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## Assembly: Pay fines or lose car

**TRAFFIC TICKETS: Thousands of scofflaws owe the city more than \$7.6 million.**

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More than 1,000 drivers owe the city at least \$1,000 in unpaid traffic tickets. Under a new ordinance approved by the Anchorage Assembly on Tuesday night, those drivers could lose their car the next time they're pulled over.

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Outgoing South Anchorage Assemblywoman Janice Shamberg and downtown Assemblyman Allan Tesche proposed the change, saying people who collect dozens of tickets and can't be bothered to pay for them are too dangerous to stay on the road.

"This is to pull those people out of their automobiles ... and say, 'OK, walk,'" Shamberg said. "Ride a bike, take a bus, but don't go out and hurt anybody else."

All told, more than 23,700 people owe the city \$7.6 million in unpaid tickets as of early this year.

Some who owe the most also have lengthy rap sheets, according to police. No one showed to testify against the changes during a public hearing Tuesday night.

"They're the same folks we deal with on a regular bases for criminal issues," Police Chief Rob Reun told the Assembly.

One driver, Darnell Jones, has 43 unpaid traffic tickets worth more than \$9,300, according to a list compiled by the city. Another, Eldridge Bradley, has amassed 70 citations and owes nearly \$7,900.

Under the new ordinance, it would be a misdemeanor for anyone who has at least three unpaid traffic tickets worth \$1,000 or more to drive in Anchorage. If caught and convicted, the driver's car would be impounded for 30 days, said assistant municipal attorney Joshua Freeman.

Drivers who still refuse to pay fines and are caught again could lose their car for good. The law would apply to unpaid traffic tickets -- for speeding or running red lights, for example -- but not to parking tickets.

If a person with unpaid fines is caught driving someone else's car, the city must prove that the car's owner knew about and ignored the traffic violations.

Getting your car back costs \$390 in administrative fees, plus towing and storage fees, Freeman said.

With little debate, the Assembly unanimously approved the ordinance. But that doesn't mean the changes are a sure thing.

The new rules hinge on the passage of a bill that gives cities the authority to impound and seize people's vehicles over unpaid tickets. Rep. Berta Gardner, D-Anchorage, proposed the bill -- which is awaiting a hearing in the House Judiciary Committee -- and said its chances are good.

She said the Fairbanks mayor's office has shown interest in scofflaw laws too. "It isn't something that's just for Anchorage."

Supporters of the so-called scofflaw law say that while hundreds of drivers would be at risk of losing their cars, the city wouldn't be knocking on doors and collecting keys of people who already owe \$1,000 or more.

You wouldn't have your vehicle impounded unless police pulled you over.

"This doesn't mean they'll be issuing warrants and trying to snag these vehicles off the street,"

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Gardner said.

Lt. Nancy Reeder is head of the police department's traffic unit. This year, she said, none of the drivers involved in any of the city's seven fatal car accidents had poor driving records. Still, she said that when someone piles up dozens of unpaid tickets, it shows a pattern of risky behavior.

"The potential for somebody to die at the hands of that driver is there," she said.

Reeder said the computer system used by police doesn't tell them whether a driver has unpaid traffic fines. "We stopped doing traffic warrants many, many, many years ago, simply because there were so many of them."

If the new impound rules are adopted, Reeder said some system would likely be put in place to flag scofflaws -- the same way police are able to tell if your license is suspended.

This is Shamberg's last month as an Assembly member. She did not run for re-election in this month's election, opting to focus on her first grandchild, but said in January that passing a scofflaw law was one of her last priorities.

She previously championed a law that requires Anchorage children to wear bicycle helmets.

# Penalty fits the crime

*City has right idea to seize cars of worst traffic ticket scofflaws*

**T**he city needs a heavier hammer to enforce traffic safety laws; a more effective way to collect unpaid fines from the worst offenders. More than 1,000 drivers owe more than \$1,000 each in unpaid traffic tickets.

So the Assembly passed a new law Tuesday evening that would allow the city to impound a car for 30 days if the driver owes at least \$1,000 in unpaid tickets. Drivers who refuse to settle up and are nabbed a second time could lose their car or truck permanently.

A strong penalty, no doubt, but a just penalty for drivers who show no respect for the law and for the safety of others on the road. Unfortunately, it's not as easy as the Assembly passing an ordinance and waiting for the first bust. State law does not allow municipalities to impound or permanently seize a vehicle for the owner's unpaid traffic tickets.

That's where Rep. Berta Gardner is trying to help. The Anchorage Democrat has a bill before her colleagues that would amend state law to give such authority to cities and boroughs. Her bill would not require municipalities to get into the business; it would be a local option.

House Bill 169 is scheduled for a hearing Wednesday in the House Judiciary Committee. If successful there, it could go to the full House for a vote, and then over to the Senate for its consideration.

The \$1,000 in unpaid traffic tickets would have to come entirely from the city or borough that wants to impound the car. No piling on unpaid tickets from other towns. It would be a local law based solely on a local problem.

And unpaid tickets are a problem. In addition to the 1,000 worst offenders in Anchorage with thousand-dollar debts, there are an additional 23,000 drivers with at least one unpaid ticket. The total debt to the city? About \$7.6 million.

It's not like the city has been sitting on its hands in recent years, ignoring the debt. Stepped-up collection efforts including Permanent Fund dividend and wage garnishments have brought in several million dollars since 2003.

Sponsors of the new Anchorage ordinance, Assembly members Janice Shamberg and Allan Tesche, say the idea is that drivers who are irresponsible enough to rack up multiple tickets but aren't responsible enough to pay the bill probably are too dangerous to stay on the road.

Makes sense. The Legislature should see it the same way and pass the enabling change in state law.

**BOTTOM LINE:** Drivers should be responsible to pay their tickets. If not, they shouldn't drive.

# Lose the car

**I**T IS ACTUALLY difficult to believe that 23,700 people owe the city something like \$7.6 million in unpaid traffic tickets.

According to an Anchorage Daily News story, there are at least 1,000 people who each owe at least \$1,000 apiece, with one guy owing more than \$9,000 for 43 unpaid traffic tickets. Police say many of these scofflaws who skip on their tickets are criminals in their own right.

The Assembly this week approved an ordinance that could have those folks walking. The next time they are stopped, they could end up losing their cars. The way it would work, the newspaper says, is that the new ordinance would make it a misdemeanor for anyone to drive in Anchorage with three unpaid traffic tickets totaling \$1,000 or more.

Drivers unlucky enough to be stopped under those circumstances would lose their vehicles for 30 days. If they refuse to pay the fine, they could lose their car for good if stopped again.

All of this, of course, is contingent on the Legislature's passage of a measure that would allow cities to seize vehicles because of unpaid traffic tickets.

The bleeding hearts among us will argue that the city could be taking cars from people who need them for work. Get real. If you owe a wad of dough for unpaid traffic tickets — \$9,000 for 43 tickets, for crying out loud — we want you off the road.

It is incredible that this city has allowed this kind of thing for so long. The scofflaws should have been brought to heel long ago. The rest of us do the responsible thing when we run afoul of the law. They can, too.

Or walk.

**Written Remarks before Senate Community & Regional Affairs Committee  
Submitted by: Daniel Moore, Treasurer, Municipality of Anchorage

Thank you, Chairman Olson, for the opportunity to provide testimony before your Committee today regarding SB 145, more specifically the working draft Committee substitute which addresses 2 closely related issues dealing with repeat violators owing multiple delinquent traffic citations and criminal fines, all of which are judgment cases that have run through the Alaska Court System. Please note that the Municipality is a formal collection agent of the Court System for these judgment cases.

Unpaid default judgment cases are at a crisis point and local governments and the Alaska Court System need to be empowered with the highest levels of enforcement / collection tools available.

The Municipality strongly supports the concept behind both major elements contained in the Committee Substitute for SB 145, which is before you today. Our objective in promoting this legislation is to enhance public safety, to rightfully hold individuals accountable for past violations of the law, and to strongly encourage greater compliance with the law going forward.

The focus of my testimony today will be on the need for access to employer records held by State Department of Labor (DOL). While we generally support the concept espoused in the draft bill regarding access to employment records we are not comfortable with the proposed language because it is too vague and does not provide adequate assurance that DOL will follow-thru within a reasonable amount of time to requests for employment information from authorized parties. We have literally worked for 2 full years now with various individuals at DOL to gain access to employer records under the existing "may" clause in AS 23.20.110P but DOL has repeatedly delayed and obstructed our requests. New statutory language that is clear and accountable to both DOL and any authorized local government official requesting employer data is what is needed. Below is our suggested language to remove ambiguity from the bill:

Section 1. AS 23.20.110 is amended by adding a new subsection to read:

**CURRENT DRAFT**

~~(r) The department may provide information obtained under this chapter to a municipal attorney to assist the municipality in the collection of civil or criminal fines, penalties, or other payments or judgments ordered by a court. The department may not release information under this section to a municipal attorney until the department and~~ <sup>for this chapter</sup>

~~the municipal attorney have entered into a written agreement that governs the release of the information. The written agreement must specify~~

- ~~(1) The purpose for the information;~~
- ~~(2) A description of the information to be provided;~~
- ~~(3) A description of the procedure for transmitting, securing, using and disposing of information; and~~
- ~~(4) The method of reimbursement for the cost of providing the information.~~

#### **REVISED DRAFT**

(r) Upon written request by a municipal attorney or borough attorney of a political subdivision of the State of Alaska, the department shall provide the most recent or currently available employer data to be used by requestor for wage garnishment purposes. The department shall make every effort to provide, in an electronic format, a data match to the requestor-provided listing of debtors owing a criminal or civil fine or fee resulting from a court judgment. The requestor shall provide verification data to the department for any person or persons where wage garnishment is sought, including name and social security number. At a minimum, matched records provided by the department to the requestor shall:

- (1) first be provided with 180 days of the enactment of the legislation;
- (2) subsequently be provided within 30 days of request;
- (3) include required data elements necessary to effect wage garnishment, specifically:
  - a. current legal business and employer names, physical work site address, and business phone number.

Initial setup costs associated with establishing an electronic interface, as well as on-going costs incurred to facilitate periodic information exchanges shall be fully borne by the requestor based on actual direct costs incurred plus an overhead rate not-to-exceed 30%.

#### **Background:**

The Municipality of Anchorage has for the past several years dramatically revamped its approach to collection of delinquent traffic citation and criminal

fine judgment cases. During this period we have cleansed our data, hired additional internal and external expertise, and worked closely with a task force comprised of the Court System, DMV, the municipal prosecutor and the Anchorage Police Department to address a serious and ever growing problem of individuals not being held fully accountable for paying traffic fines and criminal fines that have been assessed by the Court.

### Magnitude of the Problem:

The statistics are staggering and the problem is growing worse every year despite all our current collection efforts. Below are statistics which quantify the problem for traffic and criminal fine judgment cases for Anchorage alone:

- Currently there are [REDACTED]. This represents 53,603 unpaid outstanding citations (please see Excel spreadsheet provided to Committee staff, for a detailed listing).
- Owing 4 or more Traffic Citations. There are 3,644 unique individuals who owe \$3.3 million in unpaid traffic citations (i.e., this equates to an average individual owing a cumulative citation balance of \$917). This group represents 15% of the delinquent debtor population and 43% of all the money owed on traffic citations. The average individual citation value for this group is \$138 per ticket (i.e., \$3.3 million owed, divided by 23,974 outstanding citations).
- Owing 1-3 Traffic Citations. There are 20,073 unique individuals who owe \$4.3 million in unpaid traffic citations (i.e., this equates to an average individual owing a cumulative citation balance of \$215). This group represents 85% of the delinquent debtor population and 57% of all the money owed on traffic citations. The average individual citation value for this group is \$145 per ticket (i.e., \$4.29 million owed, divided by 29,629 outstanding citations).
- Currently there are [REDACTED]. This represents 25,930 unpaid criminal fines with an average balance owed of \$626 per judgment case (please see Excel spreadsheet provided to Committee staff, for a detailed listing).

The extreme balances owed by tens of thousands of individuals represent a systemic disregard for the justice system. Individuals are choosing not to pay the fines that have been ordered by the Court. And, to this point, they have become

accustomed to PFD garnishment being a means to passively pay off small portions of what is owed. Note: historically the MOA receives approximately 25% realization on the PFD file we submit each year; in 2006 this 25% realization rate equated to \$3 million. The above figures represent balances still owed after applying 2006 PFD money. Every year approximately \$6 million of new judgment cases are passed to us by the Court. We are losing ground in collecting each year due to the volumes of new cases and the existing limitations on our ability to garnish funds.

**Proposed Solution:**

The Wage Garnishment issue, along with impounding vehicles where > \$1,000 in delinquent traffic fines is owed, were both proposals that came out of a local task force recommendation comprised of Court System, DMV, APD, Municipal Prosecutor and MOA Treasury. Both proposals were also included as top priorities within the Public Safety legislative section of the Municipality's 2007 Legislative Program.

A State Law change would provide DOL with clear authority to work with municipalities to enforce collection of court-ordered fines. We believe that having the ability to use wage garnishment on a large scale will send a strong message to the violators (and to the rest of the population) that we are no longer going to allow these violators to evade paying the traffic and criminal fines that they have been assessed after receiving due process through the court system. We want to ensure that violators are held fully accountable for their actions.

The Municipality is not asking for any information related to unemployment claims made or in-process. MOA only needs to receive Employer Name & Address for those individuals who are currently working, as of the most recent quarterly filing received from private employers.

**Note:** DOL already has pre-existing established practices to share information with other agencies such as Child Support and DHSS. There are specific provisions in State law currently that authorize DOL to share information with other named agencies. The proposed legislation would explicitly add one more set of authorized entities able to receive Employer Name / Address information from DOL.

**Benefits Derived:**

We believe that full enforcement of Court orders on public safety matters is what the public expects. The Department of Revenue and the Alaska Court System have worked closely with the MOA for the past 12+ years to share confidential

information in order to pursue collection. We literally have access to 600,000 PFD applications with name, phone, address, SS # and D.O.B. While this is a very effective garnishment tool it's limited by the amount of PFD money available each year. Wage garnishment, on the other hand, would provide a garnishment tool many times greater than PFD.

**Initial concerns of DOL, addressed in our REVISED Committee Substitute draft language for SB 145:**

With respect to confidentiality of information there is no federal restriction on sharing Employer Name / Address information between DOL and the Municipality. And, with respect to fiscal impact, there would be no need for increased budgetary authority since the authorized requestor of the Employer Name / Address information would be the entity required through State law to bear 100% of all direct costs + a not-to-exceed 30% overhead rate (i.e., indirect costs).

DOL will be able to select the IT vendor of their choice to create an electronic data interface. This IT project is not considered complicated. The data sharing requests literally can be done with a few pushes of the button, once the interface is created. The Municipality, as a requestor, would pay all direct costs incurred + a maximum 30% overhead markup. The Municipality expects to request information from DOL only 1-4 times per year. There would be no need for DOL to add any additional staff. The legislation would give them clear, up-front authority. There would be no need for a special attorney to review each and every request. The Municipality already fully complies with security requirements of the DOL, per questions asked of us by Pat Shier of DOL - anyone from DOL/Anchorage or DOL/Juneau can audit the Municipality's secured environment at anytime without any material cost impact to DOL. Legal review and security checks are upfront tasks that would be done as part of initial setup and then only periodically on an as-needed basis going forward.

**Additional comments re: protection of confidential information:**

The Municipality already receives 600,000 Names, Social Security #'s and D.O.B.'s from the Department of Revenue / PFD office each year in order to facilitate garnishment of PFD. There is pre-existing authority in State Statute and in the Court Rules to allow the Municipality to receive confidential information to facilitate efficient collection of judgment cases. The Municipality's IT Department already utilizes security data exchange protocols which meet the Department of Revenue / PFD office's strict standards. DOL would fully control the security data exchange protocols that the IT programmer of their choice

would use in building an electronic data interface program to share Employer Name / Address information with the Municipality.

Employer Name / Address is not confidential information when you consider that every type of application for rent, mortgage, cable television service, movie rental, car financing, furniture financing, etc. asks for employer information. Individuals widely and regularly release this basic information for all sorts of general purposes.

The Municipality has had no violations in the past 14 years regarding unauthorized or inappropriate handling of confidential information provided to us by the Department of Revenue / PFD office. The Municipality's concern about protecting individuals' private information is equally as high as any State Agency's concern, including DOL.

The Municipality is a collection agent of the State of Alaska Court System. There is a formal written agreement that has been in place for many years which very clearly describes the MOA's role and responsibility in collecting judgment cases on behalf of the Court.

#### CONCLUSION:

The Municipality needs the proposed legislation in order to document absolute, clear statutory authority for information sharing of Employer Name / Address. This legislation would make it clear to everyone (i.e., DOL, judgment debtors, private employers, federal agencies and municipalities) what specific authorities / requirements exist - i.e., requiring a reasonable timely response by DOL and requiring authorized requestors to fully bear the cost of periodic requests made. This legislation also makes it clear that the DOL is not required to pass back confidential information (i.e., Social Security number), only non-confidential information (i.e., Employer Name / Address).

This legislation promotes the greatest public good by holding debtors accountable for breaking public laws. This can only help to encourage greater compliance with laws in the future and improve public safety. In addition, every dollar collected via wage garnishment by Municipality will go back to the Anchorage Police Department's budget to fund police enforcement, in addition to reimbursing the Court for their portion of Court collection costs.

**Subject:** RE: Updated: Legislative Hearing - MOA Testimony - Senate C&RA Committee re: SB 145

My comments:

1. The Assembly has made a finding based on data provided by the Anchorage Police Department that there is a significantly high co-relation between motor vehicle accidents caused by drivers with significant delinquent traffic fines.
2. There are other ways to address the problem of scofflaws who have paid their traffic fines under state law e.g. contempt, bench warrant, etc or request the court suspend a license under AS 28.15.181(g). However, these processes are cumbersome and may require significant municipal and court resources.
3. The best way to address this problem would be for the state to enact a law requiring some type of automatic driver's license suspension proceeding for drivers who have unpaid traffic fines. However, in the absence of something initiated by the state, or even in addition to any state legislation to address the problem, the municipality believes this is the best approach it may use to deal with the public safety issue of scofflaws.
4. Attached is an amendment needed to properly authorize the municipality to seize vehicles operated by habitual offenders. In order to seize the vehicle it is necessary that there be an underlying crime. The amendment makes it a misdemeanor to operate where the driver has more \$1000 or more in delinquent traffic fines.

7 **FINDINGS.** The legislature finds that providing a voluntary clean elections system for  
8 all primary and general elections would enhance democracy in the state in the following  
9 principal ways:

10 (1) it would affirm the principle of "one person, one vote," reduce the  
11 disproportionate and deleterious influence of large contributors, and restore the rights of  
12 citizens of all backgrounds to equal and meaningful participation in the democratic process;

13 (2) it would slow the escalating cost of elections;

14 (3) it would enable voters and candidates to hear and to be heard in the

1 political process, and restore open and robust debate on issues of public concern;

2 (4) it would diminish the public perception of corruption, strengthen public  
3 confidence in democratic institutions and processes, and eliminate the danger of corruption  
4 caused by the private financing of election campaigns;

5 (5) it would increase the accountability of elected officials to the constituents  
6 who elect them;

7 (6) it would create genuine opportunities for qualified residents of the state to

20 nonparticipating candidate shall, in addition to the reports required under  
21 AS 15.13.040 and 15.13.110, within two days after exceeding that amount, begin  
22 filing spending limit reports with the commission.

23 (c) If the administrator determines under AS 15.70.120 that a nonparticipating  
24 candidate has incurred expenses that exceed 90 percent of the applicable expenditure  
25 limit for a participating candidate under AS 15.70.080, after notice, the  
26 nonparticipating candidate shall, in addition to the reports required under  
27 AS 15.13.040 and 15.13.110, begin filing spending limit reports with the commission.

28 (d) A nonparticipating candidate under (a), (b), or (c) of this section shall file a

27 (3) the report under (a) of this section does not correctly identify the  
28 candidate the expenditure is intended to help elect or defeat.

29 (d) A complaint under (c) of this section must include a statement of facts  
30 supporting the complaint, the name of the candidate the complainant believes the  
31 expenditure is intended to help elect or defeat, and, if available to the complainant, a

1 copy of the communication alleged to have been funded by the independent  
2 expenditure. The administrator shall give the person or group making the expenditure  
3 an opportunity to be heard. Within seven days after the filing of the complaint, the  
4 administrator shall decide whether the subject of the complaint is an independent  
5 expenditure under this section and, if necessary, whom the expenditure is intended to  
6 help elect or defeat. A decision of the administrator under this subsection is valid only  
7 for the purpose of determining the appropriate treatment of the expenditure under (e)  
8 of this section.

9 (e) If an independent expenditure is reported under (a) of this section or an  
10 expenditure is determined to be an independent expenditure under (d) of this section,  
11 the administrator, in determining whether a participating candidate is entitled to  
12 matching funds under AS 15.70.130, shall

13 (1) treat an independent expenditure against a participating candidate  
14 as the expenditure of the highest spending nonparticipating candidate in that election  
15 contest;

16 (2) treat an independent expenditure made in support of a  
17 nonparticipating candidate as if it were the expenditure of that candidate;

18 (3) in an election contest with more than one participating candidate,  
19 treat an independent expenditure made in support of a participating candidate as if it  
20 were an excess expenditure of a nonparticipating opposing candidate of any other  
21 participating candidate in that election contest;

22 (4) in an election contest with more than one participating candidate,  
23 treat an independent expenditure against a participating candidate as if it were an  
24 excess expenditure of a nonparticipating opposing candidate of that participating  
25 candidate.

26 **Sec. 15.70.150. Permitted use of funds.** (a) A participating candidate may use  
27 contributions and funds received under this chapter only for the purposes set out in  
28 AS 15.13.112.

29 (b) If the commission determines that a participating candidate used funds  
30 received under this chapter in violation of AS 15.13.112, the commission shall notify  
31 the participating candidate, and the candidate shall, after notice and opportunity for

1 hearing, reimburse the fund the amount determined by the commission.

2 **Sec. 15.70.160. Contributions by political parties.** A participating candidate  
3 may accept contributions from a political party during the primary and general  
4 election campaign periods if the total amount of contributions received by the  
5 candidate from all political parties does not exceed 10 percent of the fund distribution  
6 for the office the participating candidate seeks under AS 15.70.090(a)(1) for the  
7 primary election or AS 15.70.090(a)(2) for the general election.

8 **Sec. 15.70.170. Repayment of unused funds.** (a) Within 14 days after the  
9 director of elections certifies the results of the primary election, a certified candidate  
10 who is not successful in the primary election shall return to the commission all funds  
11 received by the candidate under this chapter that were not spent or obligated to be  
12 spent during the primary election campaign period.

13 (b) Within 14 days after the certification of the results of the general election,  
14 a certified candidate shall return to the commission all funds received by the candidate  
15 under this chapter that were not spent or obligated to be spent during the general  
16 election campaign period.

17 **Sec. 15.70.180. Candidates by petition.** (a) A candidate who is seeking to be  
18 nominated by petition under AS 15.25.140 – 15.25.200 may become a certified  
19 candidate by complying with the requirements of AS 15.70.020 – 15.70.070. The  
20 administrator may not certify a candidate under this subsection until the director of  
21 elections has verified that the candidate has qualified for the general election ballot. A  
22 candidate nominated by petition is eligible only for funding under AS 15.70.090(a)(2).

23 (b) A certified candidate who has been nominated by petition may solicit and  
24 accept private contributions and contributions from political parties for the general  
25 election if the total amount of contributions received by the candidate does not exceed  
26 10 percent of the fund distribution for the office the candidate seeks under  
27 AS 15.70.090(a)(2).

28 **Sec. 15.70.190. Governor and lieutenant governor joined campaigns.** (a) If  
29 a political party nominates candidates for governor and lieutenant governor who were  
30 both participating candidates during the primary election campaign period, the  
31 candidates shall form a joined campaign for the general election. The joined campaign
