
HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION NO. 6.

TO THE HONORABLE ALBERT B. FALL, SECRETARY OF THE INTERIOR. GREETINGS:

WHEREAS, Alaska is dependent upon the Federal Government for administrative improvements, and

WHEREAS, it is evident that an era of great development of the vast natural resources of Alaska is to be inaugurated by the Government, and

WHEREAS, the people of the Territory of Alaska feel that a great advantage would occur to this Territory and to the nation at large, should the Secretary of the Interior visit this great Empire, and thus gain personal knowledge of the country, and give our citizens an opportunity of meeting one who has manifested so great an interest in our welfare and development,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the House of the Legislature of the Territory of Alaska, the Senate concurring, that it is the sense of the people of Alaska that for and on behalf of Alaska, an invitation should be, and the same is hereby respectfully tendered to the Secretary of the Interior to visit Alaska, meet the people thereof, gain first hand information as to the solution of the vast problems now confronting us, and grant the citizens of Alaska the privilege of greeting the Secretary of the Interior on their own soil as their honored guest.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that an engrossed copy of this resolution, duly certified, be forwarded to the Secretary of the Interior, Albert B. Fall, and that we do most respectfully urge that such invitation be accepted, and the Secretary of the Interior visit the Territory of Alaska at his earliest convenience.

HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION NO. 9.

WHEREAS, the daily journal of the House and Senate for May 5th has not been read or approved, and as the validity of all measures passed by the Legislature on that date depends upon the correct journal entries being made at each stage of their consideration;

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the House and Senate concurring, that the President of the Senate and Speaker of the

House, in conjunction with the Secretary of the Senate and Chief Clerk of the House, be authorized, after the close of the Session, to revise and arrange said journals in proper and correct order and sign same, and that said President of the Senate and Speaker of the House be allowed the same salary as they are now receiving, as members of the Legislature, for a period of time not to exceed ten days.
