

Senate Concurrent Resolutions

SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION NO. 1.

BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate and the House of Representatives concurring, that a joint session of the Senate and the House of said Legislature of the Territory of Alaska, be held in the hall of the House at 2 o'clock on the afternoon of Wednesday, the 9th day of March, A. D. 1927, for the purpose of receiving the message of the Governor of the Territory of Alaska.

Passed the Senate, March 7, 1927.

Concurred in by the House, March 9, 1927.

SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION NO. 2.

BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate and the House of Representatives concurring, that the Joint Committee on Printing and Purchasing be instructed to have printed five hundred (500) copies of the Report of the Territorial Banking Board for the years 1925-1926.

SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION NO. 3.

BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate and the House of Representatives concurring, that a joint meeting of the Senate and the House of said Territorial Legislature, be held in the hall of the House at 8 o'clock on Tuesday evening, March 29, 1927, for the purpose of a public hearing on Senate Bill No. 1, familiarly known as the Comptroller Bill.

SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION NO. 4.

BE IT RESOLVED, by the Senate of the Alaska Legislature, the House concurring, that the President of the Senate

cooperate with the Speaker of the House and Governor George A. Parks in arranging a joint committee meeting of the entire membership of both the House and the Senate, with Governor George A. Parks presiding, for the purpose of formulating the best plan of procedure to correct the present iniquitous and inhuman contract system of caring for Alaska's Insane.

SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION NO. 5.

BE IT RESOLVED, by the Senate of the Legislature of the Territory of Alaska, the House concurring, that the recent purchase, under contract of fulfillment, from the U. S. Forestry Bureau, of a large tract of timber from the National Forest Reserves of the Ketchikan district, for the purpose of erecting and operating large pulp and paper mills, by Izadore and J. D. Zellerbach, and the purchase of a large tract of timber in the Juneau district, under like conditions and for a like purpose, by Geo. T. Cameron, of San Francisco, California, mark a new epoch in the permanent industries of Alaska and inspire renewed confidence in the future development and advancement of this great Territory.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that it is the desire of this Legislative body to extend encouragement and every legitimate support, consonant with public welfare, to the encouragement and establishment of legitimate industrial enterprises throughout the length and breadth of the Territory of Alaska.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Legislature of the Territory of Alaska, acting in behalf of the people of Alaska, request the Governor to transmit to the above named Izadore Zellerbach and J. D. Zellerbach, and to Geo. T. Cameron a copy of this resolution together with such comment as he deems fitting.
