

CHAPTER 96.

AN ACT

[S. B. 33]

To amend Sections 2 and 5 of Chapter 94 of the 1923 Session Laws of the Territory of Alaska as amended, relative to licensing of fishermen.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the Territory of Alaska:

Section 1. That Section 2 of Chapter 94 of the 1923 Session Laws of the Territory of Alaska is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Section 2. Licenses to fish in the waters of Alaska shall be issued by the Treasurer of the Territory and by such other persons as shall by the Treasurer be deputized for that purpose. Provided, that there may be a deputy appointed in every incorporated city on the coast of Alaska with power to administer oaths to applicants; and, provided further, that there may be two itinerant deputies for each of the First and Third Divisions with like power to administer oaths. Such deputies shall also have power to make arrests and enforce compliance with this Act. Itinerant deputies shall each be supplied with a badge of office constructed of metal with the words "Fish Tax Collector" engraved thereon and which badge they shall wear plainly exposed when on duty.

License fee.

The license fee shall be as follows:

- (a) For resident fishermen of all classes \$1.00;
- (b) For non-resident fishermen who use hook and line in trolling, \$250.00;
- (c) For non-resident fishermen who use gill nets, \$10.00;

(d) For non-resident fishermen who use seines, \$25.00.

Such fee shall be paid before the license is granted or issued and shall accompany the application for license.

The application for license shall be addressed to the Treasurer of the Territory, shall give the age and place of residence of the applicant, and, if the applicant be a resident of Alaska, it shall state how long he has been such resident immediately preceding the signing of the application.

The application shall also state whether the applicant is a native born or naturalized citizen; and, if foreign born, whether or not he has declared his intention to become a citizen of the United States. If he be a naturalized citizen the application shall state where and when he became a citizen, and if he has declared his intention to become a citizen the application shall state where and when such intention was declared.

Section 2. Section 5 of Chapter 94 of the 1923 Session Laws of the Territory of Alaska is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Section 5. The term "fishing" as used in this Act means the catching of fish, whether by hook, net or seine.

Definitions.

By the term "fisherman" as used in this Act is meant anyone engaged in "fishing" as above interpreted.

The term "resident" fisherman used in this Act shall mean one who at the time of applying for a license shall be a bona fide resident of the Territory of Alaska and shall have been

such resident continuously for at least one year immediately preceding the signing of such application.

The term "nonresident" fisherman as used in this Act shall mean one who is not a "resident" fisherman as above interpreted.

CHAPTER 97.

AN ACT

[S. B. 60]

To revise and codify the laws relating to public schools in the Territory of Alaska, and repealing certain Acts in conflict herewith.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the Territory of Alaska:

ARTICLE I.

Public School System Established.

Uniform public school system established.

Section 1. School System Established. There is hereby established in the Territory of Alaska a uniform system of public schools to be administered and maintained as hereinafter provided.

Public schools defined.

Section 2. Public Schools Defined. Public schools within the meaning of this Act shall include elementary schools, high schools, normal high schools, citizenship night schools for adults, and such other public educational institutions as hereafter may be established; Provided, that nothing in this Act shall be construed as referring to or as including schools for Alaska aborigines, which are now and which may hereafter come under the control of the Federal Government and be administered and supervised through the United States Bureau of Education of the Department of the Interior.
