I wish to speak against Senate bill 107/House bill 174. In this testimony, I will make the following points:

1. Duplication of services is a non-issue.
2. Closing Alyeska may actually cost the state more money.
3. Alyeska students receive 100% of state funding in direct services, unlike other correspondence programs.
4. Alyeska can serve the state well by developing high quality, low cost programs for small schools

#### DUPLICATION OF SERVICES

Those supporting the bill have stated that Alyeska should be closed, in part, because it is a duplication of other educational programs. My answer to this claim is, "so what?" Saying that Alyeska should be closed because it duplicates other programs is like saying that the Juneau School District should be closed because the Anchorage District also provides educational programs. Alyeska serves an entirely different student population.

#### MONEY #1

Closing Alyeska will not save money. Foundation funds follow Alaskan students to whatever district provides services to that student. If two districts provide services to the student, only one district receives funding unless an arrangement exists between the two districts to share the funding. It is very possible that closing Alyeska will have the result of costing the state more money. Correspondence students generate funding at a rate lower than students who attend regular programs in Alaska's districts. **If all of the students currently enrolled with Alyeska choose to attend regular district programs, it will result in a 20% increase in cost to the state.**

#### MONEY #2

A major difference between Alyeska and other district correspondence programs, most notably IDEA, is this: 100% of the foundation money generated by students enrolled in the Alyeska program is spent on the students in the program. The funding pays for teacher support, materials, materials development, and other direct services. This is not the case for other correspondence programs. A significant percentage of the funds generated by students in these other programs is diverted to other purposes within the districts operating these programs. **Other district correspondence programs operate the programs because they make money on them. If the profit motive disappears, so will the programs.**

#### FUTURE

It appears that the Department of Education is not supportive of continuing Alyeska as a correspondence school. At the present time the Department is without a commissioner and in effect is functioning without strong direction. Comments made by personnel from the department at past legislative hearings indicate a lack of understanding of how Alyeska provides services to students. It also indicates a lack of understanding of

Alyeska's potential for serving students in the future, especially those in rural Alaska. A number of Alyeska teachers have been teachers in rural Alaska and understand the challenges we face in rural schools. **The Department and the state Board can direct Alyeska to develop programs which will be valuable to rural schools facing closure because of decreased enrollment.**

Here are some key points in support of saving Alyeska Central School Program as a vital educational service available to all K-12 grade Alaskan students.

- ◆ Closing Alyeska Central School will not be a cost saving measure. The foundation funding will follow the student were ever they go. The state will pay at least the same amount if not more to educate that child.
- ◆ If we were to send our children to a state boarding school that could cost the state approximately 15,000 per child.
- ◆ What is Accreditation? A school has met the standards of a regional accreditation agency. Alaska does not require schools to provide accreditation to graduate. Accreditation is important to students applying for college.
- ◆ The Federal "No Child Left Behind Act" currently in place mandates that every teacher will be highly qualified by the year 2006. Alyeska Central School already has teachers certified at the appropriate subject areas and grade levels should meet the highly qualified standards being adopted by EED.
- ◆ If Alyeska Central School summer program is taken away it may cost the state more money due to students, especially Seniors lacking in credits, having to return to their local school for one semester or year.
- ◆ Our economy is so bad that many students work full time and take home school/correspondence courses. We all know that high school graduates with a diploma are preferred employees, even at fast food restaurants.
- ◆ We have not been able to find another home school/correspondence that offers dual enrollment or tuition.
- ◆ Alyeska Central School is vital to other Alaska School Districts. They purchase Alyeska Central School's quality curriculum and teaching services to use with their students.
- ◆ Alyeska Central School provides an exemplary educational experience.
- ◆ Students do not want to go back to overcrowded, under budgeted public schools in a sometimes hostile learning environment. This option is not a possibility for all students through out the state, especially rural Alaska.
- ◆ Alyeska Central School is not a duplication (Governor Murkowski states Alyeska Central School is a duplication!). No other home school/correspondence compares. Alyeska Central School courses are written by Alaska Teachers based on Alaska standards. Students receive full teaching services from certified teachers with each subject area endorsement.
- ◆ In the Governor's televised state address on March, 30, 2003, he stated "Choices we make determine the quality of our lives in the future". Please consider carefully the value of saving Alyeska Central School, students are our future.

The Department of Health and Social Services respectfully requests a hearing in the Senate Health, Education, and Social Services Committee on Senate Bill 108 "An Act relating to payment rates under the Medicaid program for health facilities and to budgeting, accounting, and reporting requirements for those facilities; abolishing the Medicaid Rate Advisory Commission; and providing for an effective date."

This bill will provide greater flexibility to the Department of Health and Social Services to set Medicaid payment rates for Alaska's hospitals, nursing homes and other health care facilities. Changes in federal law in the past few years providing more flexibility in rate setting have not been taken advantage of in Alaska due to our own inflexible statute.


The proposed bill would eliminate the Medicaid Rate Advisory Commission (MRAC). Since the MRAC currently acts in an advisory capacity and the Commissioner has ultimate authority to set rates, elimination of the Commission and its attendant costs is appropriate.

Passage of this legislation will allow the department to develop in regulation a more flexible, cost-effective rate setting process that will, for the first time, allow the department to explicitly take into account the appropriations made by the legislature for the Medicaid program when setting rates. A fiscal note should be on file with the committee.

The Department of Health and Social Services respectfully requests a hearing in the Senate Health, Education, and Social Services Committee on Senate Bill 109, "An Act repealing the statute that sets priorities for the Department of Health and Social Services to apply to administration of the medical assistance program when there are insufficient funds allocated in the state budget for that program; authorizing the department to make cost containment decisions that may include decisions about eligibility of persons and availability of services under the medical assistance program; and providing for an effective date."

This bill will provide greater flexibility to the Department of Health and Social Services to implement cost containment strategies for the Medicaid program.

Under current law, if insufficient funds are allocated to fully-fund the Medicaid program, the department is directed to eliminate optional Medicaid services based on a priority list that is out-of-date. First, the department must pursue all other reasonable cost containment measures before eliminating any eligibility groups or services.


Second, the department should aggressively pursue strategies to maximize federal financial participation in the Medicaid program.

Under the authority of art. III, sec. 18, of the Alaska Constitution, I am transmitting a bill which clarifies local school district programs for under-school-age students.

Pursuant to existing statutes, a district may enroll a four year old child, referred to as an "under school age student." The intent of this bill is to prohibit districts from constructing curriculums that offer two years of kindergarten as a standard program. Early entry of four year olds into the school system should be a rare event and reserved for the truly exceptional child.

This bill would remove a school district's ability to offer early entry as standard practice to access the foundation formula and provide state funded pre-school programs. Currently, districts can enroll four year olds and then enroll them again as a kindergarten student in the next school year. This action effectively provides a child with two years of kindergarten with very little in the way of extra expense to the district. The result to the state is an additional year of per pupil funding equating to approximately \$3.9 million.

Enrolling four year olds as the current statute provides should be retained. However, early enrolled children should be expected to advance through to the next grade level or grade level equivalent.

I urge your prompt and favorable action on this measure.

Under the authority of art. III, sec. 18, of the Alaska Constitution, I am transmitting a bill that would repeal AS 14.36.010 through AS 14.36.070, the Community Schools Grant Program.

While the value of providing access to school facilities beyond the school day continues to be important in Alaskan communities, the level of funding for the program does very little on a statewide basis to support the effort.

The community schools statute was adopted in 1975. The purpose and intent section of the law is very clear. The grant program was enacted to provide financial support to encourage and assist local school districts in establishing community school programs. The funds provided assistance to local communities in the initial development, implementation and operations of community school programs.

This program has fulfilled its intended purpose, as all school districts currently offer a community schools program.

I urge your prompt and favorable action on this measure.

You are scheduled to hear SB 121 on Monday. Unfortunately I will be unable to testify that day, so please consider my comments as you deliberate.

I have been a volunteer with Community Schools in Anchorage since 1985 - serving on advisory boards and special committees, and volunteering as an instructor. I am currently Chair of the Anchorage Community Education Association, a nonprofit organization representing Anchorage's Community Schools.

SB 121, introduced at the request of the governor, repeals the existing Community Schools statutes. The administration says these statutes originally set up a mechanism for grant funding as "seed money" and that they have "fulfilled their purpose." I disagree. The statutes express the intent of the legislature that the state have a strong, ongoing Community Schools program by allowing part of the foundation formula funding to be used for Community Schools grants. The statutes do not obligate the state to pay for Community Schools - the language reads "may" and not "shall."

This bill alone does not affect Community School funding - it simply repeals the entire set of statutes dealing with Community Schools. That is a real blow to the thousands of volunteers who make this a vibrant program statewide. I believe many legislators feel the Community School programs in their areas are very successful. Whether or not the state provides funding, there is no reason to remove Community Schools from statute.

The existing \$500,000 State funding for Community Schools is used by numerous school districts statewide to run a variety of programs that provide after school and preschool programs, tutoring, family math nights, resume preparation classes, and activities for people of all ages. In Anchorage, our portion funds 2-1/2 community schools. Additional school district funds, user fees and donations are the other sources of funding for the program. If the Governor's other proposed cuts to education are adopted, it is very likely that the community schools program in Anchorage will be eliminated completely.

The House has written a Committee Substitute for their version of the bill (HB 165). I do not support the committee substitute - it still allows the statutes to be repealed while affirming vague support for the program in "uncodified law."

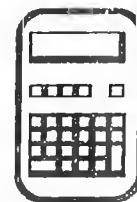

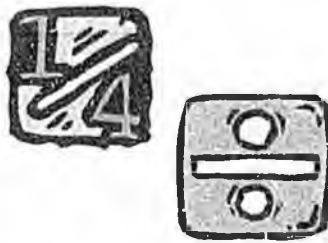

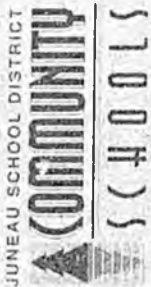

Alaskans passed legislation in 1975 to implement Community Education programs in local neighborhoods. This Act was subsequently revised in 1980. Funding is appropriated by the Legislature and the Department of Education distributes the funds to the school districts based on the School Foundation Formula. School districts must apply for Community Education Funding through annual grant application process.

## Fiscal Year Report

Since the inception of community school programs, a report and evaluation of the programs in the preceding year was presented to the Alaska Legislature as required in the Community Schools Act. Sec. 14.36.010(B)4. In recent years, the interpretation of this requirement by the Department of Education determined that it wasn't necessary annually.

However, those in the field of Community Education felt it was important to be accountable to the State Legislature on how our money was spent. So the Alaska Association for Community Education (AACE) volunteers continue to distribute this information.

**Because legislators provide state funding for Community Schools at \$500,000.00 in FY 02....**

**The following occurred in Alaska:**

- existing buildings in 53 out of 53 school districts are being used at nights and weekends. As opposed to closing the doors at the end of school day or year.
- over 20,000 programs/activities were offered
- over 342,566 activity hours logged
- over 464,300 youth served (duplicates)
- over 390,564 adults served (duplicates)
- 20,142 different volunteers logging in almost 212,000 hours of recorded volunteer time

## PRINCIPLES OF COMMUNITY EDUCATION

### Plan of Service

Community Education is both a program and a process which recognizes that learning begins at birth and continues throughout life, offering a variety of academic, recreational, social, cultural and health promotion activities and programs. Community Education stresses cooperation and coordination with schools, agencies, businesses and individuals, using professional and experienced community members to help provide effective programs at the lowest possible cost.

Community Schools staff members and volunteers across Alaska are taking a hard look at today's needs and are responding in a timely fashion. The early 90's trend was to increase prevention programs. As Alaskans were affected in many ways by alcohol and drug abuse, the decline in fisheries and more than ever due to new Welfare Reform laws, daycare needs generated by working parents and single-parent families. Community Schools programs stepped up to the plate to offer this programs and today continues to meet these needs.

The new millennium brought additional challenges to our communities such as terrorism, economic hardships and educational changes in the form of the No Child Left Behind Act. Not only are school districts, states and communities facing challenges in how to improve our education system but are being asked to do it with less money. Community Schools programs hope to share their afterschool programs, parent involvement programs, community/business partnerships and volunteers to make this happen.

Community Schools programs across the state continue to make a difference in the lives of all Alaskans.

**Community Education** provides local residents and community agencies and institutions the opportunity to become active partners in addressing community concerns. It is based on these principles:

- **Self-Determination.** Local people are in the best position to identify community needs and wants. Parents, as children's first and most important teachers, have both a right and a responsibility to be involved in their children's education.
- **Self-Help.** People are best served when their capacity to help themselves is encouraged and enhanced. When people assume ever-increasing responsibility for their own well-being, they acquire independence rather than dependence.
- **Leadership Development.** The identification, development and use of the leadership capacities of local citizens are prerequisites for ongoing self-help and community improvement efforts.
- **Localization.** Services, programs, events and other community involvement opportunities that are brought closest to where people live have the greatest potential for a high level of public participation. Whenever possible, these activities should be decentralized to places of easy public access.
- **Integrated Delivery of Services.** Organizations and agencies that operate for the public good can use their limited resources, meet their own goals and better serve the public by establishing close working relationships with other organizations and agencies with related purposes.
- **Maximum Use of Resources.** The physical, financial, and human resources of every community should be interconnected and used to their fullest if the diverse needs and interest of the community are to be met.
- **Inclusiveness.** The segregation or isolation of people by age, income, sex, race, ethnicity, religion or other factors inhibits the full development of the community. Community programs, activities and services should involve the broadest possible cross section of community residents.
- **Responsiveness.** Public institutions have a responsibility to develop programs and services that respond to the continually changing needs and interest of their constituents.
- **Lifelong Learning.** Learning begins at birth and continues until death. Formal and informal learning opportunities should be available to residents of all ages in a wide variety of community settings.

Dear Alaska State Legislatures,


Community Education is a vital part of a community serving many different needs and functions. Not funding Community Education is a serious mistake and the \$1500.00 Skagway receives needs to be increased not taken away!

Here in Skagway, Community Ed. offers an After School program that is very well attended by those students in need and others that just require a place to finish their homework. We also offer a Summer School that is very well received. These are programs that have been hit or miss in the past but Community Ed is making a firm commitment to the community of Skagway to keep offering these two very important educational opportunities to the youth of Skagway. With the High School Qualifying exams and state benchmarks being required, **these programs must be kept in place.** I am also building distance education here in Skagway by centralizing as much as possible here at school by giving people a place to come and take their satellite classes and audio conferences. I proctor tests for several people who take classes through the University of Alaska and other state systems.

Recreation and workshop opportunities are also a vital part of our Community Education program. We offer a sound recreation program for the school students and expand this in the summer months for adults. A Teen Center was opened this past winter and was a huge hit with students, parents, and police department. Workshops have helped keep the winter doldrums away and are very well attended.

As you can see Community Ed is a very integral part of our community and needs to be funded. My 21<sup>st</sup> Century grant expires May 31, 2004 and Skagway needs more dollars to keep Community Ed going. The \$1500.00 from the state that is being received right now is very important and will be even more important next year.

When asked to respond to the 2001-2002 ASD Goal Report on how Traditional Community School Programs have helped in achieving academic excellence in Reading, Writing and Math, Traditional Community School programs were able to site specific objectives and give clear examples of their help.

## OBJECTIVITIES

1. Each traditional site must offer at least one activity that will assist parents/adults to help children increase their skills in Math, Reading and Writing,
2. Each Community School is responsible to coordinate at least three enrichment opportunities for their schools.

## ACTIVITIES / SERVICES:

- Creekside - Artist in Resident program, contribution to RIFF program to purchase books, hosting Family Library Night and Artist Reception for storytelling.
- Rabbit Creek - Author in the Classroom project with 10 authors throughout the year visited classrooms and worked on reading/writing development.
- Sandlake - Dimond High tutorial program, Japanese Poetry and Poetry artist for Kincaid, Salmonoid Reading program.
- Chester Valley - purchased 1,000 books for the library.
- Baxter - 2 week visit with Alaskan author - Larry Kaniut, 2 week intensive school-wide reading

program – “Iditaread”.

- Inlet View – Battle of the Books, helped publish “The Nanuq News”, provided funds for three week Nature Studies Curriculum for Chugiach Optional.
- Four Valleys (Girdwood) – supports the student body with a \$5,000 enrichment budget, annually. With this teachers can request annually two field trips for their classroom. Another activity included an annual two week Artist in Residence program.
- Tudor – jointly purchased with PTA book for the Battle of the Books program, provided buses for field trip activities, sponsors the 100<sup>th</sup> day celebration for the 4 Kindergarten and 3 First grade classes.
- Gruening – allocates \$4,000 for enrichment opportunities/grants to ten schools in the Chugiak/Eagle River area.

Traditional Program, on an average, contribute over \$3,000.00 for school-wide resources, annually.



## Healthy Kids/Safe Neighborhoods

With hundreds of programs and activities each quarter, Traditional program sites are able to extend the use of school facilities to offer a safe location for Anchorage students before and afterschool. Five Traditional Community School programs offered afterschool tutorial programs in 2001-2002, serving over 800 students in grades 3-10. Before school language programs are becoming more common at Traditional Program sites. Through participation in these classes, students not only learn a new language, they gain a greater understanding of the many cultures in their schools.

Summer math camps, reading programs, enrichment classes and fun recreational activities engage neighborhood children in safe/healthy opportunities that are close to their homes.

I would like to provide information that I hope will clarify questions associated with revenue that is generated by our Community School programs in Anchorage.

Currently we have 13 Traditional Community School sites. Each program offers classes and activities on a quarterly basis to their local community. Fees are charged, and collected during registration. A portion of the fees that are collected include a 'user fee', which can range from \$1 - 6, depending on whether the class/activity is a youth or adult class and the length of time it is offered.

This 'user fee' is collected to cover costs associated with:

- \$65,000 ASD - publicity for program activities, mileage and phone expenses that are related to all thirteen traditional community school programs.
- Local program expenses associated with; Instructor salary, supplies, additional publicity, asst. coordinator; wages, training/equipment
- Each local program uses funds to help with enrichment programs and mini grants for K-12 classroom activities. Each local program provides an average of \$3,000 / year for special events; reading programs, afterschool tutorial program, computers/software.

The Anchorage School District total expenditures for community schools during FY02 was as follows:

\$ 547,392	ASD
\$ 147,115	State Grant
\$ 694,507	Total Expenditures - FY02

Clarification of DEED Community Schools FY02 Expenditures:

The figures given include all programs that fit under the audit classification; 780 - Community Services. This includes a variety of programs, including Community Schools. The Anchorage School District reports; Community Schools, Community Services, School Business Partnership, Community In Schools and a Bureau of Land Management Grant that funds Students Work Experience.

While the Director of Community Education supervises these programs, each has their own budget code, revenue and expenditure report. For Community Schools the information given above reflects accurate expenditures and revenues for FY02.

I am very much opposed to this concept. Community Education is a very important part of a community in the rural and bush communities. We offer very vital services here in Skagway.

Right now Skagway's Community Ed program is funded (\$115,000.00 starting June 1, 2001-May 31, 2002) through the federal 21<sup>st</sup> CCLC grant which expires here May 31, 2004. When this source of funding expires in Skagway we will be needing the \$1500.00 we receive now even more desperately! The funds we received from the state last year was used to purchase materials for Summer School which has been re-instituted by Community Ed. to help students that were in danger and to help others with their academic retention as we plan this right in the middle of summer break. Teachers are very pleased that students have not lost what was learned from the previous year.


With the State Of Alaska requiring benchmark and high school qualifying exams there has to be source of funding available to aid students in reaching these goals. Community Ed in Skagway is the method the school district has chosen to help the students. Community Education is the program in place for After-School tutoring and homework and summer school.

The budget last year for the After School program was \$17250.00 for certified and non-certified staff in salaries alone, this does not include my time and participation and all the supplies. I am using figures June 1/01-May 31/02. This current year has two certified teachers and one more non-certified helping the in After School program so the figure quoted would be even higher and again this would not include my time as I am active in the After School as well.

Community Ed will start implementing a fee structure this summer but as you can see every little bit helps. Community Ed also provides a very sound recreation program and offers many workshops both educational and recreational for students and the public. I have not included any budget figures for this

Please do not cut the Community Education budget.

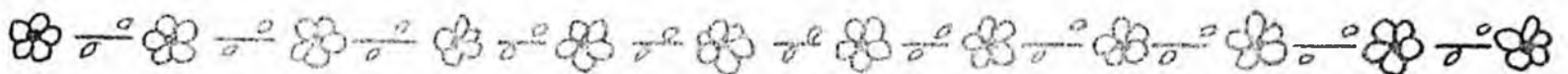

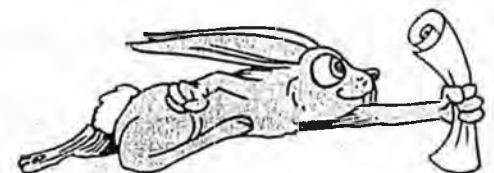

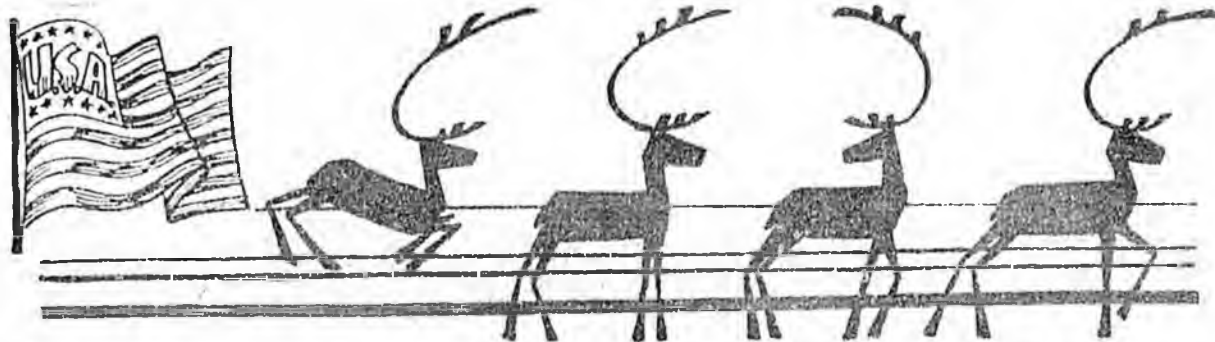
