You advised you would reconvene the committee on Thursday, April 3 at 3:30 p.m. We decided, in the interest of time, that we would submit our comments in writing.


Senator, the original program was a promise made to those Pioneer Seniors, that if they were here prior to Statehood, and worked to help grow our great State, that when they turn 65 years old, they would be paid compensated a certain amount each month for the rest of their lives. We recognize that the program was modified by later legislation, but that in no way alters the promise made, or the debt owed. It is fundamentally unfair and wrong to now eliminate the Longevity Bonus Program that many who met the requirements and now count on, and rely upon, in their retirement years. They wish now to live out their lives in the State they love, and worked hard to help build. Suddenly, they see that it may be eliminated, and their life is shattered.

In our opinion, the State of Alaska, through legislative action, promised those pioneers that met the requirements outlined in the program, they would receive the bonus outlined in the bill. A promise made equals a responsibility of the State of Alaska to keep its word, and honor the promise.

We came to Alaska in 1954. We made Anchorage our home, and raised our family here. Our funds are basically spent in Alaska, and we have paid our taxes and property taxes ever since that date. We have met all the requirements of that original promise by the State of Alaska. Our Governor now is recommending that it be taken away. The legislature made the promise and we are convinced that you will honor that promise. Governor Murkowski may not think much of promise made, but, it was made by the legislature, and that's a responsibility that falls in your area of integrity.

The Governor's desire to eliminate the program can have harmful consequences on Alaska communities. The Longevity Bonus makes it possible for many Alaskans to continue to live in Alaska, where they spend not just Longevity Bonus dollars, but Social Security income, other retirement checks, investment earning and health care insurance dollars. That money ripples through local economies, restaurants, grocery stores, dentist offices and hardware stores. The seniors are a strong part of Alaska. Don't make them lead the charge to correct Alaska's past poor fiscal management. Our seniors are passing on fast enough, without adding this additional stress to these true Pioneers.
