05.080(1), by April 1 of the calendar year in which the term expires, the governor shall appoint a person to fill the vacancy that will arise on the board due to expiration of the term of a member of the board and submit the name of the person to the legislature

for confirmation. If a vacancy arises on the board, the governor shall, within 30 days after the vacancy arises, appoint a person to serve the balance of the unexpired term and submit the name of the person to the legislature for confirmation. A person appointed to fill the balance of an unexpired term shall serve on the board from the date of appointment until the earlier of the expiration of the term or the failure of the legislature to confirm the person under AS 39.05.080.
