For the division between the parties of their joint property, or the separate property of each, in such manner as may be just, and without regard as to which of the parties is the owner of such property; and to accomplish this end the judgment may require one of the parties to assign, deliver or convey any of his or her real or personal property to the other party; and the provisions of Section 1213 of the Compiled Laws of Alaska 1913 shall apply to any such judgment.

## CHAPTER 34.

### AN ACT

[S. B. 71]

Placing a bounty on eagles, providing for the payment of the same, requiring the making of certificates as to the killing of eagles, penalizing the making of false certificate for the purpose of fraudulently obtaining money and providing for the punishment thereof.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the Territory of Alaska:

Section 1. That there be, and hereby is, placed upon every eagle within the Territory of Alaska, a bounty of One (\$1.00) Dollar, said sum to be paid in accordance with the provisions of this Act.

Section 2. To obtain said bounty, any person killing an eagle within the Territory of Alaska, after the passage of this Act, shall, as soon as possible, exhibit both feet of said eagle, to any United States Commissioner within the Territory of Alaska, together with a certificate in substantially the following form:

Section 3. In the presence of the United States Commissioner, and after obtaining the United States Commissioner's signature to the above certificate, the person making the above certificate shall enclose the same in an envelope and together with both feet of the eagle or eagles so killed, mail the same to the Treasurer of Alaska, at Juneau, Alaska. Upon receipt of such certificate duly signed and accompanied by both feet of the eagle or eagles so killed, the Treasurer of Alaska shall forward the amount due to the person so killing

said eagle or eagles and shall then destroy the feet of said eagle or eagles.

Section 4. Any person making a false certificate for the purpose of fraudulently obtaining any money from the Treasurer of the Territory of Alaska under the provisions of this Act, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof shall be punished by a fine of one hundred (\$100.00) dollars for the first offense and two hundred and fifty (\$250.00) dollars for a second or other offense, or be imprisoned for a period of six months for the first offense, or both such fine and imprisonments, in the discretion of the court. <sup>Penalty for false certificate.</sup>

Section 5. All acts and parts of acts in conflict herewith and particularly Chapter 12 Session Laws of Alaska 1917, are hereby repealed; but such repeal shall not prevent the collection or bar the payment of any money earned, or due, or to become due under the provisions of said Chapter 12, nor shall it bar the punishment of any violation of said act. <sup>Repeal.</sup>

## CHAPTER 35.

### AN ACT

[S. B. 78]

To prohibit other than competent miners to be employed as foremen, assistant foremen, or fire-bosses, in coal mines.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the Territory of Alaska:

Section 1. It shall be unlawful for the operator of any coal mine employing over ten (10) men underground on any one shift in the Territory of Alaska to have in his service as mine foreman, assistant mine foreman, or fire-boss, any person who does not either; <sup>Unlawful to employ as mine foreman, etc., anyone without—</sup>

(a) hold a certificate of competency as such mine foreman, assistant mine foreman, or fire-boss, issued by any
