

Section 2. That whenever any personal property belonging to the Territory shall have become superfluous or of no further use to the Territory, the same may be sold in such manner and on such terms as the Governor shall approve, and the moneys received for such property at such sale shall be covered into the Treasury of the Territory. Provided, however, that this shall not be construed to prevent old and worn office furniture or office supplies to be traded in part exchange for new ones of the same general character.

Superfluous Territorial property may be sold.

CHAPTER 43.

AN ACT

[H. B. 60]

To authorize advertisement of the advantages of construction of the proposed International Highway between Fairbanks, Alaska, and Seattle, Washington, and making an appropriation therefor.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the Territory of Alaska:

Section 1. That the Alaska Road Commission is hereby authorized to advertise the advantages of the construction of the proposed automobile highway between Fairbanks, Alaska, and Seattle, Washington, through Yukon Territory and British Columbia, in such manner as such commission may deem advisable and to expend therefor not to exceed the sum of One Thousand Dollars during the current biennium.

Alaska Road Commission to advertise International Highway.

Limitation of expenditure.

Section 2. For the purpose of carrying into effect the provisions of the foregoing section the sum of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00), or so much thereof as shall be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of the general fund of the Territory not otherwise appropriated, and it shall be the duty of the Auditor to draw warrants against this appropriation in payment

CHAPTER 44.

AN ACT

[H. B. 61]

To provide for the return of taxes illegally collected and paid under protest.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the Territory of Alaska:

Providing for
return of taxes
illegally
collected.

Section 1. Whenever any taxes shall have been paid to the Treasurer of the Territory under protest and such taxes shall have been covered into the Treasury of the Territory, and such taxpayers shall have recovered judgment against the Treasurer of the Territory for the return of such tax, or where, in absence of such judgment, it shall become obvious to the Governor, the Treasurer and the Attorney General that such taxpayer would recover judgment against the Treasurer for such tax if legal proceedings therefor were prosecuted by him, it shall be the duty of the Auditor of the Territory to issue a warrant against the general fund of the Territory for the amount of such tax in favor of such taxpayer upon approval of the Governor and the Treasurer of the Territory.
