

that an institution for the care of the Alaska insane patients be established in Alaska at some convenient and desirable location, any number of which can be obtained where the climate and facilities are conducive to the proper treatment, care and welfare of the insane patients:

AND IT IS RESOLVED by the Fifth Legislative Assembly of the Territory of Alaska, that this petition be forwarded to the Congress of the United States with an urgent request that the same be given immediate consideration and that immediate steps be taken for the abrogation of the present contract system and for the establishment of an asylum and sanitarium for the insane in the Territory of Alaska.

IT IS FURTHER RESOLVED that the Secretary of the Territory of Alaska be, and he hereby is, instructed to forthwith transmit copies of this Memorial and petition properly authenticated to the President of the United States, to the Secretary of the Interior and to the Delegate to Congress from Alaska.

HOUSE JOINT MEMORIAL NO. 20.

TO THE PRESIDENT OF THE UNITED STATES AND THE SECRETARY OF THE INTERIOR:

We, your Memorialists, the Legislature of the Territory of Alaska, in Fifth Regular Session assembled, do most respectfully and earnestly represent that

WHEREAS, there are many water power sites in Alaska, exact information regarding which is exceedingly meager; and, whereas, water power is important to the development of the mining, cannery and wood pulp industries; and, whereas, the only investigation made of such potential water power is carried on by small allotments made from the appropriations for the investigation of mineral resources of Alaska;

NOW, THEREFORE, your Memorialists respectfully urge that Congress appropriate at least forty thousand dollars (\$40,000) to be used in investigating the water resources of Alaska with reference to their use in mining, wood-pulp and other industries.

BE IT RESOLVED, that certified copies of this Memorial be sent to the Delegate to Congress from Alaska, the Secretary of the Interior and the President of the United States.

HOUSE JOINT MEMORIAL NO. 21.

TO THE PRESIDENT OF THE UNITED STATES AND THE SECRETARY OF COMMERCE:

We, your Memorialists, the Legislature of the Territory of Alaska, in Fifth Regular Session assembled, do most respectfully and earnestly represent that

WHEREAS, only about nine per cent of the Alaskan ocean waterways have been charted, and there is a great lack of lighthouses and other aids to navigation; and, whereas, these conditions form one of the greatest elements to the high operating cost of Alaskan steamers; and, whereas, exact information regarding such conditions is exceedingly hard to obtain;

NOW, THEREFORE, we, your Memorialists, respectfully recommend and urge that the Geodetic Survey extend its work to the waters of said Territory with a view to obtaining the necessary information at the earliest possible moment, and that as soon as possible a light house be built at Cape Spencer near Icy Straits, and that aids to navigation be placed at the entrance of Kuskokwim River.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that certified copies of this Memorial be forwarded by the Secretary of the Territory of Alaska to the Delegate to Congress from Alaska, the Secretary of Commerce and to the President of the United States.

TO THE PRESIDENT OF THE UNITED STATES, THE CONGRESS OF THE UNITED STATES AND THE SECRETARY OF AGRICULTURE:
