HOUSE JOINT MEMORIAL NO. 14.

TO THE HONORABLE, THE SECRETARY OF THE INTERIOR:

Your memorialist, the Legislature of Alaska, respectfully says:

There is a great crying, human need for a detention ward, or temporary quarters of some kind at the U. S. Government Hospital, situated at Juneau, Alaska, where tubercular patients may be cared for until some definite arrangement can be made for them. In the outlying villages there are many natives who have no medical aid. The natives, suffering from tuberculosis, come from different villages, expecting to find relief. The government hospital does not take care of tubercular cases.

To add another story to present hospital would not be expensive, as it merely entails the finishing of what now is an attic. The hospital soon will need a new roof; and another floor can be added at a little additional expense, which will result in a ward for men and one for women, each of which will accommodate ten patients. They will be entirely segregated from other patients.

WHEREFORE, your memorialist asks that steps be taken to cure the situation above recited.
