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**SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION NO. 10.**

TO THE HONORABLE WARREN G. HARDING, PRESIDENT  
OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA, GREETINGS:

WHEREAS, Alaska is dependent upon the Federal Government for administrative improvements, and

WHEREAS, it is evident that an era of great development of the vast natural resources of Alaska is to be inaugurated by the Government, and

WHEREAS, the citizens of Alaska are of the opinion that a great advantage would occur to this Territory and to the nation at large, should the President of the United States visit this great Empire, and thus gain personal knowledge of the country, and afford to our citizens the honor and privilege of meeting the Chief Executive of our Nation.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate of the Legislature of the Territory of Alaska, the House concurring, that it is the sense of the people of Alaska that for and on behalf of Alaska, an invitation should be, and the same is hereby respectfully tendered to the President of the United States to visit Alaska, meet the people thereof, gain first hand information as to the solution of the vast problems now confronting us, and grant the citizens of Alaska the honor of greeting the President of the United States on their own soil, as their guest.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that an engrossed copy of this memorial, duly certified, be forwarded to the President of the United States, Warren G. Harding, and to him and to our nation do we pledge our people in loyalty and patriotism, firmly believing that right and justice will prevail, and all obstacles to the further progress and development be removed.

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**SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION NO. 12.**

BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate, the House of Representatives concurring, that the Attorney-General of the Territory be, and he is directed to compile the Session Laws enacted at all former Sessions and the present Session of the Legisla-

ture of the Territory of Alaska, codifying the same, with proper annotations, marginal side-notes, and other references, and prepare a full and complete index to the same, and report the same to the next biennial Session of the Legislature with such amendments and suggestions attached thereto, as may eliminate any conflict, inconsistencies or variance in said laws, together with any suggestions which he may have for the printing thereof.

### SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION NO. 13.

BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate, the House concurring, that the Territorial Treasurer is hereby directed and empowered to employ an accountant to audit forthwith all accounts of the Board of Trustees of the Pioneers' Home at Sitka, and file a copy of his report with the Governor and the Attorney General of the Territory; the expense thereof to be paid from the Emergency Appropriation.

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## House Joint Resolutions

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### HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 1.

BE IT RESOLVED by the Legislature of the Territory of Alaska that the House Committee on Judiciary and Federal Relations be authorized to employ a clerk at an expenditure of not to exceed Three Hundred Dollars (\$300.00).

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### HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 3.

BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the Legislature of the Territory of Alaska, the Senate concurring, that the Governor be, and is hereby, authorized to investigate the claim of the Seward General Hospital for reimbursement for repairs made thereto, from the funds of the Seward Chapter of the American Red Cross Society, and, if in his judgment such claim is just, he is further authorized to forego any claim or any part thereof the Territory may have against said funds, provided, that the Seward General Hospital becomes the beneficiary thereby, otherwise, he shall take all necessary steps to obtain legal adjudication of all the claims of the Territory.
