House Concurrent Resolutions

HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION NO. 2.

WHEREAS, E. P. Cox, of Nenana, Alaska, has incurred expenses and had property belonging to him destroyed in and by reason of a smallpox epidemic at Nenana, Alaska, during the year 1928; and

WHEREAS, it appears there are funds in the hands of the Governor of Alaska in the "Contingent Quarantine Expenses and Prevention of Diseases" Account more than sufficient to cover this bill of the said E. P. Cox amounting to One Hundred Fifty (\$150.00) Dollars;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the Legislature of the Territory of Alaska, the Senate concurring, that the Governor of Alaska be directed to pay said claim of E. P. Cox, in amount not to exceed One Hundred and Fifty (\$150.00) Dollars.

HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION NO. 3.

WHEREAS, the daily journal of the House and Senate for May 2, 1929 has not been read or approved, and as the validity of all measures passed by the Legislature on that date depends upon the correct journal entries being made at each stage of their consideration;

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the House, the Senate concurring, that the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House in conjunction with the Secretary of the Senate and Chief Clerk of the House, be authorized, after the close of the Session, to revise and arrange said journals in proper and correct order and sign same, and that said President of the Senate, Speaker of the House, Secretary of Senate and Chief Clerk of House be allowed the same salary as they are now receiving, as members of the Legislature, for a period of time not to exceed ten days to be paid by the Territorial Treasurer from any funds in the Treasury not otherwise appropriated.

House Resolutions

HOUSE RESOLUTION NO. 1.

BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives, that an invitation be extended to the Hon. Henry O'Malley, Commissioner of Fisheries of the United States, to appear before the House at such date as he may find convenient for the purpose of conferring with the members of the Legislature of the Territory of Alaska with regard to matters pertaining to the fisheries of the Territory in order that the House may be more fully informed with regard to legislation coming before it.

Adopted by the House, March 8, 1929.

HOUSE RESOLUTION NO. 2.

BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the Alaska Territorial Legislature in Ninth regular session assembled:

That we commend, without reservation, the Honorable George A. Parks, Governor of Alaska, as a true and loyal Alaskan, an honorable and upright man, and an excellent administrator, of whom Alaskans may well be proud. We commend Governor Parks for the marked ability with which he has performed the duties of his office; we commend him for his fairness and impartiality; we commend him for the labor he has taken to acquaint himself with the needs of the various regions of Alaska, and for the thoughtful consideration he has given to the many problems which confront him; we commend him for his scrupulous care in confining his activities to the proper performance of his own duties, and in never invading the field of action reserved for the Alaska Territorial Legislature by the provisions of the Organic Act of Alaska; we commend him for his good temper and sanity when he has been (and that lately) vilified and traduced by men who in their eagerness to obtain political jobs at the public expense have passed far beyond the bounds of truth and of decency; we commend him because he is a gentleman.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that a copy of this Resolution be sent to the President, a copy to the United States Senate, a copy to the United States House of Representatives, and ten copies to the Honorable Dan A. Sutherland, Delegate to Congress from Alaska, for distribution among the heads of the departments of the Government.
