Bonus: Plan to eliminate program draws outcry

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the Alaska Commission on Aging. Burgin and others from around the state commented on the Bonus proposal during a Commission on Aging legislative teleconference March 11.

"One gentleman told me that he and his wife each receive \$250 a month, so for them it will be a \$500 reduction in their monthly budget," said Denise Daniello, executive director of the North Star Council on Aging in Fairbanks. "His wife is on a lot of different types of prescription drugs, so without that \$500 they are going to have to make some crucial decisions with respect to medicine versus food. A lot of seniors in Fairbanks are very concerned."

And many around the state are very mad.

"Seniors met in the lunchroom here yesterday," said a woman from Cordova during the teleconference. "They circulated a petition to impeach Murkowski."

A broad array of organizations, from the Tanana Chiefs Conference to the Alaska Public Interest Research Group to retired teachers and Pioneers' Homes resident organizations are voicing concern — or outrage — over Murkowski's proposal.

"We've made a concerted effort to have our membership send public opinion messages, faxes, personal letters and telephone calls to legislators," said Robert Huffman, chairman of the Pioneers of Alaska statewide Grand Igloo Legislative and Government Affairs committee.

"A lot of these old-timers are helping to pay their way in the Pioneers Home system via the Longevity Bonus. They're using it for medical reasons and pharmaceuticals and it would hurt a lot of them if in fact they pulled the rug out from under the entire program," Huffman said.

The Pioneers of Alaska organization has between 7,000 and 8,000 members statewide, and Huffman estimates 30 to 40 percent of them receive the Bonus.

The Pioneers are coor-

inating their lobbying efforts with an even larger organization. AARP, which has some 70,000 members statewide.

"This is the first time the Pioneers of Alaska and the AARP have worked together jointly like this," AARP state communications director Ann Secrist said. "We're sharing information, making sure that as we get the word out, they get the word out to the Pioneers." **Unanswered questions**

Shortly after Murkowski's announcement, AARP fired off a press statement challenging the wisdom of the proposal on several fronts.

"We're concerned that, as the Bonus goes to the oldest of older Alaskans, these are the same ones who are likely to use the most pharmaceutical drugs, and are the ones most likely to be widowed older women trying to 'age in place' and stay independent," the statement said. "It would be difficult for people to go back to work at their ages. The Longevity Bonus recipients have received these checks for years and have built it into their monthly budgets."

The statement noted that the proposal comes right on the tail of huge increases in prescription drug prices, and that Alaska has no plan to help deal with these costs.

"Pharmaceutical prices in Alaska rose over 25 percent in 2001 — 25 percent in just one year. This was the highest increase in the entire United States," according to the press statement.

Secrist said it doesn't make sense to propose cutting a benefit like the Bonus when lawmakers know little about the recipients or their needs.

"It's amazing, because the state doesn't even know," she said. "We're suggesting the state study it, find out who is receiving it and what it is being used for."

The program was established in 1972, according to

Murkowski, "as a way to say 'thank you' to pioneer Alaskans who brought us into statehood."

In 1984, the Alaska Supreme Court opened the program to all Alaska residents who were 65 or older at the time. By 1993, the program had 22,741 recipients and the cost to the state was up to \$67 million a year. It was then that the state, under Gov. Hickel, decided to phase the program out. No new members have been added since the end of 1996. The youngest Bonus recipients are more than 70 years old, and enrollment has dropped to a current total of 18,000.

Calls to the Longevity Bonus office were referred to Department of Administration staff, who did not respond in time for the Senior Voice deadline.

Economic repercussions

Murkowski argues that the court ruling that changed the residency requirements effectively killed the Bonus program as it was originally conceived.

"The judiciary eliminated the Longevity program for Alaska's pioneers," he wrote in a letter accompanying his legislation. "The bill I transmit today ends its successor, eliminating a program that has outlived its original purpose and no longer offers special consideration to those pioneers so deserving of our thanks."

Some argue that the state will be shooting itself in the foot, financially, by eliminating the Longevity Bonus. A year 2000 study conducted by the McDowell Group for the Alaska Commission on Aging found that seniors make up one of the largest industries in Alaska, in terms of impact on the state economy through their spending. Furthermore, the researchers concluded that senior spending has a "multiplier effect" — for every dollar of retirement income a senior spends, the report stated, "an estimated \$1 or more of additional economic activity is generated as senior spending is collected and re-spent by other entities in the economy."

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Director Robert Taylor referred to these findings during the recent legislative teleconference, noting that "to take \$47 million out of the pockets of seniors who are spending it at pharmacies, retail stores and grocery stores, has a double negative impact on the economy in Alaska."

Safety net and need

Marie Darlin, of the AARP Capital City Task Force in Juneau, said in written testimony to the legislature that in 1999, there were 6,000 Alaska seniors living on less than \$1,000 per month. Statistically, 8 percent or more of the state's seniors are at or below the poverty line and many more, about 40 percent, have income lower than the HUD low-income limit.

In referring to the "safety net" of public services during his March 5 budget speech, Murkowski mentioned Adult Public Assistance. However, others have pointed out that this welfare program will not help make up for lost Longevity Bonus checks. Bonus checks currently don't count as income when determining eligibility for Adult Public Assistance, so taking away the checks would have no bearing on someone's eligibility for the welfare benefits.

It also would have little bearing on their eligibility for the Meals on Wheels program, contrary to what some people have suggested.

"The governor and a lot of his staffers have been saying to the seniors that Meals on Wheels will be there for them," said Susan Faith, executive director of the Salvation Army Older Alaskans Program, which runs Meals on Wheels in Anchorage. However, the assertion is inaccurate because eligibility for the home-delivered meal program is based on physical need, not income, Faith said.

While the program serves a very important role, Faith said she can understand why many seniors have been of-

fended by the suggestion they can rely on Meals on Wheels in the absence of Bonus checks. "It antagonizes seniors from the perspective that it attacks their efforts to be independent," she said.

Another idea that offends many seniors is the proposal to make the Bonus a needs-based program.

"We fought that (idea) during the Knowles administration. He introduced it no less than three times during his two terms in office," says Robert Huffman, of Pioneers of Alaska. "To turn it into a needs-based, welfare program ... you lose all the dignity of why it was introduced to begin with. The vast majority of the recipients are in the higher \$250 category, and these tend to be the old-timers for which the program was conceived to begin with. They've never been on welfare in their life. They'd rather do without, even though it would hurt them."

Huffman also said it doesn't make sense for the state to add a new layer of administration to oversee a needs-based program, when the current program is growing smaller each year through attrition.

"In the next two or three years, the program is going to go down between \$5 to \$10 million every year. It's being phased-out. We say, let it die a natural death."

Survey seniors for proof of the Bonus' true worth

There is no "safety net" that could be in place by June 2003 to protect the oldest, most infirm or neediest of elder Alaskans.

Asking the Longevity Bonus program administration to include a questionnaire with the monthly response form and blue envelope could at least inform the Legislature and the governor whose rug they propose to pull out from under the elders, and how important that rug is to their survival.

When the phase-out law was enacted and became effective, it began reducing the amount paid, depending on the age of applicants, and gave time for those facing aging – time to know what to expect. We relied and rely on those promises.

Imagine if you are part of an elder couple in your late 70s, 80s or older, earned little cash income in your working lives, receive little or no Social Security income, live far from the world of case workers and need some cash to purchase necessities. The Longevity Bonus program has allowed you to preserve some of your Alaskan independence and dignity. Taking \$500 from a couple or \$250 from a single elder may mean them having to forego food or medicine.

For many of us from age 73 in 2004 down to the cutoff group (all over 70 in 2004), the Longevity Bonus program is our bulwark against being obliged by need to surrender independence and control of our lives to regulation by social workers hired by state agencies to administer and monitor such "safety net" programs as Medicaid and welfare, e.g. Adult Public Assistance.

Instead of paying our own way, we will have to ask Medicaid to take over the monthly payment of Part B of Medicare premiums and replace the Medigap insurance most of us have been paying, in addition to picking up the many other costs of care, from prescriptions to supplies such as respirators.

The affluent few among elder Alaskans can opt out of the program simply by not returning the monthly response form and the little blue envelope by which we report presence in Alaska and eligibility. They do not have to die off to leave the program.

Legislators oppose eliminating the Bonus

When we gathered in Juneau this year, Democratic legislators made protecting Alaska's seniors and elders a high priority. Unfortunately, our new governor, Frank Murkowski, doesn't seem to be on our side.

For one thing, the governor has proposed eliminating the Longevity Bonus starting in July. We are very upset that he would betray a 1994 promise to seniors that Alaska would continue the bonus to those who were already receiving it. Many seniors use Longevity Bonus payments to pay for food, clothing, medicine and other necessities. Cutting off these payments would cause real hardship.

Governor Murkowski added insult to injury by suggesting that seniors hurt by this cut could get relief by applying for welfare. He is apparently unaware that the Longevity Bonus is not counted when determining whether someone is eligible for Adult Public Assistance, so losing the Longevity Bonus will not help you qualify.

Besides, why would Governor Murkowski want to throw Longevity Bonus recipients onto the welfare rolls? We'll fight this bad idea from the Murkovski-Leman administration every step of the way.

On the positive side, we are trying to find ways to lower the cost of prescription drugs. Working with AARP, we are considering two approaches to this problem. One would require prescription drugs to be sold at a reduced price to seniors. We also are considering an approach that would secure voluntary senior discounts from pharmacists.

We also are supporting legislation that would protect Alaskans from unwanted telemarketing calls. Seniors are often targets of flim-flam artists and others who call people at home with a sales pitch. You shouldn't have to suffer these intrusions if you don't want them. These bills would set up a list of people who don't want to be called, and telemarketers would be prohibited from calling people on the list. When they call someone not on the list, they would have to identify themselves as telemarketers.

Issues affecting Alaska's seniors and elders are close to our hearts. That's why we intend to be a strong voice for your interests in Juneau.

The Longivity program for the older Alaska residents should not be discontinued. Most of these Pioneers have resided in Alaska for the past fifty years and endured many hardships. They have earned the small return for their efforts with the Longivity bonus. Income is limited for the elderly who have no basis for income necessary to pay their bills. Economic times are a fraction as what is available at the present time ^{due} to alarming increases in wages to State employees who benefit to tremendous health and retirement programs. Comparatively the 250.00 bonus is a mere fraction to the benefits received by retired employees from the public and government agencies as well as to the military retirees.

For practical reasons the Permanent Fund should be eliminated in its entirety. The sum of at least 25% is returned to the government as income taxes. If the Permanent fund would be eliminated the 25% ⁺ of taxable income could be retained by the State and returned to the Alaskans at 100% and the taxed 25% could be returned to the Alaskans in other programs such as health and housing as elderly care. As it is now the recipients of the fund are children, included, spent by the parents, on unnecessary items so it would be better to cancel the fund. Twenty five percent would not revert to the Government as income taxes, and as stated this 25% could be returned to the elderly and those who need it, rather than "throwing it away."



I am a 38-year resident of Alaska and receive a \$100-per-month longevity bonus payment. I do not rely on this stipend for a comfortable livelihood and would not support the continuation of the program for myself. However, I am adamantly opposed to the governor's proposed abolishing of the program for moral, humane, and economic reasons:

First, because seniors in the program constitute a relatively small percentage of Alaska's population they are, therefore, vulnerable to the bullying and discrimination implicit in the governor's draconian proposal. I believe that many senior recipients of the bonus would have to leave the state if the program were abolished. Thus, this proposal seems immoral--in effect, a broken promise and an arrogant power tactic without regard for the human dignity of valuable Alaskan citizens.

Second, the bonus recipients who depend on the bonus for their independence and dignity should not suddenly be reduced to going, hat in hand, to plead for charity from welfare programs. I have many proud senior friends and acquaintances whose contributions to Alaska over the years far exceed the small longevity stipend. The governor's rash, arbitrary, ill-considered proposal undermines and insults the humanity of some of our most valuable, creative citizens.

Third, the Alaskans receiving the bonus have chosen to remain in the state. Their residence constitutes a significant contribution to Alaska's economy. They pay taxes; buy food, clothing, medicine, and services here. Their living here and supporting the economy should surely be a factor in considering the status and future of this program.

Finally, I am a conscientious voter in this state and believe other seniors and their families vote (the implications of the governor's proposal may far exceed the concerns of only senior citizens). I shall continue to watch the actions of our elected officials and urge the legislature to continue their concern and respect for senior citizens.

My name is Gary Longley, Sr. and I just turned 70 years old. I am among the oldest of the group that was not eligible for the longevity bonus so have no axe to bear on discontinuance of this program.

However, my Mother who turns 92 in July of 2003 and my brother who will turn 66 in May will be adversely affected by losing her longevity bonus. They live in a nursing home in Anchorage and only receive social security and disability payments along with her longevity bonus. If she should lose the bonus, they may not be able to afford living in the nursing home.

It doesn't take a big brain to realize that closing out of the longevity bonus program will be done shortly because these old people are dying off. Attrition will automatically close out the program.

Also please keep in mind that all recipients are now in their seventies, eighties and nineties!!! They are used to receiving the bonus and it is too late for them to adjust to a major economic change. I can only speak on behalf of some of the Eskimo people, but I know that they are a proud people and do not want to be placed on welfare if there is some other alternative.

Governor Murkowski stated that the judiciary eliminated the longevity program for Alaska's Pioneers. What about those Pioneers who still live in Nome, Anchorage and the villages including the Eskimo Pioneers who do not live in Pioneer homes? This program has not outlived its' purpose, it will have outlived its' purpose when all of the recipients have gone to the happy hunting ground!!!

Testimony to Senate State Affairs Committee March 26, 2003

Chairman and Committee Members --

My name is Marie Darlin. I am Coordinator of the AARP Capital City Task Force. You have received a letter from the AARP State Office regarding our concern about SB 117, which repeals the Longevity Bonus for Seniors. I wish to add a few additional facts to your deliberations.

The Longevity Bonus is important to many seniors and is phasing itself out. The cost has dropped 13 million in the last four years and will continue to decrease even more each year. Research shows that 12,000 or 2/3 of the 18,000 seniors on the Longevity Bonus are over age 75 that receive the \$250. They are our most elderly, so we know the yearly cost will be declining more rapidly each year. If you don't believe me, read the obituaries in your local papers. In 1999 over 2,000 of the state's seniors were over age 85.

One of the main reasons for the Longevity Bonus was to keep our seniors in Alaska, so they wouldn't have to leave upon retirement. And statistics show they are staying. The Bonus helps them do that. There are reasons you should want them to stay in Alaska.

Governor Murkowski talks a lot about Alaska resources and business. The Alaska SENIORS ARE BOTH. Although they are usually overlooked or ignored when either is mentioned. I want to refer you to the December 2001 study entitled "Issues Affecting the Economic Well-Being of Alaska Seniors" prepared by the McDowell Group for the Alaska Commission on Aging, and also to the Dept of Labor Trends issue of December 2001.

SENIORS ARE A BASIC INDUSTRY. They bring revenue into the state- i.e. retirement pension income, investments and assets, medicare and medical

payments, veterans benefits, Social Security payments, etc.-- that came to a total of 1 billion, 217 million in 1999. Most of it was spent here. If you apply the multiplier of two to this income, this is a 2.4 billion impact on our economy, generating more income than most of the state's leading industries. Thus the 47 million the Governor saves by eliminating the bonus takes 94 million of the Alaska's economy.

The seniors are also an important RESOURCE that gets overlooked most of the time. The McDowell report shows 20,000 seniors over age 50 provide 400,000 hours a month of volunteer time to our communities. This is the equivalent of 2400 full time jobs worth approximately 60 million per year. Many non-profit organizations could not exist without this help. Our municipalities also benefit greatly from these volunteer services. Then we have the senior caregivers who provide an average of 20 days per month of unpaid care to someone. An equivalent of 6300 full time jobs.

In 1999 there were 6,000 Alaska seniors living on less than \$1,000 per month, the poverty level, and the bonus is important to them. It provides about 10% of the income for single seniors. The seniors are an important part of our communities, and critical to many of our families, and they hope to spend the rest of their lives here.

These statistics show how our seniors contribute to our state and I ask you to consider them in your deliberations. I want to thank the Commission on Aging for the McDowell Study, which had been needed for a long time. I urge all legislators to review it.
