

Sec. 6. That any person violating or aiding in the violation of any order or notification issued by any inspector of live stock shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof be confined in jail for a period of not less than three nor more than six months and shall be fined not less than one hundred nor more than one thousand dollars for each offense. ^{Penalty}

Sec. 7. An emergency is hereby declared to exist and this act shall take effect upon its passage.

CHAPTER 39.

(H. B. NO. 88.)

AN ACT to amend section 43 of Title II of the Act of Congress of March 3, 1899, entitled, "An act to define and punish crimes in the District of Alaska and to provide a code of criminal procedure for said district."

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the Territory of Alaska:

That section 43, of Title II, of the Act of Congress approved March 3, 1899, entitled, "An act to define and punish crimes in the District of Alaska and to provide a code of criminal procedure for said district," be and is hereby amended to read as follows: ^{Joinder of counts in indictment}

"When there are several charges against any person for the same act or transaction, or for two or more acts or transactions connected together, or for two or more acts or transactions of the same class of crimes or offenses, which may be properly joined, instead of having several indictments the whole may be joined in one indict-

ment in separate counts; and if two or more indictments are found in such cases, the court may order them to be consolidated."

CHAPTER 40.

(H. B. NO. 76.)

AN ACT to provide for the appointment of commissioners for the promotion of uniformity of legislation in the United States.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the Territory of Alaska:

Appointment
Commissioners
on Uniform
Legislation

Section 1. Within thirty (30) days after the passage of this act the Governor shall appoint by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, three commissioners, who, with their successors, are hereby constituted a Board of Commissioners by the name and style of "The Board of Commissioners for the Promotion of Uniform Legislation in the United States." All appointments hereunder shall be submitted to the Senate by the Governor on the first day the Senate may be in session after the same are made. The Senate may approve or disapprove any such appointment before its final adjournment; and, if any such appointment be so disapproved by the Senate the office shall become vacant. If the Senate shall fail to act upon any such appointment before its final adjournment, the office shall become vacant upon the final adjournment of the Senate.

Sec. 2. Term of Office—The term of office of the first three commissioners appointed hereunder shall be two, four and six years respectively; but the term of office
