

CHAPTER 27.

AN ACT

[H. B. 7]

To amend Section 1 of Chapter 2 of the 1913 Session Laws of the Territory of Alaska entitled "An Act in relation to legal holidays and repealing Sections 716, 717 of Chapter 71, title 2 of the Code of Civil Procedure for Alaska" and repealing Chapter 1 of the 1917 Session Laws of Alaska relating to the same subject.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the Territory of Alaska:

Section 1. That Section 1 of Chapter 2, of the 1913 Session Laws of the Territory of Alaska be amended to read as follows:

"Section 1. The following days are legal holidays, namely: Sunday; the first day of January, commonly called New Year's Day; the twelfth day of February, commonly called Lincoln's Birthday; the twenty-second day of February, commonly called Washington's Birthday; the thirtieth day of March, to be called Seward's Day in commemoration of the signing of the treaty ceding Alaska to the United States; the 4th day of July, commonly called Independence Day; the first Monday in September, commonly called Labor Day; the eighteenth day of October, commonly called Alaska Day; the eleventh day of November, commonly called Armistice Day; the twenty-fifth day of December, commonly called Christmas Day; and any day designated by public proclamation by the President of the United States or the Governor of the Territory of Alaska, as a legal holiday, or as a day of Thanksgiving; the day known and observed as Memorial or Decoration Day and the day on which a general election is held throughout the Territory of Alaska.

Section 2. That Chapter 1 of the 1917 Session Laws of the Territory of Alaska be and the same is hereby repealed.

CHAPTER 28.

AN ACT

[H. B. 15]

To provide for the escheatment of property belonging to defunct fraternal, beneficial or social organizations or corporations, and declaring an emergency.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the Territory of Alaska:

Escheatment

Section 1. Whenever any fraternal, beneficial or social organization or corporation shall become defunct leaving money or property belonging to it, and no person interested in such money or property shall, within four years after such organization or corporation ceased to function, institute any proceeding to have such money or property distributed to persons entitled thereto, the same shall be delivered or transferred to the Treasurer of the Territory. If the person or persons in possession of or holding such money or property shall refuse to do so, or if the property be real estate, the Attorney General shall institute the proper proceedings to recover such money or other property for, or to adjudge title to such real estate to be in, the Territory.

Section 2. That no action or proceeding in court shall be instituted by the Attorney General until one year after the passage and approval of this Act, and that any person interested in any money or property belonging to such organization or corporation who does not institute the proper proceedings within four years after such organization or corporation becomes defunct, or within one year after the passage or approval of
