I am writing to support legislative bills HB434 and SB 306, both titled "An act relating to the practice of naturopathic medicine."

As a pharmacist and naturopathic physician, I taught pharmacology at the Southwest College of Naturopathic Medicine in Tempe, Arizona and wrote pharmacology test questions for the naturopathic board exam. I also created the original formulary used in Arizona and later used in Oregon, which included drugs derived from natural sources. As an instructor, I taught students to thoroughly research the warnings and precautions of each drug they prescribed, so they were aware of the possible harm they might cause to their patients. The test questions I wrote required knowledge of pharmacology necessary to protect the public safety. The formulary system, which I have had to practice under, is antiquated and actually has a negative effect on public safety. The formulary forces naturopathic physicians to choose less than optimal drugs over more effective newer medications.

As a provider, I know that naturopathic physicians, like MDs, regularly prescribe a handful of drugs with which they are quite familiar. Unlike medical doctors, naturopathic physicians prescribe medications as a last resort, treat fewer patients each day, and are less likely to place individuals on multiple drug regimens, which lead to interactions and complications. As general practice physicians seeing fewer patients on a daily basis, naturopathic doctors have much more time to research the consequences of drug therapy than do their MD or DO colleagues.

In Oregon, where I practice, medical care has been shifted to nurse practitioners with less education than naturopathic physicians. It is irrational for trained primary care physicians to be limited to non-drug therapies at a time when access to quality health care is becoming scarce. Consequently, I support legislation that allows naturopathic physicians to practice commensurate with their education and to the full scope of their training. Please support this Bill.

## House Bill 449 Sponsor Statement

The Southeast and Gulf of Alaska (SEAGA) gas project will bring the benefits of gas utility service to the people and communities of Southeast Alaska and the Gulf of Alaska. On December 31, 1998 Alaska Intrastate Gas Company was granted Certificates of Public Convenience and Necessity by the Alaska Public Utilities Commission, now the Regulatory Commission of Alaska, to provide regulated gas utility service to homes and businesses in the unified municipalities of Juneau and Sitka, the boroughs of Haines, Ketchikan, Kodiak, and Yakutat, the cities of Angoon, Cordova, Craig, Kake, Klawock, Petersburg, Skagway, Valdez, and Wrangell, and the communities of Klukwan and Metlakatla. Gas utility service to these boroughs, cities and communities will be initiated in 2004 and completed by 2009. In the first two years gas utility service will be initiated in Juneau, Ketchikan, Sitka, and Wrangell, and then expanded rapidly to cover the remaining communities. The overall cost to bring gas utility service to these 17 communities will exceed \$100,000,000. The project will result in over 200 jobs during construction, and more than 35 permanent full time jobs within the region.

The project is based on the bulk movement of liquefied natural and petroleum gases by barge and/or ship throughout the service area. The utility gas is stored in each community as a liquid until needed. It is then regasified and distributed via buried pipeline to utility customers on demand. Gas supplies will initially be obtained from Canadian sources and shipped from the Port of Prince Rupert, BC, Canada. However, after initiation of gas utility service in the first four communities, utility service will transition to both Canadian and Alaskan gas supplies as additional communities are brought on line.

The AIDEA Development Finance Program focuses on the development, ownership, and operation of facilities within Alaska such as roads, ports and utilities which are essential to the economic well-being of an area; are financially feasible; and are supported by the communities in which they are located. The legislature must approve any project over \$10,000,000. AIDEA must be given this approval in order to consider assisting with financing any communities within the SEAGA Gas Project or those that may wish to join in the future. House Bill 449 provides legislative approval for AIDEA to evaluate the SEAGA Gas Project as required by AS 44.88.095(g). If AIDEA decides to move forward with project financing for any of the communities, this bill places a limit of \$76,000,000 on the amount of bonding provided to the project. HB 449 provides a sunset date of July 1, 2009, for issuing bonds for this project.

Project running out of time

Propane-air company continues to have problems starting up in Alaska

The Regulatory Commission of Alaska has granted its third extension in less than three years to a company working to bring natural gas to coastal communities, but also has ordered the company to show cause why its operating certificate should not be revoked.

"It is not in the public interest to continue to extend Alaska Intrastate Gas Co.'s conditional certificate without evidence there is a reasonable expectation that the AIGC project will be completed," the commission said in its Feb. 24 order.

The regulatory agency granted the original certificate more than five years ago.

The company also is having to deal with a consultant's report that says the project could be a money-loser unless it can find a low-cost propane supply.

Alaska Intrastate's plan is to ship liquid propane by barge into coastal communities, store it as a liquid, then gasify and mix it with air for distribution through a network of underground pipes it would build in each community. At the right price, the gas could be competitive with diesel fuel for heating and electrical generation.

So-called propane-air systems are used in small Lower 48 communities not connected to natural gas pipelines.

It comes down to the price of the propane supply, the consultant report said. "The propane supply is the most critical variable in the success of this project," said the report by Montana-Dakota Utilities Co. "Propane prices over 30 cents per gallon have the potential to negate any potential earnings."

That could be a tough number to overcome, said the report, which was released last month. "At the time of this report, Montana-Dakota has not been able to identify a reliable source of propane at costs less than

47 cents per gallon at Edmonton.”

Propane for April delivery was selling for 58 cents a gallon March 16 on the New York Mercantile Exchange futures market. The price averaged 50 cents a gallon at the Edmonton, Alberta, pricing point the second week of March, with delivery to Puget Sound an additional 17 cents to 19 cents.

The consultants suggested perhaps Alaska Intrastate could make its 30-cent price threshold if it could buy half its propane from the state of Alaska royalty share at Valdez at just 20 cents a gallon and match that supply with an equal volume out of Canada at 40 cents a gallon.

Even if it could get propane delivered to Juneau for 61 cents a gallon, the company's internal rate of return over 40 years — using low prices to win customers — would be just 3.5 percent, the consultants said. With higher rates to customers, the “aggressive model” shows an 8.45 percent return.

Meanwhile, with six months before its deadline to prove to the regulatory commission that it should keep its operating certificate, Alaska Intrastate is trying to convince the Legislature to authorize the Alaska Industrial Development and Export Authority to issue up to \$76 million in state bonding for the project.

The measure, House Bill 449, had its first hearing and moved out of committee March 16, but it could be hard to push the bill through two more House committees, the full House and also Senate committees in the final seven weeks of the legislative session.

“I'm not exactly happy at how things have moved,” Frank Avezac, board chairman of Alaska Intrastate, said last month. It's up to the Legislature and governor “~~to have the balls~~” to pass the bill and show investors the state is serious about helping the project, he said in a February interview.

Avezac, an accountant by trade, in 1986 transformed his Anchorage real estate company into the envisioned gas distribution business, and has been working ever since to put together the deal.

Alaska Intrastate applied to the state utility regulatory agency in 1997 to barge liquefied natural gas to as many as 17 Alaska coastal communities, then later amended its application to serve the cities with a propane-air mixture, also called utility gas. The company later scaled back his plan to start with service to Juneau, Ketchikan and Sitka in Southeast Alaska, pledging to add more communities in later years.

With a propane supply at the right price, the company believes it could bring gas to the communities and pipe it around town at a lower cost than diesel fuel or electricity for residential and commercial uses.

“Gas utility service ... will be initiated in 2004,” Avezac said in a Feb. 16 letter to legislators, pushing for passage of HB 449 that would allow AIDEA to bond for the system. Avezac made no mention in his letter to lawmakers of the company's pending request to the regulatory commission for a delay in the start-up date until December 2005.

Regardless of what happens to the legislation, the company has to meet two deadlines from the Regulatory Commission of Alaska:

- Sept. 15, 2004, to show cause why the commission should not revoke Alaska Intrastate's certificate to operate as a natural gas public utility. The commission wants to see a current business plan, management structure and proof that the company has the ability to start service. The commission delayed action on the company's request for a December 2005 start-up deadline.

- Dec. 31, 2004, to show proof of financial fitness and permanent financing for the venture.

The company had faced a Dec. 31, 2003, deadline for proof of financial fitness. In its mid-December filing to extend that date until December 2004, Alaska Interstate partially blamed the Legislature and the administration for the delay.

It said legislation introduced last year, House Bill 235, would have allowed for state bonding to assist the project. "(It) received strong support from both Democrats and Republicans," the company said in its filing with the regulatory commission. Work on the bill ceased when Alaska Intrastate turned its attention to different bond financing "promised by the Department of Revenue," the company said.

Despite the company's claim of strong bipartisan support, not a single legislator signed on to co-sponsor HB 235, introduced by freshman Rep. Bruce Weyhrauch, R-Juneau, and the bill never had a single hearing. The measure would have authorized the Alaska Railroad Corp. to use its bonding authority to issue \$76 million in debt for the propane-air venture, with Alaska Intrastate to assume sole financial responsibility for repaying the debt.

And a Department of Revenue official denies there ever was a promise of bond financing. "We gave Paul Fuhs a copy of the application," said Tom Boutin, deputy commissioner at Revenue. Fuhs, a paid lobbyist in the past on natural gas issues, is not listed with the state as a lobbyist for Alaska Intrastate.

The application was for the issuance of private-activity bonds through the state, Boutin said. "We told them there was plenty of private-activity allocation to go around," but Alaska Intrastate would need to get a bond counsel opinion as to whether its project could qualify for the tax-exempt financing, he said.

Boutin said he had no further financing discussions with the company, which never submitted an application to the state bond committee.

In its filing with the regulatory commission, Alaska Intrastate said it later determined it would not qualify for the tax-exempt, private-activity bonds. "The avenue that the administration had promised did not appear feasible," it said.

The company told the regulatory commission in December its new plan was to develop other sources of financing, at 80 percent debt with 20 percent equity.

But Alaska Intrastate's consultant, Montana-Dakota Utilities, pointed to a potential problem with that plan. "Montana-Dakota's experience has been to limit utility operations to a 50 percent equity," it said in its report. "Further, as a start-up utility, it is prudent to construct the first community using 100 percent equity financing." After starting operations and generating revenue, "debt financing will become more readily available and more prudent."

As for raising equity to build the system, Alaska Intrastate told the regulatory commission it was working closely with Montana-Dakota "concerning an equity position," and that the utility company's management was prepared "(to) ask its board for a commitment of up to \$5 million, a 10 percent equity position."

That statement differs from what Montana-Dakota's spokesman reported as the company's role in the venture. "We were never involved in it from investing," said Dan Sharp, spokesman for the Bismarck, N.D., oil, gas, electricity and construction material company. He said the company's only role was to prepare the market and economic feasibility report under contract to Alaska Intrastate.

Montana-Dakota is not new to Alaska. It owns Alaska Basic Industries, which owns Anchorage Sand and Gravel Co., one of the largest aggregate suppliers in the state.

In another financing issue, Alaska Industrial Development and Export Authority Executive Director Ron Miller in a Dec. 24 letter to the regulatory commission questioned Alaska Intrastate's representation of its dealings with the state agency.

"AIGC's memorandum in support of its extension request implies that the Alaska Industrial Development and Export Authority may consider financing of the project under its development finance program. ... We have indicated to AIGC on previous occasions that the proposed project does not appear to fit within the development finance program," Miller said.

Letters from AIDEA officials in 2001 and 1999 also stated the project would not meet the agency's criteria for development finance program lending.

"There were some claims ... that mischaracterized our programs and our potential role and our history in the project," Miller said last month.

The Regulatory Commission of Alaska also received several letters in support of Alaska Intrastate's request for another year to prove its financial fitness, including letters from Jim Sampson, president of the Alaska AFL-CIO; Alaska House Speaker Pete Kott and Senate President Gene Therriault; and Michael Gallagher, business manager of Laborers' International Union Local 341 in Alaska.

U.S. Sen. Ted Stevens, R-Alaska, also sent in a letter of support, adding, "We have been unable, so far, to obtain Federal funds to assist AIGC."

Dear Representative Harris:

Your staff asked about Alaska Industrial Development and Export Authority's (AIDEA) history of involvement with the gas project proposed by Alaska Intrastate Gas Company (AIGC) and our response to the introduction of HB 449. AIDEA's introduction to the proposed AIGC project was in 1999, and since that time we have been working with AIGC to determine if there is a role for AIDEA and what that role might be. As explained below, HB 449 is a bond authorization that AIDEA would not expect to use in support of AIGC's project.

AIDEA supports economic development in Alaska through 3 programs: loan participation, development finance and conduit revenue bonds. AIDEA's maximum participation in a bank-originated loan is 90% up to \$20 million. The program requires bank participation and, at least, a 25% investment by the borrower. AIGC's project does not qualify for a loan participation because the amount of financing AIGC is seeking is in excess of the loan program's limits of \$20 million and because AIGC has no collateral with which to secure a loan.

Under our development finance program, AIDEA "owns and operates" infrastructure directly related to economic activity; e.g., the DeLong Mountain Transportation System supporting the Red Dog Mine and the Federal Express Maintenance Facility at the Ted Stevens Anchorage International Airport. AIDEA recovers lease payments or user fees under an operating or use agreement with the project developer. AIDEA enters into these projects if we determine that AIDEA can add value by lowering the costs of project financing. This is accomplished, generally, through AIDEA issuance of tax-exempt general obligation or revenue bonds that provide the funds for AIDEA's investment.

We determined early in our discussions with AIGC that their project did not appear suitable for financing under the development finance program since the project was not expected to qualify for tax-exempt financing, AIDEA's "ownership" of the project assets under the development finance program did not bring any additional benefit to the project and because we could not consider using Authority funds to assume any of the developer's risk since there was no collateral, or other security, in place to pay off bonds in case AIGC's business foundered.

We have informed AIGC on several occasions that if there was a role for AIDEA, it would be under our conduit revenue bond program, whereby AIDEA would be the issuer of taxable

conduit revenue bonds. Under this program, neither the assets nor credit of AIDEA is at risk. Under this program, the project developer, normally, is responsible for finding an underwriter to purchase the bonds. AIGC has not yet brought an underwriter to AIDEA, nor have they filed an application requesting a conduit revenue bond issue.

We sent letters to AIGC on September 30, 1999 and on June 15, 2001 explaining our position regarding their proposed project. Copies of both letters are enclosed.

HB 449 authorizes AIDEA to issue bonds in a principal amount not to exceed \$76,000,000 to finance AIGC's proposed project. AS 44.88.095(g) requires legislative approval before AIDEA can issue bonds in excess of \$10,000,000 to finance a project under our development finance program. Since AIDEA's initial assessment is that AIGC's project does not qualify for the development finance program and since our conduit revenue bond program does not require legislative authorization, HB 449 is a bond authorization we would not expect to use. We have conveyed this to AIGC on several occasions. Please call me at 269-3050 if you have any questions on this, or any other AIDEA matter.

The purpose of this letter is to clarify some of the information presented in AIGC's request of December 18, 2003 for an extension of time to demonstrate evidence of its financial fitness and permanent financing. AIDEA has a long history of discussions with AIGC on its proposal and is providing this letter for clarification purposes only. We take no position on whether the extension should be granted.

AIGC's memorandum in support of its extension request implies that the Alaska Industrial Development and Export Authority (AIDEA) may consider financing of this project under its Development Finance Program, incorrectly referred to in the memorandum as the "Development Resources Program." We have indicated to AIGC on previous occasions that the proposed project does not appear to fit within the development finance program. (See attachments)

We have also expressed to AIGC that AIDEA would consider possible assistance under our Conduit Revenue Bond Program, whereby AIDEA is the issuer of bonds and neither its credit nor assets are at risk (see attachments). Under the conduit bond program, the bondholders may only look to project revenues and any credit enhancement provided for the bonds. Our initial determination is that this project would not qualify for tax-exempt bonds, therefore, if conduit bonds were issued, they would be on a taxable basis.

AIGC's memorandum also creates the impression that HB 236 still provides for authorization of issuance of bonds by AIDEA, when in fact the Senate Resources Committee replaced HB 236 with a committee substitute that removed the authorization language and replaced it with language relating to a study by AIDEA of the feasibility of the project.

The memorandum further states that AIDEA introduced AIGC to two underwriters, R.B.C. Dain Rauscher and G.K. Baum. For clarification, G.K. Baum was not one of the two underwriters introduced by AIDEA. Additionally, the statement in the memorandum that G.K. Baum would work with AIDEA on any "government bonds" is inaccurate since any bonds AIDEA would potentially issue for the AIGC project would be taxable conduit bonds which are not backed by the moral obligation of any government entity. We are unclear as to what is meant by the term "government bonds."

AIGC also states the Legislature may still move a bill to authorize issuance of "governmental bonds" by AIDEA. Bonds in excess of \$10,000,000 issued under our Development Finance Program require legislative authorization, but, as stated earlier, AIDEA has determined that the AIGC project does not appear to fit under that program and we have only considered possible assistance to AIGC under our Conduit Revenue Bond program which does not require legislative authorization.

The Alaska Industrial Development and Export Authority (AIDEA) has reviewed the documents you provided us on your proposed Southeast Alaska gas delivery and distribution project as well as the additional project information you have brought to our attention in recent discussions. The purpose of our review was to determine if there is a useful and acceptable role for AIDEA in helping to finance the project.

Unfortunately, our analysis of this project indicates that it is not well suited to take advantage of AIDEA's financing programs because it will only be eligible for taxable financing. The following discussion will outline why we believe this is the case. However, we remain of the belief that this project could significantly help reduce the cost of energy for Southeast Alaskans living in the communities your project targets. AIDEA can be of assistance to you in pursuing conventional (private sector) revenue bond financing, and we stand ready to assist you where we can in helping AIGC successfully move through this process.

#### Summary of Project Concept

As you have described it, the project would initially deliver propane to Juneau, Sitka, and Ketchikan. As demand grows and the system expands to other communities, LNG would replace propane as the primary delivered fuel. Project facilities would consist of (1) new docks in Southeast Alaska communities for fuel delivery, (2) fuel storage and LNG gasification facilities at the dock sites, and (3) new pipeline distribution systems to deliver the gas to retail customers. Barge transportation of propane and LNG from the wholesale suppliers to the new dock facilities would be arranged by lease.

Your company has an unidentified partner who would finance and own the first two components of the project - the new docks, fuel storage, and gasification facilities - at an estimated cost of \$16 million. The third component - the pipeline distribution network - is estimated to cost \$50 million and it is for this component that you seek AIDEA financing assistance.

#### AIDEA Financing Alternatives

There are essentially three programs under which AIDEA can provide financing assistance for development projects: (1) loan participation, (2) development finance, and (3) conduit revenue bond.

Under the loan participation program, AIDEA is contacted by an eligible financial institution that has already approved a loan subject to AIDEA's participation. With adequate security and compliance with other program conditions, AIDEA can purchase up to 80% of that loan, not to exceed \$10 million. Your project does not fit the loan participation model as no financial institution has approached us with a proposal that meets these criteria.

Under the development finance program, AIDEA becomes the owner of the project facilities. Financing is provided either through (1) funding provided by AIDEA which could entail the issuance of AIDEA's general obligation bonds, under which the bonds are ultimately secured by AIDEA's general assets and revenues, or (2) the issuance of AIDEA revenue bonds, under which AIDEA's general assets and revenues are not committed as security. For a number of projects, tax-exempt financing can be obtained only if the facilities will be owned by a public entity such as AIDEA, and it is for this purpose that AIDEA sometimes assumes a project ownership role. A project qualifies for tax-exempt financing based on the IRS tax code. Based on our knowledge of the code, without obtaining bond counsel's opinion, we do not believe the proposed project will qualify for tax-exempt financing regardless of possible ownership by a governmental entity.

Under the conduit revenue bond program, AIDEA's general assets and revenues are not pledged as security and AIDEA does not have a project ownership role. In many cases, the main advantage of a conduit revenue bond financing is a public entity must issue the bonds in order to obtain tax-exempt financing even though the public entity has no substantive involvement in the project and provides no loan security. That is the main advantage of conduit revenue bond financing - to obtain tax-exempt status by having a public agency issue the bonds. Again, however, it is our opinion that your proposed project will not qualify for tax-exempt financing whether or not AIDEA is the bond issuer.

#### Conclusion - What AIDEA Can Offer

Since we believe this project will not qualify for tax exempt financing, AIDEA's programs are not well matched to your project because they would unnecessarily add to the overall cost of financing your project. However, AIDEA does have a great deal of experience working with private sector bond underwriters. We would be pleased to assist AIGC in working with private sector underwriters in evaluating the financial feasibility of the Southeast gas project and in assessing possible financing options for the project.

#### Discussion

##### A. Taxable Issue

There are several compelling reasons that lead us to the above conclusion. The first consideration is that, in our opinion, the pipeline distribution network will not qualify for tax-exempt financing. The local furnishing rule as it exists today under the IRS code does not provide for tax-exempt status unless the project to be financed builds on a system that was in place or a service that was operated by the proposed borrower prior to 1997. Although we have not sought an opinion from bond counsel on this matter, it is our understanding that the new system you have proposed will not qualify for tax-exempt financing whether the pipeline network is owned by AIDEA or by a private entity.

B. General Obligation Bonds

Even as a taxable issue, you expressed interest in AIDEA issuing its general obligation bonds to finance the pipeline network. Under this scenario, AIDEA would own these distribution pipelines and AIDEA's general assets and revenues would be pledged to pay off the bonds if project revenues fall short. AIDEA cannot consider using public funds to assume any amount of developer risk unless, at a minimum, there is collateral of sufficient market value in place and/or other reliable security measures sufficient to pay off the bonds that precede any exposure to AIDEA's general assets and revenues.

The only security AIDEA would have in the event of default would be ownership of the gas distribution pipelines. As installed, these pipelines would have no alternative use if the gas project fails, and the net salvage value of this collateral would be far less than the amount of financing at risk. We have asked if your company can supply any other credit enhancements, such as acquisition of a letter of credit from a financial institution sufficient to pay off the bonds in the event of default, but we are unclear whether such options are realistic for AIGC. Finally, this would clearly be a start-up business without any track record of success either in Southeast Alaska or in other locations under present management. For these reasons, AIDEA cannot give any further consideration to possible issuance of our general obligation bonds for this project.

C. AIDEA Revenue Bonds

The other alternative that you asked us to consider is to finance the pipeline distribution network with a taxable issue of AIDEA revenue bonds. Under this concept, AIDEA would be the owner of the distribution pipelines at least while the bonds are outstanding but the bonds would not be secured with a formal pledge of AIDEA's general assets and revenues. In the absence of any credit enhancements that you might supply, these bonds would be secured solely by the revenues of the project and by the residual value of the pipelines themselves in the event of project failure. We have considered this financing scenario as well but have concluded that the risks to AIDEA's public resources are still unacceptably high for the following reasons:

1. AIDEA would own the pipelines at least while the revenue bonds are outstanding. Many households and businesses in Southeast Alaska will initially invest in heating system conversions and could be left stranded if the gas project fails and its management withdraws. Under this scenario, AIDEA could be under significant pressure to take over the system operations so that, even with continuing financial losses, gas would continue to be delivered to people now relying on it. Again, the lack of security prior to AIDEA's involvement, combined with AIDEA's necessary ownership of the pipeline system under this scenario, produces an unacceptably high level of risk for this agency to take on.
2. AIDEA would have additional ownership risks for which no mitigation measures have been proposed. These include liability for environmental and safety risks that are inherent in a project of this nature and which may exceed whatever insurance coverages are provided. We cannot position this agency such that public resources are at risk for claims due to fuel contamination or explosions that could occur and for which AIDEA could ultimately be liable as owner of the pipeline system.
3. If the gas project fails while the bonds are outstanding, AIDEA, as a governmental entity, could be under pressure to provide some form of financial assistance to the project. This pressure would derive from the fact of AIDEA's ownership of the pipeline network. Therefore, the lack of adequate security is still of major concern even if AIDEA's general resources are not pledged as security for the bonds.

D. Handicaps of AIDEA Ownership

There are other aspects of AIDEA project ownership that would handicap the project. These handicaps include:


1. Project construction would fall under the requirements of the Little Davis Bacon Act, which would likely result in higher construction costs.
2. As a project owner, AIDEA would seek an investment return either in the form of an increment to the bond interest rate and/or another negotiated return mechanism. The higher the risk to AIDEA, the greater the required investment return.
3. The developer could anticipate additional costs due to AIDEA's extensive due diligence requirements, and additional delays due not only to these requirements but also the need for legislative authorization.

In select cases, it can be worth the developer's additional time and expense to accept these handicaps in order to gain access, through AIDEA's participation, to tax-exempt financing. In this case, however, AIDEA involvement will not bring tax-exempt status to the project financing and so the key advantage of AIDEA involvement is not present in this case.

Where AIDEA Can Help

In closing, we believe that AIDEA can be of assistance to you in pursuing conventional bond financing through private sector bond underwriters. We would be pleased to introduce you to bond underwriters who may be interested in your project, and we can help you navigate the financing process by participating in your meetings with underwriters and by reviewing the financing documents you will need to prepare. Our facilities are available to you for this purpose. Please contact me if you would like to pursue this option in concert with AIDEA.

This is in response to your letter dated September 24<sup>th</sup>. Alaska Industrial Development and Export Authority (AIDEA) is also looking forward to a detailed presentation by Alaska Intrastate Gas Company (AIGC).

As we discussed at the recent meeting with AIGC and KeyBank, the most appropriate type of financing for AIGC's proposed gas project in Southeast Alaska is issuance of revenue bonds. If you seek financing assistance from AIDEA, the conduit revenue bond program is the appropriate financing vehicle. You mentioned in your letter that the gas project could be financed with AIDEA bonds similar to those used to finance the Red Dog Mine. To a certain extent you are correct. The Red Dog project is a development finance project where AIDEA owns the road and port, however, revenue bonds were issued to partially finance that project. The proposed AIGC gas project would not be a development finance project, however, if the project is viable, conduit revenue bonds could possibly be issued to finance the project. As I mentioned at the meeting, these bonds do not have the credit or assets of AIDEA behind them. Bondholders must look solely to the revenues from the project, project assets, and any credit enhancements offered as the source of repayment.

As an alternative, you suggest using AIDEA's loan participation program but structuring the financing so that a separate loan is acquired for each of the communities of Juneau, Ketchikan and Sitka, with each loan under the \$10 million cap. I am confused since your business plan shows a financing requirement of \$52 million. Even if the financing requirement was lowered to \$30 million or below, the total of all the loans would give AIDEA more exposure to one borrower than we are comfortable with. In addition, there would be a lack of adequate collateral to support the loan in accordance with AIDEA's statute and regulations. As I have indicated to you already, AIDEA's loan participation



program was not designed to finance this type of project. If AIDEA is going to assist in providing financial assistance for the AIGC gas project, it will be through the conduit revenue bond program.

I strongly urge AIGC to contact an underwriter of your choice and have them review your project. If they think the project is economically feasible and that a market is available for bonds sold to finance the project, AIDEA would be interested in pursuing financial assistance through our conduit revenue bond program.

As you have requested, I have reviewed the information you provided on the proposed gas project of the Alaska Intrastate Gas Company (AIGC). The following is an assessment of the impact of the AIGC project on the Four Dam Pool Power Agency (Agency).

The Regulatory Commission of Alaska (RCA) has conditionally approved AIGC's application for a certificate of public convenience and necessity to provide utility gas service to 17 communities. Several of those communities are served with electricity produced and sold at wholesale by the Agency (namely Ketchikan, Wrangell, Petersburg, Kodiak and Valdez). The conditions imposed by the RCA include a filing by AIGC for proof of financial fitness, permanent financing, and a notification of initiation of service. The RCA has granted at least two extensions of time to fulfill those necessary conditions, with the current deadlines being December 31, 2003 for the evidence of financial fitness and permanent financing, and December 31, 2004 for the notification of service initiation.

A feasibility study was prepared for AIGC by CH2M-Hill, the executive summary of which you had sent to me. That summary, however, referred only to Phase I of the project (service to Ketchikan, Sitka and Juneau) and did not assess the likelihood of AIGC obtaining the requisite financing, nor did the summary provide any specifics on either the volume of electric load potentially displaced as a result of fuel source conversions or the electricity requirements of the gas handling equipment. A request was made by a telephone call to AIGC for the feasibility study's supporting documentation. Initially, an AIGC principal agreed to provide these documents to me; however, on a subsequent follow-up call, my request was denied. Consequently, the Agency has been unable to independently evaluate the underlying assumptions of the feasibility study.

Nevertheless, in those conversations with AIGC the AIGC principal informed me that the Agency could expect an electric market impact of 10-15% over a five-year period. Assuming an electric load reduction of that magnitude, taking into account the time necessary for AIGC to obtain financing, equity partners, and initiate service, the estimated annual revenue loss to the Agency would be as much as \$2.2 million by 2008 and each year thereafter. That would be a loss of about 11.5% of the Agency's revenue, which would seriously affect the Agency's ability to cover operating costs, reserve contributions, and debt service. An increase in energy rates to all participants in the Four Dam Pool may subsequently be required to maintain the financial integrity of the Agency. Any increased wholesale electric power costs would negatively impact electric consumers in communities in which AIGC initiates gas service, but would as well have an adverse impact on consumers in communities served by other members of the Four Dam Pool.

I should also note that significant support has been provided by the legislature and state agencies to the development of a S.E. electrical grid, the first component of which is the Swan Lake - Lake Tye intertie. The interconnection of those two Four Dam Pool resources is anticipated to be complete and in operation in 2005 and will provide a significant additional source of electricity for Ketchikan. Nearly half of the 15% reduction in annual sales suggested by AIGC would be from reduced energy flows on the Swan-Tye intertie. While energy alternatives may be sought for a variety of reasons, one of the many benefits of an interconnected electric system in S.E. Alaska is the opportunity to make more intensive use of existing facilities. Using the surplus power from Lake Tye to serve electrical loads in Ketchikan, for example, is an improvement to the S.E. electrical system that promises an opportunity for lower electricity rates in the future. We appreciate the support for interties and ask that such opportunities for improved electrical service not be diminished.

## **Important Questions Regarding HB 449, ADIA, and the Montana-Dakota Study**

HB 449 Raises the bonding limit to 79 million dollars, this limit will apply to anybody who wishes to bond any project that involves any form of gas or gas facilities.

### **Question: Is there justification to raise the bonding limit from 10 million to 76 million?**

Note: In a letter dated March 1, 2004 to Rep. Harris signed by Frank Avezac, it states that then executive director Bob Poe supported lifting the 10 million dollar cap so AIDA could look at the project. AIDA has looked at this the project. The 328 million dollars of projects that haven't been bonded didn't prove to be financially feasible when reviewed by AIDA. (Ref: May 03,2001 Senate Resources minutes)

A letter dated March 1, 2004 to Rep John Harris signed by Frank Avezac states that AIGC has received support from the Governor's Office. Mike Menge, in the Governor's Office, was called to confirm this statement, however, Menge said that the Governor was "neutral" on the project.

In the document, SEAGA GAS PROJECT, under title FEASIBILTY, there is reference to the CH2MHILL being a (worst case) study. The Montana-Dakota study makes different statements under Proposal Background, bullet 4: Market Study 2.1.3: Market Penetration 2.3 : Distribution system 3.1: Revenue Requirements 9.1

The Montana-Dakota Feasibility study provided by SEAGAS early in the process is very different from the copy sent out via email last week. Some very important numbers and statements have been changed. Changes are marked with ) ( and underlined by hand. I am writing to you in response to a letter you received from Mr. Ron Miller, Executive Director of the Alaska Industrial Development & Export Authority (AIDEA), dated February 18, 2004. This letter discusses the history of AIDEA's involvement with Alaska Intrastate Gas Company (AIGC) and their response to HB 449 pending before the present Legislature. Mr. Miller summarized much of our past discussions in that letter. In fact, we are actively working with AIDEA now on pursuing conduit bond financing for the project as they have recommended. At the present time this financing mechanism seems to be a good fit for initiating service in Juneau. However, there are many pieces to the overall financing of the project, some of which may qualify for AIDEA's development finance program. Also, as the project moves forward other financial instruments may become more appropriate to integrate into the project. AIGC is involved in a multiyear, dynamic infrastructure development project that may ultimately extend to 40-50 Alaskan communities.

In his letter Mr. Miller did not summarize AIDEA's history with AIGC with respect to HB 236 from the previous Legislature. This Bill was passed unanimously by the House in the last Legislature and was referred to the Senate. In the Senate Finance Committee, the bill was tabled pending the completion of a feasibility study. Since that time, two feasibility studies and a market survey have been completed by independent companies. With the completion of this work, HB 449 (virtually identical to HB 236) has been introduced to continue what was begun with HB 236. AIDEA's Executive Director at that time, Bob Poe, testified in favor of passage of HB 236 in House hearings. His position was that the \$10 million cap needed to be removed before AIDEA could consider investment in the project. He stated it did not matter whether the cap was removed before or after the AIDEA Board of Directors considered the project, but there is a very significant difference that will be discussed later. In fact he stated that there was more than \$350 million in projects approved by the Legislature that had not been acted upon by AIDEA. His testimony is part of the public record. HB 236 had been discussed with AIDEA prior to submission and received their support as long as AIGC would lobby and work for its passage.

The same situation exists with HB 449. The Bill was reviewed by AIDEA, and AIGC was told by Mr. Miller that AIDEA would not oppose passage of the Bill. However, AIGC would, again have to lobby and work to pass the Bill since AIDEA's plate was full with other issues. AIGC has also received support from the Governor's Office for passage of HB 449. The Bill accomplishes two things within AIDEA. First it removes the \$10 million investment cap which allows AIDEA to consider any and all financial instruments it has to support the project if they choose to provide financial support. Secondly, it provides a sunset for bond authority, so that if AIDEA has not made investments within or on behalf of AIGC within the specified timeframe the bonding authority terminates. Additionally, the Bill demonstrates legislative and Administration support for the project which is important to private and institutional investors in the project. Investors want to know that they are making an investment into a stable political environment with broad support for the infrastructure development. HB 449 will accomplish this whether it is ever utilized by AIDEA or not.

As I mentioned earlier the development of gas utility service in rural Alaskan communities is a very dynamic and changing process. AIDEA looked at the project initially and made a determination, based on the project as described in 1999 and again in 2001, that conduit financing was the best vehicle. However, the project is constantly changing and may fit other financial instruments now and in the future. However, AIDEA has stated that the project must be treated as a single project, regardless of how many communities are serviced, which means that they cannot consider all financial instruments for portions of the project unless the \$10 million cap is removed by the Legislature. In other words, since the project at full-build out for seventeen communities will exceed the \$10 million cap, no single community or portion of the project can be considered as being under the \$10 million cap since the project as a whole exceeds this amount. This is important as we add new communities to our utility service. The City of Seward has already initiated discussion with AIGC on gaining the benefits of our gas utility service for their community. While AIDEA does not currently expect to use the authorization provided by HB 449 that may not be the case as circumstances change and more communities petition to participate within our utility.

Finally, there is another very important issue that is indirectly addressed by HB 449. It concerns maintaining the confidentiality of proprietary information provided to AIDEA. AIDEA only maintains confidentiality on proprietary materials for pending applications. AIDEA cannot receive a complete application from AIGC on our project and maintain confidentiality until the \$10 million cap is removed. We have already experienced problems with confidential materials submitted to AIDEA and then ending up in the public domain, to the detriment of our business interests. We cannot in good faith submit confidential materials to AIDEA and hope that it remains confidential without the Legislature having first acted on approving our ability to participate within the AIDEA framework in a manner that will provide protection for confidential information.

HB 449 is good legislation that provides numerous benefits to Alaskans and the communities they live in. It will help to promote infrastructure development and reduce energy costs, and diversify energy resources within rural Alaska. It will expand the

financial options available to rural communities to promote gas utility service. Although it authorizes AIDEA to evaluate the financing structure of this project, it does not force AIDEA to do anything. And, in fact, it provides a sunset provision if they should not.

BY THE COMMISSION:

Summary

We grant, in part, the request of Alaska Intrastate Gas Company (AIGC) for an additional extension of time to demonstrate evidence of its financial fitness and permanent financing for the Southeast Alaska and Gulf of Alaska (SEAGA) Gas Project and to commence providing natural gas public utility service. We extend to December 31, 2004, the deadline to file proof of financial fitness and permanent financing for its proposed operations and do not act on the request for an extension of time to begin service at this time. We require AIGC to file information by September 15, 2004, to show cause why the conditional approval to operate as a natural gas public utility should not be revoked.

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1 Background

2 The APUC<sup>2</sup> granted a certificate of public convenience and necessity to  
3 AIGC to operate as a natural gas public utility, subject to the conditions set out in  
4 Order U-97-46(6), including a requirement to file proof of its financial fitness and  
5 permanent financing by July 1, 2001.<sup>3</sup> AIGC filed a status report on

1 December 19, 2000, in which it indicated that it had continued to work toward achieving  
2 permanent financing for the project.

3 On June 11, 2001, AIGC requested that we extend the filing date for it to  
4 show proof of financial fitness and that we defer our requirement for it to begin providing

1 In its latest filing, AIGC asserted that the further extensions are in the  
2 public interest and are supported by good cause. It stated that it has been diligent in  
3 seeking financing but required more time to achieve financing. AIGC asserted that the  
4 SEAGA Gas Project would provide many benefits to the Southeast and Southcentral  
5 Alaska regions and is strongly supported in the community and by community and  
6 political leaders. AIGC noted that the APUC granted a certificate of public convenience  
7 and necessity after a comprehensive investigation. AIGC supported its request with an  
8 executive summary of an economic feasibility study assessing the project.<sup>7</sup>

9 On December 26, 2003, Montana-Dakota Utilities Company (MDUC) filed  
10 a letter stating that it is under contract with AIGC to prepare a final marketing and  
11 feasibility study of the proposed project (Study) and that the Study should be completed  
12 in the very near future. The Alaska Industrial Development and Export Authority  
13 (AIDEA) filed a letter clarifying information contained in AIGC's memorandum. AIDEA

1 AIGC asserts that it has tried diligently to obtain funding and describes the  
2 steps it has taken to prepare for construction and operation of the project. However, we  
3 lack an adequate current record to determine whether the requested extensions of time  
4 should be granted in full. AIGC has not demonstrated financial fitness nor provided  
5 proof that it is providing service to customers. We grant, in part, AIGC's request for an  
6 extension of time. We will hold in abeyance AIGC's request for a twelve month  
7 extension of time, until December 31, 2005, to begin providing service until we have the  
8 opportunity to review the record presented by AIGC on why its conditional certificate  
9 should not be revoked or modified.

10 It is not in the public interest to continue to extend AIGC's conditional  
11 certificate without evidence there is a reasonable expectation that the AIGC project will  
12 be completed. Therefore, we require AIGC to show cause by September 15, 2004, why  
13 its certificate should not be revoked or modified.<sup>9</sup> AIGC should file its current business  
14 plan, describe its management structure, and provide resumes of key personnel. AIGC  
15 must file proof that it has the intent and ability to initiate utility service in the  
16 communities for which it is certificated.

18 THE COMMISSION FURTHER ORDERS:

19 1. The request by Alaska Intrastate Gas Company for an additional  
20 extension of time to demonstrate evidence of its financial fitness and permanent  
21 financing and to commence providing natural gas public utility service is granted, in part.

## HB 236-AIDEA BONDS FOR GAS PUBLIC UTILITIES

CHAIRMAN TORGERSON announced HB 236 to be up for consideration. He said he wanted to see due diligence done on the report before he could support this bill, but he won't block it, if the committee wanted to move it forward.

COMMISSIONER BOB POE, Executive Director, Alaska Industrial Development and Export Authority (AIDEA), said that they have done development projects under both scenarios, where the legislature has approved bonding authorization (not an appropriation) before due diligence is done and after due diligence was done. In fact, we have \$328 million of bonding authorizations on the books today that have not gone to projects.

He thought it was interesting that HB 244 repeals provisions relating to a grant of right-of-way of land for a railroad utility corridor to AIDEA. There was \$28 million in bonding authority for that project, but it didn't prove to be financially feasible, so AIDEA did not move ahead with the project. He explained:

In this case, Alaska Interstate Gas came to us mid session in a particularly busy time for us with a few large projects we are trying to get wrapped up and said, "We think we have equity investors. We think we have a good project for gas to southeast Alaska. We have been monitoring the project over the last several months or maybe a year. They said our equity [indisc.] will be ready to move in the short term in the summer or fall, if you go forward with it. But the equity partner, from our understanding, didn't want to dive into the project and didn't know there was a good chance of getting the bonding authority. So, we agreed that we would work with Interstate Gas, but that they would try and move the bonding authority through. We don't know if this project makes financial sense. I'm sure you and I could sit down and identify six or seven weaknesses right off the bat that would need to be proven true. It doesn't mean they can't. It doesn't mean that we don't see a good opportunity here, but we can't attest to the financial feasibility of this. What we can attest to is that AIDEA does do its job and the faith that the legislature has frequently given AIDEA, which is to say, "We trust you to do your job," is proven out in those \$328 million worth of projects that we haven't done, because they didn't prove to be financially feasible.

I'll wrap up by saying there are seven different qualifications that a development project needs to have before AIDEA goes to the step of making a development project. I can swear to you that AIDEA will do all of those and only when this project is financially feasible and has the support of the communities involved would we do the project.

CHAIRMAN TORGERSON asked, "Why don't you lend them \$10 million to get them started?"

MR. POE answered, "We don't do a project that way. Typically, the way we do it..."

CHAIRMAN TORGERSON said, "I know about typically, but that doesn't stop you from doing it."

MR. POE answered, "Fiscal prudence would. There is no reason to put \$10 million into a project that you don't know is fiscally feasible. The way we tend to do it is to enter into a reimbursable agreement with the sponsors of a project where they reimburse AIDEA for the cost of doing the due diligence..."

SENATOR TAYLOR asked how long it would take.

MR. POE answered that it could take several months. It depends on the proponents of the project and how well they have done their work.

SENATOR ELTON asked if it would take another act of the legislature to approve the final issuance of the bonds.

MR. POE answered that's not correct. "Once you give us bonding authority, you leave it up to the AIDEA Board to decide." He said he would be happy to keep the legislature apprised of the situation.

MR. RANDY RUARO, Staff to Representative Williams, said, "It's the sponsor's position that the original version of the bill be passed."

SENATOR TAYLOR moved to adopt the Cook 5/3/01 committee substitute to HB 236.

SENATOR ELTON objected for an explanation of the changes.

CHAIRMAN TORGERSON explained that it says that the applicant bears the cost.

SENATOR ELTON asked if there would be the additional step of coming back to the legislature for the authority to issue bonds if the due diligence got done.

CHAIRMAN TORGERSON said that was correct.

SENATOR ELTON said one of his concerns was that, "If we take this out from under the wing of AIDEA, what we're going to do is complicating passage this session..." The House would have to concur and they voted unanimously for their version. He continued to prefer the original version.

CHAIRMAN TORGERSON called for the roll. SENATORS TAYLOR, PEARCE, TORGERSON voted yeah; SENATORS LINCOLN AND ELTON voted nay; and the committee substitute was adopted by 3 to 2.

SENATOR TAYLOR moved to pass SCS HB 236 (RES) from committee with individual recommendations. There were no objections and it was so ordered.

## Anchorage firm pushes propane-air project

### Company wants to bring natural gas to Southeast Alaska communities

An Anchorage company that has looked since 1986 at bringing natural gas to Alaska coastal communities has contracted with a North Dakota utility to conduct a marketing study and engineering review for bringing propane to Juneau, Ketchikan and Sitka, mixing it with air and then piping it to customers.

Depending on the survey results, the company next would solicit investor and bond financing. Assuming it can arrange tens of millions of dollars in financing, the company says it could start construction in 2004, according to a press release.

Alaska Intrastate Gas Company, however, faces a Dec. 31, 2003, deadline to show proof of financial fitness and financing to the Regulatory Commission of Alaska in order to maintain its unused 1998 certificate to operate a gas utility. The commission's latest order in the case, issued June 17, 2002, also gives Alaska Intrastate until Dec. 31, 2004, to begin service, though the company could ask for another extension.

### **Company started in real estate**

"We have really been through the mill," said Frank Avezac of Alaska Intrastate Gas. Avezac said he is an accountant by trade and in 1986 transformed his Anchorage real estate company into the envisioned gas distribution company.

He believes he can bring propane to the three Southeast Alaska communities and pipe it around town at a lower cost than diesel fuel or electricity, though he acknowledges financing has always been a problem.

Alaska Intrastate applied to the state utility regulation commission in the mid-1990s to barge liquefied natural gas to as many as 17 coastal communities, then later amended its application to serve the cities with a mixture called propane-air, or utility gas.

### **Project has changed over the years**

Its first application to what was then called the Alaska Public Utilities Commission sought approval in 1995 to serve Homer and Seward on the Kenai Peninsula. The company later withdrew that application and in 1997 filed to serve most every city in Southeast Alaska, Cordova and Valdez in Prince William Sound, and Kodiak.

A February 2002 assessment prepared by engineering firm CH2M Hill for Alaska Intrastate looked at the economics of barging propane to just Juneau, Ketchikan and Sitka in Southeast Alaska. October's on-site feasibility review by Montana-Dakota Utilities was limited to just those three communities, with a combined population of about 54,000.

The propane would be brought to town by barge — either in railcars or large tanks — then gasified and mixed with air before it is fed into an underground pipe distribution system to fuel furnaces, hot water heaters and other appliances much the same as methane, the conventional natural gas used in cities with pipeline connections to gas wells.

### **Utility sends two staff members to Alaska**

A project manager and a marketing representative for Montana-Dakota Utilities visited Southeast Alaska in October, working under contract to Alaska Intrastate to help determine the feasibility of the gas distribution business, said Dan Sharp, spokesman for the Bismarck, N.D., oil, gas, electricity and construction materials company. The two workers will prepare a report this fall on potential customers, the volume of gas they might purchase, and the feasibility of storing propane before mixing it and sending it out as a gas.

Montana-Dakota is not new to Alaska. It owns Alaska Basic Industries, which owns Anchorage Sand and Gravel Co., one of the largest aggregate suppliers in the state, Sharp said.

The North Dakota company operates natural gas utilities in Minnesota, Montana, Wyoming and North and South Dakota, and operates a propane-air system similar to what is envisioned for Southeast Alaska in a North Dakota town of 1,500 people, Sharp said. The utility used to have a few more propane-air operations but converted them to conventional natural gas piped into the communities.

The liquid propane used in such operations also has some butane and methane mixed in, Sharp said, with about 11 gallons of the propane mixture producing 1 million Btu.

"Our end of it is the feasibility study," Sharp said, and perhaps engineering work if Alaska Intrastate Gas goes ahead with the project.

In addition to contracting with Montana-Dakota Utilities, Avezac said he is working with Foster Energy as one of several potential propane suppliers. The 71-year-old company has an office in Calgary, Alberta, and markets about 500,000 gallons a day of heating oil, gasoline, diesel and propane in western Canada and Michigan.

### Study assumptions

The CH2M Hill study looked at several factors in serving the coastal communities with gas, using the following assumptions:

- The propane could come from gas production facilities in Alberta or British Columbia via railcar to Prince Rupert, B.C., where barges would take the propane to Alaska.
- The estimated cost of the dock and storage facilities, vaporization or "send-out" facilities, and underground pipe throughout much of Juneau would total \$37.2 million, with a \$13.4 million estimate for Sitka and \$20 million for Ketchikan. Directional, horizontal drilling could help reduce the cost of running pipe beneath city streets, perhaps placing 500 feet of pipe from a single drill hole, according to the Montana-Dakota team.

- Additional start-up costs for Alaska Intrastate are estimated at \$7.2 million, not counting fuel inventory and the cost of possibly purchasing railcars to move the propane.
- The study assumes the gas utility would achieve 60 percent market penetration of residential and small commercial customers after five years.
- Alaska Intrastate would capture 100 percent of the fuel market for seafood processors in the communities.

#### **Possible cost savings**

The consultants determined residential consumers would see a small savings after factoring in the cost and possible efficiency loss of converting home heating systems from oil to gas, but consumers could realize a substantial savings if costs were measured on new, high-efficiency gas furnaces.

Avezac said his company would help finance boiler and hot water heater conversions to attract customers, noting that conversion costs for a residential furnace could run as high as \$1,600.

The company's original plan almost a decade ago was to get state royalty gas at a discount for its operations, which would have required legislative action. Though Avezac has moved away from that idea for start-up, he said he would like to someday "buy royalty gas and bring it to the residents of Southeast Alaska."

## PREFACE

### Scope of Work and Authorization:

The Alaska Intrastate Gas Co., AIGC, contracted with Montana-Dakota Utilities Co., (Montana-Dakota), to perform a detailed marketing study, preliminary engineering and an economic feasibility study of AIGC's proposed gas distribution system for communities in southeast Alaska. AIGC provided notice to proceed in September 2003, fieldwork began in October 2003 and completed in December 2003. AIGC selected Montana-Dakota to perform this work because of its past and ongoing experience as an operator of several gas distribution systems. Montana-Dakota successfully began operating gas transmission and distribution systems over 75 years ago and continues to operate gas and electric systems in Montana, Wyoming, South Dakota, North Dakota and Minnesota.

AIGC provided significant information in the development of this report through direct interaction with Montana-Dakota's marketing and engineering personnel. Additionally, information contained in CH2M Hill's March 2002 "Economic Assessment, Phase 1 of the Southeast Alaska and Gulf of Alaska Utility Gas Distribution Project" report provided adequate background to begin this work at an accelerated pace. However, information contained in this report represents the independent development and interpretations of concepts developed by Montana-Dakota and its employees. Research on this project centered on the proposed Juneau distribution system and the assumptions extrapolated to other communities in Southeast Alaska for financial analysis.

Montana-Dakota began its research by focusing on marketing aspects in an attempt to answer the question "Are the volumes and conversion estimates contained in earlier reports accurate?" Over its history, Montana-Dakota experienced many opportunities to develop, construct and operate distribution systems in communities where consumers used alternate energy sources such as bulk propane, fuel oil, coal and/or electricity. Based on those experiences, Montana-Dakota recognizes the tendency to overstate the probability of conversions. Accordingly, the marketing research and revenue forecast efforts resorted to direct contact with potential customers to identify and quantify contributors to conversion decisions.

Preliminary engineering focused on reviewing transportation aspects, pipeline routing and construction estimating. Mueller Pipeliners, a business unit of Infrasource specializing in pipeline construction, performed a detailed cost estimate for the Juneau distribution system. Commodity movement and storage scenarios centered on developing cost effective alternatives to earlier proposals.

Montana-Dakota's financial analysts developed a detailed financial model that uses revenue and cost information provided by researchers to determine the economic viability of this project. The model allows for various return on investment hurdle rates. Since each investor has a different risk tolerance and desired return on investment, the models presented here show a conservative and aggressive of scenario.

**Limitations:**

The analysis included in this report include assumptions about conditions that may occur in the future. Although these assumptions appear reasonable, they are dependent on future events and actual conditions may differ from those assumed. To the extent that actual factors differ from those assumed, the results may vary from those projected. Accordingly, Montana-Dakota makes no warrants, guarantces or assertions that investments will actually produce the projected returns.
