

Care and Support of insane Persons in the Territory of Alaska"; and

Whereas, the buildings provided for in said Act to be built at Fairbanks and Nome have not been constructed for the reason, as stated by the Governor of Alaska, given upon the advice of the Attorney General, that no provision was made in said Act for the purchase of sites upon which to construct such buildings, and that the Government could not accept the donation of sites; and

Whereas, all insane persons in the Fourth and Second Judicial Divisions are forced to remain in the United States jails, awaiting a convenient time for their transportation; and

Whereas, the sum of Four Thousand Dollars will purchase suitable sites in the Towns of Fairbanks and Nome for the hospitals provided for in said Act;

Now, therefore, we, your memorialists, do most earnestly and respectfully request that an appropriation be made in the sum of Four Thousand Dollars to purchase suitable sites for the construction of detention hospitals at Fairbanks and Nome, as provided in the Act of Congress of June 25th, 1910, entitled: "An Act to Provide for the Care and Support of Insane Persons in the Territory of Alaska."

And we, your memorialists, will ever pray.

SENATE JOINT MEMORIAL NO. 18.

To the Attorney General of the United States:

Whereas, the Town Council of the Town of Seward, Alaska, have petitioned the Territorial Legislature of Alaska for the construction of a Federal Building, and

for the holding of a regular term of court in that town; and

Whereas, the construction of a Federal Building and the holding of a regular term of court in the town of Seward would facilitate the court business of the Third Judicial Division of Alaska, (and be of much benefit to the citizens of that locality;

Therefore, we, your memorialists, the Senate of the Territorial Legislature of Alaska, the House of Representatives concurring, would respectfully ask that the Department of Justice take up the subject matter herein set forth and take action thereon at its earliest convenience.

SENATE JOINT MEMORIAL NO. 20.

To the Honorable, the President of the United States of America:

Whereas, Alaska is dependant upon the Federal Government for administrative improvements; and

Whereas, Alaska and its citizens are of the opinion that great advantage would accrue to Alaska and to the nation should the President of the United States visit Alaska, thus gain personal knowledge of the country and afford our citizens the honor and privilege of meeting the Chief Executive of our nation;
