we here at the Museum would be most pleased to offer advice and council in the establishment of a museum there and we would also be pleased to maintain some sort of continuing cooperation which might mean the exchange of materials and personnel, as well as the training of your students and ours. For example, our people here would be pleased to help you in continuing to evaluate the best possible uses of such a museum in your Community and to remain in long-lasting contact with the people who look after the museum in Barrow.

Perhaps something extraordinary and interesting can grow out of this. We know that many young people in every society these days are losing contact with the past and it is possible that the museum contemplated at Barrow could be a center for the training of your young people in the great traditions of your past, as well as training in the crafts which are unique to the Eskimo people. That is, the older men and women of your Town might well use the museum as a center for the instruction of the young in what is very characteristically Eskimo. In other words, we sincerely hope that this museum will become a cultural center for your Community.

We are also concerned with helping you find the necessary funds to erect such a museum. We are just beginning to look at this problem and hope to have some information on it in the near future. However, it is most important that your Council take the initiative in raising the needed money. From our wide experience, it is first necessary for you to obtain a series of gifts and grants from various private and public sources and then to plan the physical facilities after the funds are committed. What you need is to develop a brief description of the idea and the kind of uses you want for the facility. With this description and our letter of intention you should be able to begin immediately to raise the necessary funds which we believe should be between \$500,000. and \$1,000,000. for this kind of museum. Finally, when the Barrow museum is completed, we would like to be able to invite a variety of representatives from our Museum; your local, state and federal government; and other people in the communications media to be present at the dedication ceremonies. Of course, we suggest you too should make such invitations to contributors and other people of Alaska to such an important event in the development of Barrow.

In a very personal vein, I must say it will be a pleasure to me to come to Barrow since I lived in Alaska for many years and am well acquainted with Eskimo people on St. Lawrence Island, Point Hope and Barrow. But I must say I haven't been in Barrow and Point Barrow for more than 25 years. If all this works out, I look forward to renewing my acquaintance with the people of Barrow. In the meantime, I have sent instructions to one of my assistants, John Bockstoe, who is now hunting whales with my friends at Point Hope, to call on you in Barrow for further discussions about organizing and developing the proposed museum there. He may be in Barrow when this letter arrives.

As you know, a disastrous fire in March of this year destroyed the building at Chefornak, Alaska that had been used as a community activity center for many years. It was the only building reasonably suitable for community activities and get-togethers in that remote village. Discussions with Representative Martin Stork and other community leaders of the general area have convinced me that funds should be provided in the general or service-items bill that would permit construction of a community building at Chefornak. The cost of \$25,000 (Twenty thousand dollars) in state funds would enable construction of an adequate facility. This relatively small sum will be sufficient only because the community leaders at Chefornak have been raising other additional funds among their own people, and because a considerable part of the labor involved will be on a community volunteer basis. I hope your Committee will include the \$25,000 funding for such a building in the general appropriations bill.

Another item involves a building presently being used as a school classroom and community hall at Thorne Bay, in Southeast Alaska. This building was constructed by the people of Thorne Bay community. The floor is of concrete construction without wooden flooring. Basketball and other sporting events are held there during the long winter months. The bare concrete floor is not only difficult to maneuver on but actually results in a constant safety hazard for many participants. A good wood floor should be installed prior to the next fall school year. There are some other upgrading necessities for the building.

It appears that a further funding of \$25,000 (Twenty Five Thousand Dollars) would bring the facility up to a reasonable standard where the many school students and the several hundred other residents of the community can utilize the building properly throughout the winter months. In arriving at the conclusion that this money should be appropriated, I have taken into consideration the local initiative and input that has already gone into this building.

EXPLANATION: Fire and Safety Improvements:

1. Fire detection, audible alarm and fire station notification systems are needed in each building to meet Alaska and Administrative Code 13ACC50 and the Uniform Building Code.
2. The plumbing system must be upgraded to provide minimum water supply for adequate fire fighting and health standards. Water supply capability for fire fighting is deteriorating rapidly in McIntosh, Nerland, Stevens and Lathrop Halls as well as Patty Gym and the Chapman Building and must be replaced.
3. Three of the above dormitories have dangerously combustible ceiling materials which must be replaced; egress must be improved, including the installation of fire doors and fire walls in all but the Bunnell Building.
4. Heating and ventilating systems must be upgraded to provide minimum controls, heating and ventilating requirements as required by the Uniform Building Code, this is especially the case in the Bunnell Building and the Patty Gym in which these systems must be partially rebuilt.

PROPOSED MUNICIPAL WATER SUPPLY IMPROVEMENTS

City of Kodiak, Alaska

The attached map shows improvements to the Kodiak Water Supply which are now programmed for construction in 1972, 1973, and 1974.

Construction of Monashka Creek Water Project.

A - Completed

1. Construction of a new, 20-inch cast iron transmission line from the pumphouse on Pillar Creek, over the ridge to the existing upper storage reservoir near the City; and
2. Construction of an addition to the Pillar Creek pumphouse, including an additional 3500 gpm pump to increase the pumping capacity from Pillar Creek to 7.5 mgd.
3. Construction of a new, 24-inch transmission line from Pillar Creek to Monashka Creek along the extension of the Pillar Creek Highway which is programmed for construction this summer.

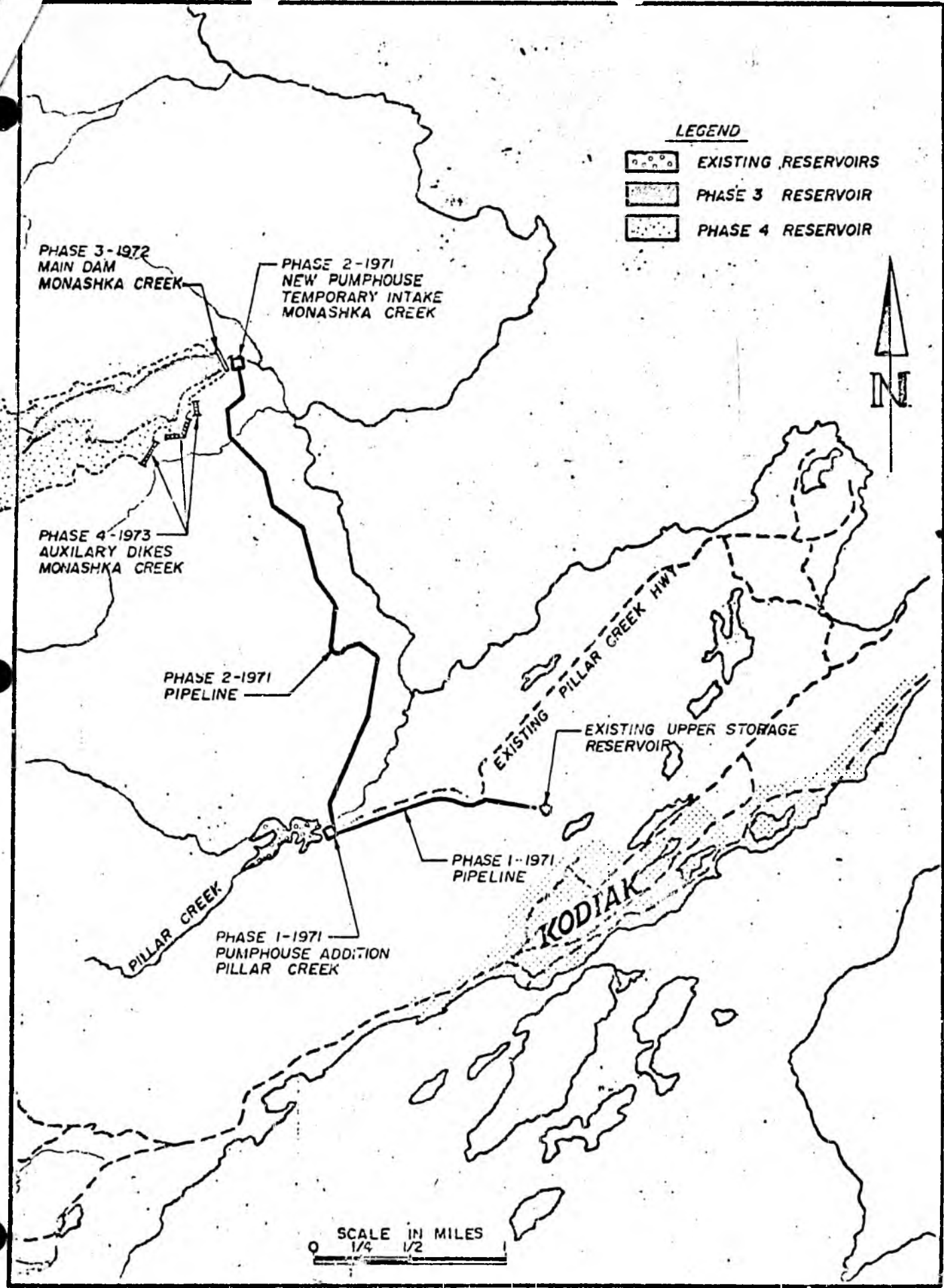
B - Proposed

1. Construction of a new 10 mgd pumphouse at Monashka Creek.
2. Construction of the Monashka Creek Dam and permanent intake.
3. Construction of three auxiliary dikes near the Monashka Creek Dam to permit raising the level of the reservoir to 160 feet.

Construction of the proposed new, 20-inch line from Pillar Creek to the City will allow pumping at rates of up to 10 mgd when Monashka Creek is connected to the system.

# WATER & SEWER GRANTS

## HOUSE RESOURCES COMMITTEE REPORT

### DEPARTMENT OF ENVIRONMENTAL CONSERVATION BUDGET

April 20, 1972

As the newest department in the state government, and as one whose relative importance in relation to other government activities can only increase in coming years, the House Resources Committee has made a detailed review of this agency's budget requests. The committee findings are summarized as follows:

(1) In general, the committee believes the operating budget recommended by the Governor (essentially unchanged from the agency request) provides sufficient funds to adequately carry out the Department's operational responsibilities.

(2) The capital budget for the Department of Environmental Conservation as it related to state assistance in funding municipal water and sewer systems is inadequate. The \$2 million in general fund monies deleted in the Governor's budget from the agency request should be reinstated. ✓

(3) Agency projections of expected operating budgets in years beyond F-Y 73 seriously underestimate the funds required during these future years. The committee expects that agency responsibilities during this period are likely to expand at a faster rate than expected.

(4) Because of the large amount of federal grant funds administered by this agency it should, in conjunction with other state departments such as Health and Welfare, consider the establishment of an Alaska state office in Washington, D.C. It is believed that savings in travel could probably pay for this office at the present time. In addition, such an office could assist Alaska municipalities in acquiring federal grants and loans, and make it possible for Alaska to compete with other states on a more equitable basis for the increasing amounts of federal funds which are becoming available for distribution to state and municipal governments.

Only recommendation (2) requires additional funding at this time, and thus the balance of this report will be restricted to an explanation of this item.

Under AS 46.03.030 the Department of Environmental Conservation is authorized to make grants to municipalities for water and sewer systems and sewage treatment facilities up to the maximum of 25% of the cost of those facilities. This state assistance, along with local funding, makes it possible for these municipalities to receive federal grants, often in excess of 50% of the total value of the project. Last year \$2 million in general fund monies were appropriated

for this purpose. The Department of Environmental Conservation requested a similar amount this year but had the entire amount removed by the Governor's budget review committee. No specific explanation as to why this cut has been made in this category rather than in any other has been given to the Resources Committee.

In view of the federal funding which is lost as a consequence of this cut, the continuing hazards to public health and safety as evidenced by the recent situation in Cordova, and the fact that failure to move ahead with construction of required sewage treatment facilities constitutes an outright violation of federal law, the committee believes that the deletion of this \$2 million is unwise and uncalled for and recommends strongly that it be reinstated.

The attached copy of a letter from the Commissioner of the Department of Environmental Conservation outlines specific projects which could be placed under construction during the current season if additional funds to carry the purposes of AS 46.03.030 are made available by the legislature.

this program. As we view it we have two alternatives as to the use of this money - a. add operational money to existing personnel or b. add new personnel with a limited amount of operational money. We have chosen the latter alternative and created two regional coordinating positions (working title) and a part-time clerk.

The maintenance level figure was arrived at by summarizing the costs necessary to coordinate the Habitat Section program in Southeast and Southcentral Alaska, even though other "elements" were picking-up the cost. This cost was then centralized in the water planning element.

The funding level in this element will remain constant until we can achieve a higher level of non-federally aided matching money - i.e. General Fund.

Perhaps the greatest challenge facing resource agencies today is providing access to the resources. This is true whether the user is a recreationist or a miner or lumberman. In Alaska, today, we have vast areas of public land and it would seem that access problems would be minimal. However the archaic federal land laws that have allowed strip development and have led to fraudulent land entry are the cause of a myriad of access problems. We have a double responsibility in Alaska to protect existing access and to negotiate the return of lost lands.

Again, there are few alternatives that are acceptable. There are alternatives as to how to protect access but not if you need to protect it. The alternatives available as to techniques are as follows:

1. Buy private land
2. Protect public land by zoning for public access corridors
3. Enact legislation declaring access corridors along all water bodies or section lines, etc.
4. Negotiate pedestrian easements at token cost through private lands.

Note: This list essentially reflects the projects and approximate amounts that had to be deleted from the authorized FY 72 construction program. This was due to the fact that the FY 1972 appropriation bill tied the source of funding directly to fuel tax receipts. Three new projects are recommended (Sitka, Fairbanks & Whittier) and two moved to the proposed bond measure (Kake & King Cove). Other minor adjustments have also been made to cover anticipated extra work, changed conditions and other contract overruns. Technically speaking, except for the three locations listed above, these projects have already been authorized for construction by the legislature, however, the program was inadvertently underfunded.

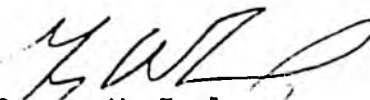

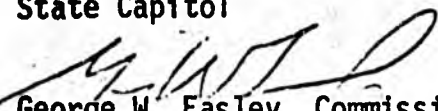
